Lubbock Truck Driver Killed In Wreck

The driver of an International truck tractor which went out of control about 7 miles south of Tahoka on U.S. 87 Tuesday afternoon and overturned was killed, just two days after his 30th birthday.

Dept. of Public Safety officials said Guzman was driving north in the inside lane passing traffic about 2:05 p.m. when the left side of his truck crossed into the median. He over-corrected to the right and the truck slid across both northbound lanes and off the roadway into a deep ditch, causing the vehicle to roll over 1-1/2 times.

Jose Peralez, 39, a truck driver from Idalou, was a passenger in the vehicle, and he was airlifted to University Medical Center in Lubbock for treatment of head and other injuries. A DPS official said he was listed in stable condition late Tuesday.

Tahoka and O'Donnell fire departments assisted at the scene, using the Jaws of Life to gain access to the truck's cab, but the driver already had succumbed to injuries. Lynn County EMS treated the passenger at the scene before he was airlifted to Lubbock.

Both Guzman and Peralez reportedly were wearing seat belts.

Another wreck with injuries occurred in the city of Tahoka Saturday evening, when a 1997 Chevrolet pickup driven by Hector Saldana, 46, of Tahoka was involved in a collision with a 2001 Dodge pickup owned by the City of Tahoka and driven by Raymond Vega, 40 of Tahoka. Two passengers in the Dodge pickup were taken by Lynn County EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of possible injuries. They were Rosalina Delacruz, 27, and Marisol Delacruz, 5.

Saldana was issued four tickets related to the accident, police said.

Police also were investigating a report that a white Chevrolet tailgate and a chrome bumper had been stolen recently and two suspects were questioned.

told officers she had been sexually molested for about three years when she was a child living near O'Donnell. According to the girl, the last incident occurred when she was about 12. Sheriff's officers are investigating the report, which named a suspect.

were held for Lynn County, with one held for Garza County, five for Gaines and eight for Lubbock County.

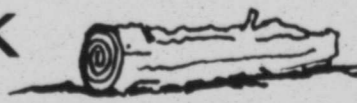

Freedom Rally And Concert To Be Held On Courthouse Lawn

Sunday June 11, at 7:00 p.m., the Tahoka Ministerial Fellowship will be sponsoring a "Freedom Rally" at the Lynn County Courthouse lawn. This will be a time for the community to come together and honor our heroes who have faithfully served our country through the years. All veterans and active duty military personnel are encouraged to attend as each one will be honored during a special ceremony.

In conjunction with the rally, Russ Murphy will be here to present a concert on the Courthouse lawn.

Murphy is an accomplished musician and songwriter. He started his music-writing career in Lubbock while he was a student at Texas Tech University. He has written several full-length musicals and published numerous songs and is about to have several of his songs performed and recorded by other artists.

From 1981-1989, Murphy traveled the world with his singing and writing partner, Bill Gammill, forming the duo known as Gammill and Murphy. They released three albums, including many songs written by Russ. The well-traveled duo performed over 2,000 times in their eight-year ministry. In 1986 they performed on the New Artist Showcase at the Gospel Music Association Week in Nashville.

From 1989-2005, Murphy served as the University Minister at a church in Lubbock. The group - which began with only nine students has grown to over 1,200, one of the largest University Ministries in the nation, and has been featured on the 700 Club TV show.

"The song "Welcome Home (Chad's Song)" was written for Chad Gross, one of Russ' former college students who flew over 130 missions in his Blackhawk helicopter in Kosovo and Iraq. Welby Smith, one of Russ' closest friends, requested that he write a song to honor Chad's return to Lubbock. Russ wrote the song and recorded a demo to play on a couple of radio stations. It was then that Russ met Mike Hammock, in a divine coming-together of God-given talents. Mike listened to the song, liked it, and he and Russ discussed the possibility of Mike recording it.

Bill Stewart, who happened to be a friend of both Russ and Mike - and a man with a huge vision - was present at that meeting and saw in this project what could be a blessing to ALL our nation's servicemen and service women. So what started out as a song written for one soldier has blossomed into a project that we are praying will touch the world. This moving song has recently hit #1 on PowerSource Magazine's Top 20 Chart and has risen to #3 on Christian Music Weekly's Top 25," said a local ministerial fellowship pastor.

