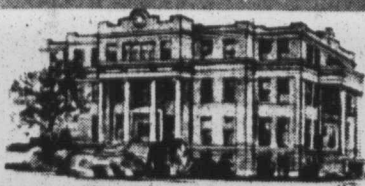

Dogs Win Over Longtime Rivals!

Dogs Ease By Shallowater 28-27 To Stay Unbeaten

If two football teams are going to battle it out until one of them wins by a single point, it's a lot more fun being the winner.

Last year, the Shallowater Mustangs managed a 35-34 win over Tahoka, but last Friday it was the Bulldogs getting the win, 28-27, thanks to a few long scoring plays and a defense that was strong when it had to be.

The win put Tahoka up 2-0 in the young season for new Coach Jay Hellums, but for longtime Bulldog fans, it was especially pleasing since it is believed to be the first time Tahoka ever has beaten Shallowater.

Lynn County News records of continuous scores of Tahoka football games go back to 1946 and individual issues of years before that would have to be examined to determine if the two schools ever met in a football game before that. Since 1946, Tahoka first played Shallowater in 1984 and has lost to the Mustangs in all the games since then (about a dozen times).

Tahoka overcame a Texas Tech-style passing bombardment by Shallowater to win last Friday. Mustang QB Jared Johnson completed 29 of 40 passes, most of them 7 to 15 yards, all in the flat zones. Four went for touchdowns.

Tahoka started out with a goal line stand after an early Mustang drive which finally was halted on downs at the 1-foot line. Tahoka had to punt, and the Shallowater returner fumbled the ball, which was recovered by Tahoka at the Bulldogs 45.

On the next play, junior running back Britt Wuensche took the ball around left end 55 yards for the game's first score, and Jay Tillman kicked the first of his four extra points, one of which eventually proved to be the margin of victory.

That was all the scoring in the first period, but the two teams put up 34 points in the second. First, Tahoka went ahead 14-0 after QB Damon Moore passed 9 yards to end Josh Hawthorne for a touchdown less than 2 minutes into the quarter.

Shallowater came back to score on a 20-yard pass play, Johnson to Trevor McCurdy, after Tahoka turned the ball over at its own 20, attempting a run on 4th and 8. Andrew Morris kicked the point to make it 14-7 with 6:39 left in the second.

After the kickoff, Tahoka had the ball on its own 23 and Tillman broke free to race 77 yards for a Bulldog touchdown. He kicked the point to make it 21-7 at 6:16.

Shallowater came back with another TD pass of 2 yards, but missed the extra point, and it was 21-13 with 2:44 left. But Tahoka scored again before the half as Moore ran 35 yards, and it was 28-13 with 1:32 remaining. Still, the Mustangs drove quickly downfield before halftime, only to have the drive halted as Wuensche intercepted a pass.

The third quarter was scoreless, with another Shallowater drive stopped by an interception by Daniel Baker of the Bulldogs.

Shallowater scored with 8:48 left in the fourth and added two points on a pass play to make it 28-21. The Mustangs scored again on a lateral-forward pass play which appeared to be forward to Tahoka fans as Johnson threw the ball across to Jordan Schaff, who hit McCurdy on a 39-yard pass at the goal line.

However, when the Mustangs tried to kick the tying point, Moore broke through to block it with 5:02 left in the game. Tahoka managed to hold the ball for a drive after that, and Shallowater got it back with little time left, throwing a pass incomplete into the end zone as time expired.

Tillman gained 136 yards on 14 carries and Moore gained 104 yards on 18 carries. Wuensche gained 75 yards in just 5 carries, and all three rushed for touchdowns. Moore also completed four of 7 passes for 58 yards and a touchdown thrown to Hawthorne. Kyle Preston gained 12 yards in 5 carries.

On defense, Daniel Baker had 6 tackles and an interception, Martin Garcia had 10 tackles and others doing well on defense included Wuensche, Moore, Brandon Tomlinson, Hawthorne and Matt McLelland.

The Bulldogs this week go to neighboring O'Donnell, which has lost two games, each by a single point, this season so far.

City Officials Approve 5-Cent Tax Increase

Tahoka City Council unanimously approved a 5-cent tax rate increase for 2006-07, setting the rate at 74.7031 cents per \$100 of property value. The rate is slightly more than five cents over the previous year's rate of 69.5 cents. The 2006-07 budget was also approved as presented at the city council meeting held Monday night, Sept. 11.

