Hospital Board Looks At Policies

Lynn County Hospital directors Tuesday night approved a policy for supervision of physician assistants, a governing board assessment of community medical needs and by-laws spelling out duties and obligations of board members.

Administrator Dan Powers reported that a survey team regarding the hospital's plan to be designated a critical access facility would be in

Tahoka sometime in January. The designation relates to the amount of money the hospital receives from Medicare.

Billy Tomlinson presided at the meeting. Others attending were board members Jerry Ford, Dalton Wood, Virginia Griffing, John Hawthorne and Joan Knox, plus Powers and Jim Morris, assistant to Powers. Absent was board member Mike Rivas.

Kingston Announces Candidacy For District Attorney

Brian Kingston announced Monday his candidacy for District Attorney of the 106th Judicial District consisting of Garza, Lynn, Dawson and Gaines counties.

"I am a very hardworking, fair and experienced attorney, and I hope that I can earn the vote and respect of the residents of these counties on March 9 and Nov. 2, 2004," stated Kingston.

A resident of Lynn County, Kingston has served as an Assistant District Attorney for Lubbock County for approximately three years and in Austin for Travis County for over nine years. During his tenure with Lubbock County, Kingston was Chief of the Lubbock County Special Crimes Unit, Chief of the Domestic Violence Division and Chief of the Misdemeanor Unit. As an Assistant District Attorney, Kingston has been active in the daily prosecution of felony crimes such as child abuse, rapes, robberies, murders, weapons violations, drugs, theft, etc. and in training other attorneys in prosecuting misdemeanor and felony cases. "Having been actively engaged as a trial lawyer for over 15 years, I respect the law and I love being a part of the courtroom," Kingston stated. "I also greatly enjoy teaching others about the law, and I look forward to working more with our district's police departments, sheriff departments, assistant district attorneys and residents of Garza,

Lynn, Dawson and Gaines counties." As an avid instructor of the law, Kingston has taught at police academies in Austin and Lubbock, the Texas Department of Public Safety Training Academy, and at The University of Texas School of Law.

Kingston continues to teach at the South Plains Association of Governments' Police Academy in Lubbock, the Lubbock County Sheriff's Academy, and the City of Lubbock Police Academy. To further his knowledge of the law and rapport with police officers, Kingston has just completed a year-long night course certifying him as a Texas Peace Officer.

The Republican candidate was appointed by Gov. Rick Perry in 2001 to serve as Vice Chairman for the Governor's Planning Council for STOP Violence Against Women. He is a member of the Texas State Bar Association and the Texas District and County Attorney's Association. Prior to his career as a prosecutor, Kingston practiced civil litigation for Hammerman and Gainer in Austin and for the firm of Lynch, Chappell, Allday and Alsup, also in Austin.

Kingston Graduated in 1987 from South Texas College of Law in Houston and earned his undergraduate degree from The University of Texas at Austin in 1984. An Army Veteran, Kingston proudly served his country as a U.S. Army military policeman from 1976 to 1979.

He lives in O'Donnell and is married to Rhonda Forbes Kingston, and they have one child. They are active members of First Baptist Church in O'Donnell where Kingston has taught high school youth Sunday School.

Two More File For Upcoming Local Elections

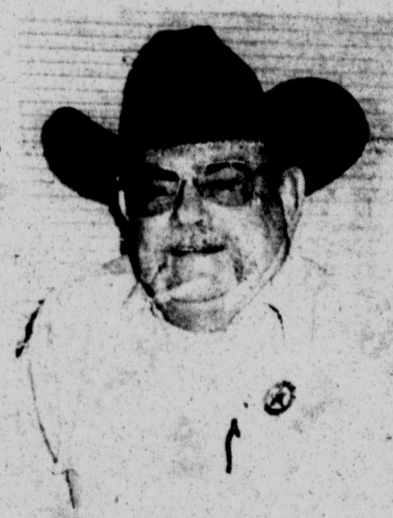
Two more candidates filed this week for the local elections, both filing on the Republican Party ticket.

Brian Kingston of O'Donnell has filed for District Attorney of the 106th Judicial District, which consists of Garza, Lynn, Dawson and Gaines counties. And, Glenn Heinrich has filed for Lynn County Commissioner, Precinct 1. Both face incumbents who have filed as Democrats.

No other challengers had filed as of press time Wednesday in any of the other local races against incumbents for Lynn County Attorney, Tax Assessor/Collector, Sheriff, or Precinct 3 Commissioner.

Filing deadline is Jan. 3, at the Lynn County Clerk's Office at the County Courthouse. The courthouse will be closed Jan. 1-2 for the New Year's holiday, but candidates interested in filing may contact County Clerk Susan Tipton at home, 998-5072, or the County Chairman for the Democratic Party, Lee Holden, or the County Chairman for the Republican Party, John Baker, all of Tahoka.

