The Tahoka High School '3-D Band and High School Choir will present their annual free Christmas concert this Monday night, Dec. 16, in the high school auditorium from 7 to 8 p.m. The choir will be singing Little Drummer Boy, Donna Pacem, and Silent Night. The band, under the direction of Carroll Rhodes and assistant Lora Smith, will perform The Grinch Who Stole Christmas, Patapan, Chanukah, Yuletide Festival, and Lord of the Rings.

"We invite all to come and get in the Christmas mood and support these outstanding band and choir students," said Rhodes.



I WONDER how many people in Lynn County are suffering from paraskevidekatriaphobics. I wonder how many local residents can pronounce it, or spell it. Or know what this disease is? Certainly not me; I had to copy it off an internet printout.

What it means, according to a researcher named David Emery, on a site called About.com, is a person who is afflicted with a morbid, irrational fear of Friday the 13th, which is tomorrow, if you're reading this on Dec. 12. According to one source, 21 million persons in the USA fear what could happen on Friday the 13th. There are lots of superstitions about Friday the 13th. and about Fridays and the number 13, some of which I may get to before I finish this literary offense.

First, though, I found it interesting that he cites a British scientific study that indicates Friday the 13th is not a good day for driving.

With the aim of examining "the relation between health, behaviour and superstition surrounding Friday 13th in the United Kingdom," the authors compared the ratios of traffic volume to traffic accidents on two different days, Friday the 6th and Friday the 13th, over a period of years. They found that although fewer people chose to drive on Friday the 13th, the number of hospital admissions due to accidents was significantly higher than on normal Fridays.

They concluded that "Friday the 13th is unlucky for some. The risk of hospital admission as a result of a vehicular accident may be increased by as much as 52 per cent. Staying at home is recommended." (Maybe it would help if they didn't all drive on the wrong side of the road).

Some people, said Mr. Emery, won't go to work on Friday the 13th (a new excuse, to me). Some won't eat in restaurants, and many would not schedule a wedding on the date.

Even by itself the number 13 is considered unlucky by many. It is said that if 13 people sit down to dinner together, all will die within the year (some places I have eaten, it could happen before the day is over). . . Many cities do not have a 13th St. and many building don't have a 13th floor (none in Lynn County do). . . If you have 13 letters in your name, you will have "the devil's luck." Examples cited were Jack the Ripper, Charles Manson, Jeffrey Dahmer, Theodore Bundy and Albert De Salvo. Osama bin Laden was not mentioned.

It is said ... Never change your bed on Friday; it will bring bad dreams. Don't start a trip on Friday or you will have misfortune. If you cut your nails on Friday, you cut them for sorrow. Ships that set sail on a Friday will have bad luck - as in the tale of H.M.S. Friday ... One hundred years ago, the British government sought to debunk the widespread superstition among seamen that sailing on Friday was unlucky. A special ship was commissioned, to be named "H.M.S. Friday." They laid her keel on a Friday, launched her on a Friday, selected the crew on a Friday and put her in command of Captain Jim Friday. Finally, H.M.S. Friday embarked on her maiden voyage on a Friday - and was never seen or heard from again.

Some say Friday's bad reputation in western culture goes all the way back to the Garden of Eden. It was on a Friday, supposedly, that Eve tempted Adam with the forbidden fruit. Adam bit, and they were both ejected from Paradise. Tradition also holds that the Great Flood began on a Friday; God tonguetied the builders of the Tower of Babel on a Friday; the Temple of Solomon was destroyed on a Friday; and Friday was the day of the week on which Christ was crucified. Traditionally, it is a

day of penance for Christians.

But some sources say the pall over the sixth day of the week predates Christianity. In Rome, Friday was execution day (later Hangman's Day in Britain). In other pagan cultures Friday was the Sabbath, a day of worship. Those who indulged in secular or self-interested activities on that day could not expect to receive blessings from the gods - which may explain the lingering taboo on embarking on journeys or starting important projects on Fridays.

Still other sources pinpoint the origin of superstition about Friday the 13th as a specific event: the rounding up of the Knights Templar for torture and execution by King Philip IV of France on Friday, Oct. 13, 1307.

Fortunately the Elks Club and the Rotarians were not meeting that day.

A.D. Wes Cope Resigns; Tejeda Named TISD Officer

Athletic Director Wes Cope has resigned the AD/Head Football Coach position at Tahoka Independent School District, and school officials are now accepting applications for the position, Superintendent Jimmy Parker told trustees at last week's school board meeting.

Cope has offered no comment to The News on his resignation, and Supt. Parker also declined to comment on the situation, noting merely that he has accepted Cope's resignation which is effective at the end of his contract, on June 30. In the meantime, Cope has been reassigned from AD duties to teaching two PE classes and hall monitoring duties, and High School Principal Cliff Gardner has been named interim Athletic Direc-

tor until the position can be filled. Cope's salary at TISD is \$51,500.

One other resignation was noted, that of first grade teacher Kathy Druesedow, who is moving away from the area. Trustees approved an employment agreement to Angela Larpenter to fill the teaching position for next semester, which was unanimously approved.

Stroope, Moore Named First Team All-District

Ben Stroope, a fierce tackler at linebacker for the Tahoka Bulldogs last season, and Adrian Moore, who led all South Plains pass receivers, were named to the first team All-District 4-AA squads.

Stroope was the leading tackler in just about every game he played in before being injured toward the end of the season. The 185-pound senior also was selected on the sec-. ond team offense as a tackle.

Moore, a 170-pound senior, was the only Tahoka player named on the first team offense. Stroope and three other Bulldogs, all seniors, were named to the second team offense.

They were Josh Pridmore at wide receiver, Matt Wells at running back, and Brandon McCord, the leading passer in Class AA on the South Plains.

Warren Baker, also a senior, was named to the second team as a defensive back.

Moore and Wells also were given honorable mention on defense, Wells at linebacker and Moore in the secondary. Zach Lindsey was honorable mention on both offense (lineman) and defense (end). And Josh Schwartz, just a sophomore, was honorable mention as an offensive

A new administrative position within the district was approved by Supt. Parker said he hopes to have the board, for a Curriculum Director/Director of Special Programs. Trustees also approved a job description for the new position, and Supt. Parker told The News that the job The superintendent also informed would include overseeing many of trustees of the hiring of Tommy the district's special programs such as Title I. Migrant, ESL/Bilingual. and At-Risk programs, as well as handling grant-writing duties, overseeing curriculum alignment throughout the district, breakdown of test data to pinpoint strengths and weaknesses, and assisting principals with campus/district plans and sitebase team strategies. The new person would mostly likely have an office at the Harvick Educational Building, where the Superintendent and Business Manager have offices.

"We are opening up the position for applications, with the new person hopefully to start on July 1st," Supt. Parker told The News.

In other business, Greg Gilbert of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss. presented their auditor's report for the 2001-2002 school year to the board. According to official board minutes. Gilbert noted the audit report was "very favorable." Trustees approved the audit as presented.

John Baker presented information regarding the completion of the high school gym heating/air conditioning renovation project. Trustees unanimously approved entering into a Performance Contract with Johnson Controls for the proposed renovation project on the high school/middle school, which includes electrical and heating/air projects. Johnson Controls will oversee contractor bidding on the proposed project.

Supt. Parker was authorized to solicit bids for a new school Suburban, and Elementary Principal James Baker told trustees that the elementary will receive a \$27,473 grant from Head Start for a new piece of playground equipment.

Trustees met in closed session for about an hour and a half to discuss personnel and to conduct their annual evaluation of the Superintendent.


FFA Auction Cookout Set For January 4


