

Rep. Heflin Files Bill To Restore CHIP Program

State Representative Joe Heflin has filed House Bill 824 to restore health coverage to hundreds of thousands of Texas children through the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). In 2003, the Texas Legislature reduced state funding for CHIP and made enrollment in the program more difficult. Since the restrictive policies were enacted, almost two hundred thousand children across the state have lost their health coverage.

Joining dozens of other House members to advocate and raise awareness for the repeal of the restrictive CHIP policies, Rep. Heflin said, "In District 85 alone, between 2003 and 2007 the CHIP enrollment numbers dropped by more than half. Children should be a number one priority, and that is why we need to refund CHIP, so children can have the access they need to health insurance."

Restoring the CHIP program to pre-2003 enrollment levels would not cost the state any additional money. According to data collected for the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, during the 2006 budget year the State of Texas left unspent \$400 million in state funds dedicated for CHIP and Children's Medicaid. "Those dollars could easily cover every child that has lost CHIP coverage since 2003," said Heflin."

"The money is there to do the right thing and to help working families who cannot afford private health insurance. CHIP gives the children of those hard working families health insurance, so they can grow up happy and healthy," Heflin added.

Heflin represents Texas House District 85, including Borden, Crosby, Fisher, Floyd, Garza, Glasscock, Hale, Howard, Irion, Jones, Kent, Lynn, Reagan, Sterling, Stonewall, and Terry Counties. 



Childcare Laws

A couple of years ago the State of Texas passed a law stating that if you are caring for three or fewer children unrelated to you in your home you must pay a \$20.00 yearly fee to be what is considered listed with the state. I was aware of the laws governing home daycares that care for more than 3 children that required you to be either registered or licensed but was unaware that I, by caring for two children in my home, am required to be listed.

With that being said, to the person responsible for turning in the home daycares in Tahoka who were unaware that we were in violation of that law, you have gained nothing from all this except for maybe a couple of days of satisfaction that probably will turn into resentment when you find that you really did nothing to benefit yourself. Granted, we did not know the law but was it necessary to report us to the Texas Dept of Family and Protective Services just because we were not listed with the state. This is a small town where people have lived their entire lives and know others about as well as they know their own children. Anyone who knows me or the others that were reported to the TDFPS knows that the children that come to our homes are getting the love, nourishment and care that they have the right to receive.

Furthermore, we are a small community that thrives on keeping our money in our local businesses. By us providing this care, we are giving some families the opportunity to keep their children in a local daycare. If you had caused us to get shut down, which you didn't, these parents would probably end up having to take their children to a daycare in Lubbock where not only would their money be taken out of Tahoka, but the children will go from receiving care on a 1:3 ratio to at least a 1:6 ratio and at a much higher cost to the par-

ents. I know now that I am required to be listed and have started that process and furthermore, as a parent to 3 young children, I completely support laws that protect our children. However, I am confused as to what your reasoning was in reporting us because it is obvious that in this particular incident, the children's best interests were not what led to your decision. So

I ask, was there really a legiti-



"Know Your Numbers"

This week we'll share information about the important Blood Glucose test. A blood glucose test measures the amount of glucose or "sugar" in your blood. Glucose comes from the foods we eat, especially carbohydrates like sweets, breads, pasta, and starchy vegetables like corn, rice, and potatoes. Normally your blood glucose level increases slightly after you eat. When you eat a meal, glucose from the food stimulates your pancreas to release Insulin. The amount of insulin released is proportional to the amount or type of food you ate. Insulin's main role is to help move certain nutrients (especially glucose) out of the blood and into the cells of your body's tissues, because our cells require glucose to function. If the body is not producing insulin, or is not producing enough insulin, or if it is not using the insulin properly, the glucose will build up in the blood instead of being transported into the cells as it should be. On the other hand, if the body produces too much insulin, there will not be enough glucose in the blood.

Blood glucose levels can be measured by a simple blood test. Your health care provider may want to test your glucose level to rule out hyperglycemia (high blood glucose) as seen in diabetes or hypoglycemia (low blood glucose). He/she may want to know what your blood glucose level is after you've had nothing to eat or drink for at least 8 hours. This is called a fasting blood

sugar. Or he/she may want to see what your blood glucose level is regardless when you ate last. This is called a random blood sugar. Random testing is useful because glucose levels in healthy people do not vary widely' throughout the day. Blood glucose levels that vary widely may indicate a problem.

65 - 120 mg/dl is the normal lab value for both of these tests. Of course this value may be altered by various factors like the medications you take, the amount of alcohol you drink, emotional stress, smoking, and other health issues. Your health care provider will determine what is acceptable for you.

Low blood glucose may indi-. cate a serious health problem, and can be dangerous if not treated immediately

If your glucose level is too high and goes untreated, your health could suffer seriously including damage to your eyes, kidneys, nerves and blood vessels increasing vour chances of having a heart attack or stroke. Your health care provider may want you to decrease the amount of food you eat, the amount of alcohol you drink, the amount of cigarettes you smoke and increase the amount of exercise you get. In many cases these changes alone are enough to correct the problem. For others the problem is more serious and may require oral medication or even insulin injections.







Free Diabetes Classes To **Be Offered In Tahoka**

Free classes will be offered here with information on living with type 2 diabetes. Plan to attend the "Do Well, Be Well With Diabetes" 3-part program on Wednesdays, February 21, 28, and March 7, from 2:00-5:00 p.m., at the Lynn County Extension Office, 1600 Ave J, Tahoka (north of PJ's).

