Superintendent's **Contract Extended** At Wilson ISD

The Wilson Independent School District Board of Trustees approved another year on the contract of Superintendent Mike Jones at their meeting last Thursday. The action extends Jones' contract through the 2006-07 school year. Trustees voted 5-1 for the motion, with trustee Roy Isham casting the lone vote against, saying he did not believe in giving multiple-year contracts, according to minutes from the meeting.

The action followed a closed session during which trustees evaluated the superintendent's job performance for the past year.

In other business, the board approved the 2001-02 financial audit as presented by Rory Waide of Pate, Downs, and Waide. According to Supt. Jones, the school district received a clean audit and "is in sound financial health."

Trustees discussed several persons to fill the seventh seat on the board, a vacancy which was created last fall, but took no action.

No action was taken on selling baseball equipment. Trustees were presented certificates of appreciation for their service to the students and staff of the district. All six trustees were present for the meeting, including Board President Clyde Wilke, Doug Bolyard, Lonnie Donald, John Henderson, Mike Taylor and Isham.

Funds Generated By Jail Short Of County Needs

The new Lynn County Law Enforcement Center, which opened last January, is costing the county thousands of dollars in loan payments. and so far the jail population from housing prisoners from other counties is not kicking in the amount of dollars that county officials had hoped.

The county is making its third payment on the loan in February, County Treasurer Janet Porterfield told The News, and for the third time is having to dip into general funds, or cash in certificates of deposit, to make up the difference in funds generated for the loan payment and the amount of the loan payment. The note payment comes due every six

In presenting the monthly bills at the county commissioners meeting Monday morning, the treasurer reported that the next loan payment, due in February, is a whopping \$126,960 and she said there is only \$63,440 in the jail interest and sinking fund, which is the fund set aside for the note payment. That means the county must take from reserves or general funds the remaining \$63,520 - and that's just for the February pay-

County officials are hopeful, however, that funds will increase from housing other prisoners, which generates \$30 per day per prisoner for the county jail. Sheriff Jake Diggs. told The News the county began housing prisoners from Lubbock County in October, and that the number has increased to averaging 20 prisoners per day. The Lynn County Jail is a 48-bed facility.

"If we can keep 20 prisoners a day from Lubbock County, that generates \$600 a day, adding up to \$18,000 a month for Lynn County," Diggs said. "I'm pretty confident that Lubbock will continue to give us all we can serving times of 60-90 days so it's more permanent than just keeping some for a day or two," he explained.

"In a year's time, at 20 prisoners a day, Lubbock County could generate \$216,000 for the jail, which would make the loan payments," Diggs said. Lynn County also houses a few prisoners from Dawson County when their jail population overflows.

Sheriff Diggs said that the first year was hard on the jail financially because of the slow process of contracting with Lubbock County for housing their prisoners. It was nine months after the jail opened before Lynn County began housing Lubbock County's prisoners on a regu-

The 20-year note on the new county jail/law enforcement center is paid twice annually. Last February, the first payment due was \$83,300, and the jail fund had \$68,844, with the county making up the difference of \$14,456. The second payment, in August 2002, was \$71,400 with only \$24,921 in the jail fund and the county making up a difference of \$46,479. Although this February's payment is larger by far, at \$126,960, Mrs. Porterfield said the next payment due in August is considerably smaller, expected to be \$69,466.

Including this February payment, total note payments have amounted to \$281,660, of which the county has contributed \$124,455 in general funds in addition to the jail interest and sinking fund, which contributed \$157,205. According to the treasurer, the jail interest and sinking fund is comprised of funds generated from housing other prisoners, as well as five percent of all revenues that come into the county, including ad valorem taxes, fees, etc.

The bottom line is, that while thus far the jail hasn't paid for itself, county officials are cautiously optimistic that the future will more consistently bring enough out-of-county prisoners here to contribute most of the funding for the note payments on the jail/law enforcement center.

Taxpayers should remember, too, that before Lynn County had the new 48-bed jail, the county was spending \$60,000-\$80,000 per year to house prisoners in other counties because of overcrowding at the old jail, which only housed 14 prisoners.

In other business at Monday morning's commissioner meeting,

Bill Miller, Andy Bill Fillingim, Ty Askew and Jay Kelln met with the court to express their appreciation for Lynn County Extension Agent Bryan Reynolds in the performance of his duties and to ask county officials to keep, and these are prisoners who are consider supplementing Reynolds' salary until another County Agent is hired for the county. Lynn County's Family and Consumer Sciences agent, Elizabeth Jones, resigned from that position last month, leaving a vacancy in the extension office.

"We have an excellent county agent in Bryan Reynolds, and we want to keep him," Bill Miller told commissioners. "There are some other counties who may have pitched a pretty good package to him, and he is very much sought after as a county agent. Right now the extension service is pretty much in a frozen state, as far as hiring new people to fill vacancies - I was told there are 53 job openings and that they might fill seven," he added.

After some discussion, commissioners are considering supplementing Reynolds' salary with a portion of the other county agent's salary, since Reynolds is currently the only agent in the county. County agents are paid by the state as well as supplemented by the county. Lynn County contributes \$9,268 to each county agent's salary. Commissioners plan to place the issue on the agenda for the next meeting for consideration.

Holiday pay for county employees working double shifts was clarified, with commissioners noting that holiday pay is offered only for the first shift. Nine names and an alternate were drawn from the county's grand jury list for the 2003 Grievance Committee. Those people will be contacted by letter asking if they will agree to serve on the committee, which meets only if an elected county official wants to present a grievance. Those names will be released for publicity at next onth's meeting of commissioners

Commissioners also voted to advertise for bids for a county auditor. and to take bids for the bank depository for county finances.

