Thefts, Criminal Mischief Incidents Investigated Here

Thefts, criminal mischief, one traffic accident and an arrest of a 17-year-old who resisted violently were among incidents investigated by law enforcement officers in the city and county during the last week.

Police officer Brent Lee stopped a car early last Friday for a traffic violation and the 17-year-old driver, from Waco, cursed and beat his head against the patrol car windows and damaged the interior of the car, later wrestled with and threatened Lee and another officer who came to assist, and damaged the paint on the patrol car by scraping his handcuffs on the vehicle. He also spit on one of the officers and struggled when taken to jail, where he was booked for minor driving under the influence of alcohol, no drivers license and criminal mischief, plus retaliation and assault on a peace officer.

Sheriff's officers took a report on May 20 from Cecil Hammonds of Tahoka, who said a 21-foot black utility trailer loaded with some parts for a 1975 International tractor had been stolen from his farm about five miles southeast of Tahoka. Among the tractor parts were a radiator, air conditioner coil, back plate and a water tank bracket, which later was found on a road in the vicinity. Total value of the 2004 trailer and the equipment not recovered was set at \$5150.

Deputies also received a report Wednesday that 25 Lubbock Avalanche-Journal newspapers intended for route delivery were stolen from behind the post office at O'Donnell sometime after 3 a.m. Wednesday.

On Saturday afternoon in the 1800-block of Ave. Q in Tahoka a 1994 Oldsmobile driven by Jeremy Munoz, 18, of Tahoka, struck two flower pots, a fence and

mailbox in the yard of the home of A.J. Jester. The driver was not injured.

Rosa Alvarado of Tahoka told police that someone had dented her parked 2001 Mazda 626 Saturday. Damage was estimated at \$300.

Joey Barrientez of Tahoka advised police that a stereo CD player valued at \$500 had been stolen out of his 1978 Chevrolet pickup over the weekend.

Waldo Segovia Jr. of Tahoka reported that someone had damaged his 1999 Dodge Neon Saturday.

Dispatchers at Lynn County sheriff's department processed 265 calls during May, with 137 for the county, 84 for the City of Tahoka, 21 for O'Donnell, 21 ambulance calls and two fire alarms.

Hospital Administrator Dan Powers Resigns

Lynn County Hospital Administrator Dan Powers dropped a bombshell into the middle of Tuesday's meeting of the board of directors by announcing that he is resigning from the top job at the hospital effective Sept. 5.

In a letter read to the board, Powers expressed appreciation to the board for support and said he was just tired of dealing with all the problems and details of running the hospital. He noted that the

hospital is now doing well financially and that all key hospital personnel appear to be capable and well-trained.

Powers, who had been administrator since Aug. 1, 2000, said he plans to go into some other occupation which is not related to medicine.

Newly-elected board members W. Calloway Huffaker and Regina

Crutcher were given the oath of office by Carmen Chapa and welcomed to the board by President Billy Tomlinson.

Powers advised the board that the legislative measure sponsored by Sen. Robert Duncan which would have set stronger standards for hospital board membership had not been passed by the legislature. The bill, which applied only to Lynn County Hospital, would have made current payment of all taxes a condition of board membership, plus some attendance requirements.

The board re-elected Tomlinson president, Jerry Ford vice president and Virginia Griffing as treasurer. All board members were present, including those mentioned above plus Joan Knox and Dalton Wood, and Jimmy Morris, Chief Operations Officer.

WE ALL HAVE heard the advice, "Don't sweat the small stuff," and preachers and others are always urging us to keep our sights set on the really important things in life, higher goals and all that. But that doesn't keep most of us from getting all bent out of shape over things which really don't matter much.

For example, I still get bothered by people who install toilet paper so that it feeds from the bottom of the roll instead of the top. I even wrote a column about this one time.

Even my wife, who has better priorities than I do, has a couple of little things which bug her. For one, she really hates it when I open the car door and leave the key in the ignition for a few seconds. The beeping sound greatly irritates her and I usually am so advised.

