Four Arrested Here After Cocaine Found

Four persons who were in a car stopped by a Tahoka police officer Saturday were arrested on charges of possession of cocaine after six rocks of cocaine were discovered.

Arrested were three males, ages 20, 21 and 20, and a female age 22, all of Tahoka.

A 40-year-old Tahoka man was questioned in the theft of a package of wieners and three CDs from Town & Country convenience store last Thursday, and had the CDs in his possession when stopped by police. He admitted the thefts and the items were returned to the store.

Another 40-year-old Tahoka man was arrested Saturday for public intoxication and an alleged assault on his estranged wife. A 21-year-old Tahoka man also was questioned regarding an alleged assault on a 16-year-old female.

Nineteen more persons were jailed during the last week, bringing

the total jail population to 49 as of Wednesday, including 24 for Lynn County, 14 for Lubbock County, nine for Garza and two for Hockley County.

During the last week, four persons were jailed for public intoxication, three for driving while license suspended, three for possession of a controlled substance, two for evading arrest, two on Ector County warrants for theft by check, and the others on these charges: grand jury indictment for possession of a controlled substance, Lubbock warrant on failure to identify/fugitive from justice, DWI second offense, driving while license invalid, and assault/family violence.

During May dispatchers at Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. processed 272 calls, including 131 for the county, 100 for City of Tahoka, two fire calls, 17 for EMS ambulances and 22 for City of O'Donnell.

Pool passes may be purchased at \$100 for a family pass, or \$50 for individual passes for the entire summer. Passes are available at Tahoka City Hall.

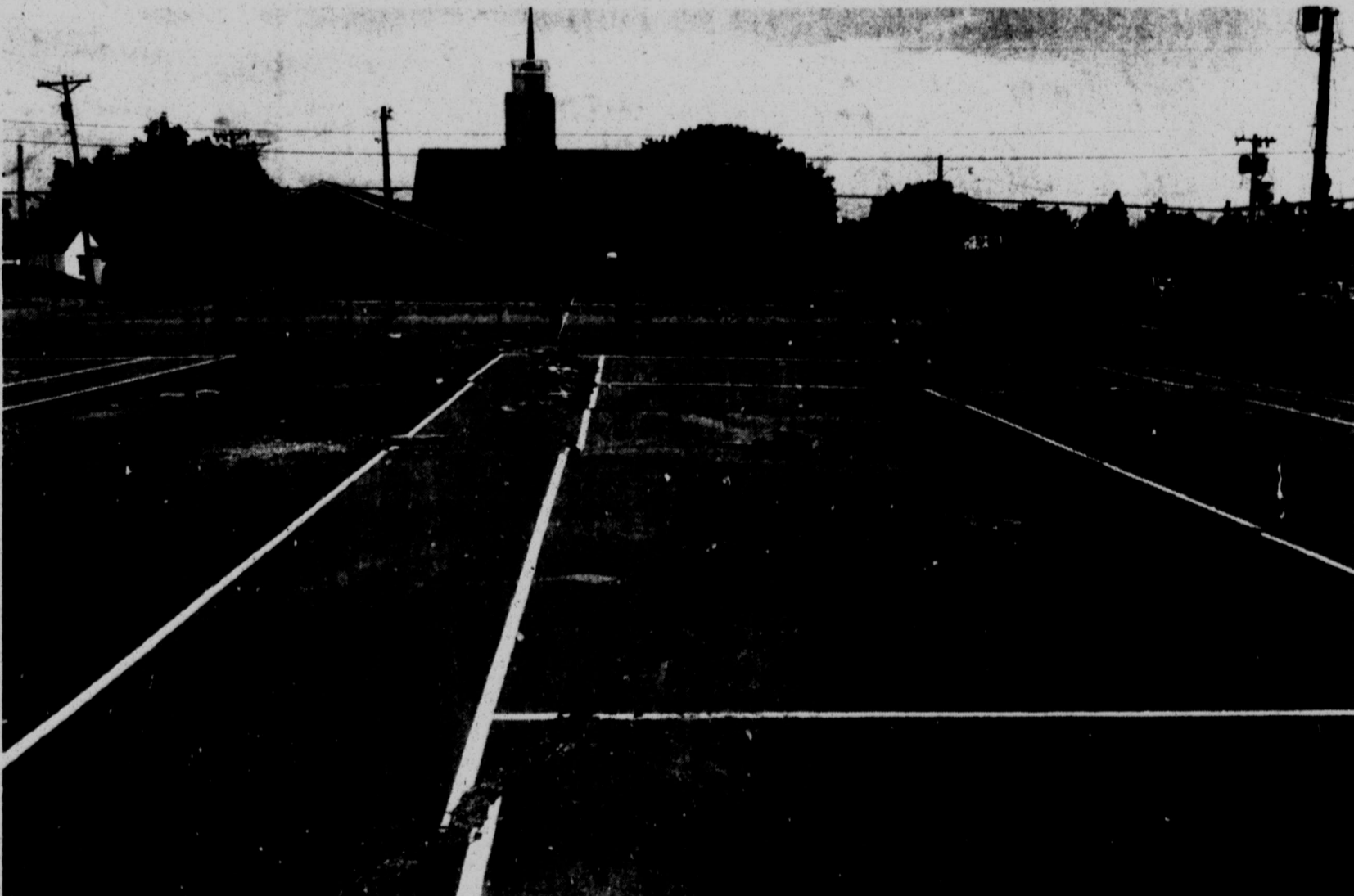

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SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Available For Disaster Victims

Business in some Texas counties, including Lynn, can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster.

Drought that occurred June 20, 2003, and continuing, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disaster can apply.

Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply: Bailey, Cochran, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry, and Yoakum.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing an application is November 22, 2004.

Due to the weather, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels.

The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program.

The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are 2.953 percent and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

Jason Jaquess Awarded Scholarships

Jason Jaquess, senior Sports and Exercise Science major at West Texas A&M University, was selected to receive two scholarships for the 2004-2005 academic year. Jaquess will receive a \$500 President's Community Service Scholarship and a \$600 Student Endowment Leadership Scholarship from the university.

In order to qualify for these scholarships, a student must demonstrate an active leadership role in their community while maintaining at least a 2.5 GPA. During his three years at WTAMU, Jaquess has helped build a home through Habitat for Humanity, wrapped children's Christmas gifts through the Eveline Rivers Project, helped with a MDA children's summer camp at Palo Duro Canyon, served as a guest speaker for Fire Prevention Week, and conducted tours of the Canyon Fire Department where he has been a volunteer for two years. In addition, Jaquess works part-time as an EMT-Basic for the BSA Ambulance Service and for the Texas Forest Service, serving as a wildland firefighter during the 2003 Slims Fire in Idaho.

The facility will emit the following air contaminants: unburned hydrocarbons, particulate matter, nitrogen oxides, sulfur dioxide and carbon monoxide.

This application was submitted to the TCEQ on April 30, 2004. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Lubbock regional office, and the Lynn County Courthouse, 100 Main Street, Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Lubbock regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

PUBLIC COMMENT. You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. 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Tahoka-Ex Running Marathons 40t Years After Heart Surgery

(Editor's Note: The following article was submitted by Glenden P. Riddle of Albuquerque, N.M.)

Did you ever think of running (literally) to Lubbock some day when it's about 85 degrees? Not many would allow such a thought to fall within the limits of the term "sanity." For Glen Riddle, formerly of Tahoka, that is the equivalent of what he does "for fun."

Some of you will remember when Glen was taken to Dallas for open heart surgery. Some of the twenty-four men who accompanied the Riddles to Dallas to give blood June 1, 1961 will still remember their part in extending Glen's life. But that Glen was one who couldn't get involved much in sports due to the shortage of oxygen in his blood. The heart surgery solved that problem, and he went on to serve over 37 years in the Navy Reserve.

In November 2001 Glen overheard two friends talking about running their first marathon. At the time he didn't even know exactly what a marathon was. John, "Man, when I hit that wall at mile 19 I just had to get it out the last seven miles." Jim, "I know what your mean, I really didn't think I could finish. On the way home Jody had to stop the car so I could vomit." By this time, the native Texan was developing a curiosity. A challenge loomed on the horizon.

From jogs of 2-3 miles several days a week, Glen began that November extending one run a week by approximately ten percent. By May of 2002 he was ready to run his first half-marathon in northern California. In October of 2002 he ran the Marine Corps Marathon in Washington, D.C. with a time of 4:18:23 (roughly nine-minute miles).

If you'd told Glen Riddle three years ago that a day was coming when he would run 26.2 miles non-stop, he would have put his money on the bet that said he would first grow hair on top of his head. The hair has not grown back on top of his head, but on April 19, 2004 he had the tremendous joy of joining almost 18,000 other runners from all over the world for the 108th Boston Marathon. It was Glen's 11th marathon in 18 months.

The Boston is unique for two reasons. It is the only marathon outside of the Olympics that requires qualifying first with a minimum time in another race first. For Glen, at 56 years of age, his qualifying time was 3:45. The Boston is also unique in that it doesn't start in the cool of the morning as most marathons do (usually between 6 and 8 a.m.). It starts at noon! Not good on day like April 19, 2004 when the temperature hit 85 degrees. Over 1,100 runners were treated for medical reasons. Some 88 were admitted to local hospitals. About 1,200 could not complete the course. Glen decided at mile 15 he did not want to join those getting free ambulance rides to local hospitals. He slowed his pace to end with a 4:51:05...his second slowest time for a marathon but still good enough to get his medal.

Next on the agenda for the boy who couldn't run...the Great Wall of China Marathon, May 22. A bit more difficult than the normal due to over 3,700 steps (some very steep!). Then there's his third Marine Corps Marathon, October 31 and Tucson again in December. But, he's already got his sights on Boston again.

"It was the greatest marathon yet. I've got to go back and see what I can do on a cooler day. I often think

while I'm out running, of those men who gave blood for me in 1961, of that heart surgeon who skillfully repaired my heart, of my parents who loved me enough to go to all that trouble and expense to get me through it all. But most of all, every time I cross a finish line in a marathon, my heart just swells with praise to God for the health he has given me and the strength to "run with perseverance" the race set out for me (Heb 12:3). I thank each and every one of you still living in Tahoka who prayed for me that day over 40 years ago, and for everyone who gave financially to help pay for the surgery. I've traveled in some 43 countries over the past 39 years since leaving Tahoka, but the gratitude for those close friendships and sacrificial love

so evident in the little towns with big hearts has never left me.

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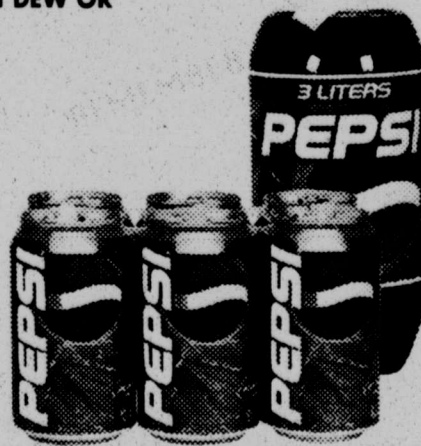
