## Traffic Accident, Assault, Dog Attack Investigated

About 7:15 p.m. Sunday a 2000 Saturn Ion driven by Evin Young, 19, of Lubbock, overturned upside down on U.S. 87 about 7 miles south of Tahoka.

Neither the driver nor a passenger was injured, according to the investigating Dept. of Public Safety trooper.

A 45-year-old Tahoka man was jailed this week on four charges documented by a recent 106th District Grand Jury. Ambrosio Valero DeLeon was indicted on charges of aggravated sexual assault, aggravated assault, sexual assault and indecency with a child.

A 13-year-old Tahoka girl was taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment Sunday night after an altercation reportedly involving four other juvenile girls from O'Donnell.

Two goats owned by Michael Anthony

Arriaga of Tahoka reportedly were killed by dogs which got into Arriaga's yard Tuesday. The owner of one of the dogs was contacted by police. The owner of the goats valued them at \$100 each.

Nine other persons were arrested during the last week, on these charges: application to revoke probation on conviction for driving while intoxicated, second offense or more, plus grand jury indictment on DWI second offense plus bond surrender. The other eight were charged with DWI second offense, driving while license suspended, possession of marijuana under two ounces, driving while intoxicated first offense, failure to report an accident, public intoxication and theft over \$500 and less than \$1500.

As of Tuesday there were 40 persons in jail, including 10 for Lubbock County and one for Garza County.

## One More Teacher Hired For Tahoka High School

One more teacher was hired by trustees of Tahoka Independent School District, and salary pay schedules for at-will positions were amended with cost-of-living increases, among other routine business at the July board meeting held last Tuesday. Student TAKS test scores were also discussed.

Jessica Crabb was hired to teach Theatre/Arts and Speech at Tahoka High School, filling the position vacated by Ronny Powell.

A salary schedule for at-will employees in the district was approved unanimously by the board, with the new schedule including cost-of-living increases in the step plans. At-will employees include custodial, cafeteria and transportation/grounds staff, secretarial and certain other positions.

"We are still waiting [on state legislators] to see what the state is going to do for teachers across the state," Supt. Parker told *The News* Tuesday morning. "We sure hope they do something for the teachers - we're just waiting to hear. If they give them a big raise and don't fully fund it, we're just hung out to dry," he added. School districts throughout the state are anxiously postponing budget decisions until a new school bill is passed.

In other business, District Curriculum Director Sherri McCord presented the 2005 TAKS scores of students in the district. "We were above state average in lots of areas, and below state average in a few areas, but overall we are primarily above state average."

Supt. Parker told *The News*, "We know we've got some work to do, and the bar has been raised again," he added, explaining that students in grades 3-8 and 9-10-11 are given the TAKS test, with grade level determining which aspects of the test are taken.

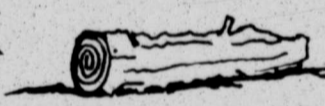
"Just to give you an idea of how demanding the TAKS test is, especially for juniors, normally the state has been averaging approximately 2,500 seniors each year that do not get a diploma because they didn't pass the TAKS, even though they passed the required school curriculum. This year, 21,000 seniors in the state did not get a diploma because of not passing the TAKS - that's just how much harder this test has gotten. Fortunately, Tahoka did not have any seniors in that group - all of our seniors had passed the TAKS," Parker explained. "But the bar is going up again, and the test will be harder for juniors this year," he predicted.

The Student Code of Conduct and Athletic Policy manuals were approved by trustees, and the board amended Supt. Parker's contract to include a \$600 per month car allowance. The superintendent's contract has not included a car allowance during Parker's term, although previous TISD administrators have had a car allowance.

Parker informed trustees of the upcoming Board Convention in Houston in September, and the next regular board meeting was set for Aug. 11 at 7 p.m. All seven trustees were present for the meeting.

No. 3—Golfer: That can't be my ball; it's too old.

