Guilliams Resigning As Director Of Senior Citizens Organization

County Sets Hearing For Tax Increase;

Nancy Guilliams, director of the Lynn County Pioneers, the senior citizens organization headquartered in Tahoka, this week announced that she is resigning that position.

Mrs. Guilliams will have been director of the center here for five years on Sept. 16, which is about the time her resignation will be effective.

She said she is resigning primarily to devote more time to her family. She also admitted that frustration with South Plains Assn. of Governments (SPAG), which allocates state money to the Lynn County facility and about 14 other county senior citizens organizations in this area, is a factor in her

Four Traffic Accidents Reported In County

Three traffic accidents on U.S. 87 north of Tahoka and one collision in the city of Tahoka were reported during the last week, with no apparent serious injuries resulting in any of them, although several persons required treat-

Last Thursday morning near a roadside park four miles north of town a southbound 1997 Cadillac driven by Austin Butler, 92, of Lamesa collided with a 1992 John Deere tractor driven by Isaac Berg of O'Donnell and owned by Todd Lockaby of Tahoka. The car ran under part of the tractor, taking off part of the roof of the car on the passenger side, occupied by Butler's wife, Floristein Butler, 55, who was taken by Lynn County EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital for treatment and released the same day, according to investigating DPS Trooper Veronica Broun, who said speed was a factor in the accident.

About 6 p.m. last Friday a 2001 Mitsubishi Diamante driven south by Marty Guerrero, 18, of Lamesa went out of control after striking water across U.S. 87 five miles north of Tahoka, went into the median, overturned once and came to rest in the northbound lane.

Speed also was a factor in this accident, according to investigating DPS Trooper Quintin Kingham.

Guerrero and three passengers were taken to Lynn County Hospital by EMS ambulances. None of the four were believed to be seriously injured, although one was transferred to a Lubbock hospital. The passengers were Natalie Moreno, Antonio Moreno and Nelia Morales, all of Lamesa.

The third mishap on U.S. 87 was not really classified as a traffic accident, but possible criminal mischief may have been involved, according to an investigating Lynn County sheriff's deputy. David Hernandez, 30, of Tahoka was driving his 2003 Chevrolet pickup 1.7 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 Monday when the steering failed on the front, causing the pickup to go out of control and strike a ditch. Hernandez was taken by EMS ambulance to Lynn County Hospital and then transferred to Lubbock for treatment of a shoulder injury and then released.

Deputy Abraham Vega said the lug nuts on the left front wheel were very loose, causing the steering problem. He said that lug nuts on the other front wheel also were slightly loose, and an investigation revealed that lug nuts on another vehicle owned by Hernandez were discovered to be loose, possibly done purposely by someone.

The collision in Tahoka Saturday resulted in no injuries. At Lockwood and Ave. L a 2002 Chevrolet van driven by Joshua Arriazola, 17, and a 2006 Chevrolet SUV driven by Nathan Paul Garcia, 19, collided.

Deputies this week saw two juvenile females removing two more letters from the "TAHOKA" sign in a small park-like area just north of the city limits and apprehended them after they dropped the letters and ran. The sign previously had lost the first two letters, but the girls denied any knowledge of the earlier thefts. Deputies took the letters K and A which the girls had removed, to the sheriff's office, leaving the sign with only two letters, "HO."

I HAVE HEARD the comment that a person's chances of winning the lottery are about the same as getting struck by lightning. This, of course, is not even close to being true, because a person is much more likely to get struck by lightning than he (or she) is likely to win the lottery, even if they buy a ticket every day.

It's also safe to say that getting hit by lightning is almost certainly to be less fun than winning the lottery.

I learned some things I hadn't previously known about lightning by reading a story in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal about a week ago and by reading a bit more in an encyclopedia. About a thousand people are injured in the United States alone by lightning, and more than 100 are killed. According to the encyclopedia, lightning kills more people in the U.S. each year than hurricanes and tornadoes.

I was acquainted with a young Methodist evangelist who lived in Lubbock, and who had spoken (and played saxophone) in services in Tahoka who was killed by lightning while on an outing in New Mexico several years ago. Some who read this probably know of persons who have been killed or injured by lightning.

According to the news story, the odds are about 300 to 1 (100 to 1 in Florida) that you will be seriously affected by lightning, and that's a lot worse odds than most of us would like to think about.

The encyclopedia noted that thunderstorms are the most common producers of lightning, but it also is produced by other clouds, including snowstorms and sandstorms. I sure didn't know sandstorms could produce lightning. I wish I hadn't read that.

The story noted that if it is 30 seconds or less from the time you see lightning until you hear the thunder, the storm is close enough to be dangerous, and you should take some precautions. A house or fully enclosed structure is the best shelter. Stay away from telephones, appliances and plumbing, and don't watch lightning from windows or doorways. A car with a metal roof and sides is your next best protection; according to the story, it's the metal shell that protects you, not the rubber tires (as I had always heard).

The story also noted that it's safe to be talking on cell phones during a storm, and even listening to an iPod (perhaps, of course, unless someone is singing "You Light Up My Life.")

I have been told that my mind works like lightning. One brilliant flash (which occurred in 1958) and it was gone







They can't fetch a stick, run along with you or hop in your lap greens, collard greens and kale for a quick petting session, but turtles - not usually associated with speed - can become a favorite pet in a hurry.

