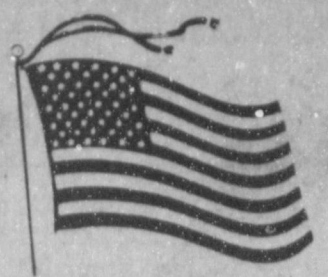

Muleshoe Duo

Wreck Victims

At Shallowater

A longtime Muleshoe couple, Robert and Bonnie Harrison, lost their lives in a three-vehicle accident near Shallowater late Tuesday evening.

The accident, that claimed the lives of the Harrisons occurred around 7:45 p.m. about one half mile west of Shallowater in Lubbock County, according to Department of Public Safety reports.

DPS troopers said the accident occurred when a tractor-trailer truck jackknifed on the eastbound lanes of the four lane highway, skidded across the median into the west bound lanes, where it struck two vehicles, both westbound.

Although the Harrisons were both reported to be wearing seat belts, the force of the impact apparently killed them instantly.

Three persons in the other car were critically injured in the accident.

DPS troopers said the west bound lanes of the highway were blocked for more than two hours following the accident, with traffic rerouted to the eastbound lanes as emergency crews used Jaws of Life equipment to free the victims from the crushed vehicles.

The driver of the truck, from Waco, received slight injuries in the accident.

At presstime, funeral services for the Harrisons were pending with Ellis Funeral Home in Muleshoe.

Until his retirement, Harrison had been part owner of the former Plains Auto Parts in Muleshoe. Mrs. Harrison was a housewife.

Among their survivors are two daughters, Janis Lowrie of Seminole and Brenda Sales of Hillsboro.

Rainfall Passes Four Inch Mark

After several days of rain, amounts of just over five inches have been reported in the immediate Muleshoe area, and the rains are apparently not over at this time.

Rainfall in the city of Muleshoe have been variously reported from four to five inches, with lesser amounts to the south, west and north of Muleshoe.

Locally, the official measurement since last Saturday was shown to be 3.15 inches, although some residents reported larger amounts.

This rain fell slow, accompanied by very little wind, and no hail was reported anywhere in the area.

To the south, the Muleshoe National Refuge reported a total of 2.30 inches since last Saturday night, with an additional .07 being recorded Tuesday night around 11 p.m.

Buffalo Farms at Goodland has recorded 3.7 inches at the main house, with four inches to the northwest on another segment of the large farm.

At Longview, Mrs. I. L.

Kitchens said they had received nearly two inches of good, slow rain, accompanied by no stormy conditions.

From the Lazbuddie area, Foster Fertilizer said two and a half to three and a half inches of rain had fallen. A spokesman at Foster Fertilizer, east of Lazbuddie, said it was a very good, slow rain, but sunshine was needed now, to allow the young crops to grow.

Although other parts of the nation continue to swelter in extremely high temperatures, and continued drought conditions, the National Weather Service predicted a continuation of the rain patterns across the South Plains, with continued chances for additional moisture.

At presstime on Wednesday morning, NWS was predicting there still existed about a 40 percent chance for additional rainfall, up to two inches in this area.

Some brief flooding was reported and some highways and farm to market roads being under water for a short time.

Many country dirt roads remained under water as the soaked lands forced the continuing moisture to run off.

Little was reported in the county concerning weather-related accidents, although a Muleshoe couple was killed near Shallowater Tuesday evening on a rain-slick highway. (See related story, this page.)

George Nieman Installed Rotary President Tuesday

Tuesday, May 28, was officer installation day for the Muleshoe Rotary Club. Special ceremonies were also held by outgoing Governor Ed Self of Plainview, who has served the past year as Governor of District 573.

This year's governor is J. D. Cage, and he was presented the 'Home' banner for the district to be displayed by the Muleshoe Rotary in the incoming year.

Gov. Self commented, "This has been a great year for Rotary in this district, and outstanding. The year started with 54 Rotary Clubs in the district, and that has increased to 57 clubs, with the addition of one in Plainview, one in Midland and one in Colorado City."

He called Cage and his wife, Julie, to the front, and Mrs. Cage pinned her husband with the District Governor pin.

In brief remarks, Cage remarked how much Gov. Self had helped the district in the year, including asking District Governor nominees to sit in on meetings of the Advisory Board, and keeping him (Cage) informed of each meeting he attended during the year.

Cage also complimented outgoing Governor Self for helping choose people who will be guiding the district for the coming year.

Cage also touched on the ongoing Polio Plus campaign, and said District 573 is 100 percent in contributions to the international project.