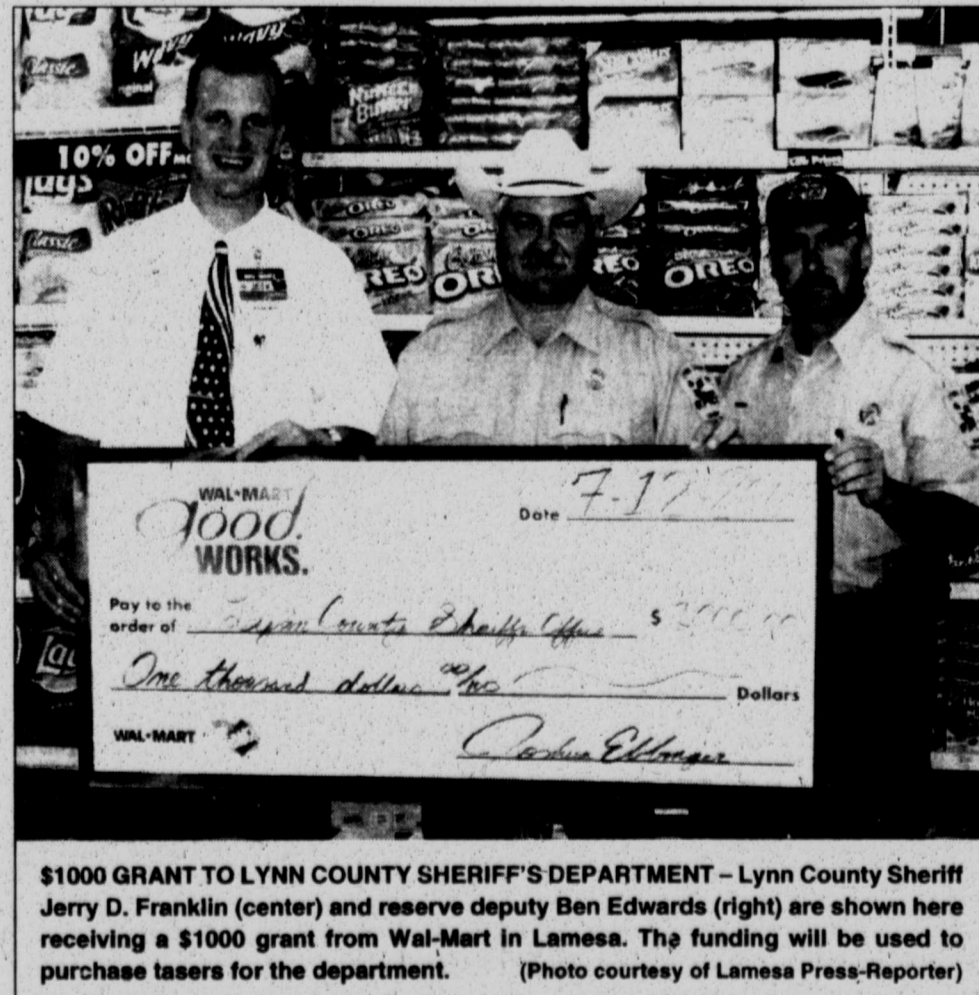
Caddy: It's been a long time since we teed off, sir.

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## Tahoka Woman's Brother Narrowly Escapes Fire; Leads Fellow Firefighters to Safety

*How an experienced fire fighter's training and quick response in a frightening emergency saved two young fire fighters' lives*

**Editor's Note:** Adrian Condarco of Junction, Texas, brother of Iris Calvillo of Tahoka, is credited with saving the lives of two fellow firefighters during a recent brush-fire inferno near Junction that burned for more than a week. Adrian's mother of Junction, Jesusa Condarco, was raised in Tahoka, and Adrian spent some summers working in Tahoka. He is the grandson of the late Leonardo and Luz Aleman of Tahoka.

The following article, reprinted with permission from *The Junction Eagle*, recounts the horrific tale of the firefighters' narrow escape.

The story, and the fire itself, seemed routine. Last Tuesday, July 5, a brush fire, which was probably ignited by a lightning strike, started on the ranch property of Dwight Spaeth, out in the rough, brushy tri-county area near Streeter.

It's that time of the year, after all. It's hot, it's dry, and the volunteer fire departments in the area deal with several hundred rural brush fires every year. All that lush vegetation nurtured by the abundance of spring rain has now become dry kindling.

At press time on Tuesday, July 12, a week later, the fire is still burning, having practically denuded about three quarters of Spaeth's property, and several Kimble County firefighters narrowly escaped a disaster that could have cost them their lives.

