Former Tahoka Grad, Doug Lawson, Named President of Baylor Hospital

T. Douglas Lawson has been named president of 233-bed Baylor Regional Medical Center at Grapevine. He will begin his new duties on August 20.

"We are pleased to welcome Doug into the Baylor Health Care System family," says Joel Allison, president and chief executive officer. "Baylor Grapevine is undergoing significant expansion and growth at the present time. Doug's background and professional experiences make him an excellent fit with the needs of the medical center."

Lawson, who is from the panhandle town of Tahoka, Texas, has more than 15 years of increasing responsibility in health care administration. Currently, he is senior vice president and chief operating officer for Cabell Huntington Hospital (CHH) in Huntington, W. Va., a position he has held since 2004. He is responsible for all ancillary, clinical and core hospital operations for CHH, which is a 322-bed not-for-profit teaching hospital and regional referral center. While at CHH, Lawson oversaw creation of a comprehensive cancer center and initiated construction of an \$80 million, 110-bed patient tower and emergency department expansion.

Prior to joining CHH, Lawson served as president and chief executive officer of The Cancer Institute, part of the Saint Luke's Health System in Kansas City, Mo., from 1999 to 2004 and concurrently served as System vice president from 1999 to 2002. He was vice president and chief operating officer of the M.D. Anderson Cancer Network in Fort Worth from 1997-1998 and has served as a senior administrator at Northeast Louisiana Cancer Institute in Monroe, La., and Scott and White Memorial Hospital and Clinic in

Temple, Texas.

"My family and I look forward to becoming part of Baylor Grapevine and the Baylor Health Care System," says Lawson. "Being a member of such a high-quality organization is truly an honor and a privilege and I am looking forward to working with the employees and medical staff to build upon the Baylor tradition of excellence for Grapevine and the surrounding communities. We are also excited about returning to Texas and living in Grapevine." He and his wife, Jennifer, have a 2-year-old son.

Lawson is a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives and a member of the Medical Group Management Association. He currently serves as a board member of the Huntington Hospice. He received his bachelor's degree in political science from Texas A&M University in 1990 and his master's degree in health care administration from Trinity University in San Antonio in 1993.

He graduated from Tahoka High School in 1986. He has a brother, Rusty Lawson and wife Julie of Lubbock, and a sister, Deena Ballard and husband Shawn of New Home. His parents are Tommy and Judy Lawson of Lubbock, and Karen and James Taylor, also of Lubbock.

Baylor Regional Medical Center at Grapevine is a full-service, fully-accredited hospital, serving residents in more than 20 cities throughout the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex. The hospital offers advanced medical care for brain and spine conditions, cardiovascular care, intensive care, diagnostic imaging, women's services, neonatal intensive care, sleep disorders and emergency care.

Baylor Health Care System is a network of hospitals, primary care and specialty care centers, rehabilitation clinics, affiliated ambulatory surgery centers and the Baylor Research Institute. One of the largest private-sector employers in Dallas/Fort Worth, Baylor employs more than 16,000 people and has more than 2,700 physicians on its medical staffs. Baylor University Medical Center, flagship hospital of the system, is a major patient care, teaching and research center for the Southwest.

For fiscal year 2006, Baylor Health Care System will report \$405.6 million in community benefit to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

Multiple Sentences Given In Child Sex Abuse Trial

Ambrosio Valero DeLeon, 48, of Pleasanton and formerly of Tahoka, was sentenced to 99 years in prison on a charge of aggravated sexual assault, plus 20 years each on 10 other counts of indecency with a child by a jury in 106th District Court this week.

The trial started with jury selection on Friday and testimony and a ruling of guilty came Monday. Sentence was pronounced by Judge Carter Schildknecht Tuesday.

One traffic accident and two incidents where checks had been altered after they were written were among reports investigated by Tahoka Police during the last week.

On the east access road of U.S. 87 near N. 3rd St. Sunday night a 1994 Mercury Cougar driven by Rebecca Renee Ysasaga, 21, of Tahoka went out of control and struck a utility pole. The driver was taken by EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital, where she was treated for "a possible injury."

Police received complaints from two persons who had written checks to

the same business recently that the checks had been altered by someone putting a "1" in front of the numerical amount. Investigation was continuing.

