

these days, of thousands of cotton modules stretching across field after field, with rainbows of colored tarps protecting the best cotton crop area producers have seen in years - or ever, if bale counts soar as high as predicted. The fantastic crop, and wet weather delays, is creating a backlog at area gins, with many expecting to gin into March before completing the 2004 bale count.

Gin managers haven't seen this late a season since the 1972 cotton crop, when weather - not volume - created a late finish. "It was April 27, 1973 when we finished the 1972 crop at Woolam Gin," said Tommy Woolam, owner of Woolam Gin in O'Donnell. "I remember we had 13 separate snowstorms that year that put us so far behind," he added.

"Right now we are 50 days behind, and that will put us into March," Woolam said. "Our normal 10-year average is 18,000 bales in one season. We're already over 20,000 bales this week and we are well on our way to 35-40,000 bales," Woolam predicted. "I don't know where this is going to end up, but this year's crop is absolutely incredible. We've got gins trying to farm out some of the load to other areas where ginning is already finished, so they can get their customers out in a timely manner. It's just a weird year," he added with a laugh. Lynn County producers planted 295,179 acres of cotton - the most of any county in Texas - with 217,835 acres of dryland and 77,344 acres of irrigated cotton, according to figures released by Bryan Reynolds, Lynn County Extension Agent. Add in to the mix a record-breaking rainfall for the year -42.85 inches - and the potential for recordbreaking bale counts is high. Yields have been good, with many dryland reports of 1-2 bales per acre being reported, and 2-3 bales per acre and sometimes more from irrigated fields. Last year, Lynn County ranked fourth in Texas with 198,800 bales produced on 279,400 acres. THE REAL PROPERTY AND ADDRESS OF THE PARTY OF THE

According to predicted estimates,

Lynn County may produce an all-time record high number of bales this year, as much as 441,490 bales, based on the number of acres planted and the predicted yield estimates, says Reynolds.

The record for Lynn County cotton production was set in 1973 with 275,800 bales, and only nine other years (all since 1972) have produced more than 200,000 bales in the county's history.


Bob Ballard, manager at Farmers Coop Assn. #1 in Tahoka, said if the weather remains nice that they should finish ginning about the middle of March, and predicted that Farmers Coop would gin close to 50,000 bales.

"Our average here is about 17-18,000 bales. This may be nearly tripled this year. I think the record here is 28,000 bales," he said. With a bale count of 21,005 as of Tuesday afternoon, Farmers Coop is well on their way to surpassing their record.

Wet weather has also prevented gins from picking up the modules already out in the fields. Ballard said he figured Farmers Coop had about 1800 modules in the fields to pick up as of this week.

Figuring a conservative 10 bales per module, a predicted 441,490 bale count equals a mind-boggling 40,000+ modules in Lynn County that the gins have been working frantically to pick up and process.

Two Pickup Accidents, Burglaries Investigated

Two pickups were involved in separate accidents on U.S. 87 near O'Donnell last week, with no injuries listed in either accident.

On Friday morning a 1997 GMC pickup driven by David Baker, 19, of Stanton left the roadway and slammed into a ditch. He was not injured.

On Sunday morning about 10 a.m. at a point 2.9 miles north of O'Donnell, a 1999 Dodge pickup driven by Lisa Rodriques, 28, of Lubbock went out of control after a rear tire separated, and struck a highway sign. Neither the driver nor a male passenger was injured.

Information was obtained this week on a collision which occurred the previous week just north of the north overpass at Tahoka on U.S. 87. Jessica Garza, 25, was driving a 1991 Chevrolet Blazer which collided with 1990 Jeep Cherokee traveling north on U.S. 87 as the Blazer was entering U.S. 87 from FM 400 during a fog. The driver and a passenger, Becky Escamillia, 25, also of Lubbock, were taken by Tahoka EMS ambulance for treatment at Lynn County Hospital emergency room and later released.

The driver of the Jeep, Barry Lance Johnson, 54, of Colorado Springs, CO was not injured. Tahoka Police arrested Amanda

Lee Gutierrez, 23, of Tahoka on an outstanding warrant for grand jury indictment on a forgery case.

Sheriff's officers are investigating two burglaries in the New Home area. On Jan. 3 a 2004 Dodge pickup owned by Gary Lee Cramblet was stolen and numerous items and cash were stolen from the home two miles west of New Home. The pickup, a generator and some other items were recovered after Dept. of Public Safety task force officers located the pickup in Lubbock and arrested a 20year-old New Home man. Burglary charges are pending further investigation.

On Jan. 11, a farm shop owned by James Mitchell of Wolfforth, located about five miles northwest of New Home, was burglarized, with various tools and equipment stolen, valued at a total of about \$1700. Investigation of this incident also was continuing, according to a sheriff's deputy.

Seven persons were jailed during the last week, bringing the total jail population as of Wednesday to 42, including 18 for Lubbock County. Charges against the seven included possession of marijuana under two ounces, possession of drug paraphernalia, grand jury indictment on six counts of forgery. driving while license suspended, DWI and warrant on parole violation.

I think that's a pretty foolish way to spend \$50,000, since I am of the (admittedly minority) opinion that the world doesn't need any more cats.


I don't have a lot of respect for the way some people fawn over their pets, and that includes dogs, although I like dogs and we have always owned dogs.

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

Texas Agrees To **Concealed Handgun** Reciprocity

Texas Gov. Rick Perry has signed a proclamation allowing citizens with concealed handgun licenses issued by Colorado to legally carry concealed handguns in Texas. Based on this proclamation, Colorado law allows Texas citizens with concealed handgun licenses to legally carry concealed handguns in Colorado. This action has the same effect as a reciprocal agreement.

"In essence, this agreement allows licensed Texans to enjoy the same or similar privileges their licenses give them at home," DPS Director Col. Thomas Davis Jr. said.

This is the 15th reciprocity agreement Texas has reached with another state. (These agreements were made possible by 1997 and 2003 changes to the Texas concealed handgun law.) Texas also has reciprocity agreements with Arkansas, Arizona, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Utah and Wyoming

"Texans should remember that laws vary from state to state; and before traveling, license holders should educate themselves about laws in other states that govern where and when they can legally carry their concealed handguns," Davis said.







New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin Manager David Wied is also predicting they will be ginning into March, with a bale count this week of 35,701. "I figure we will have a bale count into the 80,000s at least, and maybe pushing 90,000 bales before we finish," said Wied.

Texas Star Gin has reported a total bale count of 62,942 for their plants at Wilson and Union as of Tuesday afternoon, and gin officials say they are hoping to finish around the first week of March, with an incredible 110,000 bales predicted.

All predictions are that the 2004 crop will be the largest in history in the United States, with an estimate of 22.5 million bales projected. Texas is expected to produce 7.7 million bales of cotton, and Lynn County producers are certainly doing their part to add to the state's total


Total figures from the nine gins reporting bale counts in the Lynn County area this week surpassed the 200,000 mark, with 207,942 bales as of Tuesday afternoon. Normally, The Lynn County News is finished reporting bale counts by mid-January, but this year the bale count reports will continue until area gins are finished - whenever that may be.



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