On Sunday afternoon, July 10, Cecil Conner, a nineteen-year veteran fire fighter and current President of the Kimble County Ranch Fire Association, was driving a half-quarter ton brush truck with Johnny Lombrana riding in the back, working the water hose.

Close by, driving a ton and a quarter Kaiser Jeep, was Adrian Condarco, who has 21 years experience fighting fires and serves as Second Assistant Chief of the Junction Fire Department. With him were two young fire fighters, each with less than two years with the department. Kris Lombrana (Johnny Lombrana's son) and Vanessa Childress (a third

generation Junction fire fighter, following in the footsteps of her father and grandfather).

Both crews were working a "hot" area, which means that their vehicles were moving in and out of the fire line. When the engine on Conner's truck stalled and would not restart, Condarco heard his friend call "I'm in trouble!" and moved immediately toward Conner.

Just as Condarco arrived, Conner's truck finally restarted. Conner warned Condarco, "Go! Go! Go!" and was able to drive out of the rapidly intensifying fire. Condarco started out of the area behind Conner, but the engine on his vehicle also cavitated due to the lack of oxygen caused by the intense heat. It would not restart.

Surrounded now by 20-foot flames, Condarco struggled to get his truck's engine restarted. Kris Lombrana and Childress were enveloped, with the flames curling over their heads. They began screaming but remained on the truck as they were trained to do. Recognizing that his vehicle was not going to restart and the situation had become critical, Condarco directed Childress and Lombrana to abandon the vehicle. The cab of his stalled truck filled with flames and Condarco kicked the driver's side door open.

An instinctive response would be to run away from the fire, ahead of it. But Condarco helped his two less-experienced firefighters escape by running through the walls of flames to the already burned-out area behind the fire.

"This was a critical move and probably saved their lives," explained Junction Fire Chief Lee Hall, who was working in another area of the fire at the time. "Under the circumstances that existed, that fire could not have been outrun. Though terrifying to even consider, charging through the inferno and away from the fire's fuel supply was exactly what they should have done. Adrian probably saved their lives."

Conner agrees, "Years of training and experience paid off. Adrian went above and beyond. If they had run the other direction.... I know what they would have run into. They

would not have survived.... period." (This was not Adrian Condarco's first experience saving a younger person from sustaining severe injuries from a fire. Many years ago, when his younger brother Sammy got gas-on-fire on his legs and started running, older brother Adrian chased and tackled his brother.)

During the escape from the engulfed truck, Condarco left his handheld radio and so was unable to communicate his crew's position and condition. The concern of his fellow firemen was apparent as a search for the group was initiated immediately.

Conner explained that the last he had seen of Condarco's team was when the fire "rolled over" his truck. When Conner got to safety and discovered that Condarco and crew were not behind him, he went back and found the abandoned truck on fire, but there was no sign of the crew.

"At that point, I reported them missing. I gave the coordinates of the location, called for an air life helicopter and also a DPS chopper to search for them. Then, I started searching," explained Conner.

Meanwhile, Condarco, Lombrana and Childress were walking through intense heat and smoke, not removing their protective clothing, although the pain from their burns was worsening, stopping for air when they came to "clean" areas. Condarco feared the two injured fire fighters might go into shock and was mindful of their pain and of his team's youth.

They are both new parents and I was very concerned about getting them to safety as soon as I could," he said. "At one point, we had to run back through a wall of flame, so I told them to put their arms up to protect their faces from the heat."

*(Editor's note: According to his sister, Condarco led his team to a clearing where a helicopter could see them, and the chopper landed. Both Lombrana and Childress were more severely injured and they were transported by chopper to medical facilities. Condarco worked for an ambulance.)*

All three fire fighters sustained burns and were treated at the scene by emergency medical crews from McCullough County first, and then those from Mason and Junction when they arrived.

Childress and Kris Lombrana were flown by a medivac helicopter to Brooke Army Medical Center. Also aboard was Josh Thompson, from the London fire department, who was having difficulty breathing. He was checked and released.

Childress had first and second degree burns on her face and arms. She was kept overnight and released

late Monday evening. Childress explained that she had on all of her protective equipment including her gloves. Her burns are in those places left bare where the various pieces of equipment did not cover. Plus, she said, "Kris jumped on top of me where I was up on top of the water tank, which protected me but left him exposed."