That's just one little thing. I, on the other hand, am bothered by lots of little things. Just last Sunday at the noon meal I commented negatively on the mashed potatoes. "I like potatoes fixed almost any old way, but I really don't like them that much mashed," I said. And one of my daughters spoke right up:

"We know, dad. You say that every time," implying that nobody wants to hear it again.

I don't believe I say it every time. I remember once in 1993 when I had a cold and lost my voice, I didn't say anything about the mashed potatoes.

Back to the bathroom for a minute: One thing which really bothers me is commodes which won't flush, especially those which flush just fine for everybody else, but don't work properly when I trip the handle. I complain about the equipment and someone else steps into the bathroom and flushes it the very first time. Then they go off muttering things like "that old guy has a college degree and he can't even flush a commode."

There are many little things which bother people, and none of them matter much in the long run.

So I am going to try to ignore all those little things I don't like and concentrate on things I do like. As soon as I can come up with any.

AMONG THE THINGS I can't help being bothered by is the high cost of everything, like the water bill I received from the city of Tahoka last week. It was easily the highest one I ever got. I noticed there was a statement stamped on the bill which advised that "Swimming pool opens June 3." I guess they must have filled it with water channeled through my meter.

The possibility of cats not fighting just isn't in their nature. Feline caregivers need to be aware of their pet's susceptibility to fight wounds.

"Felines are very territorial and will fight other cats to protect or acquire territory. As a result, fight wounds occur," notes Dr. Melanie Landis, a veterinarian at Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

Landis explains that when a cat bites another cat, its sharp teeth go through the skin, and then it releases quickly. The result is a small puncture wound into the skin and muscle.

Because these skin holes seal quickly, bacteria are provided an excellent place to grow and multiply. Anaerobic (meaning it grows in the absence of air) bacteria become trapped under the skin and can multiply for days before infection signs become evident.

"The bitten cat may show common signs of infection such as swelling, pain at the puncture site, possible fever and decreased appetite," notes Landis. If treated immediately, some cat bite wounds may successfully be treated with antibiotics.

If several days have elapsed, an abscess will often develop. To help clear infection, the abscess is surgically opened and flushed with an antibacterial solution. A drain tube may be used to keep the wound open and allow infected matter to escape so the abscess can heal completely. The tube is then removed and the surgical opening heals.

"If you know your cat has received a bite, the puncture wound should be immediately and thoroughly washed with plenty of soap and warm water," advises Landis. "The idea is to remove as much saliva and, therefore, bacteria as possible. Generally, the cat will need to be sedated so that the bite/wound can

be cleaned completely with minimal stress.

Fight wounds are more common in male cats, states Landis. Because of their instinct to roam into other cats' territories, male cats are frequently fighting with other male cats especially if a female cat is in heat.

Neutered male cats seem more content to claim a smaller area around or within their homes, but they will fight to defend their territory, she adds.

It is not just bite wounds that should concern cat owners. "Diseases, like feline leukemia virus and feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV), may be transmitted through bite wounds," explains Landis. "However, feline leukemia virus can possibly be prevented with regular vaccination."

Keeping cats indoors will help protect them from fight wounds.

Commissioners Have Routine Meeting

Lynn County Commissioners met in routine session May 23. Melvin Eaker met with the court to explain the additional billing for the county audit and to say the Juvenile Probation Office had a clean opinion for the 2004 audit. Eaker has provided additional work for auditing some county offices and has had to bill accordingly. He told commissioners he expects to present the county audit soon.

John Baker met with commissioners to report on the progress of the renovation grant for the courthouse. He said he hopes to have the final draft presented to the committee in Austin by September, and was optimistic in expectations for the grant.

Sheriff Jerry Franklin reported on jail facilities, noting that a larger vent for air conditioning would be needed in a closet that housed several computers that ran the jail.

