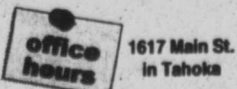

Miller, Hammonds Win Local Races; Runoff Slated For JP

Pam Miller will be Lynn County's new County Treasurer, and Brad Hammonds will be the Commissioner for Precinct 4 come Jan. 1, 2007, voters decided in Tuesday's primary election. A runoff election will be held for Lynn County Justice of Peace Pct. 1

between the top two contenders in that race, Ginger Henry and incumbent Judge Terri Walker, on April 11. These contested local races on the Democratic ballot had no opposing candidates in the Republican Primary, which means the Democratic winners will be

uncontested in the November General Election. Winners will take office on Jan. 1, 2007.

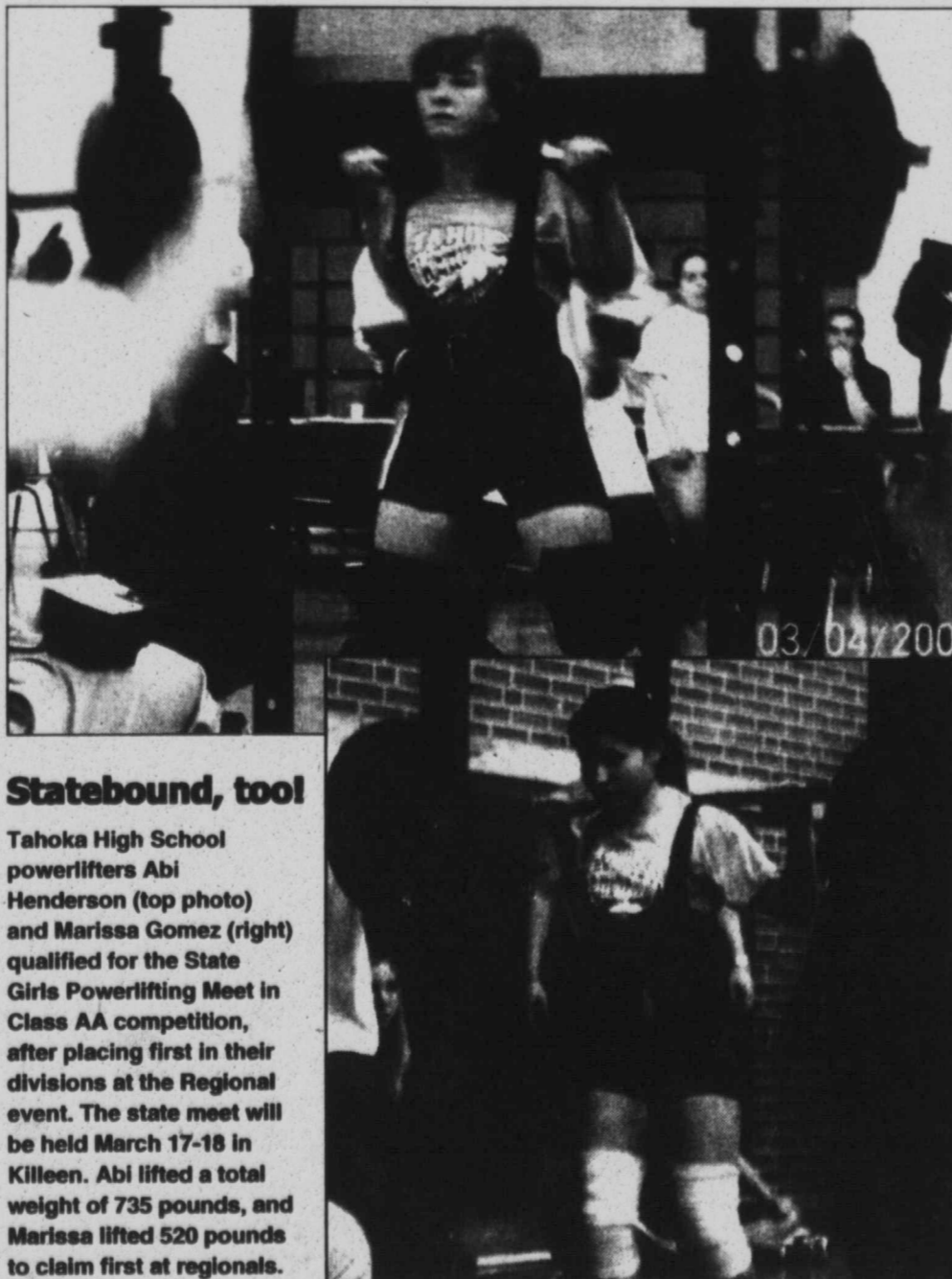
A total of 785 voters decided the fate of candidates in the Democratic and Republican primary elections in Lynn County, according to County Clerk Susan Tipton, whose office oversees election processes here. Most voters in the county opted to vote in the Democratic Primary, to vote in locally contested races. The county's new electronic voting machines were used by voters on election day, but software glitches prevented their use during early voting. Mrs. Tipton says the machines worked well for the county in the primary elections.

Following is a breakdown of votes for the three contested races in Lynn County: County Treasurer - Pam Miller 629, Helen Calvillo Saldana 233; County Commissioner Pct. 4 - Brad Hammonds 198, Curtis Gicklhorn 89; and for Justice of the Peace

Pct. 1, Ginger Henry led the ticket with 292 votes and Terri Walker had 226, with candidate Quaydene Caswell carrying 124 votes.

The runoff election for the Justice of Peace election will be held April 11, with early voting conducted April 3-7. It is unknown at this time whether any other state offices will have runoff elections on the Democratic ballot.