Lombrana had first and second degree burns on about 35% of his body, mostly around his head, face

and hands because he did not have on his gloves. He was released from BAMC on Tuesday and allowed to return home.

Both Childress and Lombrana are in a lot of pain and will take some time to recover fully. Physical therapy will be necessary, especially on Lombrana's hands.

Condarco was burned on his forehead and nose. He was taken by ambulance to Kimble Hospital, where he was treated and released.

"I'm doing fine," he said Tuesday morning. "I really appreciated the outpouring of support and concern from the community."

The fire continues to be obstinate, seeming to restart itself on several occasions. It has stretched the resources of the volunteer fire departments from Kimble, London, and Mason, which have gotten needed assistance from the departments in Menard, Lohn, Voca, Brady and Mountain Home. The Texas Forest Service and Mason have also provided bulldozers.

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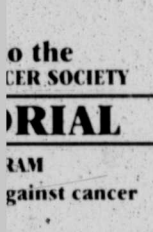

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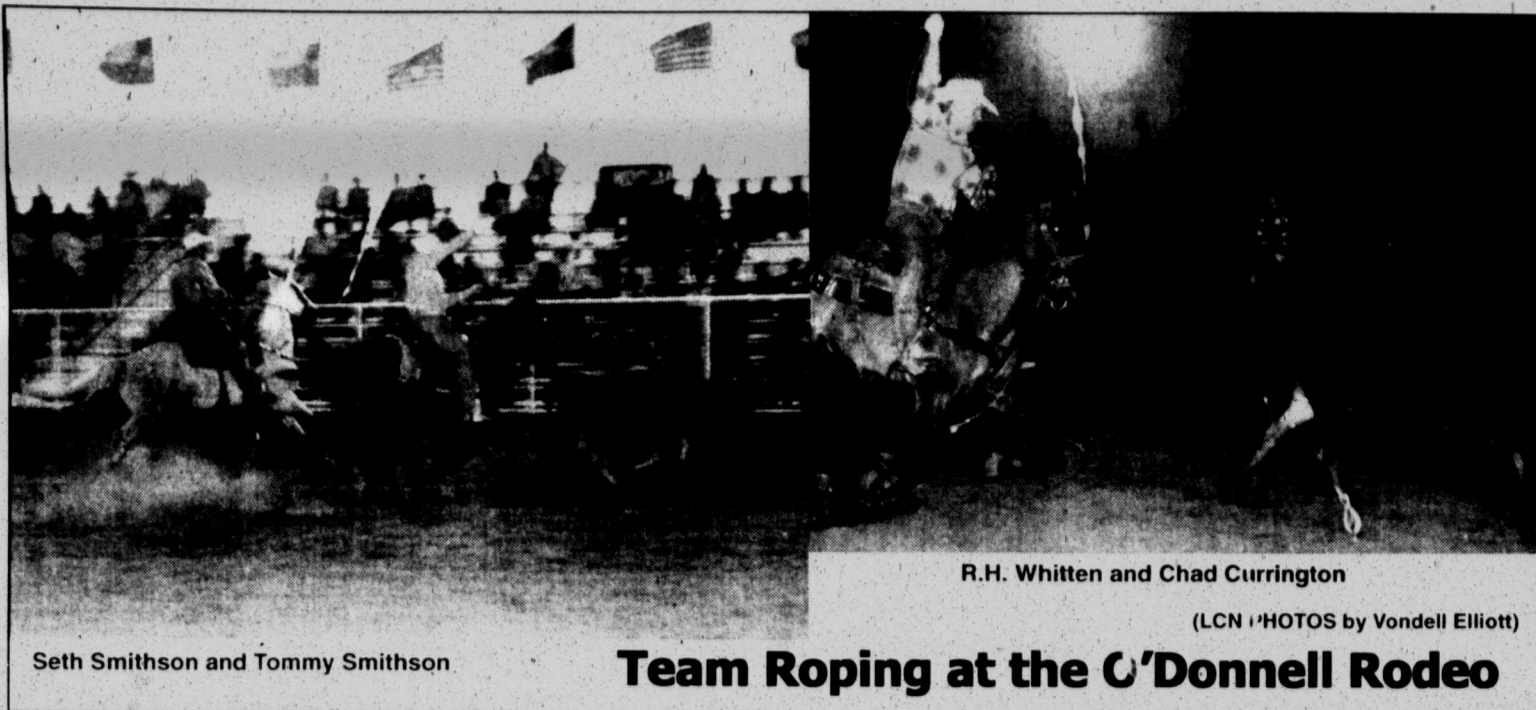
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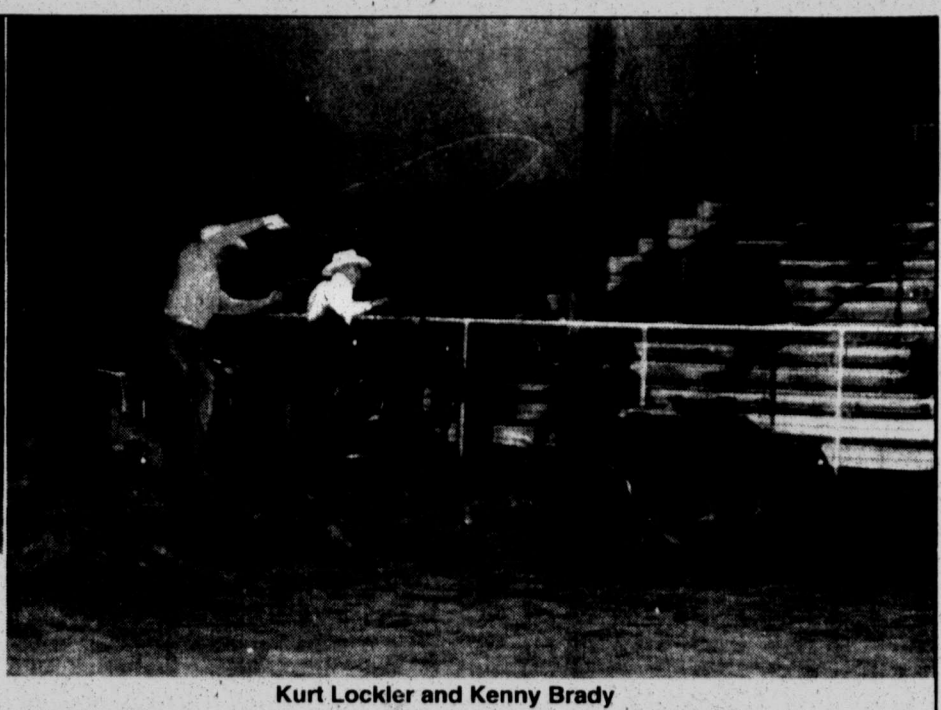

