Bill Chancy Honored For 600th Game On Chain Gang

Not many people can say what they have done every Friday night during football season for the past 57 years, but generations of Tahoka football fans can name one exception -Bill Chancy. Chancy has been on the sidelines of Tahoka football games for nearly six decades, volunteering his services on the chain gang.

On each and every Friday night during the Tahoka Independent School District fall football season, Chancy shuts down his service station in Tahoka and goes wherever the Bulldogs are playing that night, staking out his spot on the sideline. He has anchored the chain gang on the sidelines for hundreds of games, but Friday night was a special night for him, as school officials honored

Superintendent Jimmy Parker and trustee Leighton Knox Jr. presented Chancy with an appreciation plaque and school letter jacket during pre-game ceremonies at Kelley Field, prior to the last game of the season as the Bulldogs hosted Shallowater. Fans applauded as the presentation was made, showing their appreciation for the longtime Bull-

Since 1946, Chancy has reported for the chain gang to work every Friday in the fall, with the exception of one game that he missed due to a business obligation.

"I do it for the boys and that is the only reason I do it," Chancy says.

Chancy for his 600th time on the chain So, come rain or shine, hot or cold weather, he has always stuck it out for the players - even through six inches of snow! Winning season, or losing season, Chancy is there for the team. He and his wife, Frances, will have a spot on the sideline indefi-

> Now 74, Chancy has watched three sons and four grandsons play for the Bulldogs. He currently has one grandson, a freshman, playing for the JV Bulldogs, and he hopes that he is able to carry the chains for the "Mighty Bulldogs" when his grandson is on the varsity lineup.

He says he has saved every football program for the Bulldogs since 1946 - quite a collection. He is going to have hip-replacement surgery in January, and during his recovery he plans to write a book of all his memories of the past 57 years of chain gang work for Tahoka High School. He is waiting to have his surgery until after his other big fall hobby (Ho! Ho! Ho!).

Chancy has another unique hobby, collecting antique cars, including a 1928 Model A Ford, a 1966 Plymouth Barracuda, and a 1964 Dodge pickup. He plans to make a trip to South Dakota in his 1928 Chrysler that he and his grandson. Heath Ross, rebuilt.





County Gets Clean Audit Report; Three Motor Graders Approved

Lynn County Commissioners met in a lengthy session Monday morning, hearing the county's financial audit report and opening bids for road equipment for three of the four precincts in the county.

Melvin Eaker, representing the firm of Gary, Bowers and Miller, CPA, presented the audit to commissioners, noting that the audit took longer to conduct this year than in the previous year since this was the first year for his firm to conduct an audit on Lynn County.

Christmas Craft Show Set Here November 22nd



THS Grad Grows Giant Pumpkins In Connecticut

If Charlie Brown is looking for the really Great Pumpkin for next Halloween or Thanksgiving, he would do well to go see John Williams in East Lyme, CT, because Williams, a 1974 graduate of Tahoka High School, is growing big pumpkins up there:

Really big. Like 500 pounds, and pumpkins weighing 750 to 800 pounds each are the target size for next year

Williams, a nuclear mechanic at the Millstone Power Station in Connecticut, grew-up on a Lynn County cotton farm and spent 15 years farming cotton on his own. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Williams of Taboka, who said their son was known as "Benjie" when he was in

This year John Williams, who also once was a deep-sea diver, says he is new at pumpkin growing, and, according to a story in The Day, a Connecticut newspaper, says he just had beginner's luck. He credits the success of his pumpkin-growing venture to feftilizing techniques. One growing aid he used to produce about 20 ciant pumpkins this year is a mixture of seaweed and fish emulsion, which he calls "Hooter's mix" and buys from a source in Arizona.

If the fertilizer's name has anything to do with a restaurant chain famous for its full-breasted waitresses. Williams says he has no clue. My father works as a commercial organic fertilizer salesman in Texas. and they have always called the seafood-fish by-product which farmers use to enhance their crops 'Hooter's

Williams grows prize-winning flowers and vegetables at his home; the giant pumpkins are grown at the home of his in-laws.

He says he hopes next year to grow pumpkins much larger than the two 500-pounders he grew this year.





High Number Of Deer/Vehicle Accidents Occur In Fall Months

The next few weeks are one of the most dangerous times of the year for motor vehicle collisions involving deer, an insurance industry spokesman said.

The highest number of auto accidents involving deer traditionally occur in November, making this a hazardous situation for motorists traveling around the state, according to Mark Hanna, a spokesman for the Insurance Council of Texas.

"Statistics show that the majority of deer/vehicle accidents in Texas occur during the fall of the year." Hanna continued. "Behavioral changes, especially the increased activity associated with the rut or mating season, archery season (Sept. 26 - Oct. 26) and the general hunting season, which begins in most counties on Saturday, November 1, all play a role in deer moving across our highways."

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety. 15 people were killed and more than 1,500 people were injured in motor vehicle collisions with animals in 2000.

In Llano County, described as the deer capital of Texas, Llano County Chief Deputy John Keith said the rut, which coincides with the start of deer season, put the animals on the move. Keith said the collisions between deer and motorists occur both day and night, making it a dangerous situation for drivers.

L. David Sinclair, director of Wildlife Enforcement for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said drivers must use extra caution while driving at night where deer are plentiful. "It's just harder for motorists to see deer at night, thus the greater chance of hitting a deer that may dart onto the roadway." Sinclair said.

Texas Department of Public Safety Sgt. John Stafford of Kerrville said motorists kill at least one deer every day on Highway 16 between Kerrville and Fredricksburg.

"It happens so frequently in this area that about half of the accidents are not reported to law enforcement," Stafford said. "The locals just call their insurance agent the next day and explain what happened. The agent tells them to go get it fixed."

Comprehensive insurance coverage will pay for the cost of fixing or replacing your vehicle after the accident, minus your deductible.

Sgt. Stafford said the best way to

avoid hitting a deer is to beware that they are there. "Be watching for them. If you see one, slow down," Stafford said.

Most importantly. Stafford said don't swerve to miss a deer. "Brake and hold your steering wheel," Stafford said. "More people suffer serious injuries from trying to avoid hitting deer than having the actual collision with a deer."

If you hit a deer, law enforcement officials recommend that you pull off the roadway and contact law enforcement authorities to make an accident

The following list of safety tips are recommended by the Insurance Council of Texas to help reduce the number of deer-related accidents:

* Deer activity is highest during the dusk and dawn periods. Drivers should be particularly alert in the early morning and evening.

* Motorists should drive defensively when approaching wooded draws or creek bottoms that intersect highways, especially in agricultural

* Newly constructed roads through deer habitat often have a rash of deer/vehicle accidents. Be on the

* Highway traffic signs indicating deer crossings should be a clear reminder to all motorists to use extreme caution in these areas especially during the early morning and evening hours.

* Drivers are advised to scan roadways for deer; if at night, motorists should look for deer eye reflections. Passengers can help "keep an eye out for deer."

Deer are often dazed or confused by vehicle headlights. When a deer is spotted, drivers should reduce speed but maintain control. Use emergency flashers or pump the brakes to alert vehicles approaching from behind.

If a deer is observed crossing the road, reduce speed. Deer are social animals and often travel in family groups, so it is likely that others will follow.

* Most severe deer-related accidents result when loss of control occurs while trying to avoid a deer. Maintaining control of the vehicle is essential. It is recommended that a driver steer straight rather than risk losing control and colliding with oncoming traffic or hitting objects off