Several uncontested races for offices in Lynn County were on the ballot, including H.G. Franklin for County Judge, Sandra Laws for District Clerk, Susan Tipton for County Clerk, Ed Follis Jr. for Justice of Peace Pct. 4, and Mike Braddock for County Commissioner Pct. 2. Jay Napper, Democratic challenger for the office of District Judge, was unopposed on the Democratic ballot, but will face incumbent Judge Carter Schildknecht, the lone Republican candidate, in the November General Election.

Filing Deadline Is Monday For City, School, Hospital Elections

The filing period for all city, school, and hospital board elections will close Monday, March 13. Several more candidates have filed for elections during the past week, and a correction for the Lynn County Hospital District election is listed this week.

The News incorrectly reported that incumbent John Hawthorne had filed seeking reelection to the hospital board, but he has not filed. The other two incumbents, Billy Tomlinson and Jerry Ford, have filed, and during the past week Jannis Childress-Horwood filed for a seat, making a full slate of candidates for the three positions on the board.

Jana Lowdermilk added her name to the Tahoka ISD election, making that a contested race with three candidates vying for two at-large seats on the board of trustees. She joins incumbents Jimmy Dorman and Valton

Stephens in the election. No new candidates have filed in the Tahoka City election, with incumbents Clara Calvillo, Jay Dee House and Ray Box all seeking reelection, currently unopposed.

Oscar Ortega Ortega added his name to the Wilson ISD board of trustees election, joining candidate Casey Donald for two seats on the board. In the Wilson City election, two candidates filed during the week, with Francine Williams filing for city council and Cody Paul Donald filing for Mayor. With incumbent Oscar Follis filing previously for city council, that election has a full slate of candidates.

Shane Fiedler and Alan Nettles filed for New Home City Council seats, the first two candidates to file for three seats in the election. No new candidates filed for New Home

**Teacher Contracts Approved
At TISD Board Meeting**

Teacher contracts were approved as presented at the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting Tuesday night, with all current contracts renewed with the exception of those who had previously given resignation notices. The 2006-07 school calendar was approved as presented, although Kelly and Kim Draper presented a letter requesting a date change for 2007 graduation. The Drapers were present at the meeting, but chose not to address the board. Trustees considered the letter before approving the calendar without any changes.

In other business, monthly bills were approved and principals presented campus reports. Supt. Jimmy Parker informed trustees that the drawing for ballot positions for the school election will be held Monday, March 20 at the Harvick building. To date, there are three candidates for the two at-large trustee seats on the board, and the filing period closes Monday, March 13. School officials noted that the business office would be open that Monday to allow filing, but will be closed the rest of the week for Spring Break.

The next regular board meeting was scheduled for April 10.

Six of seven trustees were present for the meeting, including Board President Math Bartley, Carmen Chapa, Jimmy Dorman, Valton Stephens, Frank McLelland and Kent Kahl, with trustee Joe Calvillo absent from the meeting.

Lois Florine McCracken

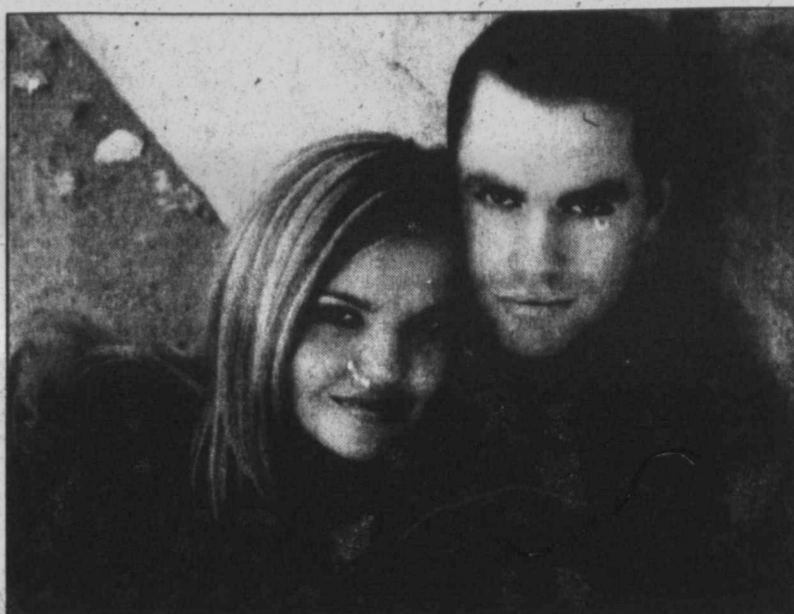

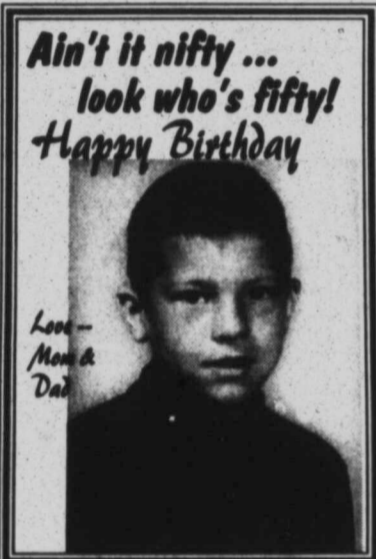

ISD board of trustees, where incumbent Andy Maeker is the lone candidate for two trustee positions.

O'Donnell now has a contested race for Mayor, with incumbent Maurice Jackson adding his name to the list this week, running against James Williams who had previously filed. Two council seats are up for election, with incumbent Harry Howell the only candidate filing to date. O'Donnell ISD election is uncontested thus far, with incumbents Renn Dorman and Monty Hancock seeking re-election.