County Judge H.G. Franklin presided at the meeting, with commissioners J.T. Miller, Don Blair, Don Morton and Mike Braddock present, as well as other county officials.

County Clerk Attends Seminar

Lynn County Clerk Susan Tipton joined over 400 clerks' office personnel for the 31st Annual County and District Clerk's Continuing Education Seminar at the Hilton College Station and Conference Center on Jan. 13-16, in College Station.

The seminar was sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, which is part of Texas Cooperative Extension. The Institute provides elected county officials with information and technical assistance and helps officials complete their state-mandated, minimum continuing education requirements.

The theme of this year's seminar was "Embracing the Past While Exploring the Future." Included in the program were workshops on financial reporting, records management, FBI criminal searches, a review of the 2002 elections, fraudulent filings and procedures for filing electronic records.

"I must be educated on all new issues and procedures pertaining to my office," said Mrs. Tipton. "This will be a challenging year with the new legislature beginning their new session. The most beneficial aspect of the seminar was the professional networking session and gaining knowledge from clerks from all over the state," she added.

"Texas is one of a small number of states that requires all elected county officials to earn continuing education credits," explained Richard O. Avery, Extension Specalist with the Institute. "The Institute provides education to county commissioners, judges, treasurers, tax assessor-collectors and county and district clerks through programs conducted here in College Station and across the state."

Clerks who attended all of the sessions during the seminar received 14 hours of credit.

Strayhorn Delivers Sales Tax Rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn this month sent \$283.1 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. Sales tax allocations are down one percent compared to January 2002.

January sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in November and reported to the Comptroller in December.

Wilson bucked the statewide trend, showing an increase in the amount of allocations received this year over last, receiving \$447.50 this period versus \$272.41 for the same period last year, for an increase of 64.27 percent. O'Donnell and Tahoka however received less money this year compared to last. O'Donnell showed a huge drop from last year (72.07%), receiving \$398.74 this year as opposed to \$1,428.11 last year. Tahoka fared better, receiving \$4,462.99 this year versus \$4,914.58 last year for a drop of 9.18 percent. The county received \$5,309.23 this year and \$6.615.10 last year for a decrease of 19.74 percent.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, Feb. 14.

Dog Obedience Trials Scheduled Feb. 22-23

The South Plains Obedience Training Club of Lubbock, Inc. will be hosting two American Kennel Club All Breed Dog Obedience Trials in the Merchants Building at the South Plains Fairgrounds, Feb. 22-23. Admission is free.

Over 125 purebred dogs from six surrounding states will be judged at the event which takes place from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. Many of the top obedience trained dogs in the country will be competing.

Each exhibitor and dog team will be judged at one of the three different levels of competition; Novice, Open or Utility. These dogs will be demonstrating their proficiency in such exercises as heeling, high jumps, broad jumps, retrieving and scent discrimination. The dogs are working towards various AKC obedience titles and obedience trial championship points. There are also Non-Regular class competitions such as Veterans, Brace and Team. 

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
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

TDH Urges Understanding Of Diabetes-Heart Disease Link

They are an ominous pair - diabetes and heart disease — that can level a person with a debilitating, sometimes deadly one-two punch.

"People understand that uncontrolled diabetes can lead to other serious health problems such as blindness, kidney failure, amputations, pregnancy," said Jan Ozias, director cation and/or insulin injections." of the Diabetes Program at the Texas Ozias said. Department of Health (TDH).

that heart disease is the leading cause of diabetes-related deaths," she said. "Adults with diabetes have heart disease death rates from two to four times higher than adults without diabetes. And about 65 percent of adults trolling diabetes: with diabetes also have high blood

Diabetes is the sixth leading cause of death in Texas, contributing to more than 15,000 deaths in 2000. More than 1 million people 18 and older in Texas have been diagnosed with diabetes. "But estimates are that another 500,000 adults in the state have diabetes and don't know it," Ozias said

About six percent of the nation's population is diagnosed as having the disease

With diabetes, the body either does not produce insulin (Type I diabetes) or does not effectively use or produce adequate amounts of insulin (Type 2 diabetes). Insulin is a hormone needed to convert sugar, starches and other food into energy. In uncontrolled diabetes, sugar and fats remain in the bloodstream and,

with time, damage vital organs. Symptoms of diabetes may include sudden vision changes, lack of energy, extreme thirst or hunger, fre- calling 512-458-7490.

quent urination, weight loss, numbness or tingling in hands or feet, slowhealing sores or cuts, frequent infections and very dry skin.

Treatment is aimed a keeping blood sugar near normal levels at all times. "Treatment measures may include diet control, exercise and home dental problems and complications in blood glucose testing plus oral medi-

"While people cannot change the "But what many do not realize is fact that they have diabetes, they can work to control some things such as high blood pressure, high blood fat levels, weight and physical activity levels," she said.

The following are keys to con-

- · Be active. Get some exercise each day, 30 minutes or more if pos-
 - · Eat less fat and salt.

· Eat more fiber, choosing from whole grains, fruits, vegetables, and

· Strive for and maintain a healthy weight.

- · Don't smoke.
- · Control blood pressure.
- · Take medication as prescribed. · Ask health care provider about

taking aspirin. · Get support from family and

friends in managing diabetes. "People should see their health care provider regularly," Ozias said. "Sometimes the only way people can know what's going on with their bodies is to have a checkup."



The junior high teams will compete in the district tournament Jan. 30 and Feb.



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
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
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