With a district goal of some \$708,700, the district has in actuality raised more than \$743,000. For Muleshoe, the goal of \$7,000 is expected to reach \$12,000 in contributions by the time it is ended.

The new district governor called his wife and son, Jay, up to the front, and recognizing her for her 'care for children', and being a member of the Board of Trus-

Neel told the city council, "I appreciate the city and what it has done over the years for us, and appreciate the good working relationship I have had with the city."

"I have known the principals involved in Mission Cable Company for 20 years, and the company in process of purchasing Muleshoe Antenna Company plan to continue to work with the city. They are good, reliable operators."

Muleshoe Mayor Darrell Turner commented, "There has been a good working relationship both ways in the past, and we hope in the future, it will work out the same way."

Williams assured the city council that Mission Cable Company "has every intention of trying to work with the city the same way Muleshoe Antenna worked with the city."

He explained that Mission Cable Company prefers to work with smaller towns, obtaining 'clusters' of small communities to serve.

He said Mission Cable Company intends to keep the same people Merlyn Neel currently has employed.

The representative of the company obtaining Muleshoe Antenna Company said the sale is expected to be completed soon, with the new company assuming operation in July. He said there will be a different rate structure. The basic rate of \$16 will include everything basic except the pay channels of HBO, Showtime and Disney Channels.

Neel told the council that if Muleshoe Antenna had continued, they would have asked for a rate increase in January or February of this year.

He said the \$16 basic charge for the cable was very much in line with what comparable companies are charging.

Mayor Turner noted that the city cannot regulate rates, as it does not have the power (authority) to regulate rates. However, Williams said representatives of Mission Cable would come before the council and visit about rate increases in the future.

He explained that Mission Cable Company, a Delaware-based company, currently has 23,000 subscribers, and will acquire some 3,800 subscribers when they take over Muleshoe Antenna Company, who serves Muleshoe, Friona, Bovina, Sudan and Earth. The local headquarters will continue to be in Muleshoe.

Williams said he is looking at

CAFB Plans Celebration July 2

It's about that time of year again for people to meet on the Cannon Air Force Base flight line to enjoy a day of fun and food.

The date is July 2, and the event is Cannon's Community Appreciation Day.

This 31st anniversary will celebrate the renaming of the base after General John K. Cannon, a former Tactical Air Command commander. Prior to June 8, 1957, the base was named Clovis Air Force Base.

Fuel Tax Repeal Adopted Friday By Ways, Means

Legislation included in a bill introduced by U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) to repeal a tax on off-road use of diesel fuel is part of a legislative package adopted today by the House Ways and Means Committee.

Combest led the effort earlier this year to rescind the tax, which resulted from passage of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987. Combest said the unnecessary tax places an unbearable financial strain on off-highway diesel fuel users such as farmers, oil field crews and ranchers.

The legislation emerged as part of the Ways and Means Committee's Technical Corrections Bill "This tax is ludicrous," Combest said. "It needlessly penalizes oil field operators, farmers and other small business owners who have to pay the diesel fuel tax and later apply for a refund."

The tax requires off-road users of diesel fuel to pay a 15-cent federal tax on each gallon of diesel fuel they purchase. Estimates by the American Farm Bureau Federation show that the tax collection will cost farm users about \$420 million annually.

"This tax is best described as an interest-free loan to the federal government, and the loan is coming from those people who can least afford to pay it," Combest said.

"I believe we have the needed to repeal this unfair tax. More than 160 of my colleagues have seen the error in this disruptive tax and co-sponsored my bill," the Congressman added.

Although users may file for a refund of the fuel taxes with the Internal Revenue Service, the claims for refunds must total \$1000 to receive a quarterly payment from the IRS.

"These farmers and oilmen already have enough economic problems as it is," Combest said. "It's ridiculous to place additional budget demands on them."

The tax repeal measure could be put before the House for a vote as early as next week. The Senate is considering similar legislation to end the tax.