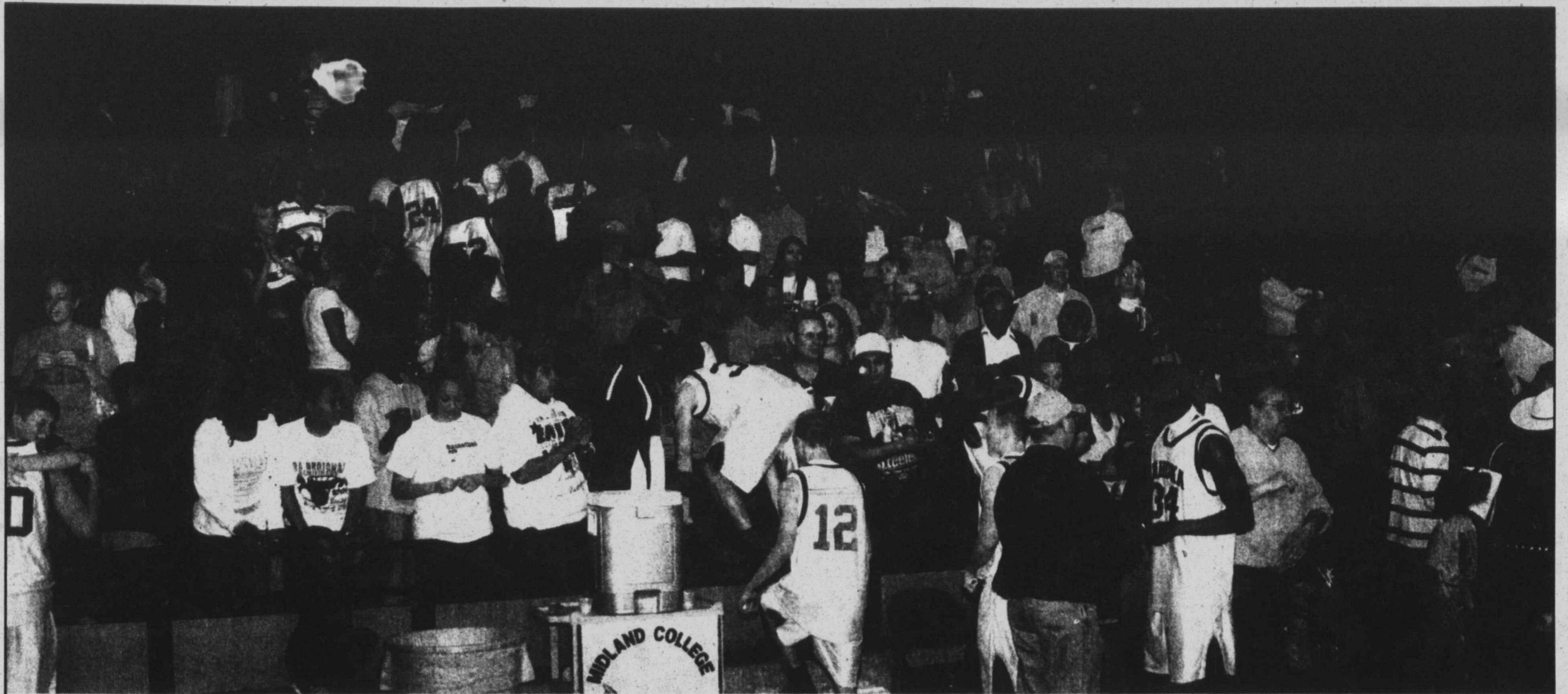

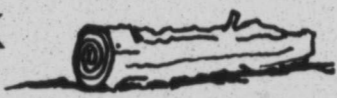

I HAVE BEEN writing this column for at least 30 years and I now can relate to the guy who said, "My brother practiced law for 35 years—he never did get the hang of it."

I sort of felt that way after wondering what to say in a column the second week of March and looking at my computer records to see what I had written about in other columns at approximately the same time. First of all, there are a lot of columns in there, going back to 1996 when I first started keeping them on computer. I have a scrapbook of columns from the 80s and a few other hard copies, but a lot of the stuff I wrote during the 80s, 70s and 60s have been lost.

I doubt that any of those columns, if ever discovered by anyone, will bring more than 35 cents at auction of lost manuscripts.

Anyway, if I have averaged 400 words per column, 53 weeks a year for the last 30 years, that's about 20,800 words a year, and in 30 years, 624,000 words. That's less than a million, but still lots of words to be held accountable for, if I understand the book of James in the Bible, and I'm afraid I do understand that part.

As always, I will pray for mercy, and not justice. Nevertheless, I did look up a few columns written in March of earlier years. In 2001 I mentioned that peanuts are supposed to be an ingredient of dynamite. I never did find out if that is really true; the whole idea sort of blows me away.

On March 9, 1998, I wrote about how movies in theaters are much too loud, and also mentioned seeing the movie *Titanic*. Since then, I have been told by Earl Kiser, a remarkable fine gentleman who lives in Tahoka, that he was born on April 15, 1912, the same day the Titanic sank.

On March 7, 1996, I wrote about eating a lot of antacids to alleviate what I called a "hyena's hernia," actually hietal hernia, which seemed to be the fashionable thing to have in 1996, but about which I have heard very little recently. I did say I would just as soon go ahead and eat the good stuff, and they could bury me in Mylanta, GA.

On March 8, 1995, I wrote about an experiment I was trying in which you soak raisins in gin for a few days and then eat nine raisins a day to alleviate arthritis and other joint pain. The experiment was aborted when, after several days, I pulled the jar of soaked raisins out of the refrigerator and dropped in on the kitchen floor, where it broke into a zillion pieces, ending the experiment and causing brief marital problems.

So I guess there's not much new to write about March. Years ago, March 15 was income tax deadline day. And even before that, William Shakespeare warned in *Julius Caesar* that folks should "Beware the Ides of March."

That never bothered me much, because I wouldn't know an Ide if I saw one.

