Trucks Collide ... Two 18-wheelers were involved in a smashup on U.S. 87 just north of Tahoka Monday morning, resulting in heavy damage but no serious injuries. The trailer of the truck at left, carrying cases of farm chemicals, was ripped open as a second truck, carrying gravel, scraped down the side of the first truck and then overturned, as shown in the photo below. Some of the gravel spilled out on the ground. Both drivers refused treatment for injuries.

Tahokans In Pickup Hurt; Trucks Collide

Two 18-wheelers were involved in a collision about 3 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 Monday morning, causing one to overturn, but there were no serious injuries. A Freightliner truck carrying cases of farm chemicals had pulled off the roadway because of a minor mechanical malfunction, according to the driver, Jay Snyderman, 55. of Laredo, who said he was just about to get out of his truck when it was struck all along the drivers side by another truck carrying gravel, said investigating Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Quentin Kingham.

The Peterbilt gravel truck overturned after knocking a hole in the trailer of the first truck, and the driver, Arturo Sotello, 49, of Odessa, crawled out through a broken window. Neither driver was badly hurt, and both refused treatment after a Lynn County EMS ambulance went to the scene. The accident occurred about 8:55 a.m. Monday

Five Tahoka residents were injured, one critically, in a collision on U.S. 87 near Cooper School Sunday afternoon. A Lubbock man, Chris Brashear, 31, was driving a 1999 Ford pickup eastbound on Woodrow Rd. when he failed to yield to a crossover at

Tillman's Runs Lead Dogs Past Eagles 21-0

Tahoka's defense was stout for the TEAM STATISTICS whole game, and O'Donnell played tough defense in the first half before Bulldog running back Jay Tillman broke loose for three second-half touchdowns to lead Tahoka to a 21-0

It was the third win in a row for Coach Jay Hellums' Bulldogs, which this week will go to Seagraves, whose game with Lockney last week was cancelled in the first half because of light-

O'Donnell, which lost its third game—the first two by single points will be open this week. The Eagles contained Tillman, the top running back among South Plains Class AA players so far this season, in the first half, when Tillman gained 13 yards. But Tillman ran 76 yards for a touchdown in the third quarter, then added a 37-yard TD run in the same period and 23-yard run across the goal line in the

He kicked the extra points after each run, so accounted for all 21 points scored in the game, and was named the AJ Player of the Week. He wound up with 183 yards on just 16 carries.

For the Eagles, Brennon Eaker gained 66 yards on 23 carries.




The idea, of course, was to thwart identity thieves, who are causing more problems everywhere these days.

U.S. 87 where a 1998 Chevrolet pickup carrying five Tahoka residents going northbound crashed into the other vehicle which pulled out in front of them, according to investigating DPS officers.

Driver of the Chevrolet was Armando Ramirez, late 30s, of Tahoka. Most seriously injured was Elena Martinez, mid-40s, who was airlifted to University Medical Center, where she had two surgeries, and was upgraded from critical to serious condition on 'uesday. Her 2-year-old son, Armando Martinez, was treated for minor injuries and released. Two teenage girls in the Chevrolet, Virginia Aleman and Nadine Aguirre, also have been released from the hospital after treatment, according to family members.

Jail population was 47 early this week after 11 more persons were jailed last week, four of these for possession of marijuana, three for possession of more than 4 ounces and less than five pounds. Those three also faced additional charges of unlawfully carrying a weapon and possession of drug paraphernalia. Still another person was arrested for possession of a controlled substance, and another on a warrant for possession of drug paraphernalia. Two persons were arrested on warrants for failure to appear on charges of driving with no liability insurance. One arrest was for failure to appear on charges of driving while license was invalid, and another was jailed on a warrant for the same charge plus driving while intoxicated.

Emergency Grazing On CRP Land **Deadline Extended**

Texas farmers and ranchers impacted by drought have been granted an extension for emergency livestock grazing on Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres. The new, proposed, extended deadline for Texas livestock producers is November 30, 2006, according to USDA announcement released last Friday. The traditional deadline for emergency grazing on CRP acres is September 30. 2006.

The USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) state committee and Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) state technical committee must agree on the need for the emergency grazing extensions before they are finalized. Once approved, producers may graze on CRP land until the extended November 30th deadline.

"Extremely dry weather conditions have created significant hardships for agricultural producers in Texas," said Rodney Schoppa FSA State County Executive Director for the Lynn County FSA. "This emergency relief measure will provide feed and forage to producers who have lost hay stocks and grazing lands because of drought.'

In mid-July, USDA also announced that CRP rental payments will be reduced by only 10 percent instead of the standard 25 percent on CRP lands that are grazed in 2006.

CRP is a voluntary program that offers annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term resourceconserving cover on eligible land. USDA may allow producers to graze or hay on CRP acreage under certain conditions such as during times of drought or other natural disasters.

Farmers and ranchers can graze no more than 75 percent of the stocking rate. They also can only graze 75 percent of a field or contiguous field that is enrolled for wildlife habitat.

In total, 30 eligible states were granted an extended deadline for emergency livestock grazing on CRP acres. These states are: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana. Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico. North Carolina, North Dakota. Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee. Texas, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming. New deadlines vary by state.


Question: Who does Jesus want us to minister to? How do we do that ministry?