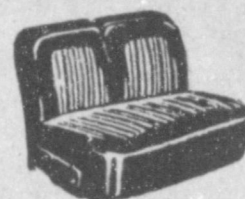

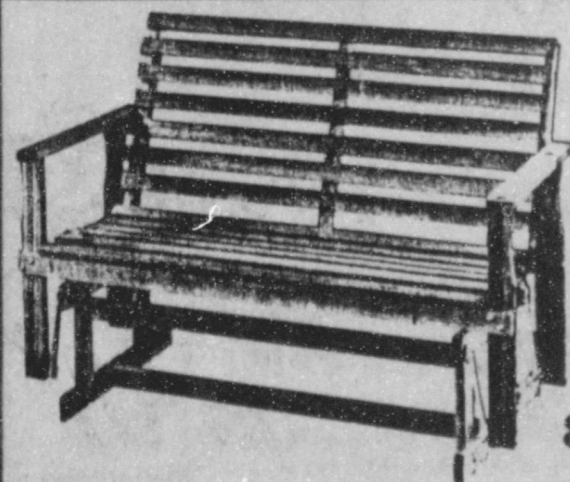

Wheat Aphid Invades More Texas Counties

Wheat producers in the Panhandle bread basket of Texas are being hit hard by the Russian wheat aphid as the crop approaches harvest.

Losses in Texas from the insect pest will exceed last year's figure of \$10 million, entomologists with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service predict. Nationwide, losses are expected to exceed last year's estimate of \$50 million.

The Amarillo area, which annually produces half of the state's 187 million bushels of wheat, is suffering its worst onslaught since the aphid was first identified near Muleshoe three seasons ago, said Dr. William P. "Pat" Morrison, Extension entomologist here. Morrison chairs a special Russian wheat aphid committee for the Great Plains Agricultural Council.

"Counties northeast and southeast of Amarillo have widespread economic infestations, with a considerable number of fields receiving at least one pesticide application, and some more than one," Morrison said.

In the Texas South Plains around Lubbock, infestations and severity are similar to that of the past two seasons, Morrison said. There, the problem is generally widespread, with a number of fields requiring treatment to protect the yields, the Extension entomologist said.

The pest also has moved eastward since last year, with infestation of several additional counties along the eastern fringe. These are Lipscomb, Hemphill, Childress, Wilbarger, Coke, Wichita, Archer and Young counties.

While infestations in the Rolling Plains of Texas haven't yet become economically significant, they could become so under the right combination of climatic conditions, said Emory Boring, Extension entomologist at Vernon.

Nationally, the pest is now

found in 15 states which produce small grains. California is the latest to find the aphid. Others, in addition to Texas, are Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

While harvest of wheat is just beginning in most of this area, estimated economic losses to wheat farmers in the 10 Great Plains states last year exceeded \$50 million. This included loss of yield and costs of efforts to control the aphid.

Meanwhile, the USDA's Agricultural Research Service has announced it will spend about \$800,000 this year to find ways to control the wheat aphid, a pest that damages barley, oats and rye as well as wheat. The insect pest's quick spread and likely continued travels have prompted the new ARS research.

Fair general manager Steve L. Lewis said the Epic Records artists would appear at a 7 p.m. show. The eight-day fair run is scheduled September 24-October 1.

Other shows already announced include Dan Seals and Kathy Mattea, 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. September 24; the Oak Ridge Boys, 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. September 25; Highway 101 and the Sweethearts of the Rodeo, 7 p.m. only September 26 and Exile, 7 p.m. only September 27. The Eight-day fair run concludes October 1.

A graduate of North Texas State University, Murrell is an accomplished guitarist, banjo and piano player who currently resides in Taos, N.M. Adding Compost Can Improve Soil Fertility

Adding organic matter such as compost to soil can improve soil fertility in home gardens, said a soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Organic matter serves to 'open up' a clay soil, thus improving drainage and aeration," said Dr. Michael G. Hickey, soil chemist and director of the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock. Hickey added that in sandy soils, compost increases water holding capacity.

Compost is refuse such as leaves, small prunings, weeds, vegetable matter from the kitchen and grass clippings which have been converted into a "synthetic manure".

"In our region, grass clippings will predominate," said Hickey. He noted that compost from clippings will be high in nitrogen, depending on lawn fertilization practices.

Hickey said that a home gardener can construct a compost pile by spreading out a four-inch layer of refuse in a three-foot square area. They should cover this layer with enough soil to fill a two-pound coffee can. This allows microorganisms from the soil to break down the refuse. To stimulate these microorganisms, a quarter cup of ammonium sulfate fertilizer should be added to the pile. The home gardener should repeat these steps until a desired depth is reached, noted Hickey.

"The pile should be turned in two to three weeks," Hickey said. New clippings which are added should be mixed with the older refuse. A layer of the older material should also be placed over the top.

The compost will be ready in three months or sooner depending on the type of refuse, temperature, or moisture, said Hickey.

To utilize the compost, the home gardener should spread about five bushels of the material over 1000 square feet and mix it thoroughly into the soil, Hickey said.