The Democratic and Republican Primary elections will be held March 9, 2004, and the General Election will be held Nov. 2, 2004. Elected officials will take office in January 2005.



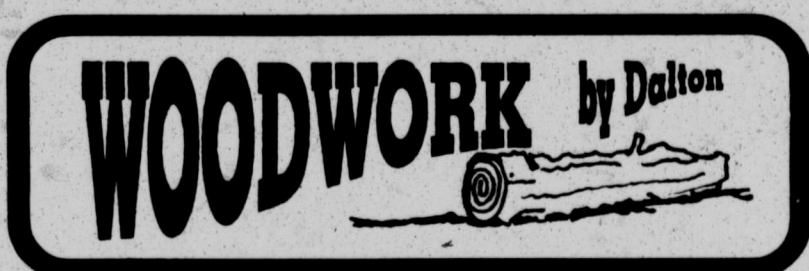

Bob Wilson Announces For Sheriff

O'Donnell FNB Sold To State National Bank

The First National Bank of O'Donnell has been sold to State National Bank of Big Spring, according to information from the Lamesa Press-Reporter.

FNB of O'Donnell completed its final transactions at the Lamesa and O'Donnell branches of the bank, as officials with State National Bank of Big Spring were present to finalize a purchase agreement made earlier between the two facilities.

In late September, the Big Spring bank entered into an agreement with FNB O'Donnell for the purchase of the main bank in O'Donnell and its

Lamesa branch, pending regulatory and shareholder approval.

Both the Lamesa and O'Donnell locations will remain in business, under the name of State National Bank.

Codi Cleavinger, an employee with State National Bank in Big Spring since October, will be vice president of both the Lamesa and O'Donnell branches. Cleavinger has also moved his residence to Lamesa in order to facilitate his new position.

Training Begins For Nursing Home Volunteers

Even with stronger federal and state regulations, quality care in nursing homes is still not where it needs to be, according to The Area Agency on Aging. Most nursing home residents do not know who to turn to when they have problems or complaints. The regional Area Agency on Aging (AAA) oversees 35 nursing homes in fifteen counties and helps with the concerns and complaints of the 4500 residents in these facilities. Area residents have an opportunity to become a part of an advocacy program called the Long Term Care Ombudsman and help improve residents' lives in nursing facilities.

The regional AAA, a program of the South Plains Association of Governments, is searching for volunteers to serve as Ombudsmen for nursing homes. Volunteers are needed in Amherst, Brownfield, Crosbyton, Floydada, Hale Center, Littlefield, Lockney, Muleshoe, Plainview, Post, Ralls, Stalon, Spur, Tahoka, and several facilities in Lubbock.

Ombudsmen advocate for quality of care and life in Texas nursing facilities, by representing residents and their families when a complaint or concern arises.

Vandalism, Burglary On Lists Of Crimes

Damage to outside Christmas lighting, damage to a parked car by another vehicle which left the scene, and a recent burglary at Wilson in which items valued at \$1700 were stolen were among reports on file at law enforcement agencies in Lynn County during the last week.

A witness described two youngsters she saw stealing some Christmas lights on N. 1st Street Christmas day. Tahoka Police found broken lights in the street. The lights were valued at \$8 by owner David Uptain. Investigation was continuing.

Police also investigated a report from Daliah DeLeon that her parked 2001 Honda had been damaged on the side panel, apparently by a vehicle which left the scene.


Sheriff's officers are investigating a report that Dan Garcia's Body Shop in Wilson had been burglarized about Dec. 20, with three B.F.

Goodrich 16-inch tires and rims worth \$900 among the items stolen. Two paint guns and two saws also were stolen by the burglars.

In jail during the last week were 13 persons, on these charges: public intoxication, application to revoke probation on conviction for possession of marijuana, DWI third offense or more plus driving while license suspended, assault on a public servant, hindering apprehension plus possession of drug paraphernalia, possession with intent to deliver a controlled substance (for Lubbock County), theft of services, grand jury indictment on DWI with a child passenger, failure to identify to a peace officer plus child support (for Midland County), drug possession and DWI first offense.

Thirty-two persons were in Lynn County jail, with 16 of these held for Lubbock County.





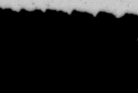

SUBJECT: QUARTERLY FLUORIDE NOTIFICATION

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Wilson water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL for Fluoride at 4mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 3.8 MG/L.

This is not an emergency. However, some people, who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in the developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

The City of Wilson has inquired about getting a Reverse Osmosis plant to deal with this problem and without the help from grants this system has been too costly to put in at this time. The City is also looking for alternative water supply sources.