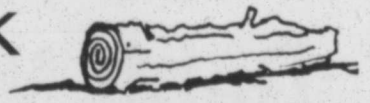
Lynn County jail population remained high this week, as 54 persons were in jail as of Tuesday, including 13 held for Garza County, and three each for Lubbock and Gaines counties.

Four persons were jailed during the week on warrants for possession of drugs, with one of these also charged with intent to deliver a controlled substance and another also charged with failure to appear. Additional charges of possession of controlled substances were listed in the arrests of persons on warrants from McLennan and Lubbock counties. Two persons were charged with tampering with or fabricating physical evidence, and one of these also was held on a grand jury indictment for failure to appear. Another person was arrested on a Hale County warrant for theft by check, and one arrest was made for violating restriction on occupational license.

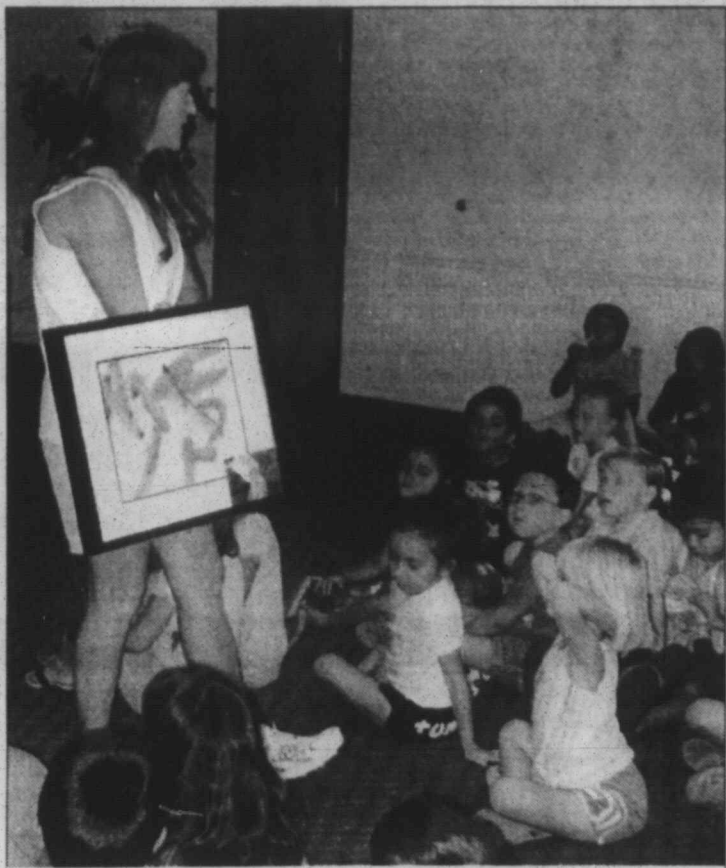

Most Americans Are Unaware Of The Dangers That UV Rays Can Have On The Eyes

Most people know the harmful effects that ultraviolet (UV) rays can have on the skin. But many are not aware of the damage that they can cause to the eyes. Possibly the most frightening aspect of the UV damage is that it is cumulative, meaning the negative effects may not present themselves until years later.

Extended UV exposure has been linked to eye damage including:

Cataract- a major cause of visual impairment and blindness worldwide. Cataracts are a cloudiness of the lens inside the eye that develops over a period of many years. Laboratory studies have implicated UV radiation as a cause of cataract. Furthermore, studies have shown that certain types of cataract are associated with a history of higher ocular exposure to UV and especially UV-B radiation.

Age-Related macular degeneration (AMD)- a leading cause of vision loss in the United States for people age 55 or older. Exposure to UV and intense violet/blue visible radiation is damaging to retinal tissue and scientists have speculated that chronic UV or intense violet/blue light exposure may contribute to degenerative processes in the retina.

Pterygium- a growth of tissue on the white of the eye that

may extend onto the clear cornea where it can block vision. It can be removed surgically, but often recurs, and can cause cosmetic concerns and vision loss if untreated.

Photokeratitis- essentially, a reversible sunburn of the cornea resulting from excessive UV-B exposure. It can be extremely painful for 1-2 days and can result in temporary loss of vision. There is some indication that long-term exposure to UV-B can result in corneal and conjunctival degenerative changes.