Monthly bills were approved, and commissioners adjourned at 11:30 a.m. Present were three commissioners, including Don Morton, Don Blair and Mike Braddock, and County Judge H.G. Franklin. Commissioner J.T. Miller was absent.

THC Offers New Online Atlas

The Texas Historical Commission's (THC) newly designed Texas Historic Sites Atlas, available through the THC web site, now offers many new features and data. The Atlas became available online in 1997. The improvements include:

- * New search capabilities featuring a keyword and an address search;
- * New data, including cemeteries, military sites and historic court-houses;
- * New mapping software displaying maps more quickly without plug-ins;

"The improvements are significant and noticeable," said THC Atlas Coordinator Dan Julien. "We will continue to update the Atlas regularly, as we receive more information from our programs and initiatives and integrate new data from field surveys into the Atlas."

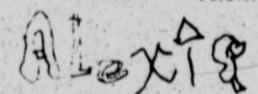

A reception will follow in St. Joseph's Hall until 5:00 p.m. It will be a time to renew friendships and thank him for his lifetime of dedicated service to others in all the parishes he's pastored.

Monsignor Tim Schwertner was born June 28, 1933 in western Lubbock County on a farm between Lubbock and Smyer. In January of 1946 his family moved to Slaton, joined St. Joseph's Parish, and he enrolled in St. Joseph's School along with his two older brothers.

After he graduated from the eighth grade, he enrolled in St. John's Minor Seminary in San Antonio. After graduation from high school in May of 1957, he applied to Assumption Seminary, also in San Antonio, the following September. After completing four years of college, and four years of Theology, he was ordained to the priesthood on May 30, 1965 in St. Joseph's Church, Slaton, Texas. He presided at his first Mass the following day - also at St. Joseph's.

Following a summer as a substitute, he was assigned to Sacred Heart Parish in Plainview as one of two associates, where he served for five years. In June of 1970, he was assigned to Holy Cross Parish in Post, with Blessed Sacrament mission in Wilson. St. Jude in Tahoka was added temporarily as a mission the following January. The "temporary" assignment lasted until March of 1973.

In June of 1973, he was transferred to Immaculate Conception parish in Muleshoe, with St. Mary Magdalen in Earth its mission. He served there for six years. In June of 1979, he was assigned to St. Michael's in Levelland, where he served for 13 years. During this time, he started a mission for the people in Sundown.

After the assignment in Levelland, he went to St. Alice in Plainview with mission San Jose in Lockney, where he served for the next six years. In 1998, Msgr. Tim was assigned to St. Elizabeth's University Parish in Lubbock, where he served three years and four months.

CHICKEN PIE

2 c. cooked chicken, cut in bite size pieces
1/2 can peas and carrots, drained
3/4 c. flour
1/2 can cream of chicken soup
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 can chicken broth
3/4 c. buttermilk
1/4 tsp. dried tarragon
1/4 c. butter melted (not margarine)

Heat oven to 350°. Place chicken in lightly greased 9 x 13-inch baking dish. Mix chicken soup, broth and tarragon, pour over chicken. Arrange peas and carrots over top. Mix flour and baking powder in a bowl, add buttermilk and butter. Stir to form a thin dough; pour evenly over chicken mixture. Bake uncovered about 1 hour until crust rises to top and browns lightly.