DO WE WISH TO GET WELL?
In Mark 1:40-45 a leper approached Jesus and said, "If you are willing, you can make me clean." While serving as a missionaries in India, my wife and I often saw lepers, men and women missing fingers and toes. According to the Old Testament, lepers were considered unclean and unapproachable. They lived on the fringe of society, in their own communities, outcasts and unclean. For the most part, theirs was a miserable life.
We don't know who the leper was who approached Jesus, but we do know he was a man of faith. He was a man who saw what many others failed or refused to see, he saw in Jesus the power that could cleanse him and give him a new life. For years I had wondered why Jesus asked the man in John 5:6, "Do you wish to get well?" Then one day it dawned on me. Some people don't want to be well. Some would prefer to beg and seek the pity of others, but not so with the leper of Mark chapter one. He wanted to be well. So, Jesus moved with compassion, reached out, touched him and said, "I am willing, be cleansed." And so he was - cleansed. A new man.
In Isaiah 64:6, Isaiah said, "For all of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy garment; and all of us wither like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away." It would seem that all who have sinned have become like one who is unclean, like a leper who needs the master's touch. So the question we might ask ourselves is this, do we wish to get well?

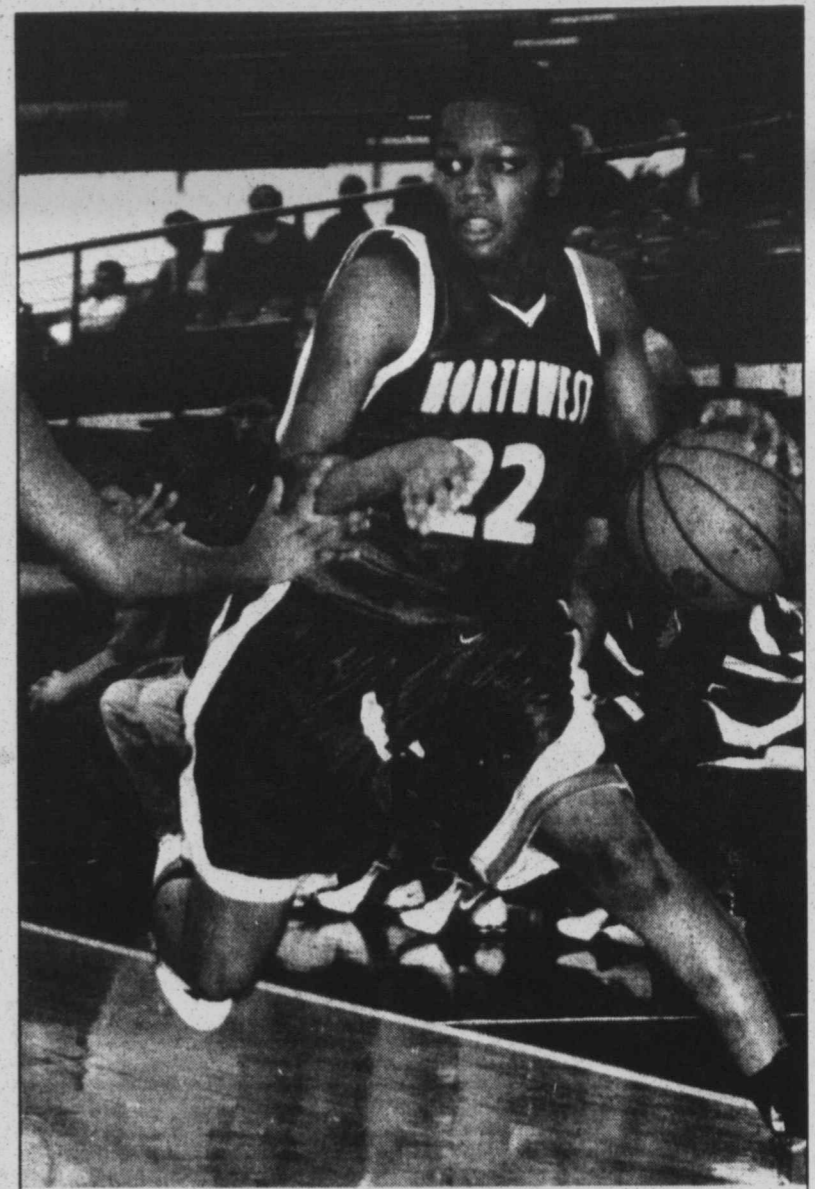

Northwest stayed hot at the start of the second half and led 63-47 with 13:01 remaining in the contest.