Sunglasses should block out 99-100 percent of both UV-A and UV-B radiation and prices vary.

Texas is Third Highest State
For Melanoma Incidence

Almost half of the estimated 60,000 new cases of melanoma projected this year will occur in just ten states, according to information released recently by the American Cancer Society. Since the climates in states where melanoma is diagnosed most frequently - California, Florida, and Texas - are hot and sunny throughout the year, the projections from the American Cancer Society are consistent with research showing that about 65 to 90 percent of melanoma cases are linked to UV exposure.

Estimated New Cases of Melanoma by State per 100,000 People (from Cancer Facts & Figures, 2007, American Cancer Society):

1. California - 6,680
2. Florida - 4,380
3. Texas - 3,860
4. Pennsylvania - 3,120
5. New York - 3,070
6. Ohio - 2,390
7. New Jersey - 2,210
8. Michigan - 2,080
9. Illinois - 2,050
10. Massachusetts - 1,820

Melanoma risk factors include: light skin color, family and/or personal history of skin cancer, presence of atypical moles and freckles and history of severe sunburn occurring early in life. No matter where you live, it's important to be aware of these risk factors and take the necessary measures to prevent skin cancer. The Skin Cancer

Foundation's Skin Cancer Prevention Tips:

- Seek the shade, especially between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.
- Do not burn.
- Avoid tanning and UV tanning booths.
- Use a sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day.
- Apply 1 ounce (2 table-spoons) total of sunscreen to all exposed areas: 30 minutes before going outside. Reapply every two hours or immediately after swimming or excessive sweating.
- Cover up with clothing, including a broad-brimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses.
- Keep newborns out of the sun. Sunscreens should be used on babies over the age of six months.
- Examine your skin from head-to-toe every month.
- See your physician every year for a professional skin exam.

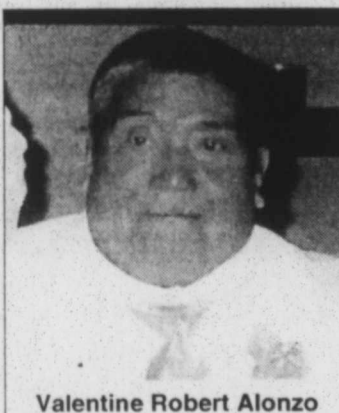
Billy Gene (Bill) Smith

Five Misconceptions
About Immunizations

One of the most important things that you can do for your child is to ensure that his or her immunizations are complete and up-to-date. Vaccines help prevent infectious diseases and they save lives. Here are the five most serious misconceptions today about immunizations for your children:

1. A child can develop autism from immunizations. There is no connection between immunizations and autism. The MMR vaccine, which is given at 12 months of age, has been blamed or autism. True symptoms of autism start to present themselves at that age.
2. Vaccines are not needed anymore because most of the diseases they covered no longer exist. False. The world is a much smaller place these days, because of the speed of transportation. Anyone who carries a virus or a bacteria anywhere in the world can travel to the United States in a few hours and easily spread this infection to people who are not immunized.
3. A child who's not yet weaned doesn't need immunizations.

This is false. Breast milk is the best nutrient available for babies and it does transfer some forms of immunity to newborns. By breast feeding, your baby will have less diarrhea and ear infection, his brain will grow better and he will have less chance of developing asthma and diabetes. But he will not be protected against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles, rubella, polio, Haemophilus B (which can cause ear infection, sinus infection, pneumonia and meningitis, among other diseases) and Hepatitis A&B.

4. Giving a child more than one immunization at a time can be dangerous. False. Research has proven that giving a child several vaccines at the same time is effective and carries no risk.
5. Some vaccines have serious side effects, so it's better not to immunize my child. False. None of the vaccines available today have any serious side effects. Some immunizations may have minor side effects. But this is never comparable to the disease itself.

FEMA Announces Assistance for Texas Counties

More than a dozen Texas counties that were impacted by the recent flooding have been declared disasters by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Residents of these counties are now eligible to apply for aid through the Individual Assistance program. This comes as good news to thousands of Texans who lost homes and personal property because of flood damage. In addition, two 19th District counties - Eastland and Archer - have been declared eligible for assistance programs that will allow those counties to use federal money to repair roads and other critical infrastructure.

