Commissioners unanimously approved the audit as presented.



He is the son of James Cloud of Tahoka and is a 2006 graduate of O'Donnell High School.

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





KNOW YOUR NUMBERS

This week we're starting a new series called "know your numbers."

We're going to introduce you to a number of important laboratory tests that your doctor, physician's assistant or nurse practitioner may order for you. Each week we'll inform you about the purpose of the test, the normal lab values, and suggest a few points to ponder.

This week we'll cover Cholesterol and Triglyceride tests. Cholesterol and triglyceride tests are blood tests that measure the total amount of "fatty substances" -(cholesterol & triglycerides) in your blood. Cholesterol is used by the body to help build cells and produce hormones. Too much cholesterol in the blood can build up along the inside of the artery walls, forming what is known as plaque. Large amounts of plaque increase your

chances of having a heart attack. HDL (high density lipoprotein) cholesterol helps remove fat form the body. It is sometimes call "GOOD cholesterol". A high level of HDL cholesterol may lower your chances of developing heart disease or having a stroke. LDL(low density lipoprotein) cholesterol carries mostly fat to various parts of the body. It is sometimes called "BAD cholesterol". A high level of LDL cholesterol may increase your chances of developing heart disease. Triglycerides are a type of fat our bodies use to store energy. Having a high triglyceride level along with high LDL cholesterol may increase your chances of having heart disease more than having a high LDL cholesterol level alone.

For accurate results, it is important that these tests are done in the morning before you've had anything to eat or drink. It is also important that you not eat a high fat meal the night before, and that you not drink alcohol or perform strenuous exercise prior to the test.

Following is a list of normal lab values for these tests. Of course these values may be altered by various factors like your age, the medications you take, and other health & lifestyle issues, so your health care provider will determine what is acceptable for you.

 Total Cholesterol – should be less than 200 (mg/dl)

HDL Cholesterol -should be 30-70 (mg/dl). Greater than 60 is desirable.

LDL Cholesterol - should be less than 129 (mg/dl) Triglycerides

- should be less than 150 (mg/dl) Points to Ponder.

If you find yourself among the many Americans who have elevated cholesterol or triglyceride levels, lifestyle changes, such as diet changes, weight loss, and exercise may help lower blood cholesterol levels and increase HDL - "GOOD" cholesterol. (Of course, we suggest you consult your health care provider before making any changes.) Try reducing saturated (animal) fats and cholesterol in your diet. Examples include fatty meats like bacon, sausage, ground beef, cooking with lard or bacon grease, fried meats and vegetables, fatty dairy products like, sour cream, whole milk products, ice cream, and cheeses. Increase fiber in your diet by choosing whole grain breads and cereals, eat more fresh fruit & vegetables, and red beans, black eyed peas, and lentils. Increase the amount of exercise you get daily. Drink less alcohol. Men shouldn't have more than 2 drinks per day, and women should limit themselves to ldrink per day. However, lifestyle changes may not be enough, and your health care provider may want







HPWD Personnel Now Making Annual **Depth-to-Water Level Measurements**

High Plains Water District personnel are now making annual depth-to-water level measurements in the district's observation well network. This indicates the effect of pumpage during 2006 on groundwater levels in the Ogallala aquifer within the district's 15county service area.

Water level measurements are made in a network of more than 1,200 privately-owned wells. These water level observation wells are spaced throughout the district at a density of one well per nine square miles.

"We want producers and residents of the district to be aware amount of tape with the darker

that our staff will be visiting well sites from early January until completion of this task," said Don McReynolds, geologist and Technical Group Supervisor.

District personnel take the water level measurement by lowering a steel tape to a pre-determined depth in the well. The first few feet of the tape lowered into each well are coated with carpenters' chalk, which turns a darker shade of blue when it comes into contact with water.

The distance from land surface to the static water level is determined by subtracting the blue chalk from the total feet of

tape extended into the well.

After the measurement is made, a blue vinyl sticker with the observation well number, the depth-to-water measurement, and the date of the measurement is affixed to the well equipment or other appropriate surface near the well site. Water District personnel attempt to measure the same wells in the observation well network each year, as long as the individual wells are accessible and continue to provide satisfactory data.

The current depth-to-water measurement in individual wells is compared to that of the previous year to determine the average annual change in water levels in the Ogallala aquifer within the district.