Two council members were not present at the meeting, including Rudy Fuentes and Ray Box. Members attending included Clara Calvillo, Amy Preston and Jeff Martin, as well as Mayor Mike Mensch, City Administrator Jerry Webster, and City Attorney Cal Huffaker.

According to City Administrator Jerry Webster, the nickel increase in the tax rate will only generate \$28,324 for city coffers. Unlike other taxing entities within the county, the city tax base has not increased significantly, with total taxable value of all property

up only \$451,230 from last year's figures. Total taxable value of all property in the preceding tax year was \$50,821,490 compared to \$51,272,720 in the current tax year. Other taxing entities, such as school districts and the county, are seeing significant increases mostly in ag property values, but the city does not incorporate any agricultural property.

City officials also approved raising the basic water rate \$2.00, from \$15.25 to \$17.25 for the first 5,000 gallons of water, which will take affect Oct. 1. This rate increase is expected to fund the 2005 additional water rights project of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, where Tahoka gets its water supply.

Other city fees for sewer and garbage collection will remain the same.

Monthly bills were approved, and the meeting adjourned in less than an hour.

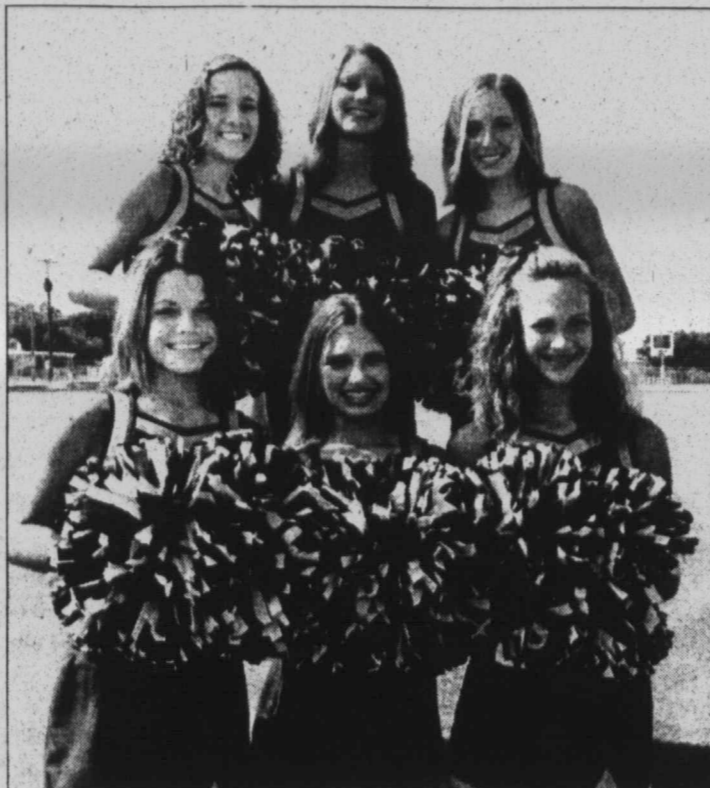

City-County Library Sets Fundraising Events

The City-County Library in Tahoka is gearing up for 2007 with several fundraising activities planned over the next month, including the annual Silent Auction held in conjunction with the Lynn County Harvest Festival: a "75 for 75" campaign to celebrate the library's 75th Anniversary; and an upcoming book sale.

According to Library Director Claudia Guin, the library receives funding from the City of Tahoka and Lynn County to pay library employee salaries while the City of Tahoka generously hosts the library in the Life Enrichment Center, providing all building and utility needs. The library depends on grants, donations, and fundraisers to supplement their budget for materials and other operating expenses.

"We are grateful for the support provided by the City and County, but the bulk of our funding to purchase books and audiovisual materials, the heart of any library, comes from outside sources," said Guin. "The library has grown in the last few years, and with that growth comes the need for more income. We are hoping the citizens of Lynn County will participate in our fundraising activities so that we are able to provide them with the best library services possible."

Fundraising will start with the Silent Auction to be held at the Harvest Festival on Saturday, Sept. 30. The library is currently accepting donations for that annual event. Anyone wish-

ing to donate an item for the auction may drop it by the library during regular library hours, or call the library at 561-4050 for their donation to be picked up.

The library will be hosting a "75 for 75" fundraiser for the rest of the year in celebration of the City-County Library's accomplishments this past decade and to celebrate 75 years of service to Lynn County.

"A 75th Anniversary is a very special event that only comes around once," said Guin. "We thought now was a great time to offer citizens the chance to contribute to their library."