FEMA has set up several Disaster Recovery Centers (DRC) where eligible residents can go to learn more about what assistance is available to them. The Eastland DRC is located at 100 Little Maverick Trail. A second DRC has been set up at 1000 Lamar in Wichita Falls and a third in Marble Falls. Before visiting a DRC, individuals should register for assistance by calling 1-800-621-FEMA (3362), or TTY 1-800-462-7585 for those who are hearing or speech-impaired. The FEMA application line is open 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. local time seven days a week, until further notice. You can also register online at www.fema.gov.

Farm Bill Moves to Full House Ag Committee This Week

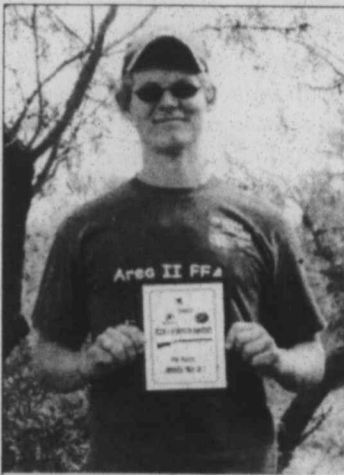
After months of field hearings and work at the subcommittee level, the full House Agriculture Committee will meet this week to put together the 2007 Farm Bill. Going into these negotiations, I have several priorities. The first is to keep in place many of the successful commodity policies from the 2002 Farm Bill that have been good for producers and taxpayers alike. These programs have provided support when commodity prices are low, but have tapered off when prices rise. As a result, producers get support when they need it, and the price tag for commodity programs has come in more than \$20 billion less than what was projected in 2002. A second priority is to maintain my crop insurance proposal that establishes a level of reliability when disasters strike and removes assistance from an unpredictable political process. Finally, the Ag Committee needs to correct the major flaws of mandatory country-of-origin labeling for livestock, and I am working with colleagues to do so. A full review of this week's negotiations will be included in next week's Roundup.

Additional Good News for the Economy

On the heels of the news in recent job growth that came in two weeks ago, we got news last week that the deficit has been trimmed another \$39 billion. Tax relief policies helped kick-start the economy four years ago. The economic growth that has occurred since then has helped produce an increase in

Pages from the Past...

The following excerpts were taken from past issues of THE LYNN COUNTY NEWS.

Friday, Sept. 3, 1937:

Wizard Blindfolded Car Driver Will Stage Stunts At Round-Up Here

F.L. Binda, hailed as the world's renowned "par-optic" driver who has thrilled the people of many cities with his blindfold driving, will appear here the first day of the Round-Up and stage one of the best drives that has ever been witnessed in this part of Texas.

Will he be able to drive this car and walk the fire wall at the tallest building in Tahoka? Well, we will see.

Binda will be here also on the second day of the Round-Up. He proposed to build a wall out of lumber, pour gasoline all over it, set it on fire, and then drive his car through it. "If I make one mistake," he says, "it will be the cuttin' for me and my wife will be looking for a man." This drive will furnish you with packed thrills, chills, and spills that make you dizzy.

Behere both Wednesday and Thursday if you wish to witness all these thrilling stunts. See them, and you will have seen what has been pronounced unbelievable.

Friday, Sept. 3, 1937:

Wear Your Boots!

Tahoka citizens, farmers, and others ... you are urged to wear your boots, sombreros, and other cowboy regalia, whether you are a cowboy or not, next Wednesday and Thursday.

The Round-Up will be reminiscent of the Old West, and all are urged to join the crowd.

Friday, Oct. 22, 1937:

Stewart Recovers Stolen Car, Dog

G.M. Stewart Saturday recovered his stolen car and dog - but the car had been gutted with fire. The dog was making himself at home at a farmhouse near Lamesa, where the car had been almost destroyed and abandoned. A shotgun, a target rifle, and a pistol, which were in the car when it was stolen, have not been recovered. A farmer had found the car Friday and reported to officers.

Mr. Stewart said that the dog had almost beaten out a trail around the car, evidently while it was burning. Why the thieves undertook to burn the car up is unknown, unless it was done in order to destroy all fingerprints.