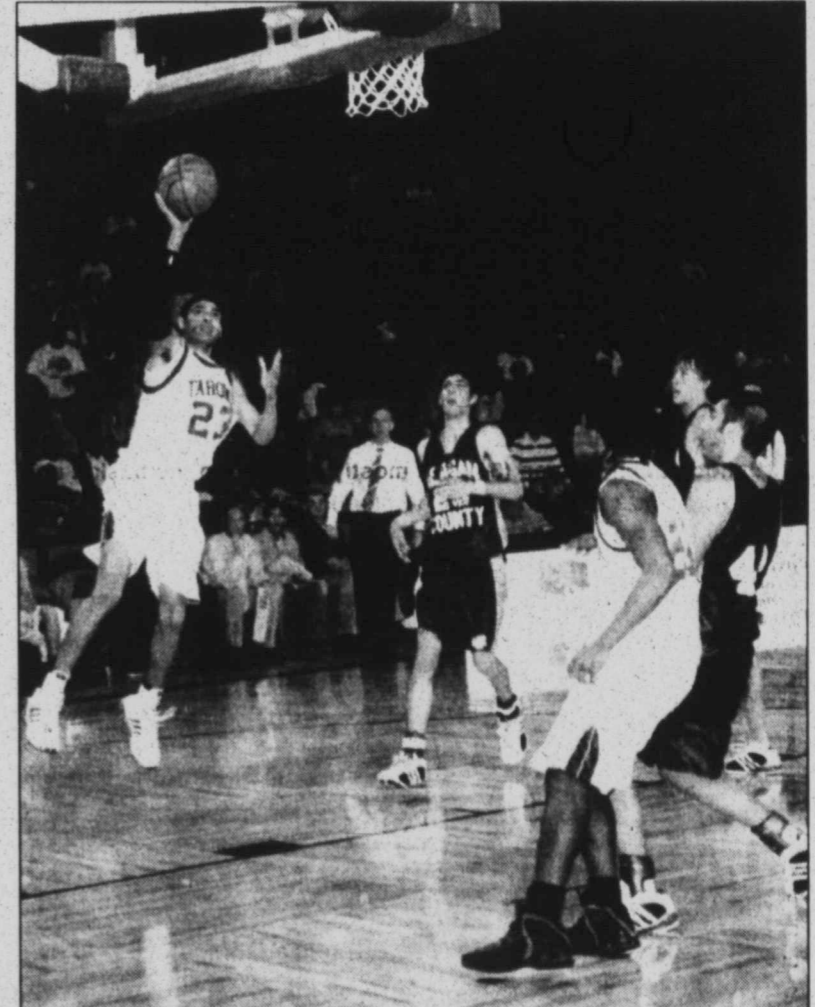

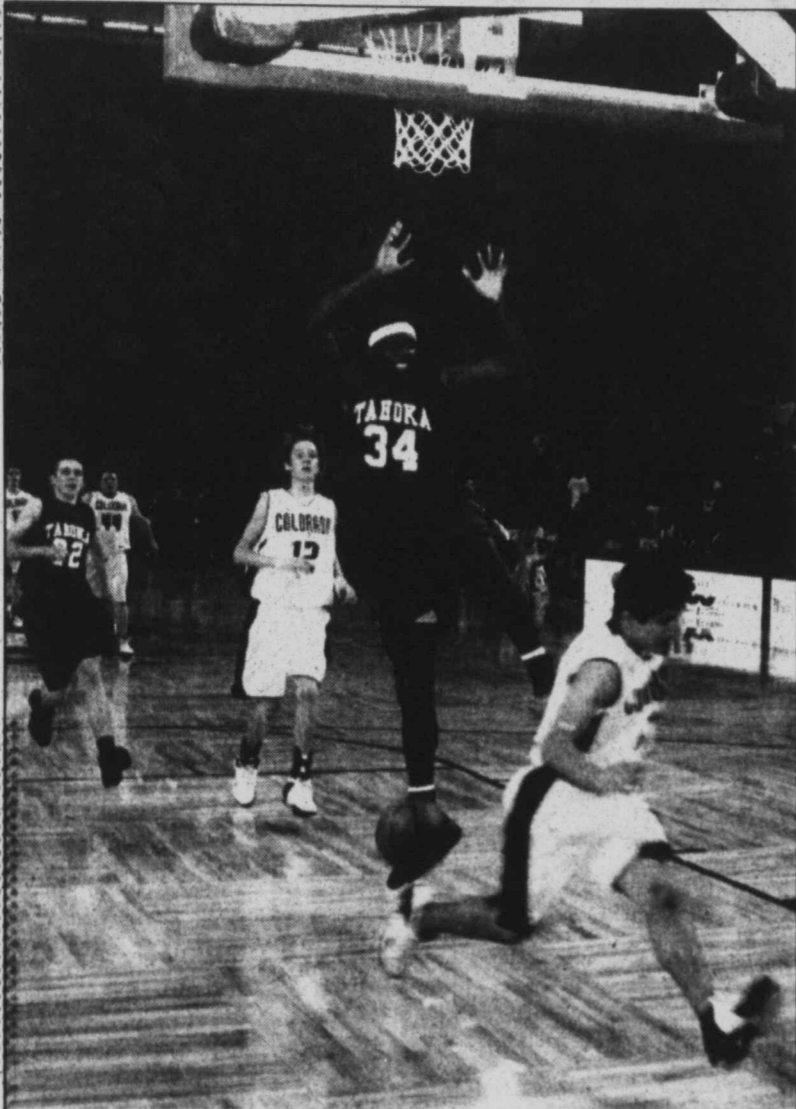

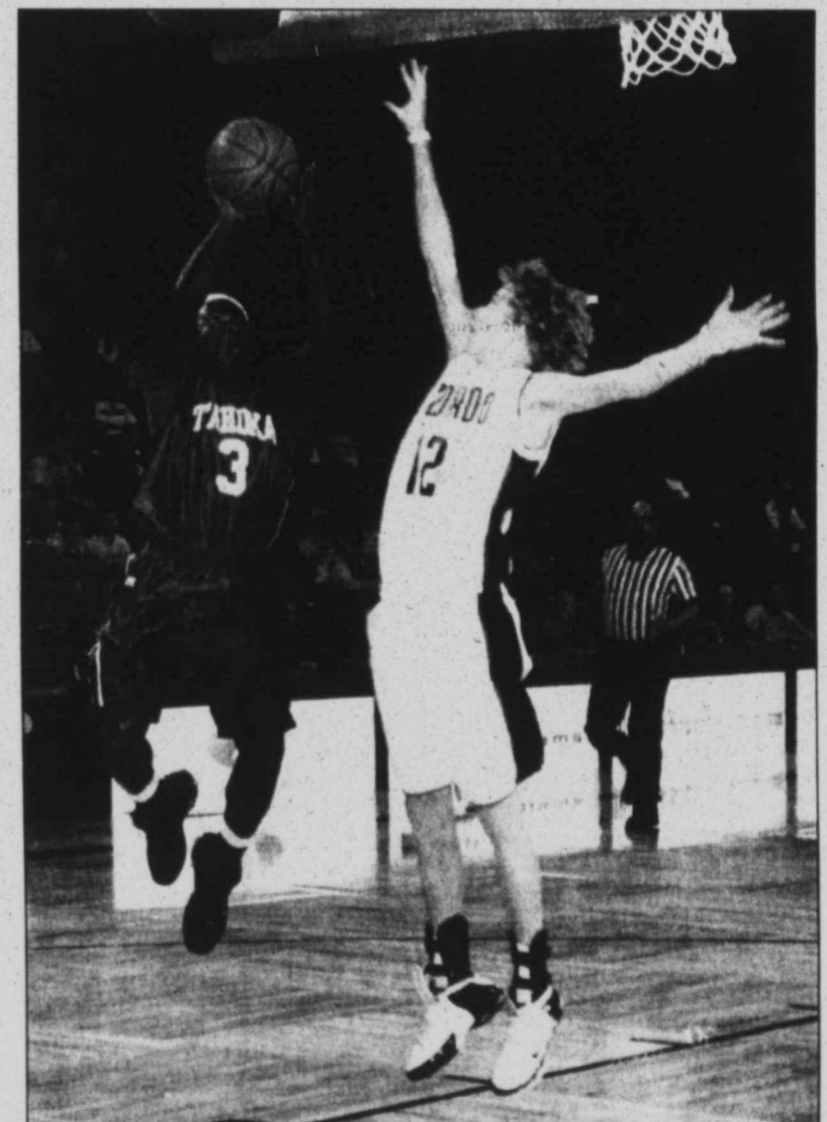

The classroom instruction will be March 20 through April 12 on Mondays and Wednesdays from 6:30 - 9:30 pm. The clinical instruction will begin on Monday, April 17 through May 4 with times and location to be announced. The clinical instruction will be held Monday through Thursday.

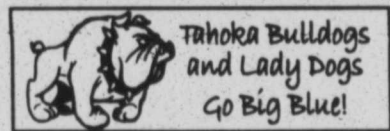
The tuition is \$340 plus a required textbook. The textbook is *The Complete Textbook of Phlebotomy*, 2nd Edition, by Lynn B. Hoeltke. Students must provide proof of immunization for MMR, Tetanus, Hepatitis B series and a current nega-

tive TB test. Students must also provide their social security card and photo identification.

The course covers vacuum collection devices, syringes, capillary skin puncture, butterfly needles, blood culture and specimen collection on adults, children and infants. A strong emphasis will be placed on infection prevention, proper patient identification, labeling of specimens, quality assurance, specimen handling, processing and accessioning.

New Fire Truck Arrives ... Several members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department get their first look at the new fire truck for the department, which arrived this week. The new truck, purchased mostly through grant funding from the Texas Parks and Wildlife, carries a 1,500 gallon water tank and pump assembly, and is designed primarily to fight grass and brush fires.

USDA Approves Emergency CRP Haying and Grazing for Texas

In continuing response to this year's widespread drought, Jimmy Woodard, County Executive Director for the Lynn County Farm Service Agency today announced approval for emergency haying and grazing of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acreage in Texas.