This particular campaign will enable friends of the library to contribute in any "75" denomination to the library, leaving the number of "zeros" to the donor (\$7.50, \$75, \$750, etc.). Contributions may be made in honor or in memory of a loved one.

October 30-November 3, the library will hold a week-long book sale with proceeds benefiting the library's general fund. The sale will be held during regular library hours in the small classroom at the Life Enrichment Center. According to Guin, there will be hardback books, paperback books and VHS tapes for sale at prices ranging from 25¢ to \$2.

Guin says there is also a way for citizens to contribute to their library on a year-round basis. "Shop for the Library" is a great source of income for libraries all over the country, and it's a service I personally utilize all the time.

Anyone who buys online may go to shopfortheLibrary.net, designate the City-County Library as their benefiting library, and shop at over 700 online stores. A portion of the sale total will be sent to the designated library.

All of these options allow library patrons to support the local library, which is located inside the Life Enrichment Center at 1717 Main Street in Tahoka. Current library hours are Monday and Wednesday, 9:00am-5:30pm (closed 12:30pm-1:30pm for lunch); Tuesday and Thursday, 2pm-7pm; and Friday and Saturday, 10am-1pm.

Tax Rate, Budget Set For County

Lynn County Commissioners met Monday morning, adopting the 2006-07 budget and setting the tax rate at .91450 for the 2006-07 year. The tax rate is about a penny lower than last year's rate. All four commissioners approved both motions unanimously.

Monthly bills were paid, and commissioners approved a new line item to the budget for the Lynn County Historical Commission for \$500.

Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin led the meeting, with commissioners J.T. Miller, Mike Braddock, Don Blair and Don Morton all present, as well as Brad Hammonds, commissioner-elect for Pct. 4.

Harvest Festival Events Gearing Up For Sept. 30

The Lynn County Harvest Festival is gearing up for Sept. 30 with several new activities adding interest to the annual event, which this year is in conjunction with homecoming for all four schools in the county.

The Harvest Festival is held all day Saturday at the courthouse square in downtown Tahoka, kicking off with games for children in the morning and booths that offer food and entertainment throughout the day. Bandgora will provide live music throughout the day, and cash giveaways are conducted from the stage, offering prizes for answering trivia questions or for bringing requested items to the stage.

The Harvest Festival Princess Contest and Queen Contest return this year, and a new King's Contest now offers high school males an opportunity for college scholarships. All three contests offer more money for winners, with the Harvest Festival Queen to receive a \$4000 scholarship, the first runnerup a \$2000 scholarship, and the second runnerup a \$500 scholarship. The Harvest Festival King will receive a \$2000 scholarship, first runnerup a \$1000 scholarship, and second runnerup a \$500 scholarship; and in the Princess contest, the Princess will get a \$1000 savings bond, first runnerup a \$500 savings bond, and second runnerup a \$300 savings bond.

The Lynn County Starz Contest is new to the Harvest

Festival events this year, with cash prizes offered in two categories. Byron Norwood, a local vocalist well known for his singing abilities, will be Master of Ceremonies for the competition (and will not be competing). The adult category, ages 16 and over, will offer a first place prize of \$300 cash, a second place prize of \$200 and a third place prize of \$100. In the youth category, ages 15 and younger, the top three winners will win savings bonds worth \$300, \$200 and \$100.

The first round of Starz competition will be held Saturday, Sept. 23 at The Center for Housing and Community Development in Tahoka, and area residents are invited to come hear the singers perform, beginning at 10 a.m. The second and final round will be held at the Harvest Festival, with singers to perform on stage. Non-local judges will determine the winners.

Susan Tipton, 561-4750, is chairman of the Starz event.

Queen, King and Starz candidates will all be selling \$2 chances to win one of four great prizes, including a grand prize of a Kentucky Derby prize package worth \$3400, \$1,000 cash, \$500 worth of groceries from Thriftway, or \$300 worth of gasoline from Witt Butane.

Princess candidates are selling \$1 chances to win a computer/printer package.

