Tahoka and area residents may bring their pets to be vaccinated against rabies at a Rabies Clinic to be held Saturday, Feb. 15 behind Tahoka City Hall, from 1:30-3:00 p.m. Dr. Larry Mills, DVM of Post, will provide rabies shots at a cost of \$7, and other shots will be available. Pets should be vaccinated annually for rabies.

City officials strongly encourage that local pets be vaccinated against rabies, in order to protect the citizens of the area. While there have been no reports of rabid animals, there have been lots of sightings of skunks and silver foxes in this area, which can carry rabies.

At Lynn County jail, the total number of prisoners as of Wednesday was 37, including 25 for Lubbock County. Terms Of Two Council Members, Mayor To Be In Next Election

Council and the position of mayor will be on the next city election ballot, scheduled for May 3. Tahoka City Council called for the election during their regular meeting Monday night. Mike Mensch currently serves as Mayor, and the terms of John Chapa Jr. in District 1, and Amy Preston in District 3, will be up for election. All are two-year terms.

The first day to file for a place on the ballot is Feb. 17, continuing through March 19. Interested candidates should contact City Hall. Deadline to register to vote and still be eligible to vote in the May 3 election is April 3. Early voting will be conducted April 16-29.

Council members tabled action on the city's Code of Ordinances, to give council members time to look at the lengthy new book of ordinances.

Two seats on the Tahoka City According to City Administrator Jerry Webster, city officials are going to repeal all the old ordinances and replace the ordinance book with complete new information.

The council voted to extend land lease contracts currently held by Joe Calvillo and David Cook, extending them from Dec. 31, 2002 to Dec. 31, 2003, to allow time for new land surveys to be completed.

Steve McKay presented the Tahoka Police Dept. report to the council, and members also voted to seek bids for cemetery maintenance. Monthly bills were approved.

All five council members were present for the meeting, including Jay Dee House, John Chapa Jr., Clara Calvillo, Amy Preston and Ray Box, as well as Mayor Mensch and Webster.





or fish with fresh vegetables and start meals off with soup. Research shows people who start their meals with soup eat less. Try a soup before lunch or dinner that offers a full

serving of vegetables. · Got the munchies? Trade in the soda and chips for iced tea and fresh fruit. Slice an apple or carrot for a nutritional after-school snack, or try unbuttered popcorn. According to Ward, hard-boiled eggs are a good snack option as well "Not only does each egg contain only 75 calories, they are also convenient and easy to prepare, so when you're looking for a quick, healthy snack or meal, think fast, think eggs," says Ward.

· Get moving. Start a daily exercise routine with your family. It doesn't have to cost a lot of money or take a lot of time. Take the dog for a walk, buy an exercise video or join a community gym or sports club. Proper nutrition and regular exercise are crucial for maintaining a healthy lifestyle.



Putting Infants To Sleep On Their Backs Good Safety Practice, According To TDH

ducted by the National Institutes of risk of dying from SIDS. Health (NIH) indicate what public health officials and pediatricians have thought for years - putting infants to sleep on their stomachs increases the risk of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

Study findings were published in October in *Pediatrics*, the journal of

the American Academy of Pediatrics. Getting infants to sleep on their backs cannot be overemphasized, according to Jere Brewer, a pediatric nurse practitioner with the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "Since the American Academy of Pediatrics these precautions with all the child's began an educational campaign called 'Back to Sleep' in 1992, the number of SIDS cases has dropped

nearly 50 percent," she said. Efforts are under way in Texas to educate parents, child-care providers and other caregivers to reduce infant mortality and increase the safety of children.

"The Texas Department of Health is working with the Texas Cooperative Extension, other state agencies and non-profit organizations to educate parents about infant health and safety issues such as SIDS," Brewer

SIDS is a sudden, unexplained death of an infant in the first year of life and is the leading cause of death in children under one year of age in the United States. A total of 233 infants under one year of age died of SIDS in Texas in 2000, the latest year for which statistics are available.

At increased risk are African-American infants, with national statistics showing that they die from SIDS at twice the rate of Caucasians. Reasons for this difference are un-

National statistics also show that infants in child-care centers or in the care of someone other than their par-

Results of a recent study con- ents have about a 20 percent higher

Brewer encourages parents who put their infants into child-care centers to ask about rules regarding sleep positions and to check with their pediatricians to see if their children have any medical condition that would prevent the infants from sleeping on their backs.

"If the baby is medically okay and it is all right with the physician to place that child to sleep on his or her back, make sure that the day-care center staff does that," Brewer said. She also urges parents to discuss babysitters.

Other factors that increase the

- risk of SIDS are: · Low birth weight:
- · Premature birth: · Exposure to second-hand to-
- bacco smoke: · Soft bedding, comforters, pillows or stuffed animals in the crib;
- · Overheating caused by wrapping the infant too tightly:
- · Covering the baby's head dur-
- · Sleeping in bed with adults; and
- · Sleeping in waterbeds or on upholstered furniture.

