Our age is gadgetizing to the point of absurdity. Pretty soon infantry will be supplied with individual power-hoppers to eliminate foot travel, battlefields will be equipped with hot and cold water for shaving and showers and spies behind the lines will be required by international law to have tail lights and turn-signals to keep from colliding with counter-espionage agents. How little did our pioneers know of our hardships. Travis never stepped out to the garage on a bitter winter morning to find his battery dead and all bus transportation behind schedule. And D. Crockett never whizzed through a revolving door to find the elevator out of order and his office was up 21 flights of stairs. No wonder we grow no heroes now.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture researchers based their facts on information obtained from more than 6.000 householders.

Meals of the average family for a week included about 10 pounds of vegetables and fruit, 4.5 quarts of milk or corresponding amounts of cheese and ice cream, 4 pounds of meat, 7 eggs, 1 pound of fat, 1.5 pounds of sugar, and 3 pounds of cereal products for each person.







INCOME SUBJECT TO TAX Reporting your correct gross ncome is the first and most important item of bssiness in preparing your federal income tax return.

As a general rule, gross income can be defined as the sum total of amounts received by you for your services, amounts which you receive from others for the use of your property or money and the profit which you realize from the sale of your property.

While your gross income will normally result from cash received in the form of wages or pay for your services, this need not be the case. Money, thefore, is not the sole medium of exchange used to determine the receipt by you of gross imcome. The fair value of property or services you receive in return for your services and the use of your money or property must also be taken into consideration in determining your gross income. Thus, if your employer provides you with a house in which to live or provides you with food, you must include in your gross income the fair value of these items. OTHER INCOME A person who receives a prize or contest award or who gambles and wins must include in his gross imcome the cash received and the fair value of items or ervices received. There are some items which would logically fall within the general rule which are specifically excluded from gross income by law. For example, if your employer requires that you be present on a 24-hour basis and provides you with a room or house on his premises, this amount does not constitute gross income. Similarly, if your employer gives you meals and requires that you eat on the premises, this amount would not constitute gross income to you. Other exclusions are premiums paid by your employer for group term life insurance, group health insurance premiums, the cost of transferring you and your family to a new location or office at the direction or request of your employer and other similar items which are paid to benefit both you and your employer. Pay received while sick, interest on state and municiapl bonds, and the first \$50 of dividends received by an individual also are specifically excluded. The application of the general rule mentioned will show you why gifts, inheritances and government benefit payments are not included in gross income, and why you must include such items as bonuses from your employer and pensions received from your employer after retirement where you have not contributed to the retirement fund. 