Boarding Homes

For Seniors To Be

Registered With State

State law now requires many board and lodging homes for the elderly to register with the Texas Department on Aging by Sept. 1, 1988.

This law was passed to give social service agencies at the state and local levels a resource for referring senior citizens or disabled persons to facilities in their area.

Homes that are required to register include all establishments which provide room and board to four or more senior citizens or disabled persons unrelated to the proprietor.

Senior citizens are defined as anyone 60 or older. Disabled persons include anyone with physical or mental impairments that substantially limit their major life activities.

Facilities licensed, inspected and regulated by the Texas Department of Health are exempt from registering with the Department on Aging, as are adult foster homes certified by the Texas Department of Human Services.

All establishments registering as board and lodging homes must add the following statement to their advertisements: "This home is registered with the Texas Department on Aging, but is not inspected, licensed, or otherwise regulated by the State of Texas."

Licensed custodial care and personal care homes may register as board and lodging homes on a voluntary basis. No advertising disclaimers or limitations apply to facilities that are licensed, inspected and regulated by the Health Department.

The Department on Aging registration is good for one year and costs \$10. This amount may change in future years, but the amount can never exceed \$15 without approval by the Texas Legislature.

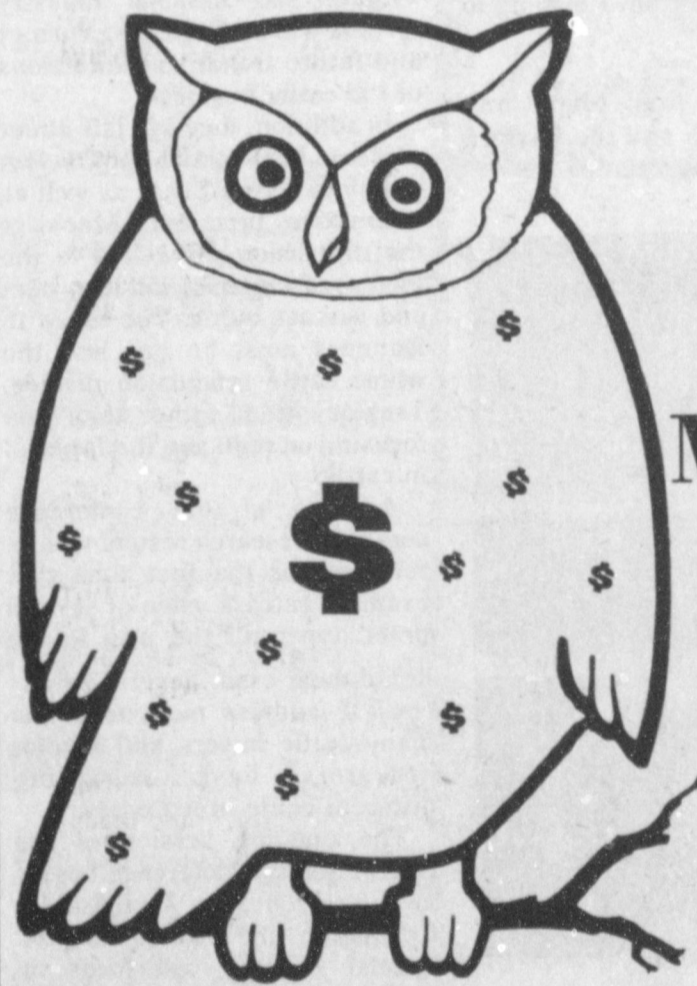

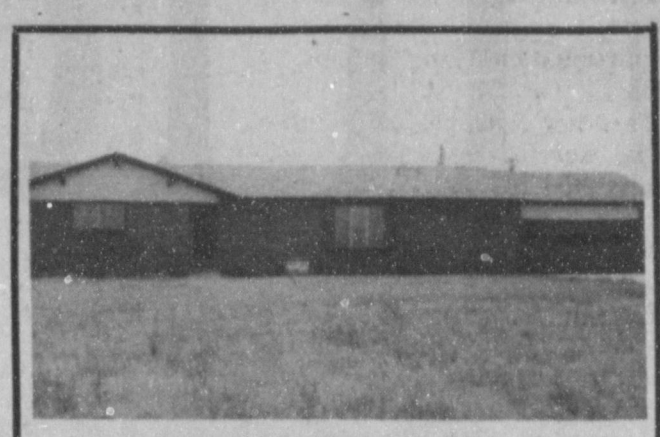