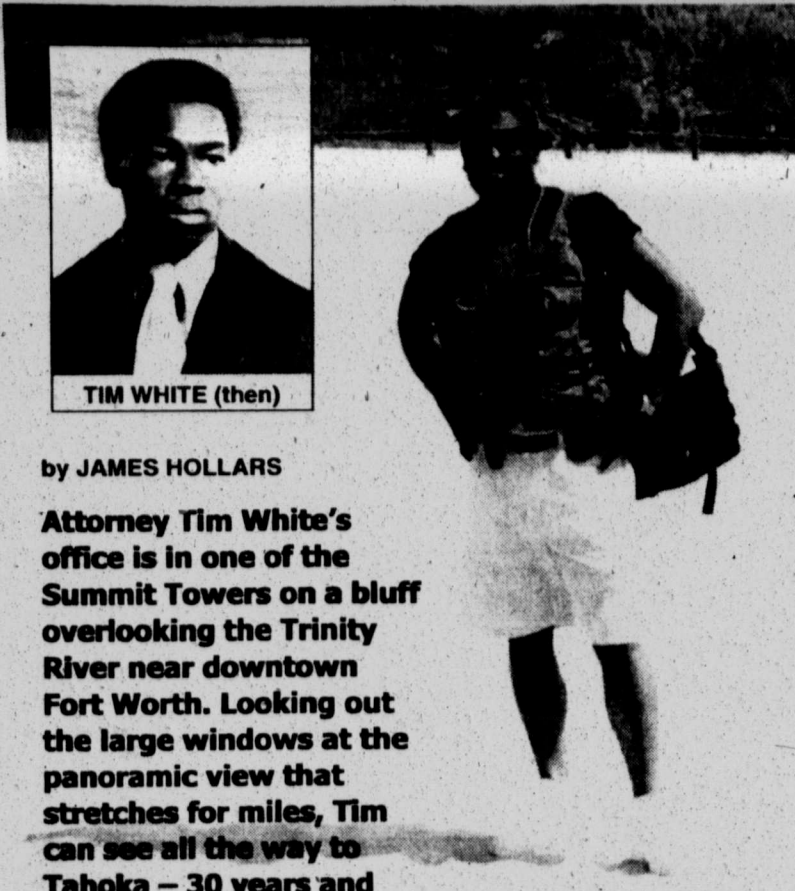

Attorney Tim White's office is in one of the Summit Towers on a bluff overlooking the Trinity River near downtown Fort Worth. Looking out the large windows at the panoramic view that stretches for miles, Tim can see all the way to Tahoka — 30 years and 300 miles away.

He can see Jay Womack, a man he admired, who gave him his first job. He can see the Friday night lights at the football stadium where his success earned him a college scholarship. He can see the nearby school where he got a quality education that was to have a major impact on his life. He remembers junior high principal Robert Ryan who encouraged him to excel in academics, as well as sports, teachers who pushed him to do his best, and Clifton Gardner, the man Tim calls "the best high school principal I have ever seen."

He can turn from the window and see on the opposite wall of his office the framed poll tax receipts his parents and grandparents paid, refusing to be denied the right to vote. In

his mind he can see the shack with no running water where he was born. He can see the three-room school in east Tahoka where eight grades of African-American students were crowded into three rooms. He remembers the text books, many with pages missing, discarded by the white pupils at the school on the west side of town.

Tim remembers how terrified his mother was when the school board announced the end of segregation when he was in the fourth grade. She was convinced her children would be harmed if they went to the previously all-white school.

Now, on the walls of his Fort Worth office he can look with pride at diplomas from the University of Texas at Arlington and Texas Southern Law School, framed member-

ships in the State Bar of Texas and Tarrant County Bar Association, and a picture of his daughter Tori, a runner-up in the 2000 Miss Texas pageant.

Tim White and Tahoka have both come a long way in that 30 years and 300 miles.

Tim graduated from THS in 1974 and enrolled at the University of Texas at Arlington where both he and

education he got in Tahoka, for the friends he has here, and for the changes he has seen in his lifetime.

"I work in Fort Worth, but Tahoka is my home. It always will be."

Tim White lives in Arlington. He has three daughters and a son. His parents, T. C. and Myrtle White, both deceased, raised ten children in

cousin Jimmy Bailey, also a Tahoka graduate, played division one college football. He enjoyed football, but it was the classroom that shaped his future. Soon after arriving at UTA Tim realized he was far ahead of his new classmates from big city schools, that he had gotten a superior education in that small high school out in West Texas.