The car, which was a 1934 Terraplane coupe, with the dog and the guns in it, was stolen from the street early Thursday night while parked near the News office. Mr. Stewart says that it evidently was stolen only a few minutes after he parked it, though it was two or three hours before he found it out. He immediately notified the sheriff, who proceeded to broadcast the theft over this entire portion of the state.

If officers have any clue as to the identity of the thief or thieves, they have not made the fact known.

Friday, Sept. 3, 1937:

Rodeo Performers Already Arriving

"There will be some champions here for the Round-Up, but the local boys are about as likely to take the prizes as anybody," Charlie Copeland, Plains, director of the Round-Up rodeo says. A number of Lynn county boys are expected to enter the events, as well as several from Terry, Yoakum and Gaines Counties, who have never ridden in competition before.

Bill (Hoot) Gibson, who is farming near Tahoka, placed in Madison Square Garden, New York City, in 1932, and also in the Chicago show.

Bob Wilkinson, Throckmorton, is already here. Bob is the 16-year-old wonder rider of the Stamford rodeo, and wears a silver belt which shows he was champion steer rider of the Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico, rodeo in 1936.

Carl Dykes, Fort Worth, rider in many shows was champion steer rider of the Boston rodeo last year, winning \$1,000 in cash and a fine saddle.

But those who know their rodeos say a champ is just another rider when he goes into the arena. In fact, most of them were just "go-devil" cowboys before they made some lucky ride that threw them into the limelight.

The local rodeo committee is composed of Ed Sanders, Judge Tom Garrard, and Boyd Smith.

Friday, Sept. 3, 1937:

Famous Horses Here For Rodeo

Bucking horses from Pecos, Texas, will be used in the Round-Up celebration rodeo here next Wednesday and Thursday.

The first rodeo ever held, it is said, was held at Pecos, and they still "ride 'em high, wide and handsome" down there. In fact, Pecos is noted from Calgary and Winnipeg to Fort Worth and Hermosillo, from Pendleton and

Cheyenne to Madison Square Garden and Boston for its hard bucking ponies.

Wild Brahma steers and bulls from the herd of "Curley" Daugherty of Olton will be used. Fourteen Brahmas will be used in the steer riding contests.

All men who think they are good cow milkers are urged to enter the wild cow milking contest.

Many good roping horses will be here from ranches over this section.

Friday, Oct. 22, 1937:

Tonight they present "In the Wrong Bed," with a merchants' matinee at 3 p.m. Saturday. The tickets with 5¢ will admit you and you get your tickets at Davis Café, Craft's Tailor Shop, and Piggly Wiggly. The farewell show Saturday night is a 4-act Western comedy, "The Cowboy, Indian, and the Lady." Following this there will be a big Swing High and Shake Low Show at 10 p.m. Any seat 10¢ and 15¢ for the late show.

Sales Tax Holiday Set Aug. 17-19

State Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the date for the annual sales tax holiday has changed from the first week-end of August to the third week-end of August. Combs also said backpacks, a standard item on many kids' school supply lists, can now be purchased tax free during the sales tax holiday.

"From now on, the sales tax holiday will occur on the third Friday, Saturday and Sunday of August," Combs said. "This year, the date is Aug. 17-19."

Since many school districts are now starting their school year later, the 80th Legislature changed the date of the sales tax holiday to move it closer to the first day of school.

During the sales tax holiday, children's and adults' clothing and shoes priced less than \$100 — and now backpacks that cost less than \$100 — are exempt from state and local sales taxes.

"The Legislature responded to parents' requests to add backpacks to the list of tax-exempt items," Combs said. "Backpacks can be expensive, especially for parents who have to buy them for several children. A tax break helps."

Combs also announced that, starting in May 2008, energy-efficient appliances will be exempt from sales tax during the three-day Memorial Day week-end. Certain appliances with a federal Energy Star rating will be tax-free, including washing machines, dishwashers, ceiling fans, dehumidifiers, programmable thermostats and incandescent fluorescent light bulbs. Air conditioners priced at \$6,000 or less and refrigerators priced at \$2,000 or less can also be purchased tax free.

"Texas consumers will save about \$8 for every \$100 they spend on qualifying appliances," Combs said. "Even more importantly, they will reap savings on their utility bills by purchasing energy-efficient appliances, and the demand for electricity will be reduced."

The Comptroller predicts families will save about \$52.1 million in sales taxes during the August sales tax holiday.
