17-Cent Tax Hike Being Considered By County

Lynn County Commissioners in a called meeting Friday set a proposed tax rate of 85.345-cents per \$100 of property value, an increase of just over 17-cents from the prior year's tax rate of 67.909-cents. A public hearing for the proposed rate has been scheduled for Thursday, Sept. 11 at 9 a.m. in the County Courtroom in the Lynn County Courthouse basement, when public comments on the issue will be heard.

The 17-cent increase is the largest in recent county history, and possibly ever. The proposed figure is the highest allowed without having an automatic rollback election, according to figures released by the county this week, which were provided by Lynn County Appraisal District.

The proposal would increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 18.5 percent. Average tax on a residence valued at \$32,000 would increase from about \$208 to approximately \$273, according to the Appraisal District figures.

"The county has not raised taxes significantly in the past several years, and costs have continued to increase," Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin told The News. "I know it's a shock and we hate it, but there is just not enough funds to run the county, and something has to give. Last year was under-budgeted and the county has really struggled this year to make ends meet," he added.

All four commissioners voted unanimously to set the proposed rate at .85345, and will hear public comments on the issue next Thursday. Commissioners expect to vote on the tax rate at a meeting set for Thursday, Sept. 18 at 9 a.m. in the County Judge's office. Commissioners had approved the budget for 2004 at a meeting held Aug. 25, with total expenditures estimated \$2,986,310.

In other business at Friday's called meeting, commissioners denied a request by the District Attorney for an increase in their budget, and also moved to pay a bailiff fee of \$50 as had been designated in the minutes from a July 8 meeting, denying a request from the DA's office for a fee of \$150.

Attorney Philip Mack Furlow met with commissioners on behalf of Danny Brewer to request the county's assistance in building a road in a new subdivision, but commissioners informed Furlow that the county could not legally go on private property and took no action on the request.

Commissioners Mike Braddock, J.T. Miller, Don Morton, and Don Blair were present for the meeting, with Judge Franklin presiding.

Routinely encourage physical activity and promote the academy's recommended limit of no more than two hours of television or video viewing each day. (This is right on the money, but it's hard to do when TV and

video games are such good baby-sitters). Encourage the youngsters to eat healthy. (Less junk food and more vegetables and fruit. Now I wish my parents had made me eat stuff good for me, instead of tons of

M&Ms and gravy and French fries). I really don't know what my own body mass index is, or what it is supposed to be. And I hope I don't find out. Actually, for me, I think BMI should stand for Body Mess Index.

Hospital Raises Property Tax Rate By 1.5 Cents

Lynn County Hospital District, faced by rising costs mostly caused by cuts in Medicare payments to hospitals and with the value of taxable property in the district down by about \$2 million, will increase the property tax rate by 1.5 cents per \$100 valua-

The hospital now is expected to end the fiscal year Sept, 30 with a loss of about \$415,000, Administrator Dan Powers told the hospital board, noting that cutbacks in Medicare payment cutbacks were about \$243,000 more than had been anticipated. He also noted that most hospitals, including those in larger cities, are planning to increase taxes by as much as 10 cents, a figure indicated in a recent story about University Medical Center in Lubbock.

The hospital board adopted a budget for the coming year in which it is projected that the hospital will come out ahead by about \$10,000. It was noted that most of the hospital's income comes from patient revenue. In the year just ending, operating expense for the hospital is projected to total 3.65 million dollars, while total revenue should be about \$150,000 less than that. Taxes this year raised \$584,692 on rate of 27.5 cents per \$100 valuation.

The new tax rate of 29 cents should bring in \$602,000. A person owning a home valued at \$50,000 would pay about \$7.50 more in taxes

this year than last year. Votes on the proposed budget and tax increase were unanimous, with all seven board members present last

Kyle Sodd, head of the physical therapy department and the physical fitness center, appeared before the board. He has resigned to accept a similar position at Seminole, effective in late September.

Powers advised the board that Lynnwood Assisted Living Center now has 16 residents, but continues to operate at a loss. He did mention reports from outside health personnel who have visited Lynnwood that it is, in their opinion, the best operation of its type they had seen.

The board approved a new retirement rate plan for hospital district employees, and medical staff privileges for two Lubbock anesthetists.







State Mandates Fee Increases For **Traffic Violations In City, County**

for violating traffic laws have been increased, effective September 1. In most cases, fees are going up an average of \$30, and city and county of- ticket. ficials want area residents to know that the increase was set by the State of Texas, and not by local officials.

"We have been notified by the state of the new fees, and this is what we will be required to charge," said Lynn County Precinct 4 Justice of Peace Terri Walker. "These stiffer fees and penalties were not a decision made by local officials," she explained.

Judge Walker and Tahoka Municipal Judge Jerry Ford brought a list of the fees to the News Office, which have been reprinted here (see accompanying charts). DWI fees have also been increased by the state, according to Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin, but no information was available this week as to specific fee amounts.

Minimum speeding fine in Lynn County will be \$130 for 1-5 mph over the posted speed limit, and drivers with no liability insurance will be fined \$350. Public intoxication carries a \$350 fine, and seatbelt violations for children ages 17 and under carries a \$210 fine in the county.

Traffic violations within the city limits of Tahoka are fined through the Municipal Court, and include \$105 for a minimum speeding fine (1-5. mph over the limit), \$305 for no liability insurance, and \$130 for seatbelt violations for ages 16 and

Court costs for defensive driving course dismissal of offenses will be \$95 to \$97, and the time allowed for taking the course has been reduced from 180 days to just 90 days to submit the defensive driving certificate to courts. Defensive driving or deferred adjudication will no longer be available if the driver is ticketed in a construction zone with workers

Under this proposal, taxes on the average homestead would increase by \$65.04, or 24 percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would increase by \$.17436 per \$100 of taxable value or 20 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

Criminal Justice Mandate (for counties):

The Lynn County Auditor certifies that Lynn County has spent \$-0- in the previous 12 months beginning January 1, 2002, for the maintenance and operations cost of keeping inmates sentenced to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Lynn County Sheriff has provided information on these costs, minus the state revenues received for reimbursement of such costs.

Enhanced Indigent Health Care Expenditures:

The County of Lynn spent \$200 from January 1, 2002 to December 31, 2002 on enhanced indigent health care at the increased minimum eligibility standards, less the amount of state assistance. 