Tim graduated from law school in 1983 and was admitted to the bar in 1984. He was an assistant Tarrant County prosecutor for five years before setting up his own law office. He practices criminal defense in state and federal court, and also handles state and federal appeals, personal injury lawsuits and deceptive trade practice claims.

Despite the segregated beginning of his life in Tahoka, Tim is glad he grew up here. He is grateful for the

Governor Rick Perry Highlights Successes of Legislative Session

Gov. Rick Perry this week joined with Lt. Governor David Dewhurst and Speaker Tom Craddick to tout the successes and accomplishments of the 2005 Legislative Session. Perry also stated his continued determination to broker a deal between the house and the senate on school finance reform.

"This legislative session ends with a number of successes and one disappointment," Perry said. "I am proud we passed landmark reforms to protect vulnerable children and frail adults, reformed workers' compensation laws to help injured workers and lower costs for their employers, and made investments in jobs and technology."

On the issue of school finance Perry expressed optimism that legislative leaders could still reach an agreement, saying, "the final chapter of this book has yet to be written. I don't believe we are finished here and I know a great many legislators feel the same way. Legislators' inability to strike an agreement will make for a long and uncomfortable summer when they go home and explain why they did not act on education reform and property tax relief."

Perry highlighted the following accomplishments of the legislative session:

- A lawsuit reform measure that will crack down on frivolous asbestos lawsuits while ensuring Texans truly harmed by asbestos get the care they need.
- A workers' compensation reform that will lower health care costs, provide relief to employers and provide better benefits to injured workers while giving them every incentive to return to work sooner.
- A landmark \$200 million CPS

reform bill that will make a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands of vulnerable Texans with the hiring of hundreds of new investigators to protect children at risk of harm.

• A continued investment in the jobs and technology that will be the foundation for the future with about \$380 million in funding for the Enterprise Fund and the new Emerging Technology Fund.

• A transportation bill that continues the state's vision for ending gridlock and creating growth, while protecting private property rights.

Perry also noted that he is disappointed that legislators did not act on comprehensive school finance reform that would improve education and provide a property tax cut to Texas taxpayers.

"I am disappointed for millions of taxpayers drowning in rising tax bills, for schoolchildren trapped in failing schools that refuse to change and for every employer that depends on an educated workforce, and that would have benefited from the landmark school reforms this legislature should have passed," Perry said. Perry added that if the house and senate can come to an agreement that he will call a special session.

"I have said all along that school finance should not be resolved at the courthouse but at the state house," Perry said. "I still believe that can happen even though the regular session has ended without an agreement."

"We ran out of time this session, but I will continue to work overtime to give a victory to schoolchildren, Texas teachers and property taxpayers, and I hope the legislature will join me."

Tool-related injuries, no joke:

Don't Let "Tool Time" Become "ER" Time

Tim Allen's popular TV comedy "Home Improvement" poked fun at the idea of a do-it-yourselfer who, in his never ending quest for "more power," created humorous mishaps. The reality is much less funny. The home improvement business is booming in America, and many will find the perfect Father's Day tool comes with a power cord. Those tools often come with instructions and safety manuals that remain unopened. And that may be responsible for the rash of injuries.

The American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) doctors know the consequences too well. Finger amputations send an estimated 28,000 children and adults to hospital emergency departments for emergency care each year. According to researchers from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC), almost one-half of all finger amputations in men, ages 55 and older, were caused by power tools.

Many of these injuries could be prevented by taking a few simple precautions, such as following the safety instructions and wearing protective gear.

Proper preparation:

Always read and familiarize yourself with the manufacturer's in-

structions, including precautions and how to respond to an emergency. Wear the recommended protective equipment, such as safety goggles, clothing, earplugs, dust masks or gloves. Finally, make sure that the tool is in good working order, including the cord, switch, and any protective guarding. Safety guarding should never be removed.

