
## Spring Concert Is Next Thursday

There is a breakfast cooking set which includes some little rings to keep eggs from running all over, plus a non-stick 11-inch square griddle, all for \$19.97. This sounds pretty good to me (of course, breakfast always sounds good to me).

There are many other items, including house shoes you wear which dusts the floors while you walk around, toenail clippers and a can opener which cuts from the side, all kinds of tools and things for the garden and lawn, plus hundreds of things designed primarily to get your money.

Of course, I will just throw the catalog away now. But first I may order some of that driveway repair tape.

IF YOU read this on Thursday, then tomorrow will be Friday the 13<sup>th</sup>, traditionally a time to beware of bad things happening to you, although I really don't know why. I tried to look up Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> in my encyclopedia to find out how it all got started, and all it told me about was the movie by that name. #### "Texas County Progress" Magazine Publishes Lynn County article in "Why Stop In?"

"Texas County Progress," the official publication of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, published an article about Lynn County in their April 2005 edition. The article was included in the magazine's "Why Stop In?" section, which featured information about four counties in Texas. including Lynn, Comanche, Trinity and Upton counties.

Lynn County Judge H.G. F anklin worked with magazine officials to provide the information. I ollowing is a reprint of the article: Lynn County

Standing sentry in the center of the town square of Tahoka for 88 years, the Lynn County Courthouse has long provided a unique historical aspect to the county that celebrated its 100th year in 2003. Tall columns frame the front facade of the courthouse, built in 1916.

Lynn County was named for Alamo defender George Washington Lynn in the legislative act of Aug. 21, 1876; the county was organized a quarter of a century later, and Tahoka was named the county seat.

The cities of Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell are located within the county, each with their own unique culture and personalities. The county boasts one of the few remaining locally owned and operated hospitals.

The county has lor ; been an agricultural area, with cotton the leading commodity. Lynn County led the entire state in cotton production in 1942, 1972 and 1975 (the year that 275,800 bales were ginned, a figure that ranked as fifth most productive county in the nation). In 2004, Lynn County h d 295,179 acres planted in cotton, leading the South Plains area in terms of acreage.

Much of the county's history is preserved at the Pioneer Museum in Tahoka, and at the O'Donnell Museum, which also features memorabilia about Dan Blocker, O'Donnell's famous son who starred in "Bonanza."

Our annual Harvest Festival is held on courthouse grounds in Tahoka every fall

#### **Questions and Answers of the Day**

I Corinthians 11:18-34; Matthew 26:26-29

Question: What is communion and what is its purpose?

When Jesus was instructing his disciples about taking the bread, he said, "Take, eat, this is my body." He said this after breaking it. He took a cup of wine and He said, "Drink ye all of it. For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." The bread and the blood are representative of the crucifixion of Jesus. Jesus' blood was shed on the cross for all of mankind. Many times in the churches, the Lord's Supper becomes a routine ritual, with some of the participants doing it only because it is expected of them.

In I Cor. 18-34, the procedure and the expectations of God are described concerning the Lord's Supper. In verses 23-26, Jesus says this is done to show His death or to bring it to our remembrance until He comes back. Verse 27 says something interesting ... [27 Wherefore whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and the blood of the Lord. 28 But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup. 29 For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily eateth and drinketh damnation to himself not discerning the Lord's body ... 33 Wherefore, my brethren, when ve come together to eat, tarry one for another.] We are supposed to come before the Lord and work out that which we have done with Him. True repentance and love

for Jesus must accompany the Lord's Supper. GOD BLESS YOU.



#### Health Officials Search For Persons who Handled Puppy at Lubbock Animal Shelter Adopt-a-Thon

The City of Lubbock Health Department is still searching for a woman who may have been exposed to rabies after bringing in a stray female Australian Shepherd mix puppy. It is urgent that the woman contacts the Health Department to discuss her probable exposure to rabies from the puppy. This puppy was brought in to the Animal Shelter Adopt-a-Thon on Saturday, April 30, between 12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m., and stayed at the Animal Shelter until Monday, May 2, at approximately 5:30 p.m. The puppy later tested positive for rabies. It is described as a 7-8 week old, female puppy being black/grey in color, a long tail and medium length hair. Information is also sought regarding the puppy's mother and littermates.

In addition, Health Department officials continue to seek other potentially exposed persons who may have had contact with this puppy during the Adopt-a-Thon. Any person who had contact with this animal may have been exposed to the virus. Any individual who attended the Adopt-a-Thon during the afternoon of Saturday, April 30th, or who may have visited the shelter on Monday, May 2nd, should contact the City of Lubbock Health Department at 775-2935. These individuals need to be evaluated to determine if rabies treatment is necessary. People who attended the Adopt-a-Thon before 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 30, would not be at-risk for exposure. Again, any person who may have had contact with this puppy needs to contact the City of Lubbock Health Department at 775-2935.