"Texas continues to experience severe drought conditions and a severe shortage of forage," said Woodard. "The authorization of emergency CRP haying and grazing will provide forage for livestock and help producers in areas most severely impacted by these drought conditions reducing the potential need to liquidate herds."

Emergency haying of CRP is authorized until May 1, 2006 and emergency grazing is authorized until June 1, 2006. Producers must file a request to hay or graze CRP acreage and visit the Natural Resources Conservation Service to obtain a modified conservation plan prior to haying or grazing the acreage.

"CRP annual rental payments will be reduced 25 percent times the number of acres actually hayed or grazed times the per acre annual rental payment," said Woodard. Other restrictions and limitations

also apply. CRP participants who do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the haying and grazing privilege to an eligible livestock producer located in an approved county.

"In light of recent weather patterns, it is imperative that USDA offer the Emergency CRP haying and grazing program to Texas producers. Availability of forage is literally a matter of survival in the unpredictable and often unforgiving agriculture industry," said Woodard.

CRP offers annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resource-conserving cover on eligible land. USDA will monitor producers to ensure the land is hayed or grazed without damaging conservation covers.

USDA offers additional programs to assist drought-stricken producers, including emergency farm loans, the emergency conservation program and the noninsured crop disaster assistance program. 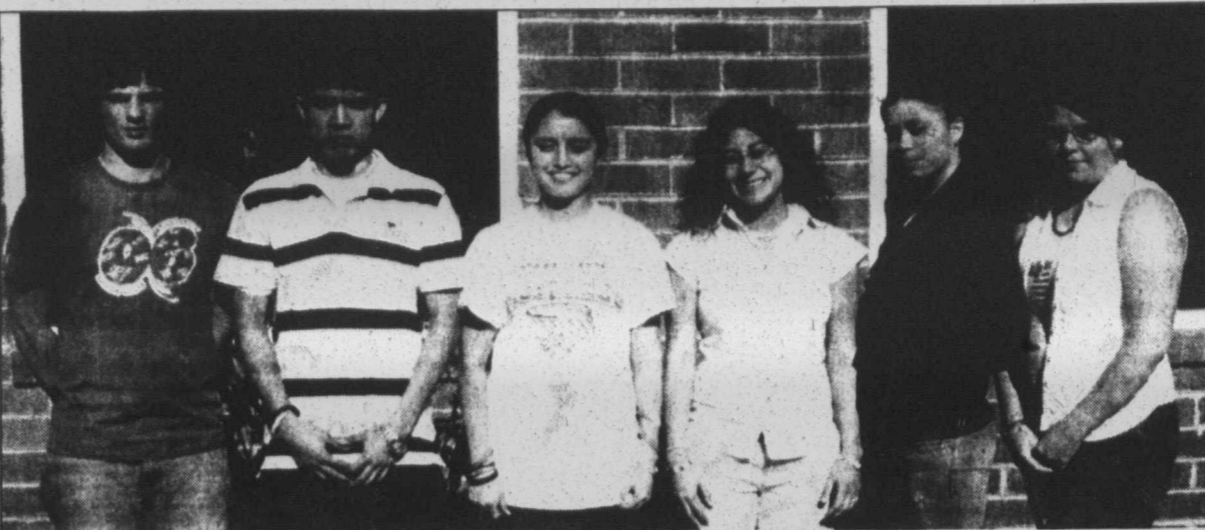