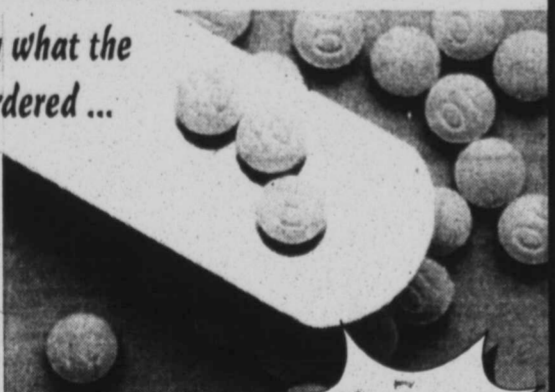

Used Vehicle Sales Tax Laws To Change Oct. 1

Effective Oct. 1, 2006, state law changes the method to calculate motor vehicle sales and use tax due when a used vehicle is purchased, mostly affecting the sales tax figured on a used vehicle that has been purchased from an individual rather than a licensed dealer. No longer will the purchase price be the only determining factor in figuring the sales tax—the value of the car will also be figured into the sales tax fee, whether or not the price paid is the same as the determined value.

If a person buys a vehicle from a licensed dealer, the tax is 6.25% of the sales price. If purchased from a private party, such as a friend or relative, the tax is 6.25% of:

- the sales price, if you paid 80% or more of the vehicle's standard presumptive value (SPV) (which is determined by a government data base);
- 80% of the vehicle's SPV, if you paid less than that amount; or
- the certified appraised value, if you paid less than 80% of the vehicle's SPV and you get a certified appraisal.

The law requires the Texas Department of Transportation to determine and publish a SPV data base for used vehicles. Check the TxDOT web site at www.txdot.gov for that data base.

Motor vehicle sales tax will continue to be due when a person titles and registers the vehicle at the county tax office. A purchaser must pay the tax within 20 county working days from the date of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use.

For those who desire to obtain a certified appraisal themselves, there are two options:

- Get a certified appraisal from a licensed dealer for your vehicle type. Depending on the type of vehicle (car, truck, mo-

torcycle), a dealer's fee can range from \$40 to \$500, with most fees from \$100 to \$300.

• Or, get an appraisal from a licensed insurance adjuster for a fee to be determined by the adjuster.

Submit the appraisal with your title application within 20 county working days of purchase or the date the vehicle was brought into Texas for use.

Be aware that an appraisal fee may offset any tax savings. For example, tax on \$1,600 of value = \$100. In other words, a \$100 appraisal must reduce the vehicle's SPV by more than \$1,600 to save money.

For more information, contact the State Comptroller's office at 1-800-252-1382, or the local county tax office. In Lynn County, the tax office is located inside the Lynn County Courthouse, phone 561-4112. This new law, however, is a state law and local officials have no control over the formula that must be used to determine sales tax for used motor vehicles.

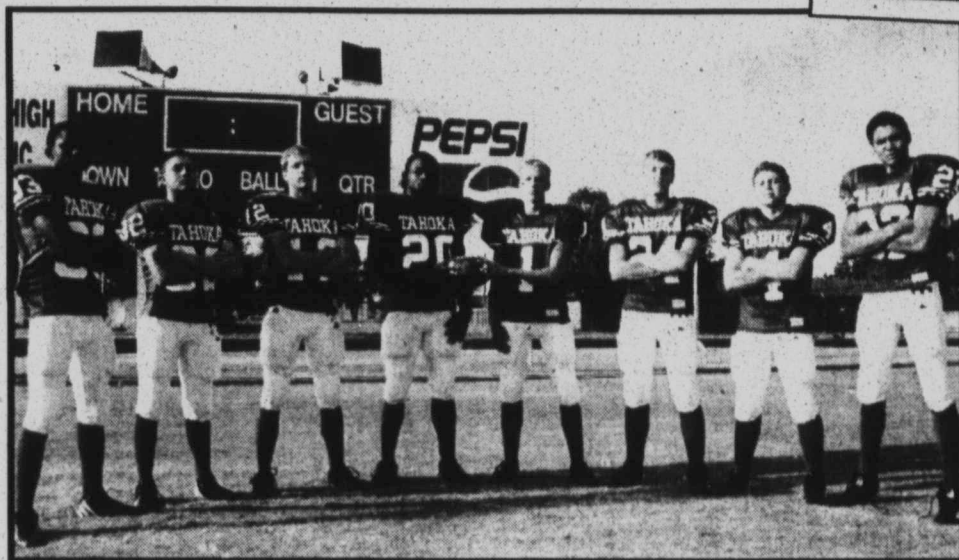

Preparing for the Unexpected: First Step is to Get Informed

If a disaster occurs in your community, local government and disaster relief organizations will try to help you. But, according to Janie Harris, Extension Housing and Environment Specialist and Lisa Norman, Extension Assistant, with Texas Cooperative Extension, you need to be ready as well. Although we cannot prevent disasters, we can reduce the risk of injury and even death by becoming informed. A first step for disaster preparedness is to learn about what could happen and how to respond.

