Two More File For Elections

Two more candidates, both incumbents, added their names to election lists in Tahoka this week. City councilwoman Amy Preston filed for re-election to District 3 in the Tahoka City election, and Kent Kahl filed for re-election to the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees in Precinct 1.


No other candidates filed during the last week for city, school or hospital elections in Lynn County, with two weeks remaining before the filing period closes, on March 12.

The Tahoka City election has a full slate of candidates to date, with all incumbents filing for two council seats and the mayor's term. Tahoka ISD has three trustee seats open, with only one incumbent filing to date. No candidates have filed in either of the Wilson city or

school elections, with both entities having four seats to fill, and no candidates have filed for two council seats and the mayor's seat in New Home. Another candidate is needed in the O'Donnell city election, where three council seats are to be filled and two candidates have filed to date. O'Donnell ISD currently has the only contested race to offer, with four candidates filing for three seats on the board of trusteer.

No candidates have filed for a director's term on the Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors, with two seats to fill in the upcoming election.

Candidates interested in filing should contact the business offices of the respective entities.

Lucinda Ruth Olveda of Tahoka reported Saturday that someone had stolen a breaker box switch from her rent house on Ave. E.



Jailed during the last week were four persons charged with driving while license suspended and others charged with order amending probation, warrant from Collin County, no liability insurance, warrants on theft plus violation of probation, possession of marijuana, non-payment of child support, and warrant on assault/family violence.



I'll bet that works. Might even sober somebody up immediately, when the urinal starts talking to you. It probably causes more work for the janitors to clean up, too.


("Hey, Charlie-call Joe's wife and tell her to come get him. He's in the restroom arguing with the urinal.")

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning, discussing cell phone usage and deciding to buy new phones and service from Sprint, without signing a contract for Sprint services.

Commissioners voted to amend the budget to allow the treasurer to transfer \$100,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund to the four precincts, which would allow \$25,000 to be moved into CDs (Certificates of Deposit) for each precinct.

Powerlifters Win Again; **Regional Events Next**



Question: What is a foundation?

To some, a foundation has to do with a house or a building. It's the part of the building that holds everything up. If you don't use good materials or build it right, the entire building falls. Farm Bureau Donates Food To County Senior Citizens Center