Naval Officer Speaks To Wilson Students

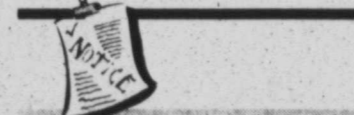

Texas Star Cooperative Gin has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for the renewal of Air Quality Permit No. 32681 which would authorize continued operation of the Cotton Gin located at 1004 Mirron, Wilson, Lynn County, Texas. The facility will emit the following air contaminants: organic compounds, nitrogen oxides, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide and particulate matter.

This application was submitted to the TCEQ on February 13, 2006. The application is available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Lubbock regional office, and the Lynn County Courthouse, 2nd Floor Clerk's Office, 1600 Avenue J, Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Lubbock regional office of the TCEQ.

The TCEQ executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. Information in the application indicates that this permit renewal would not result in an increase in allowable emissions and would not result in the emission of an air contaminant not previously emitted. The TCEQ may act on this application without seeking further public comment or providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

PUBLIC COMMENT. You may submit public comments, or a request for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. The deadline to submit public comments is 15 days after newspaper notice is published. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the TCEQ's jurisdiction to address in the permit process.

After the technical review is complete, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. You may request a contested case hearing. The applicant or the executive director may also request that the application be directly referred to a contested case hearing after technical review of the application. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may act on the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. According to the Texas Clean Air Act §382.056(o) a contested case hearing may only be granted if the applicant's compliance history is in the lowest classification under applicable compliance history requirements and if the hearing request is based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission may only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "I/we) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests the group or association seeks to protect must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

If any requests for a contested case hearing are timely filed, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the executive director will mail the response to comments along with notification of Commission meeting to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

In addition to submitting public comments, you may ask to be placed on a mailing list for this application by sending a request to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. Those on the mailing list will receive copies of future public notices (if any) mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk for this application.

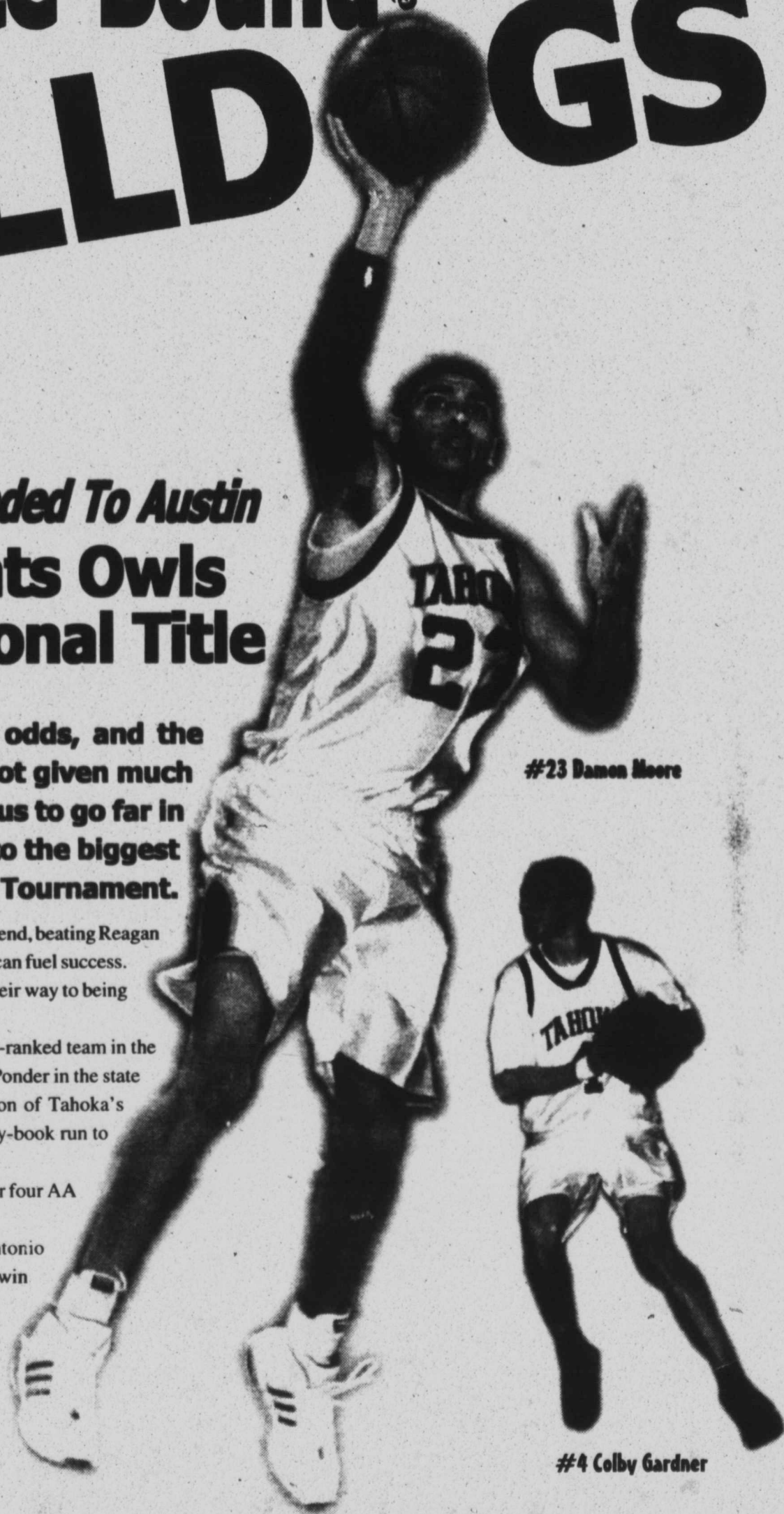
With the win over Reagan County, Tahoka now has won 11 straight games and has a season mark of 27-8.