What is a disaster? Disasters can result from natural hazards, accidents or terrorism.

1. Natural hazards: Natural disasters in Texas can be caused by drought, fire, floods, hurricanes, ice storms, tornados and, less commonly, by disease epidemics.

As a natural disaster occurs, check your local radio or television station or the Internet for current information. The National Weather Radio and the Emergency Alert System alert the public about dangerous conditions. You need to know what the different terms mean and how to respond. Watches are alerts to potential danger; warnings alert you to impending danger.

The ultimate goal of the Emergency Alert System is to get critical information on the people who need it. The Federal Communication Commission designed the Emergency Alert System in cooperation with the National Weather Service (NWS) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

2. Accidental disasters: Some disasters are caused by accidents, such as explosions, equipment failure, hazardous materials incidents, household chemical emergencies and nuclear power plant emergencies.

If a chemical incident occurs in your area, you can minimize your risk of contamination by staying as far away from the site as possible. There usually is little or no warning before accidental disasters. So advance preparation is essential for protecting your family and maintaining a safe environment. Emergency management agencies are trained to get the word out to the public. Listen to them for directions on what to do and where to shelter in order to minimize your exposure to the disaster.

3. Terrorism: There are many forms of terrorist attacks. According to the Department of Homeland Security, acts of terrorism include assassinations, bombings, cyber attacks, hijackings, kidnappings, threats of terrorism and the use of chemical, biological, nuclear and radiological weapons. No community is immune from the possibility of a terrorist attack.

The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, Texas Homeland Security, and many local agencies are working together to reduce the risk of terrorist threats in our state. They will alert the public as to the perceived risk level.

Help in Texas

In addition to listening to the emergency alert system and local health officials, you also need to know about other sources of help that are available when a disaster happens. 9-1-1 is the universal emergency phone number for residents of the United States to use to request emergency assistance. During a disaster, do not call 9-1-1 unless the situation is life threatening.

2. 2-1-1 Texas First Call for Help

2-1-1 is a non-emergency information and referral hotline. It is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to every resident of Texas. Specialists are trained to provide callers with current information such as evacuation routes and locations of food and shelter during a disaster.

2-1-1 Texas is included in Texas Homeland Security strategy as a way to share information and mobilize resources during local, state or national disasters. For more information, visit the Web at www.211.org

3. Texas Poison Control Center. If you suspect that someone has ingested or inhaled a toxic substance, immediately call the poison control center at (800) 222-1222.

Final DCP Payments For 2006 Scheduled

Agricultural producers enrolled in USDA's Direct and Counter-cyclical program (DCP) can expect their final 2006 direct payment to be electronically deposited into personal bank accounts sometime after the first week in October, announced Rodney Schoppa, County Executive Director for the Lynn County Farm Service Agency (FSA). Producers who chose not to receive an advance 2006 direct payment will receive a lump sum payment for the year in October.

The direct payment for a crop equals 85 percent of the farm's base acreage multiplied by the farm's direct payment yield multiplied by the direct payment rate.

The FY 2006 crop year direct payment rates and maximum potential counter-cyclical rates:

- Wheat: 52 cents, 65 cents per bushel
- Corn: 28 cents, 40 cents per bushel
- Grain sorghum: 35 cents, 27 cents per bushel
- Upland cotton: 6.67 cents and 13.73 cents per pound
- Rice: \$2.35 and \$1.65 per hundred-weight
- Soybeans: 44 cents and 36 cents per bushel
- Peanuts: \$36 and \$104 per ton
- Barley: 36 cents and 15 cents per bushel
- Oats: 2.4 cents and 8.6 cents per bushel

"We [FSA] will accept late applications for the 2006 DCP sign-up from now through Sept. 29, 2006 if producers pay a \$100 late fee," said Schoppa. Producers sign DCP contracts annually and can choose not to participate in the program in any given year.

FSA reminds producers that if changes in operation potentially impacting interest in base acres have been made since signing the last Direct and Counter-cyclical Program contract, the successions-in-interest must be reported to the county committee by Sept. 29, so that a final eligibility determination can be made.

Changes that qualify as a succession-in-interest include: • A sale of land • A change of operator or producer, including an increase or decrease in the number of partners • A foreclosure, bankruptcy or involuntary loss of the farm • A change in producer shares to reflect changes in the producer's share of the crop(s) that were originally approved on the contract.