Turtles continue to grow their entire lives, and some breeds that can start as small as a few inches grow to be over three feet long. For this reason, the reptiles' size must be consid-

A quick education on turtle names: Turtles, which generally refers to the water dwelling species, are also called tortoises and terrapins. Tortoise is generally used to describe a land dwelling turtle, and terrapin is a regional name that is used interchangeably with the other two, she

Turtles can be herbivorous, carnivorous or omnivorous, so they do have unique dietary demards. All turtles, however, need a good source of calcium. such as dark, leafy greens.


"Mustard greens, turnip are all a good source of calcium but iceberg lettuce is not," says Shisk-Saling. "Anything with lettuce in the name generally is not the best choice.

Turtles must also have a steady source of unfiltered UV light. If the turtle stays indoors this must come from a lamp, and it must produce UVA and UVB

If owners choose to let the tortoise sunbathe outdoors, they must respect the fact that these creatures are excellent diggers. so fences must be imbedded into

Before bringing home a turtle. Shisk-Saling suggests people research the different species that are available.

Considering all aspects of owning a tortoise is critical before deciding to get one, especially because of their long life



Texas FSA Seeks Proposals for **New Conservation Initiative**

Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) is asking federal, state and local agencies as well as private or non-profit organizations to submit proposals for a new 500,000-acre Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) program to improve habitat for high-priority wildlife species nationwide. Nearly 40,000 acres has been allocated to Texas.

" "The State Areas for Wildlife Enhancement (SAFE) initiative provides an opportunity to develop grassroots conservation projects to address high priority wildlife needs through habitat restoration," said Rodney Schoppa, Executive Director for the Lynn County FSA. This initiative further extends the positive environmental impacts of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)," With more than 36 million acres enrolled. CRP is the nation's largest, voluntary private-lands conservation program. CRP practices, area and include not only the improve water quality, air qual-

ity and wildlife habitat. SAFE will enable the public, producers, state and federal agencies; non-profit conservation organizations and others to propose areas where new CRP acreage may be established to address the habitat needs of endangered, threatened or highpriority fish and other wildlife species. In addition, conservation practices currently offered under CRP can be fine-tuned under SAFE to improve, connect or create higher-quality habitat to promote healthier ecosystems in areas identified as essential to

effective species management. Proposed SAFE acreage located in counties that have reached the CRP acreage enrollment cap of 25 percent will not

be considered. All proposed acreage for CRP enrollment under the SAFE program must have been cropped or meet FSA's definition of "farmable." four of six years during the period 1996-2001. Proposals should include a thorough description of the proposed project, identify the targeted project monitoring and evalua-

Schoppa emphasized that individual landowners interested in proposing a SAFE plan should consider partnering with other landowners or special-interest groups in order to increase the number of acres proposed for enrollment because approved SAFE plans must, at a minimum. result in a county-wide impact on restoration of habitat for the

"A good proposal will encompass a sizeable geographic target species, plantings and related details, but will offer a monitoring plan that indicates how success will be tracked; the plan will also provide a baseline for where we're at today as well as a vision of where we want be in the future with regard to species restoration," said Schoppa.

Interested entities can submit a SAFE proposal to the local FSA Office or directly to the Texas FSA State Office attention: Sammy Orange, Conservation Chief; PO Box 2900, College Station, Texas 77841. The deadline for receipt of SAFE proposals is August 13, 2007

All SAFE proposals received by Texas FSA will go through a two-tier review process at the state level before being submitted to the national



If the proposed SAFE area is approved, eligible landowners within the SAFE area may enter. into new CRP contracts with USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). Approved program participants will receive an annual CRP rental rate equivalent to soil rental rates for the county plus an annual maintenance payment.

Also, the producer is eligible for cost-share assistance of up to 50 percent of eligible practice installation costs. In addition, producers will be eligible for a one-time payment of \$100 per acre signing Incentive Payment. Producers may also receive a practice incentive payment equal to 40 percent of the eligible establishment costs of the practice.

Gohmert to Lead **Texas NRCS**


Don Gohmert recently assumed the position of state conservationist for USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas.



WHAT IS SLEEP APNEA?

Sleep Apnea (absence of breathing) occurs when you regularly stop breathing for 10 seconds or longer during sleep. Some people may stop breathing 5 to 50 times an hour or more. It can be mild to severe, depending on the number of times an hour you stop breathing.

Sleep apnea is caused by a blockage or narrowing of the airways in your nose, mouth or throat, occurring when the throat muscles and tongue relax during sleep and partially block the airway. This condition may also be caused by bone deformities or larger than normal tissues in your nose, mouth or throat, for example, large tonsils. When you lie down at night, your tonsils can press down on your airway, narrowing it and causing as obesity, certain medications, using alcohol before bed and

sleeping on your back may make you more prone to have sleep

Symptoms of sleep apnea are loud snoring and feeling very sleepy during the day. Perhaps your mate has noticed periods when you stop breathing during sleep. Other symptoms may include tossing and turning during sleep, waking up with a headache and feeling irritated and unrested. Children who have sleep apnea nearly always snore. Other symptoms may include difficulty breathing during sleep and restless sleep during which your child wakes up often.

When you stop breathing during sleep or breathe very slowly during your sleep, there is less oxygen in your blood. This lack of oxygen can lead to high blood pressure, abnormal heart sleep apnea. Other factors such rate, heart failure, coronary artery disease, stroke and more. Sleep apnea can also place you at a higher risk for depression.

> So...if you have difficulty concentrating, never feel rested, you may be suffering from sleep apnea. People with pre-existing medical conditions may have underlying causes, but for others, treatment may be as simple as losing weight, developing good sleep habits and avoiding alcohol and certain medications before bed. 