National Consumer Protection Week Scheduled Feb. 2-8

(BBB) system has joined a group of federal, state and local organizations and national advocacy groups to launch the fifth annual National Consumer Protection Week (NCPW), Feb. 2-9, 2003. This year's theme, "Information Security: Putting the Pieces Together," focuses on practical steps consumers and businesses can take to manage their personal and sensitive information wisely and help minimize its misuse.

"Online safety is the responsibility of everyone who operates a computer, whether at home or in the office," said Ken Hunter, president and CEO of the Council of Better Business Bureaus (CBBB). "BBBs are using this occasion to encourage businesses, as well as consumers, to take a look at improving the security of their personal information."

He noted that strong passwords, firewalls and up-to-date anti-virus software can go a long way toward protecting computers, and personal or business information from those who would try to damage a network operation, or worse yet, steal personal information to commit a crime.

Specifically, BBBs recommend that businesses and consumers consider the following steps to protect their computers and private information from computer hackers or identity thieves:

· Passwords should be at least eight characters long, consist of both letters and numbers, and not contain common words. Avoid using personal information or your login name as passwords. "And, it goes without saying that you should never share your passwords online or over the phone with anyone." Hunter added.

· Install anti-virus software and update it regularly. The best anti-virus software products recognize old and new viruses and update automati-

The Better Business Bureau cally. "If you decide to download anti-virus software from a web site, make certain the site is owned by a reliable, legitimate software company," Hunter said. "Pirated software is no bargain."

 Prevent unauthorized access to your computer through firewall software or hardware, especially if you are a high-speed user. Some recently released operating system software and hardware devises come with a built-in firewall. Firewalls that block outgoing information as well as incoming files can stop hackers from planting "spyware" programs that cause your computer to send out your personal information without your

· Never open a file attached to an e-mail unless you are expecting it and know what it contains. If you send . an attachment, type a message explaining what it is. Never forward any. e-mail warning about a new virus as it may be a hoax that will spread a virus. "Business owners should make certain that every employee knows and understands these rules," the CBBB president said. "Opening a virus-infected attachment creates havoc for the employee as well as the business, often leading to lost productivity and costly repairs."

In addition to the Better Business Bureau, organizers of this year's NCPW are the Federal Trade Commission, the National Association of Consumer Agency Administrators, the National Consumers League, AARP, the Consumer Federation of America, the U.S. Postal Service, the U.S. Postal Inspection Service, the National Association of Attorneys General and the Federal Consumer Information Center.





When choosing a pet, consider temperament and physical abilities of the animal," she adds. Landis says your pet should be suited for the activities you enjoy. Is your pet suited for outdoor activities and weather conditions, or quiet time at home? Consider the temperament and needs of animals and identify those that best match your lifestyle.

Landis says certain considerations should be kept in mind when choosing a dog as a pet.


"There are two types of dogs, purebred and mixed-breed, and each animal has its own personality and temperament," says Landis. Owners should consider size and hair coat as well as specific breed traits and characteristics. For some families, the best choice is an older housebroken dog whose behavior has been estab-

Landis suggests obedience training for a puppy or adult dog to promote good manners and reinforce the bond between you and your pet.

Cats come in many sizes and colors as well as purebred and mixed breeds. "Select a kitten that is neither too shy nor too aggressive." Landis notes. Kittens are easily housebroken, adapt to a variety of environments and do not have to be walked, notes Landis. Hair coats -long, short or curly -- should also be

"Birds, rabbits and other exotic animals can be family companion animals, too, but I would suggest researching the care and needs of these animals," says Landis. "Some have special diets and temperature require-

Landis says the decision to own a pet owner, plan ahead by choosing your pet wisely," she adds. Such planning will help both you and your prospective pet.

2nd Counter-cyclical Advance Payment Announced

USDA also announced today the 2nd Advance Counter cyclical payment rate for cotton, rice and peanuts. Payments are scheduled to be made starting February 3, 2003.

Producers who received the first CC Advance payment will be eligible for the second payment.

The announced payment rates are \$0.096 cents for cotton; \$1.16 per hundredweight for rice and \$72.80 per short ton for peanuts. The announced payment rate will be reduced by any counter-cyclical payments already received in the first advance payment.

Producers who already received the first advance CC payment can expect a net payment rate of \$0.048 per pound for cotton; \$0.58 per hundredweight for rice and \$36.40 per short tome for peanuts in the second CC payment.

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
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Keeping an Eye on Texas

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Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn recently released her biennial e-Texas report that outlines savings and additional revenue of about \$1.7 billion in general revenue funds for the next two-year budget cycle.

The proposals come in light of the fact that between 1990 and 2001 state spending has shot up more than 131 percent while population rose by just 23 percent.

The Comptroller's 179 recommendations to the Legislature, and their corresponding savings during the biennium include:

- Merging the Texas Railroad Commission and the Public Utility Commission — \$12.4 million (and ultimately \$18.5 million annually);
- Privatizing the Aircraft Pooling Board and eliminating the Texas Department of Economic Development — a combined savings of
- · Consolidating the state's 24 state health and human servicesrelated agencies into five efficient agencies — \$9 million. The full report can be found at

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
