Lubbock Man Badly Hurt As Car, Large Truck Collide

A Chevrolet Impala driven by a Lubbock man turned across the median of U.S. 87 last Friday afternoon in front of a northbound 18-wheeler. The resulting crash seriously injured the car's driver, Billy Simpson, 71

Investigating State Trooper David Hoard said the accident occurred just inside Lynn County north of Tahoka at the Lubbock County line. He said the back of the car was crushed as the truck struck it and pushed the car in front of the truck until the driver, Nasario Rubalcado, 27, of Crosbyton, could stop. The truck driver was not injured.

Lynn County EMS ambulance responded and Lubbock Aerocare airlifted Simpson to a Lubbock hospital.

Two burglaries, an intruder in a Wilson home, and two other traffic accidents were among incidents investigated by officers in the city and county during the last week.

Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. in Tahoka reported about \$40 in change and a box of Winchester brand pocket knives missing after someone broke into the building over the weekend.

About three miles northeast of Tahoka on County Rd. 22, thieves broke into a barn, using a bolt cutter on the lock, and took a Craftsman hand saw valued at \$150 and a . Victor cutting torch valued at \$900 by the owner, Brad Hammonds. The burglary, reported this week, apparently occurred about two weeks ago.

Gloria Hernandez of Wilson told deputies that she was asleep in her home in

Wilson early Sunday morning when she was awakened by someone opening the front door. She said she turned on the light and saw a man standing in the doorway. When she challenged him, he fled the scene. Investigation was continuing.

On Saturday afternoon at the intersection of N. 4th and Ave. M in Tahoka a 2003 Buick driven by Hazel Braddock, 77, of Tahoka and a 2003 GMC pickup driven by Timothy C. Garcia, 19, of Tahoka, collided. There were no injuries.

On Sunday morning at S. 7th and Ave. L, a 2001 Nissan Altima driven by Carmen Martinez Lucero, 57, of Levelland, and a 1995 Oldsmobile 98 driven by Henry Galindo Pina, 75, of Tahoka, were involved in a collision. A passenger in the Nissan, San Juana Gonzales, 72 of Levelland, was treated at Lynn County Hospital for apparent minor injuries and then released.

The number of inmates being held in Lynn County jail was 39 as of Tuesday, with 16 held for Lubbock County and one for Garza County. Ten persons were jailed during the last week, on these charges:

Burglary of a habitation plus criminal trespass, possession of a controlled substance more than 4 grams. Warrant on application to revoke probation on conviction for failure to identify, public intoxication, possession of marijuana under two ounces, driving while license suspended, driving while intoxicated first offense, Dawson County warrant on possession of marijuana, and driving while license invalid.

Page 12 tells you that Page 139 will tell you how to repair that CD with toothpaste. Maybe it won't play any better, but I'll bet it really will sparkle.

Anyway, these kind of mailouts are highly successful, because it makes everyone (including me), want to order the book just to see if some of those crazy-sounding things will work.

IS YOUR cholesterol too high? Well, of course it is, if you eat anything good. City Approves Keeping Same Tax Rate For Tahoka Residents

Tahoka City Council members met Friday, Sept. 16 to approve the tax rate, voting unanimously to keep the tax rate at 69.5 cents per \$100 of property value. The vote was 3-0 in favor of the motion, with council members Amy Preston, Rudy Fuentes and Ray Box voting in favor. Councilman Jay Dee House did not vote, as he was serving as Mayor Pro-Tem for the meeting. Clara Calvillo was absent from the meeting, as was Mayor Mike Mensch.

In other business, the council awarded an engineering services contract to Oller Engineering for a TCDP grant city sewer project. Three firms submitted bids for the contract.


Baker is a 1986 graduate of Angelo State University in San Angelo. He has spent the last 26 years ranching in the San Angelo-Eldorado area.