Murphy currently lives in Lubbock with Saralyn, his wife of over 31 years, but is soon to move to Nashville to pursue his music career.

"I believe I'm the most blessed man in the world—I have Christ, my wonderful Savior, I have Saralyn, my best friend and true love of my life, I have my family who is always there for support and encouragement and I have some of the most amazing friends anyone could ever have. I think I know how George Bailey must have felt in "It's A Wonderful Life," said Murphy.

Methodists Raise \$4,658 For Senior Citizens With Creative "TNT Challenge" Projects

Little becomes much in God's hands. That premise became the basis for a unique project of local church members who were each given one dollar and challenged to use their talents to make their dollar grow — no instructions, no event coordinators to organize the congregation — just a challenge issued with a gift of a silver dollar coin. Pastor Jeff Bayley called it "The TNT Challenge" (Talent and Talent) and the members of First United Methodist Church of Tahoka began wondering what talents they might have to put to use.

It was a unique opportunity for the congregation, issued to children and adults alike, with no set goal to reach except to remember that God has given us all gifts and talents. Rev. Bayley reminded members of the Parable of the Talents and said that all money raised would be given as a gift to the Lynn County Senior Citizens Center, as a local mission project.

"I wanted our congregation to experience first-hand the opportunities that God has for us all," said Rev. Bayley, who readily admits he has missed many opportunities to challenge himself to do with his talents what God would have him do.

"TNT was birthed on a sleepless Saturday night," Rev. Bayley admits with a smile. "It was birthed both out of a known need and quite frankly out of frustration. The first part of the challenge that was birthed was a sermon that was entitled, 'What Will You Do With What You Have Been Given?' God showed me how our fear that there won't

be enough of us our creativity. He also showed me that we were all put here for a reason and we have all been given gifts and talents that we are to use or they will be taken away. These thoughts led me to the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30). This is the perfect story of how you will lose your talent if you don't use it... and there are also consequences that come from losing your talent," said the pastor.

some prayer and creativity, and four weeks later brought back the results of their TNT challenge, laying their envelopes of money on the church altar as a gift to God. A grand total of \$4,658.15 was raised, and given to Senior Citizens Director Nancy Guilliams.

"You just don't know what this means to the center," Mrs. Guilliams told the congregation at a dinner held Sunday afternoon, May 21. "We had literally

birthday dinner and TNT Challenge raised a total of \$6,945.91 for the Senior Citizens Center.

The TNT Challenge began a variety of creative fund-raising efforts by the local members, including garage sales, lawn mowing, cleaning cemetery lots, selling gift cards, carryout meals, homemade ice cream, brownies, cookies, divinity candy, and funnel cakes. One family hosted Bunko parties to raise funds, a couple of ladies hosted a ladies night out, and another family hosted a concert and dinner at the church. One person preached a revival (yes, it was the pastor), and even the children of the congregation got involved, using their talents to raise funds. Gretchen Henley and Coy Mercer had a lemonade stand, selling lemonade and cookies, and Graham Henley contributed his funds from mowing lawns. The McLelland children, Matt, Jessica and Smith, sold mesquite firewood that they gathered.

"It was exciting to see how people responded to the TNT challenge," said Rev. Bayley. "We all have some talent, in some area, that we can give to God. Sometimes we just need to be reminded to use that talent, and to be aware of opportunities right here at home and elsewhere, that God might place before us," he said.

For the members of First United Methodist Church of Tahoka, the TNT challenge has served as a reminder that God can use whatever is given, and make it more — and that they may have the opportunity to offer their time and energy as an answer to someone else's prayers.

So this is where the challenge came in, using our God given gifts and talents, how can we cause a single dollar to grow. You see, I have always said, little becomes much in the Master's hands," said Rev. Bayley. "Several months earlier, Nancy Guilliams had spoken at Rotary Club, letting us know of the Senior Citizens Center's dire need for money. So the two thoughts were put together with a need and there you have TNT challenge."

