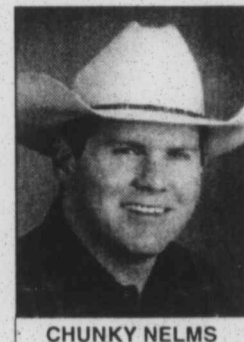

Accident Injures Bicycle Rider

A Lubbock woman riding a bicycle was injured Sunday evening when the bicycle she was riding was struck by a car about four miles north of New Home on FM 1730.

Taken to a Lubbock hospital for treatment was Laura Brown, 27. She was released from the hospital Tuesday, with no apparent major injuries, according to the investigating state trooper, who said the accident occurred about 7 p.m.

Driver of the 1999 Chevrolet Monte Carlo which collided with the bicycle was Jason Holloway, 27, of New Home, who said he did not see the bike rider before the accident.

Last Thursday Tahoka Police were advised of the theft of a spool of copper weld wire from a Lyntegar storage yard on S. 1st St. sometime the previous

night, after the fence was cut. The stolen wire was estimated at a value of \$800.

Police also were advised by a Tahoka man that he had been receiving harassing telephone calls. A similar complaint was received by the sheriff's department from a woman living in the county.

A forged check stolen out of Lubbock was used to pay for gasoline at Allsup's in Tahoka on July 21, police were told this week.

During the month of August, dispatchers at Lynn County sheriff's department processed 244 calls, including 108 for the county, 96 for City of Tahoka, 22 ambulance calls, 10 calls to O'Donnell Police, and eight fire alarms.

New 89-Cent Tax Rate Approved For County

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session last Wednesday morning, Aug. 29, adopting a new tax of .89780 in a unanimous vote by all four commissioners. The rate is two-cents lower than the previous year's rate of .91450 per \$100 of property valuation.

Commissioners also approved the 2007-08 county budget, with anticipated total expenditures of \$3,454,570.

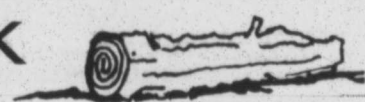
While the tax rate itself is a two-cent decrease, it is considered a property tax increase because the rate will bring in more tax revenue than the

previous year, due to increases in property valuations. No citizens attended the Aug. 20 public hearing regarding the tax rate and budget.

In other business at Wednesday's meeting, monthly bills were approved, and commissioners visited with Joe Grimes and Mike Peters from Preservation Associates regarding the courthouse restoration project.

County Judge H.G. Franklin presided at the meeting, and all four commissioners were present including Don Morton, Don Blair, Mike Braddock and Brad Hammonds.

MAYBE it was because we've had so much more rain around here than usual this year, or perhaps something I read or saw, but whichever, I was wondering the other day about towns which have been buried under water.

I really don't think any of Lynn County's towns are in danger of being completely under water, since Tahoka Lake only gets a couple of feet deep in places during a really wet year, but still I am fascinated by the idea of an entire town sitting far under the surface where only fish can go down the streets and into the buildings where people once lived and worked.

I vaguely remembered reading about a town in Tennessee being submerged, and a check on the internet affirmed that indeed, Butler, in eastern Tennessee, with a population of about 600, was vacated, partly removed and then buried underwater by the Watauga Dam, a Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) project in 1948. In 1983, when a drawdown was conducted to service the dam, the original town was exposed and a stone shoe store and one-room jail of concrete, stood out from the other foundations and building pads along the muddy streets.

What I found out was that many towns all over the United States were buried by new dams which created lakes and reservoirs as part of power projects, mostly in the 1920s, 30s and 40s.

One website listed "drowned towns" by states, including a couple in Arizona (the mining town Alamo Crossing now is under 100 feet of water in Lake Alamo) and even one in New Mexico, the town of Paraje, submerged in Elephant Butte Lake when a dam was built in 1912-16.

Surprising to me was that several towns in Texas were listed, mostly in South Texas when Falcon Dam was built, but one up by Clarendon called Saint's Roost, now under water in the Greenbelt Reservoir. People go there to fish (not me, because fish don't like me), but the website for Greenbelt Lake doesn't mention that there's a town down there under the water. However, there is a Saint's Roost Museum there which includes memorabilia from the town which was drowned in 1968. The lake is about four miles north of Clarendon on Texas Hwy. 70.

California has many towns buried by water projects, including the former booming mining town of Kennett, now under 400 feet of water in Lake Shasta. However, apparently all the towns buried under water in California by these power projects were inundated before the late 1940s, possibly because since then, nothing there has qualified for a major water project.

In other words, not worth a reservoir.

\$7,700 In Scholarships Offered At County Harvest Festival

Students in Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell high schools have an opportunity to win a total of \$7,700 in scholarships at the 2007 Lynn County Harvest Festival, with King and Queen contests open to boys and girls who reside in Lynn County. The Harvest Festival Queen's Contest is sponsoring \$4,200 in scholarships, and the King's Contest is sponsoring \$3,500 in scholarships.

Signups for the Queen and King contest will open Aug. 22, and deadline to enter will be Sept. 4, in order for candidates to have time to sell their tickets. The tickets this year are also new, offering all cash prizes. Tickets are \$1 chances to win one of three prizes - \$1000, \$500, or \$300. Both King and Queen candidates may earn \$100 cash for every 400 tickets they sell.

