Irrigation Motor Stolen Off Well

A heavy irrigation motor was stolen off a well site about a half mile northeast of U.S. 87 near County Rd. I sometime in the last 10 days, sheriff's officers were advised.

Doug Heinrich of Lubbock, owner of the property, said it was a 2000 model Chevrolet 454 valued at approximately \$4000.

The sheriff's department also was investigating a report of a burglary of a residence at New Home, where several ceiling fans were removed from the home of Gary Doss sometime after 4 p.m. Saturday.

In 106th District Court in Tahoka last week, Judge Carter Schildknecht assessed sentences for two men, one who pleaded guilty and one who was tried by a jury.


The jury found Edwin Gayle Holloway, 64, of Slaton, guilty of burglary of a habitation in Lynn County on Dec. 30, 2000. He was sentenced to 12 years in prison.

Bibian Saldana Jr. of Tahoka was assessed deferred adjudication with community supervision for 7 years after he pleaded guilty of a charge of aggravated kidnapping which occurred in 2000.

Two persons were jailed during the week, one for no liability insurance and failure to appear and one for theft by check in Ector County.

Total jail population as of Wednesday morning was 42, including 22 held for Lubbock County.

Buying A New Car? Request TT&L Be Paid To Lynn County

ONE OF MY closest relatives suggested that I might find good material for a column in the word "strudel." But she wouldn't tell me why, only hinting that I would be horrified to learn what it

Do you know what strudel is?" she asked. From my vast store of knowledge I came up with "Tight end for the Packers?" From her disgusted look, I could tell that wasn't the right answer. "I think it is something you eat or drink, but so far as I

know, I have never tasted it." She wouldn't tell me what it is, but suggested I "go ask Pam." I didn't want to ask Pam. Real men never ask for directions or help in finding things. So I looked it up on my computer's dictio-

nary, which said: "A pastry made with fruit or cheese rolled up in a thin sheet of dough and then baked." So what's so bad about that? I wondered. Then I looked in the encyclopedia, and the word wasn't even there. The closest word was "structuralism", and since I never heard of that, I read

the first part of the explanation: Structuralism is a mode of thinking and a method of analysis practiced in 20th-century social sciences and humanities. Methodologically, it analyzes large-scale systems by examining the relations and functions of the smallest constituent elements of such systems, which range from human languages

Area Cotton Gins Have Bumper Year

Lynn County area cotton gins finished up their ginning seasons during the last two weeks, in many cases reporting record high bale counts for the 2002 cotton crop. The ten area gins which have reported bale counts to The Lynn County News totaled 223,147 bales of cotton.

Gene Beck at New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin said this year has been their best-ever, topping out at 57,030 bales. Last year, which was a poor year for cotton in this area. New Home Coop ginned only 9,330 bales

"Our previous record was 44,000 bales, which we had in 1988 and again in 1996," Beck said. He said the gin finished up the season Tuesday afternoon.

Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell finished with 33,356 bales last week. and four other area gins had bale counts in the 20,000+ figure, including Farmers Coop Association #1 in Tahoka with 26,490 bales, Wilson Coop Gin with 25,757 bales, Woolam Gin in O'Donnell close behind with 25,075, and Wells Coop Gin with 21,347 bales.

Hackberry Coop Gin, located between Slaton and Post, finished with a 17,502 bale count, and several smaller gins finished in the 5,000bale count tallies, including Circle S Gin at Petty with 5,595 bales, Dempsey Gin with 5,347 bales, and Grassland Coop Gin with 5,155

Troy Hinds To Return As Tahoka Athletic Director

Troy Hinds, who left Tahoka In- currently in second and third grades. dependent School District in 2000 for a coaching position in Del Rio, is returning to Tahoka to once again serve as Athletic Director for the district. Hinds was offered a one-year professional contract at an annual salary of \$55,000 in a unanimous 7-0 decision by the board of trustees in a special called meeting held at noon Monday. to do with my family," he added. He is expected to begin his duties. here on Feb. 3.

In accepting the head athletic position here, Hinds is stepping down as AD at a 5-A school in San Felipe Del Rio Consolidated Independent School District, where he has been for the three years since leaving Tahoka in March 2000.

Hinds coached for six years at Tahoka ISD from 1994-2000, of which the last four years he served as head football coach and athletic director. In returning to TISD, Hinds will also perform some middle/high school administrative duties, in addition to his position as AD and head football coach, according to Superintendent Jimmy Parker.

Hinds told The News that he and his family are excited about returning to Tahoka, and looking forward to living in a small-town atmosphere again. Hinds and his wife, Elsie, have two sons, Alex and Andy, who are

"I've been the 5-A route, and it's good and very nice professionally. but I like the small town atmosphere. In my book, you can't beat a smalltown education," Hinds said. "Tahoka was very good to me and my family, and I am pleased to be going back. This decision had a lot

He says he has learned different coaching philosophies since leaving Tahoka, and is anxious to try new strategies here. "I've learned a lot about football and different philosophies since coaching in a 5-A school, and I want to try some new things here. The wins and losses mean a lot to me, and we're going to try to win - however the kids mean even more. I want to do what's right for the kids and help them succeed both in athletics and academics," he added.

Hinds fills the position left vacant by the resignation of Wes Cope, who was AD for the first semester of the school year. Cope is still employed by TISD, but was reassigned from AD/coaching to teaching duties for the remainder of his contract, until

Prior to Cope's appointment as AD, Bryan Gerlich succeeded Hinds as Tahoka AD for two years.

Property Tax Deadline Looms

Lynn County property owners in penalties and interest. who haven't yet paid their 2002 property taxes have about a week left if they plan on getting by with no additional fees, interest or penalties tacked on their original bills.

Friday, Jan. 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest

amounts begin to add up quickly. Those who wait until February will pay an additional seven percent

Every month following that, the penalties and interest go up by two percent through June when the penalty fee remains at 15 percent.

Property owners have until 5 p.m. Jan. 31 to pay their taxes without interest, at the Lynn County Appraisal District office, located at 1636 Ave. J in Tahoka. If paid by mail, taxes must be postmarked by Jan. 31