Rabies is most often transmitted by bites, but transmission can occur when saliva from an infected animal enters a person's body. A series of post exposure shots, if given in time, can prevent rabies from developing, Treatment must occur before symptoms appear. Once symptoms develop, rabies is almost always fatal. In humans, the incubation period for rabies after exposure is usually 3 to 8 weeks, and in rare cases as short as 9 days or as long as 7 years.



## New Phone Number, 2-1-1, **Offers Help For Texans**

South Plains residents will soon be hearing more about 2-1-1 Texas, he free, three-digit phone number that connects callers with services in their community that can improve. their health and quality of life.

2-1-1 Texas is launching a statewide education effort to teach individuals and families about when and why they should call 2-1-1.

"It's the number people should call when they aren't sure where to turn for help," says Kendra Jackson, AIC Manager. "No matter where you live in Texas, you can call 2-1-1 and find information about resources in your local community. Whether you need help finding food or housing, childcare, crisis counseling or substance abuse treatment, one number is all you need to know.

2-1-1 Texas is a free, anonymous information and referral line answered by nationally certified specialists 24 hours a day, seven days a week. When callers dial 2-1-1, they are connected to area information centers in their region. These trained experts have access to the most comprehensive database of communitybased organizations, government agencies and nonprofits that exist in Texas. Information can be provided in almost any language including Spanish.

2-1-1 is a program of the Texas. Health and Human Services Commission in collaboration with the South Plains Association of Governments.

2-1-1 Texas South Plains covers a 15 county region: Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza. Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley, Terry and Yoakum counties.

To help local information centers educate residents about 2-1-1. HHSC developed an awareness campaign that includes radio public service announcements, posters, brochures and other materials used for community presentations. All materials are provided in English and Spanish. The campaign was folled out in September to 25 Area Infor-

mation Center Directors around Texas

"When a person dials 2-1-1, their call is usually answered right in their hometown," said Beth Wick, HHSC program coordinator for 2-1-1 Texas. "So it's important the area information centers have the materials they need to promote the service in their communities. This statewide education campaign will give them the tools they need.

The list of resources available through 2-1-1 is extensive. It can also make the job easier for service providers at nonprofits and community organizations, first response personnel like nurses, counselors and police and elected officials and leaders. They can tell clients to call 2-1-1 to get the help they need, 2-1-1 experts can provide information on

2-1-1 Texas is also included in Gov. Perry's Homeland Security strategy as a tool for sharing information and mobilizing resources during local, statewide or national disasters: The Sept. 11 terrorist attacks created one of the greatest challenges community information and referral providers ever experienced. Immediately after the attacks, calls increased dramatically to community organizations as families looked for missing loved ones, people were stranded at airports, and the public needed counseling services to cope.

"If we ever face another tragedy like Sept. 11, 2-1-1 Texas will play a vital role, connecting people quickly and efficiently with help and information." said Albert Hawkins. Texas Health and Human Services Commissioner. "2-1-1 will fill a gap to prevent people from falling






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

## WEATHER WHYS

Q: What are some of the worstever weather events in the U.S.?

A: This question gets asked a lot, says Kelsey Curtiss of Texas A&M University, so much so that the NOAA (National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration) has issued a list of the some of the past century's worst weather events. "The worst ever occurred in Texas - it's the Galveston Hurricane of 1900," Curtiss explains. "It killed 8,000 people and leveled the city and is still the worst natural disaster in U.S. history." Number 2 on the list is the great Dust Bowl storm period of the 1930s when a large-scale drought wiped out thousands of farms in the Midwest. causing landowners to declare bankruptcy. The third, Curtiss says of the list, is the tornado outbreak that occurred in 1974 when an incredible 148 tornadoes raved the U.S. from the Great Lakes to Mississippi, killing 315 people.

Q: What are some others?

A: Hurricane Camille in 1969 killed 256 people and is still one of the strongest storms ever recorded, Curtiss adds. Others on the NOAA list include the Midwest flood of 1993, the costliest on record, which caused \$18 billion in damage and. killed 48 people. Also, Hurricane Andrew in 1992, which caused \$28 billion in damage and killed 23 people in Florida and Louisiana; the New England hurricane of 1938. which killed 600 people and caused millions of dollars of damage in the New York and Boston areas: the Tri-State Tornado of 1925, which killed 695 people in Missouri, Illinois and Indiana; and the Oklahoma-Kansas tornado outbreak in 1999, which killed 44 people.

'Q: What's the difference between a funnel cloud and a tornado? A: It's really a question of timing, says Michael Hammer of Texas A&M University. A funnel cloud, he. explains, is a swirling mass of air stretching down from a dark cloud. but it has not touched the ground yet. Once it makes contact with the ground, it's then classified as a tornado. "Look for the dust and debris at the ground," Hammer says. "That means for sure that a funnel cloud has

become a tornado.
