

budget

The need for increased salaries for county law enforcement officers, and especially the county sheriff Monday's topped discussion of the 2006-2007 budget.

It was noted that Sheriff Richard Wills receives an annual salary of \$28,000 which was believed to be significantly lower than the amount received by the City of Muleshoe's police chief and was responsible for 20 employees, supervision of county's enforcement activities and administration of county's jail.

County Judge Sherri Harrison said she had talked with the Texas Attorney General's office and was told the sheriff and his department employees can receive bonuses and incentive pay.

"I think he (the sheriff) (of keeping the out-ofcounty prisoner population in the jail high to generate revenue) and think he should be paid an In other business, the city incentive," Harrison said.

School News

School bus safety is everyone's business

For 23 million students nationwide, the school day begins and ends with a trip on a school bus.

The greatest risk is not riding the bus, but approaching or leaving the left before crossing the bus. As children go back to school or start school for the first time, it is important that adults and children know school bus safety rules.

Every school bus is surrounded by a danger zone. A danger zone consists of ten feet in front of the bus and on all other sides of the bus that are used for loading and unloading the bus. Following a few simple ensure that all children are safe around the danger zones of a school bus.

- at the bus stop at least five minutes early to prevent running up to the bus stop the when bus approaching.
- 2. As the bus approaches, stand at least six feet away from the curb.
- 3. Wait for the bus driver
- 4. Use hand rails to avoid
- 5. When crossing in front

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

The Greater Muleplex— Muleshoe, Texas—the little but great community in which I live, lost a longtime citizen and dear friend this week.

During all of the 21 years my family and I have lived here, just knowing that Inez Bobo's heart was here and that she loved this place and us has been a precious blessing.

Inez was amazing! She was a businesswoman deluxe and a hard worker whose hands

never lacked for something to do and whose mind was always filled with ways to do even better what she always did so well. She never stopped thinking, never stopped growing, never stopped enlarging the beauty of her life and the lives of those around her. Inez was the very definition of beauty and grace, silver-haired and regal in bearing but never condescending or anything less than wonderfully winsome and gracious, always ready to

smile, and always a blessing. When several years ago Inez' health forced her to move 70 miles away from our community, she still loved it and never forgot any of us. I visited her on occasion; I wish I'd visited more. It was not at all unusual to get a wonderful note from her because she'd heard some news of our family. I wrote back, but I'm afraid I owed her one letter I never wrote. Maybe this column will do.

Inez was for me and this community what Joyce Landorf calls a "balcony person." She was always either working right beside you or up in the balcony cheering you on in your life and work. Because of her and those like her, whatever you did, you did better and with greater joy and satisfaction. Being around Inez made you feel, and be, larger in spirit, better in every way.

At the center of Inez' life and joy was her faith. She loved her Lord, loved his people the church, and loved her church. Thank God, she was the kind of person who knew that doing all three with all of her heart was not only possible and her Christian duty, it was her joy. I never saw her moody or sullen, never heard her fuss or complain or even voice one of those "concerns" that smells like a gripe. Inez was like Christ and carried with her "the aroma of Christ," as St. Paul puts it.

Every year at Christmas and Easter, she sent all of our local churches—not just hers—a poinsettia or an Easter lily as she shared her joy and generously increased ours.

The only way Inez ever worried me is the way my favorite people have always worried me (Oh, me of little faith!)-I worried about what her church and this community would do without her.

Let's not worry. When God blesses you and me, his church universal, and our little expressions of it, with people like Inez, let's just allow their example and God's Spirit to work in our hearts to make us more joyful and generous, gracious and loving and faithful, like them. Like Christ.

Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The County of Bailey will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax rev-(percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The public hearing will be held on August 24, 2006 at 6:00 P.M. and August 28, 2006 at 10:00 A.M. at Bailey County Courthouse, Commissioners Court Room, 300 South First Street, Muleshoe, Texas.

The members of the governing body voted on the proposal to consider the tax increase as follows:

Governor waives hay truck restrictions

Gov. Rick Perry has the directed Texas Department of Transportation to temporarily waive certain trucking restrictions to allow the emergency delivery of hay to Texas farmers and ranchers harmed by on-going drought conditions.

In a letter to Ric Williamson, chairman of the Transportation Texas Commission, Perry said the Department Agriculture has estimated a 77 percent loss in hay production in Texas, and Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs and the Texas Farm Bureau have asked for help in expediting aelivery of hay to Texas.

"Hay importation from neighboring states less affected by drought will help Texas producers survive the final hot months of the year," Perry wrote. His letter directs TxDoT to suspend the permitting requirements and legal height restriction for round hay bales, and associated permit fees, for carriers transporting round bales of hay. The suspension of those requirements will expire Oct. 31.

To ensure the safety of the traveling public, Perry said TxDoT must require loads exceeding 14 feet in height to contact TxDoT's Motor Carrier Division to receive expedited routing. All other legal requirements, including licensing, registration, insurance, and safety, remain in place. Perry earlier this year issued a similar directive for emergency hay deliveries, but that expired on April 30.
