

Thefts At Tahoka, Wilson Reported

A lawnmower was reported stolen in Tahoka during the last week, and at Wilson School, \$138 cash was reported missing from a desk drawer.

Sheriff's officers talked with Wilson school officials, who said the money was taken from the desk sometime over the holidays, and was not missed until Monday. Investigation was continuing.

Roger and Melody Locke of Tahoka told police a Poulan riding lawnmower was stolen from the driveway of their home on Ave. N between Dec. 28 and Wednesday of this week. The mower is black with green lettering

On Saturday police arrested a 24year-old Tahoka man for assault/domestic violence after a 25-year-old woman living with him said he struck her several times with his fists. The woman later declined to file for a protective order.

Two Tahoka drivers, age 19 and 20, were arrested for drag racing their cars on Main St. Saturday evening.

Ten new inmates were placed in Lynn County jail during the last week, with four of these held for driving while license was invalid and two others for assault/family violence, with one causing injury. One person was held for Lubbock on a charge of burglary of a habitation, and one person was charged with resisting arrest, search and transport to jail, plus evading arrest and detention. Others were charged with driving while intoxicated and unlaw-

ing of steers, lambs and goats scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. All animals must be in the barn by 8 p.m. that day.

Lynn County Commissioners met in their first regular session of the year Monday morning, with Pct. 4 commissioner Brad Hammonds, who was officially sworn in to office on Jan. 2; joining the other three commissioners Don Morton, Mike Braddock and Don Blair, and County Judge H.G. Franklin for the session.

District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht met with the court to present the 2007 District Court contract for indigent defense for the four-county 106th Judicial District, which includes Lynn, Dawson, Gaines and Garza counties. The contract provides for indigent defense counsel to be available for each county as needed, with counties sharing a pro-rata cost based on the previous year's number of defendants who were provided indigent defense in each county. The contract approved for 2006 was for \$60,000, with Lynn County's share costing \$7,734, Garza at \$9,054, Gaines at \$20,568, and Dawson County's share at \$22,644.

Judge Schildknecht pointed out that estimated costs without a contract, if provided on a case-by-case basis, would probably cost each county thousands of dollars more. Based on previous year's figures, the judge estimated Lynn County could be looking at paying out more than \$32,000 for indigent defense, taking into consideration multiple cases for some defendants, jury trials, contested revocation hearings, and mileage fees. That's a projected \$25,000 savings from the actual contract cost of \$7,734 for 2007.

"This is the sixth year that the 106th Judicial District has contracted annually for indigent defense, and I am proud to say that other counties are looking at our contract as a model for their own indigent defense needs," Judge Schildknecht told commissioners, "The first year the total annual cost was \$50,000, and the next year it went up to \$60,000, where it has remained at the same total cost, although each county's cost-share may differ from year to year based on the number of defendants represented in the prior year," she explained.

The 106th Judicial District contracts with Lubbock attorney Artie Aguilar for the four-county indigent defense counsel.

In other business, commissioners approved the 2007-08 Historical Commission committee of 11 members, including chairman Harold Hohn and members Lenda Wood, Bettye Green, Bill Chancy, Barbara White, Wendell Morrow, James H. Sanders, Walter Steen, Sandra Laws, Mike Huffaker and Clyde May.

Armando Barrera presented cost estimates for a metal roof for the county extension office building, and commissioners instructed County Attorney Donnis Scott to prepare a contract agreement for the project.

Commissioners discussed internet service for Lynn County offices, which is currently provided by The Door. Although previous information had led county officials to understand that The Door would be closing, new owners informed officials that the internet service would continue without interruption, and commissioners decided to leave the county's internet service as is, with no changes.

Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on the Sheriff's Department, noting that he was interviewing candidates for a deputy position, and that a jailer had given two week's notice of resignation.



THE COMMON COLD

We'll we've covered a few familiar germs that we all face like the flu and the stomach bug. This week we'll delve into the common cold. What exactly is it, how do you catch it, and how is it treated.

The common cold is also known as "acute nasopharyngitis" Acute means a rapid onset of symptoms that are short in duration as opposed to chronic' which means long lasting. Nasopharyngitis pertains to inflammation in the tissue of the nose down to the throat. There are several hundred viruses which are known to cause the common cold. Viruses can evolve to survive. This means a cure is still a long way off. The common cold lasts about 5 -7 days with a cough hanging on for as long as 2-3 weeks. It usually resolves on its own.

The common cold is easily spread from person to person in two ways. The most common is by physical contact with infected nasal drainage. For example, a cold sufferer sneezes or coughs into his hand or wipes his nose, he then shakes you may infect yourself (the nose and eyes are the most common point of entry for these germs). Because these viruses can thrive a few hours outside of the body, you can also pick them up off of contaminated surfaces like door knobs or table tops. The other form of transmission is from inhaling fluid "droplets" from coughs or sneezes. The "droplet cloud" in the air after a sneeze falls at a rate slow enough to linger in the air for hours just waiting for you to step in and inhale. Cold sufferers are most infectious within the first 3 days; however. most people don't have any symptoms until they've already been sick for a day or two. Cold symptoms

include sneezing, sniffling, runny nose, nasal congestion, scratchy or sore throat, coughing, headache. and tiredness. Unlike the flu, cold sufferers don't generally run a fever. If you have a fever that exceeds 101 F you should consult your doc-

The most effective treatment includes over the counter or prescription medications to control the symptoms, plenty of fluids and rest. As you may recall. viruses do not respond to antibiotics. If your symptoms aren't improving within 7 days, or if they worsen you should consult your physician, as you may be experiencing complications or a more serious illness

Once again... prevention is the key. To help prevent the spread of the virus, the cold sufferer should frequently wash their hands thoroughly, especially after coughing. sneezing or blowing the nose. Cough & sneeze into a tissue, or into the sleeve or shirt to prevent the your hand. The germs are now on droplet cloud from lingering in the your hand. If you rub your nose or air. They should stay away from eyes with the contaminated hand others for the first 2-3 days of the illness. Healthy people should avoid cold sufferers, and since it is so easily spread through hand contact. they too should wash their hands often. Clean surfaces like door knobs and table tops often with soap and water or disinfectants. Here are a few interesting bits of "cold" trivia. Contrary to popular. belief...the common cold is not caused by cold or wet weather. The mouth is not a common point of entry and transmission is not as likely to occur with kissing or swallowing: The average adult suffers 2-4 colds a year, and children as many as 12 per year. The common cold is the most common of all human diseases.







All scholarship applications must be returned to THS Counselor Gayle Binder no later than Friday, Feb. 16.



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
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
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