"There is no cost to participate in the program. Parents of children who have diabetes are also welcome," stated Amy Baugh with the Lynn County Extension Service.

Eating the right foods at the right times is vital for good diabetes management, but don't forget the foods must also be eaten in the right quantities. That's why carefully measuring serving size is so important.

Portion size is the key to good blood glucose management, as is selecting foods wisely and then eating them in the right amounts throughout the day.

According to the USDA My Pyramid, a healthy daily diet for most adults contains five or more ounces of breads, cereals, rice and pasta; two to three cups of vegetables and one to one and a half cups of fruits; two or three cups of milk, yogurt and cheese; three to six ounces of meat, poultry, fish, beans, eggs or nuts; and small amounts of oils from natural sources such as vegetable oil, fish, nuts and seeds. The amounts eaten daily from each food group depend on your age, weight, gender and activity "level.

A popular meal plan for people who have diabetes uses exchange lists, where foods are given a certain value - starch exchange, milk exchange and so on - which can then be integrated into a healthy daily menu. One exchange is a single serving, and can be substituted for other exchanges in a healthy manner. These easy-to-use substitutions can help people with diabetes count calories, maintain their

blood sugar levels and obtain nutrients. More information is available from the American

Some sugars aren't listed as "sugar." Watch for terms that end in "ose" or "ol," or other forms of sugar such as honey or syrup.

Some canned vegetables have sugar added; although these products can be used, a better choice would be fresh or frozen vegetables without the added sugar.

Regular bread also has some sugar added, but it's a small amount in comparison to the major ingredients.

Foods that are labeled "dietetic" may be low in fat and sugar, but they still contain calories and starch and shouldn't be eaten in mass quantities, any more than any other foods.

Artificial sweeteners can be used in a healthful meal plan, but read the labels carefully to make sure they also are non-caloric. Some of these sweeteners are:

- Saccharin: does not convert to glucose; is readily absorbed and is excreted unchanged by the kidneys. However it does contain sodium and may increase sodium content in the diet.

- Aspartame: made from protein; leaves no bitter chemical or metallic aftertaste. However, is not heat-stable so cannot be used in cooking. Drinks sweetened with aspartame that 'are stored in heat will lose their sweetness. People with phenylketonuria (PKU) cannot metabolize the amino acid in aspartame and should avoid products containing it.

- Acesulfame-K: high-intensity sweetener that does not leave an aftertaste and is secreted unchanged in body waste. It also helps prevent tooth decay.

- Sucralose (commonly known as Splenda): made from sugar and tastes like sugar, but is





not metabolized like sugar. Research has shown it does not raise blood sugar in people with diabetes. Is very stable, so can be used in baking and cooking.

- Neotame: non-nutritive, general-purpose sweetener that is heat-stable.

However, one word of caution: People should not eat large amounts of any sweetener. Ask a dietitian to help make good decisions about the place these sweeteners have in your diet plan.



Knowing what each exchange contains is important. For example, one starch exchange - bread, cereal, croutons,

rolls, pasta, tortillas, etc. - has 15 grams of carbohydrate, three grams of protein, one or less gram of fat and 80 calories. One fruit exchange provides 15 grams of carbohydrate and 60

calories, while one milk exchange provides 12 grams of carbohydrates, eight grams of protein and differing amounts of fat and calories.

Counting carbohydrates is also a popular method of building healthy menu plans. This method provides several choices of carbohydrates for each meal and each snack. Each choice provides about 15 grams of carbohydrate, which might be a starch, a fruit or a serving of milk.

But whichever meal plan you and your health care provider choose for you, portions must be monitored by measuring. A small scale designed for food portions can be helpful with this process. When food portions are measured in ounces, a scale can provide the most accurate portion control. Once you are more familiar with what these portions look like, you will be better able to guesstimate them without using a scale.

SUGAR CONTENT

For people with diabetes, the prevailing wisdom has been to avoid sugar - but not any more. Research has shown that people with diabetes can include sugar and other nutritive sweeteners in their menus, within the context of a healthful diet. However, sugars should be eaten in moderation. Sugars are quickly absorbed into the blood stream and increase blood sugar levels. Read labels. Food manufac-

turers list ingredients from greatest to least, by weight. If sugar is listed as one of the first two ingredients, it probably contains too much sugar.



December 2006 saw near normal temperatures, but much above normal precipitation in the South Plains area, according to information released this. week by the National Weather Service office in Lubbock. Precipitation averaged 2.09 inches, which was 1.34 inches above normal.

Looking back at 2006 it was a year of extremes. The year started off with one of the driest and warmest winters on record. Dry, windy and warm conditions caused numerous wild fires. "Severe drought" was a good description for the first half of the year. In fact, the average rainfall for the first seven months was only 7.18 inches (about 1/3 the annual totals). In July some western parts of the South Plains area started receiving significant rain; but for most areas including Lubbock, plentiful rainfall didn't begin until the middle or later parts of August.

The annual rainfall for the Tahoka station was measured at 22.32 inches for the year.

In December 2006, the greatest daily precipitation in the South Plains area was measured at 1.70 inches at Snyder on Dec. 20. The greatest monthly precipitation was 3.27 inches at Memphis, and the least monthly precipitation was measured at 1.11 inches at Seminole.
