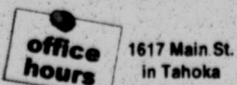

Lumber Company Burglarized Here

Between the hours of 8 p.m. Sunday and 8 a.m. Monday, someone broke into the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. on Ave. H in Tahoka and took about \$40 in cash and change.

Manager Kent Porter told police that his wife had been at the store Sunday evening until about 8 p.m., so the burglary had to occur after that. Entry to the building was gained by breaking out a door glass on the east side of the building, according to Police Chief Doyle Lee. The cash drawer in the office was prized open, and the plastic cash tray from the drawer was dumped upside down on the floor.

Investigation of the burglary was continuing.

Police also were busy during the week with several domestic disturbances and family violence incidents, and one fight involving four adults who had been drinking. Those involved told different stories, and the case was turned over to the city judge to sort out.

Lynn County Ag Farm Tour Held Sept. 15

Approximately 85 farmers, ranchers, and agribusinessmen and women gathered at Farmers Co-Op Gin on Sept. 15 to attend the annual Lynn County Ag Tour. The tour was sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Lynn County Soil & Water Conservation District. Local producers, Jay Kellin, Ty Askew, Todd Lockaby, Joe Craig and Mike Orr participated with presentations at their respective farms. The results of various test plots were discussed by Dr. Randy Bowman, Dr. Jim Leser, Dr. Calvin Trostle, and Tommy Doerderlein, all with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service; Bryan Reynolds, the local Agriculture Extension

Agent; and Cody Sparks, Rangeland Management Specialist with the NRCS.

The tour concluded with a noon meal sponsored by the Lynn-Garza Farm Bureau and the presentation of the Outstanding Farmer of the Year, Outstanding Young Farmer of the Year and the Outstanding Conservation Farmer awards.

Jackie Stidham of the Wells Community was selected by the Lynn County Agriculture Committee as the Outstanding Farmer of the Year and Todd Lockaby of Tahoka was selected as the Young Outstanding Farmer of the Year. David & Kieth Wied of Wilson were presented with the Outstanding Conservation Farmer Award for 2004.

On Saturday, police also recovered a 2000 Pontiac in Tahoka which had been reported as stolen in Plainview.

Local Schools To Receive Grants

Tahoka and O'Donnell ISD may both be recipients of a new High School Completion Grant to be awarded by the Texas Education Agency (TEA). Both schools have requested \$80,000 grants, along with over 100 other school districts requesting anywhere from \$15,000 to \$600,000. The grants are part of the new Texas High School Project, a public-private initiative designed to increase high school graduation and college graduation rates statewide.

The final grant amounts have yet to be negotiated by TEA. Both O'Donnell and Tahoka schools have received notice that they are scheduled to receive some grant funds, however it is unknown as to whether or not they will receive the entire amount they requested or when they will receive the final grant.

The grants will be used to finance new programs or enhance successful activities such as:

- Increasing student achievement, as evidenced through improved scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAKS) and increased credit accrual;
- Increasing the number of student who graduate in four years after entering 9th grade; and
- Increasing the number of students who graduate college ready, as demonstrated through credit accrual, Advanced Placement/International Baccalaureate and dual credit participation and enrollment in rigorous coursework in a college-preparatory curriculum.

"Our students represent the future workforce of Texas, and businesses and entrepreneurs will depend upon public education to produce highly-skilled and talented Texans to fuel the economy of the future," state Governor Rick Perry in Austin. "These grants are another example of our state's commitment to preparing young Texans for a college career and to compete in a competitive marketplace."

Gov. Perry said the grants represent the second cycle of awards of \$130 million in state and private funds that are part of the Texas High School Project. This \$16.3 million in state dollars comes from the High School Completion and Success Initiative, funded in Rider 67 of the Appropriations Act.

HURRICANE IVAN has struck the southern coastal areas of the United States with great resulting damage and many individual tragedies. The enormous costs will be paid by insurance companies and by taxpayers everywhere, and at the time this was written, another hurricane (Jeanne) was building up off the coast of Florida, and later caused deaths and misery in Haiti and elsewhere. It, too, may hit Florida, and I read the other day that the trend of deadly hurricanes should continue for several more years, although I'm not sure how they know that.

My brother-in-law is an independent insurance claims adjuster who goes wherever there are major storms and stays for awhile, estimating dollar amounts of damages for property owners and insurance companies. After Hurricanes Charley and Frances caused major damage in Florida, he went there and started working claims, and on a telephone call back to relatives here, estimated that he would be in Florida for two years.