The result? A hundred average people took a silver dollar out of the offering plate, added

The TNT Challenge was the second project during the month of May that FUMC members had raised funds for the senior citizens center. A church-wide birthday dinner held May 7 raised \$2,287.76 that was donated to the center, from funds given by church members who each gave an amount multiplied by their age (a penny, a dime, a dollar, etc., times their age). 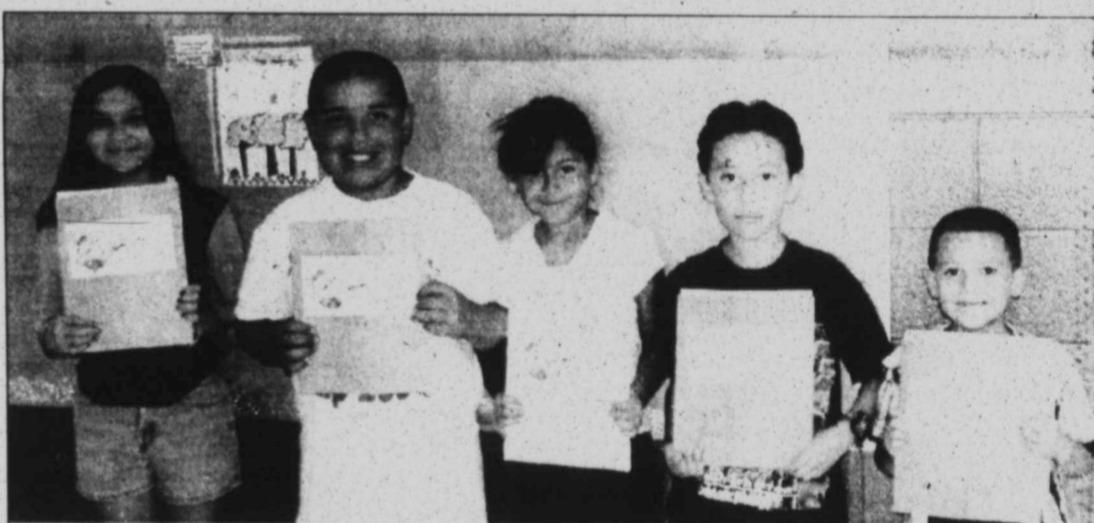

Lynn County Earns 2005 Safety Award

Lynn County has been awarded a 2005 Safety Award by the Texas Association of Counties (TAC), which administers a Workers' Compensation self-insurance pool for counties and other local governments.

The award was earned for the county's record of involvement and commitment to safety in the workplace, as well as for controlling their Workers' Compensation claims.

The honor means that Lynn

County, which participates in the counties' pool through TAC, is obtaining substantial savings for their taxpayers as a result of their TAC Workers' Comp coverage. Premiums are minimized for public entities that have lowered their claims rates and participate in other coverages through the self-insurance pools administered by TAC.

To qualify for this honor, the entity must have a safety program rated in the top 15 percent of approximately 300 governmental entities that collectively self-insure their Workers' Compensation in this pool. Only 34 entities were honored this year with this award.

These programs are evaluated by the Texas Association of Counties Safety Specialists who work with each pool member to develop loss control and safety programs.

In the evaluation of the program, the following criteria are considered:

- Safety program elements in place;
- Activity and success of program in the 2005 calendar year;
- Support for the program by the upper management, governing board or commission that directs the operations of the entity;
- Recent loss history; and
- Improvement in the safety program since 2006.

The TAC Safety Awards are presented annually.

Ag Safety Day Set Here Friday

A Progressive Agriculture Safety Day for children 6 years of age and entering 1st grade to age 13 will be held Friday, June 2, at Tahoka City Park, 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Children under 6 are welcome if accompanied by a parent. The event is being hosted by Texas Cooperative Extension in Lynn County in conjunction with the Progressive Agriculture Foundation.

Youth may register at the event. Registration begins at 9:00 a.m. The registration form and a \$3.00 registration fee per child are due at the time of registration. A parent/guardian must sign the registration form. The registration fee for the event covers lunch, speakers, t-shirt, and a packet of safety materials. Many Lynn County community members are contributing to this learning experience. TSCRA Provides Quick Justice For Lynn County Cattle Theft Victim

FORT WORTH, Texas — A call to Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association resulted in quick justice for a Lynn County victim of cattle theft.

J.R. Brady of Wilson, Texas, returned from a weekend trip out of town March 6 and noticed several of his cattle were missing; three recipient cows implanted with embryos at a cost of about \$5,000 each and three registered Limousin calves ready for sale as show calves. Total value of the missing cattle was about \$30,000.

