## **Lady Buildogs Are District Tri-Champions**

Three-way tie with Shallowater and Slaton with 11-3 records

In a coin toss Wednesday morning,

Shallowater was seeded 1st, Slaton 2nd, and Tahoka 3rd for playoff seeding. Final information was unavailable at press time Wednesday, but the Lady Bulldogs are expected to play either Floydada or Friona in a Bi-District playoff match, probably Tuesday night (time and place not available).

## Realignment Puts Shallowater, **Abernathy Out of Tahoka District**

The biennial realignment of area schools by the University Interscholastic League announced last week leaves Tahoka in a Class AA district with five other schools which have been in the district, with Abernathy and Shallowater moving to another district.

Tahoka now will be in district 4-AA, with Post, Slaton, Denver City, Idalou and Roosevelt. Shallowater and Abernathy will be in newly revised Dist. 3-AA with Childress, Floydada, Littlefield and

THS Athletic Director Troy Hinds said Tahoka should do better in a six-team district instead of eight as before, although Tahoka will still be the smallest school in the district.

He noted that the cutoff enrollment figure for remaining in Class AA was 194 and that Tahoka had 20 more than that. He said it would help Tahoka to drop to Class A, which could happen in another two years. "The other schools in our district just have a lot more kids participating in athletics than we do, and if we could compete with schools our size, we would do a lot better, said Hinds.

Wilson ISD will be in 5-A Division II with Amherst, Cotton Center, Southland and Whitharral. New Home will be in Dist. 4-A Division I with Meadow, Ropes, Wellman-Union and Whiteface.

O'Donnell will be in 11-man football Dist. 7-A, with Morton, Plains, Seagraves, Smyer and Sundown.

## Officers Investigate Thefts, Accident

A 19-year-old Tahoka man was arrested Saturday for criminal trespassing on the complaint of a woman who said he had been banging on the doors and windows of her



### **Curtis Gicklhorn Announces For** Co. Commissioner

Competent, conscientious, and cooperative - these are notable traits of an effective County Commissioner which Curtis Gicklhorn believes he can bring to the job for Precinct 4 residents next January

Curtis, who has lived alongside a Lynn County dirt road all his life, has often used his vintage International Harvester farm equipment not only to retrieve motorists stranded on precinct muddy roads, but also to grade severely rutted roads so that all of his neighbors could regain access to medical care, church, school, and business. He is keenly aware of how a deteriorating road can impede service by Lyntegar Electric, cotton gins, farm suppliers, and other area businesses, while increasing their costs due to lost worker productivity and greater vehicle maintenance costs. Moreover, poor access can turn a routine daily commute to an off-farm job into a nightmare, thereby discouraging the rental or purchase of property in some areas of the precinct. Curtis' dirt working and road building expertise will enable him to direct employees in the proper use of the precinct's heavy equipment to improve roads and drainage ditches for residents.

Curtis has been operating his family's predominantly dryland farm located between Wilson and New Home since graduating from Wilson High School in 1974. In the intervening years, Curtis has learned how illness, drought, hail, or cotton prices that were sometimes lower than production costs, could weaken family finances for a long time. Curtis therefore favors continued prudent spending of tax funds in order to avoid frequent property tax increases that could ultimately endanger continued ownership of homes and farms that may have been in the same Lynn County family for generations. Moreover, he advocates using

SLEEP TIGHT, and don't let the bedbugs bite. I used to hear that a lot, especially when I was a kid, but I never worried about it, because:

1. I figured "sleep tight" meant you need to get good and drunk before going to bed, and if you were tight enough, you wouldn't know, or care (until later) if some varmint was biting on you, and

2. I have never seen a bedbug in my life, nor have I ever been bitten by one, so far as I know.

But a recent story in the Lubbock Landslide-Diary (as we used to call the Avalanche-Journal) reported that in the New York City area, bedbugs are back, turning up in hospitals, schools, theaters and health clubs. Presumably they also are showing up in homes and motels, and the problem is spreading to other states and countries.

Bedbugs are often found in motels operated by guys named Norman Bates. The story said exterminators are blaming the resurgence on several factors, primarily increased global travel and the banning of potent pesticides.

I conducted an extensive survey of Lynn County residents (I asked two people) and found nobody who has ever seen a bedbug, and, of course, we hope it stays that way, and the bedbugs stay up north.