That was before Ivan, so now he may be there (or in Alabama) forever.

Tornadoes, with which West Texans are more familiar, can be terrible, but hurricanes are worse, because they bring deadly walls of water off lakes and oceans, bring extremely heavy rains and high winds—and carry tornadoes inside them.

In 1969 I joined a group of about 20 Salvation Army, Red Cross and media people on a flight to Mississippi to view damage from Hurricane Camille. This storm killed 256 people and damage was estimated at \$1.42 billion. But a person has to see the damage to fully realize the incredible devastation of such a storm. I still have some color slides I took of some of the damage.

That flight, incidentally, was on a Texas Air National Guard plane, a DC-3, I think. As soon as we left the airport in Plainview, Col. Ross Somebody of the Texas ANG advised us that "this is not a regular airlines-type of flight. But we do try to come out with an equal number of takeoffs and landings."

Tahoka First Baptist Plans For 40 Days of Purpose

When First Baptist Church of Tahoka launches its "40 Days of Purpose Campaign" September 25 it will join a worldwide network of thousands of churches.

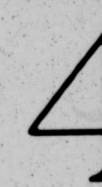

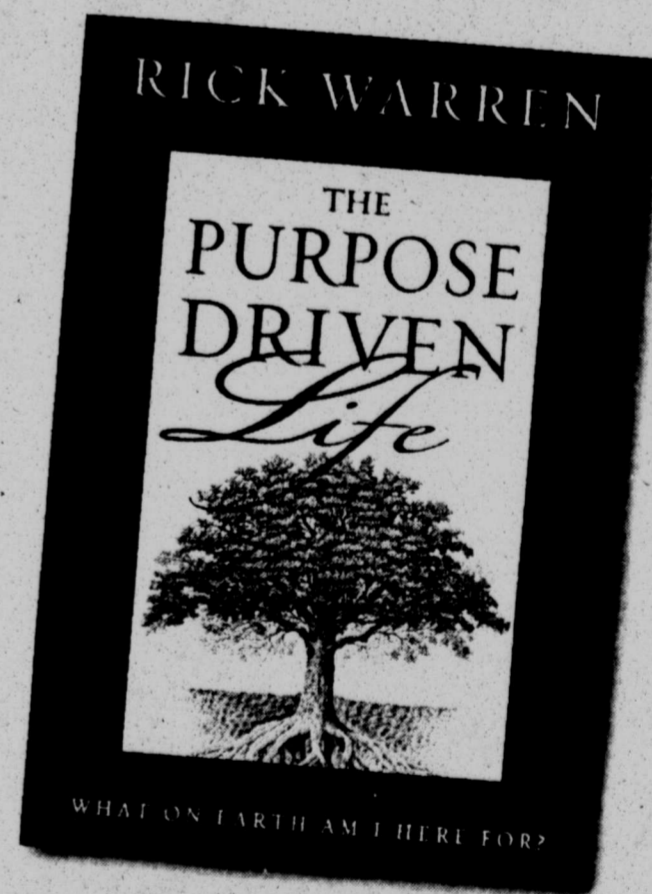

When Reggie Jackson was playing professional baseball for the Baltimore Orioles, his coach, Earl Weaver, insisted that runners have a signal before stealing a base. It upset Reggie because he had studied the pitchers and catchers in the league and felt he knew when he could and couldn't steal.

In one game, Reggie stole without a signal. Even though the play was flawless in its execution, it upset the coach. Reggie's decision to steal without a signal left first base open and gave the opponents the opportunity to walk the next player who was a powerful hitter. The coach was forced to use a pinch hitter too early in the game. The coach trusted Reggie's ability, but in looking at the whole game, he knew the better path for the team to take. 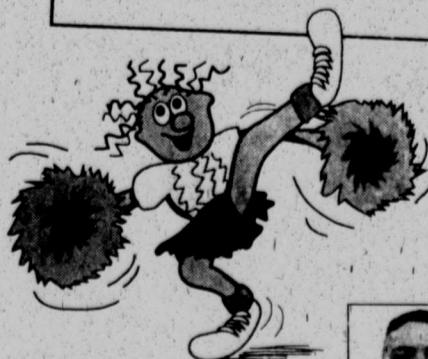

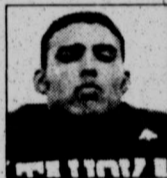