Brady called the sheriff's office the next day. On March 10 he called Dean Bohannon, his area TSCRA inspector, and gave him a detailed description of the missing cattle, including gender, color, markings, brand, ear tag numbers and approximate weight. Such meticulous information gives an investigator a huge advantage, but Brady provided an even bigger bonus—a likely suspect and the probable location of sale.

Brady told Inspector Bohannon that his employee, Mark Cruz, was having some serious financial problems and might have taken the cattle. He added that Cruz had previously hauled some of his cattle to the Muleshoe Livestock Auction. Bohannon immediately contacted Richard Wills, who inspects cattle for TSCRA at the Muleshoe sale. If Cruz had sold any of Brady's cattle at Muleshoe, Wills would have a record of it.

TSCRA employs 80 market inspectors who inspect every head of cattle sold at the 119 auction markets in Texas, recording descriptions of the cattle and information on the buyer and seller. During 2005 TSCRA market inspectors identified a total of 4,766,235 head.

The market inspectors send their reports to TSCRA's Fort Worth headquarters, where the information is processed for computer retrieval and distributed to more than 700 law enforcement agencies nationwide. That database is usually the first stop in any investigation conducted by TSCRA's commissioned law enforcement officers, known as field inspectors.

Bohannon is one of 29 TSCRA field inspectors stationed strategically throughout Texas and Oklahoma. All are thoroughly trained in law enforcement, have in-depth knowledge of the cattle industry and are commissioned as Special Rangers by the Texas Department of Public Safety and/or the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation. In 2005 TSCRA field inspectors recovered or accounted for stolen livestock and ranch equipment valued at more than \$6.2 million.

Bohannon was not disappointed; Wills told him that cattle matching the ones Brady had described had been checked in at Muleshoe on March 4 by Mark Cruz. Bohannon got copies of the sale papers and a check made out to Cruz.

It was time to confront the suspect. Bohannon and Deputy Jim Bingham of the Lynn County Sheriff's office went to Cruz's house about 5:30 p.m. on March 13. No one appeared to be home, so Bohannon called the home phone number. When there was no answer, he called the cell

phone. Cruz answered, but said he was in South Texas and wouldn't be back for a week. The lawman's instincts told him the suspect was lying. He left his business card with neighbors and asked them to call when Cruz returned. Sure enough, Bohannon got a call two hours later.

He returned to the house and called Cruz on his cell phone. He told him he knew he was at home and asked him to come outside and talk. Cruz agreed. When Bohannon asked him about Brady's cattle, Cruz exploded.

He said a drug dealer had forced him to steal the cattle by threatening his family. The drug dealer made him cash the check and took all the money. Cruz then refused to talk further without an attorney.

Bohannon now turned his full attention recovering Brady's cattle. He used buyer's sheets to trace where the missing animals had gone from the sale barn.

The three recipient cows had been sold to a packer. Bohannon contacted the head cattle buyer and was told they and had been killed on March 7.

The two purebred Limousin bull calves went to a ranch in New Mexico. Bohannon advised the New Mexico Brand Board of

their location and was assured they would locate and hold the bulls. The buyer reported he still had the calves, but had castrated them.

The purebred Limousin heifer was traced to a nearby ranch, where it had been commingled with seven similar calves. Bohannon advised the manager that Brady's calf had a yellow ear tag with the number 30 on it. The manager pointed to one of the calves and said he remembered removing a tag with that number. On March 14 Brady identified the same calf as his.

All of the cattle had been located and the culprit had confessed within four days of Brady's call to TSCRA.

Local legal authorities also moved quickly. On April 21, Mark Anguiano Cruz pled guilty to Third Degree Theft in the 106th Judicial District Court of Lynn County, Texas. He was sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary and instructed to pay \$30,000 in restitution, a \$1,000 fine and \$261 in court costs.

"TSCRA would like to both thank and commend Lynn County District Attorney Ricky Smith for the expeditious and efficient manner in which this case was prosecuted," said Larry Gray, TSCRA director of law enforcement.

The trailer will be used to transport Tahoka FFA Livestock projects and possibly other school needs as well. With the students providing the labor, the trailer was built at approximately half of the cost of a new retail trailer.