To find out about bedbugs, I went to the World Book, which said:

A bed bug is a small, wingless insect that feeds on blood. (Yuk). It lives near the sleeping quarters of its victims. The bed bug attacks people, as well as birds and other animals. It pierces the skin of its victim and then uses its sharp beak to suck up the blood. The bite causes the skin of some people to swell and itch.


The bed bug is reddish-brown and about a quarter of an inch long when full-grown. It can hide in tiny cracks and crevices. They may hide in mattresses and bedsprings, between floorboards or in cracks in plaster. The insects can be controlled by spraying their hiding places with an effective insecticide... Some people fumigate their homes to kill or drive out bed bugs.

Maybe bedbugs could be turned over to the federal government, if they happen to chew up the tag on the mattress that says "Do Not Remove or Destroy This Tag". (I always had a vision of the Mattress Police SWAT team breaking down my door and screaming, "Aha! We caught you throwing away that mattress tag!")

Perhaps the best way to get rid of bedbugs is described in the last line of the World Book report:

Cyanide gas is probably the most effective fumigating agent used for ridding a home of bed bugs.

No kidding. That ought to get rid of the pesky critters. And also any guests or family members who might come into the room for the next month.







### Tahoka VFD Answered 67 Emergency Calls in 2005

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department responded to 67 calls for fire emergencies during the 2005 year, with the extremely dry conditions during the last few months contributing to more than half of the calls. During November and December, the fire department responded to 44 calls, and in January there were 9 fire calls, according to Fire Chief Jimmy Woodard.

"This has been a very busy time for department members, who volunteer to answer these calls," said the Chief.

Many of the calls in recent months have been due to burning cotton modules in the county, which are nearly impossible to put out, and firefighters' efforts are put towards containing the fire from spreading to other areas.

"As of January 10, 2006, cotton gins in Lynn County reported 132 cotton modules had burned, and a

few more have been reported after this date," said Woodard.

The department has recently received grant funding for new personal safety equipment, new Jaws of Life, and other rescue-related equipment.

Also, the Tahoka VFD should receive their new 2006 fire truck in late February, purchased with grant funding from the Texas Forest Service which was awarded last February. The grant funded 90 percent of the cost of the truck, up to \$108,000, with the remaining 10% of the cost provided by local funds.


The new truck replaces the department's old 1936 Ford pumper,

which was sold to the "Make a Wish Foundation" in Midland where it will have "a second life lighting up the lives of children served by this foundation."

The other rolling equipment of the local fire department includes a 1994 Ford first responder truck, 1994 Kodiak tanker brush truck, a 1983 Ford personnel and equipment hauler, a 1991 International Pumper, and a 1976 Chevrolet tanker brush truck.


"As our department's equipment continues to age, this grant has helped us replace and upgrade our equipment," said Chief Woodard. "We try to be ready with the best equipment and best-trained firefighters possible, and to make wise use of limited funds. We depend on the \$3 per water meter donation to fund the department's part of all grants. This allows the City to maintain their tight budget without adding our part of the grants. We appreciate all who help us be better prepared to serve," he added.

The 20-member department meets twice monthly for training. Each volunteer firefighter carries a pager for communication as calls come in for emergencies.

### **MAKING WISE DECISIONS**

In the Sermon on the Mount, as recorded in Matthew chapters five through seven, as Jesus brings his discourse to an end. He focused upon what was of number one importance - the necessity of hearing His words and acting upon them (7:24-27). As we read through the Gospels we find, for example, that many were following Jesus because of the loaves and the fish (John 6:36). Others followed because of the miracles (Luke 19:37), and some out of curiosity. After His teaching in John 6, many who heard said, "This is a difficult statement; who can listen to it?" And it appears that most who had been following withdrew and followed Him no more. It was then that Jesus said to the twelve who were closest to Him, "You do not want to go away also, do you?" Peter answered for the twelve saying, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."

Someone wrote, "What the fool does in the end, the wise man does in the beginning." I think this is what Jesus was saying in Matthew as He concluded the Sermon on the Mount. Only the fool would build a house upon sand. So it is with one who would try and live their life without hearing the words of Christ and then acting upon them as would the wise man. Within each of us is a wise man or a wise woman, a foolish man or a foolish woman. Everyday we make decisions based upon what the wise or foolish person within us encourages us to do. Some of those decisions have little or no consequences, others have eternal consequences, so, as the knight who had guarded the Holy Grail said to Indiana Jones, Jesus says to us, "Choose wisely!"