Tahoka beat Colorado 68-54 in regional semi-finals at Midland

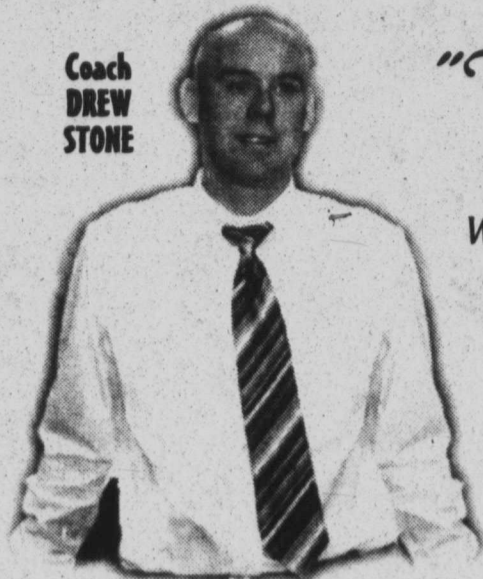

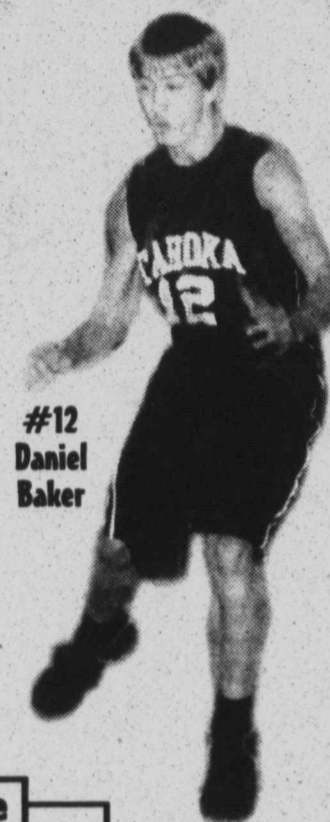

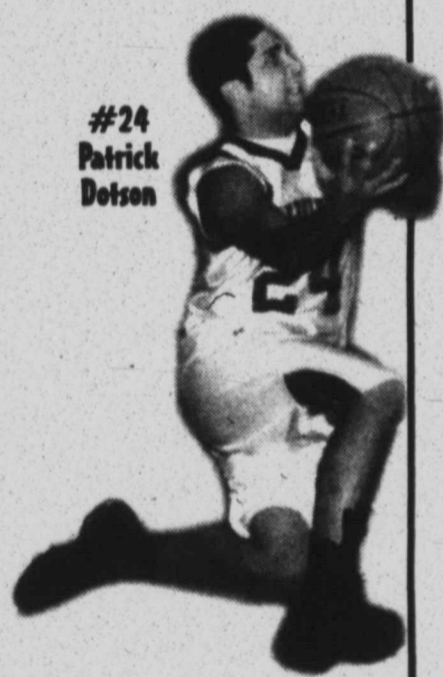

Henry Reyna led Colorado with 13 points.

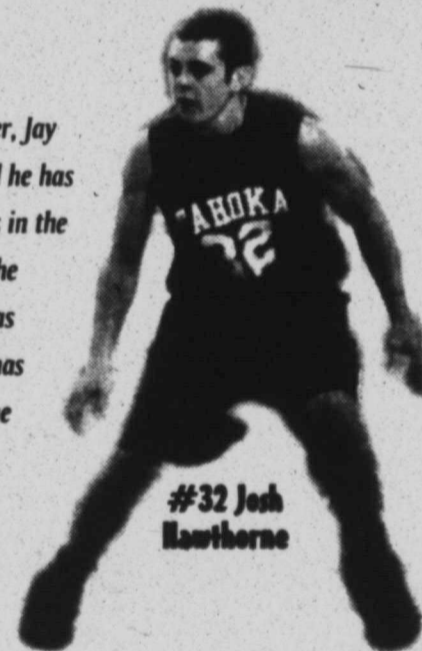

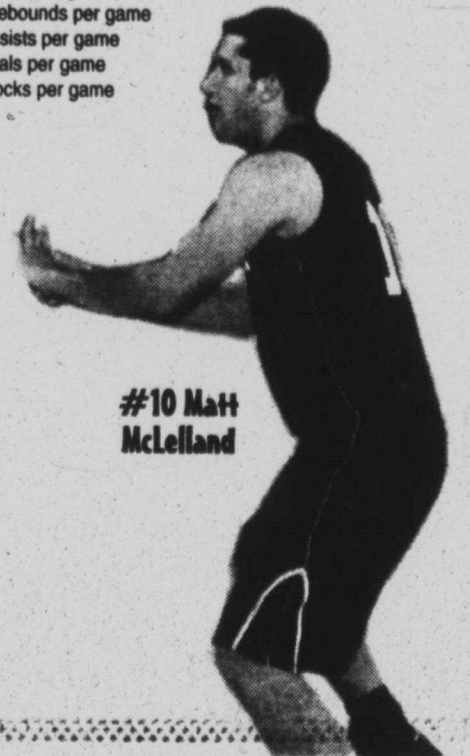