Proper tool use:

Whenever working with a power tool, it is important to make sure that safety guards are in place, in working order, and properly adjusted. Never modify a tool to use for a job it's not intended to do. Keep safety switches in working order, and never bypass or replace it with a standard on-off switch.

A common source of injuries is tools starting unexpectedly. The best way to avoid accidental starts is by keeping by hands away from switches, while carrying a plugged-in or battery powered tools. Many medications also warn against using power tools. Those warnings should be heeded at all times, or when you are tired or consuming alcohol.

Work safely:

A safe work area will keep you and others safe. Keep work areas well lit and free of clutter. Tripping or stumbling while carrying a power tool is dangerous. Never use powered tools in damp or wet locations

because of the risk of slipping as well as electric shock. Be sure to keep good footing and maintain good balance. Wear the right clothing, avoiding loose fitting clothes, ties or jewelry that can get caught in machinery. Observers should remain a safe distance away from the work area.

Storage:

When putting tools away, store them in a dry place that is not above your head. At the same time, store tools out of the reach of children and always disconnect the power supply, particularly for large powered saws, drills, and the like.

Former Tahokan Ed Smith Named Texas Cooperative Extension Director

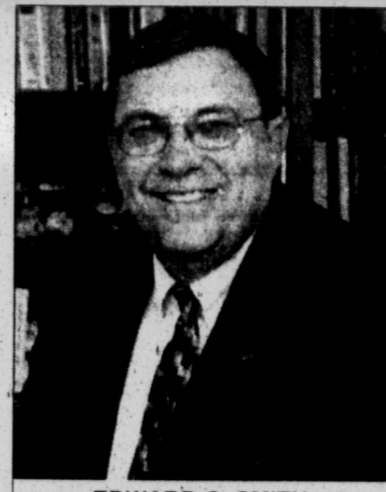

Depth-to-water Level Measurements Show Big Increase In Lynn County

Annual depth to water level measurements made in early 2005 by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 show an average increase of 0.74 of a foot in the ground water levels of the Ogallala aquifer during 2004 within the district's 6.8 million acre service area. As a comparison, the 2004 depth-to-water level measurements had indicated an average decline of 1.34 feet during 2003.

"We are pleased that above-average rainfall across the water district last year helped reduce pumpage from the aquifer," said Jim Conkwright, district manager.

The district 10-year average annual change decreased from -1.28 feet for the 2004 report to -0.99 of a foot for the current report. The district five-year average annual change decreased from -1.03 feet for the 2004 report to -0.70 of a foot for the current report.

Lynn County had the largest average annual change in water levels with an increase of 3.46 feet. Bailey County and the portions of Crosby and Floyd Counties within the district recorded average water level increases of more than one foot. Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, and Parmer Counties, plus the portions of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Hockley, Potter, and Randall Counties within the district recorded average water level increases of less than one foot. The portions of Castro and Lamb Counties within the district recorded average water level declines of less than one foot.

District officials caution that the reported water level rises during 2004 as indicated by the 2005 measurements should not be interpreted

as extensive recharge to the aquifer in most cases, but rather as a greater leveling and refilling of dewatered zones in the aquifer in the vicinity of previously pumped wells.

The exceptions to this theory may be the area of southern Lynn County and various locations of Lubbock County, as well as other possible locations in the water district where the shallow depths to the water table may allow rapid infiltration of water to the aquifer.

Depth-to-water level measurements are normally made during January to March each year to allow stabilization of water levels in the aquifer following pumpage during the previous year of ground water production.

The current issue of the High Plains Water District's newsletter, *The Cross Section*, features the results of the annual 2005 depth-to-water level measurements. It contains individual county maps, which provide the approximate location of each well in the district's observation well network. Each map is accompanied by available 1995, 2000, 2004, and 2005 depth-to-water level measurements for individual wells in that county.

Also listed are available total changes in water levels for each observation well for the periods 1995 to 2005, 2000 to 2005, and 2004 to 2005.