**Lawns Don't Waste Water, People Do!**

In recent years, much attention and controversy has surrounded the water requirement of the lawn. Misinformation and hidden agendas have fueled this controversy; however, there are some well documented facts about the American lawn.

The lawn is an integral component of the landscape. The lawn is certainly the best recreational surface for children and athletes. The lawn has a tremendous mitigating effect on the environment, reducing heat loads, noise, and water and air pollution.

A lawn is second only to a virgin forest in the ability to harvest water and recharge groundwater resources. As a design component, the lawn provides landscape unity and simplicity while inviting participation in the landscape.

The lawn has become a focus in reducing landscape water use because of the tremendous opportunity for abusive use of irrigation water in an effort of maintaining the lawn. Within the traditional landscape, the lawn has received the major portion

of the total landscape irrigation. Lawn irrigation can be reduced, while the homeowner continues to derive the many benefits of turfgrass.

Specific strategies to reduce lawn irrigation include:

- Place lawn areas into landscape irrigation zones based on water requirements, so that lawns can be watered separately from other landscape plantings
- Select adapted, lower-water demand turf species and varieties
- Use irrigated lawn areas only in areas, which provide function (i.e., recreational, aesthetic, food traffic, dust and noise abatement, glare reduction, temperature mitigation.)
- Use non-irrigated lawn areas where appropriate
- Irrigate property based on the lawn's true water needs
- Increase mowing heights to decrease lawn water use and stress
- Decrease fertilizer rates and properly schedule fertilizations

By implementing these strategies, homeowners can reduce lawn irrigation requirements and still reap the many benefits of a cool, green lawn.