This year's Harvest Festival

Queen will win a \$2,500 scholarship. The first runner-up will receive a \$1,200 scholarship, and the second runner-up will receive a \$500 scholarship. Any high school girl living in Lynn County may be a contestant (unless married, pregnant or a mother). The contest involves interviews with judges who will base their decisions on personality, poise, appearance, and intelligence. To be a finalist, a candidate must sell at least 250 tickets, but the winners are chosen solely by judges from among those finalists.

The King contest offers a \$2,000 scholarship to the winner, a \$1,000 scholarship to the first runner-up, and a \$500 scholarship to the second runner-up. King candidates will also sell tickets, and must sell 250 tickets to be considered a finalist in the contest. Lynn County businessmen/women will judge this contest, with candidates to present a community service project proposal of their choice, to the panel of judges. The candidates do not have to actually perform a community service, but would present a proposal of what they would like to see done in their community.

Rosary for Sgt. David M. Hartway, 39, of Tahoka was held Wednesday, September 5, at the White Memorial Chapel in Tahoka, Mass. Mass will be at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, September 6, at St. Jude Catholic Church with Father Eduardo Teo officiating. Interment will follow in Nevels Memorial Cemetery, under the direction of White Funeral Home in Tahoka.

After a 5-year courageous battle with a glioblastoma, Dave passed on August 31, 2007. Dave was born in Pontiac, MI on April 24, 1968 to David Jon and Adlyn (Holtzen) Hartway. They moved from Milford Michigan to Buhl, Idaho when Dave was 9 years old.

Dave proudly served his country in the United States Marine Corps. When he enlisted in the delayed program in 1985, he graduated from Buhl, ID in 1986 and went to boot camp after graduation. Dave was honorably discharged in 1994 after an injury in Desert Storm. He earned his Associate of Applied Science in Manufacturing Technology from Boise State University, December of 1997.

He married Sandye Martinez in April 1991 in Yuma, AZ. In April 1992 they welcomed Justin Dakota. Shortly after being discharged they moved to Boise, Idaho where they made their home until August of 2005.

Dave and Justin enjoyed many weekend trips to the Idaho Mountains which they called "Father and Son" pow-wows. He enjoyed hunting, camping and always remained loyal to his Detroit Lions, Michigan Wolverines and Detroit Redwings. Dave also served as Sergeant for the Treasure Valley Young Marines program in Boise, Idaho where he and Justin enjoyed father/son quality time in summer/winter encampments. He was a 12-year member of the Disabled American Veterans, and the Marine Corps League. In the many years of chemo treatments, not once did he complain. His motto for a new treatment was always: "Here's to the Good Fight".

Those left to cherish his memories are, his wife Sandye and son Justin of Tahoka; two sisters, Sheri and husband Gene Close, Kristi and husband Garner Williams, all of Kuna, Idaho; one brother, Jon and wife Jennifer Hartway of Pasadena, Maryland; mother-in-law, Gloria Gonzales of Tahoka; brother-in-law, Tanner Montalvo of Tahoka; sister-in-law, Monica and husband Jeff Parker of

Tahoka; numerous nieces, nephews, cousins, aunts and uncles. He also leaves behind, many dear close friends whom he considered family.

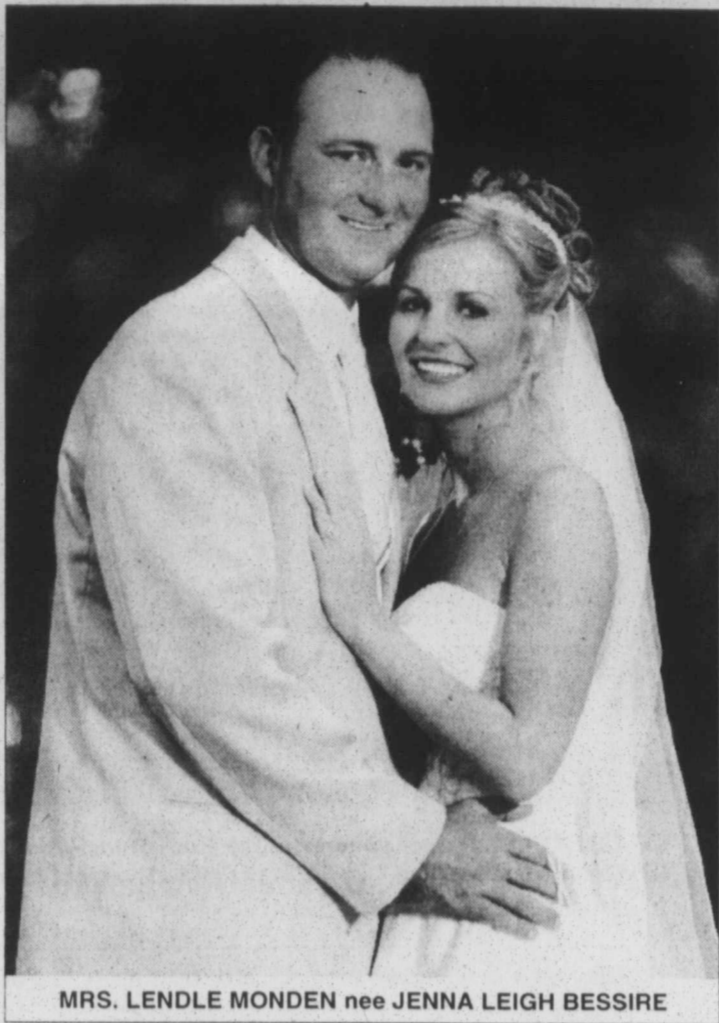
Farm Bureau Hosting 1st Annual Scholarship Golf Tournament Here

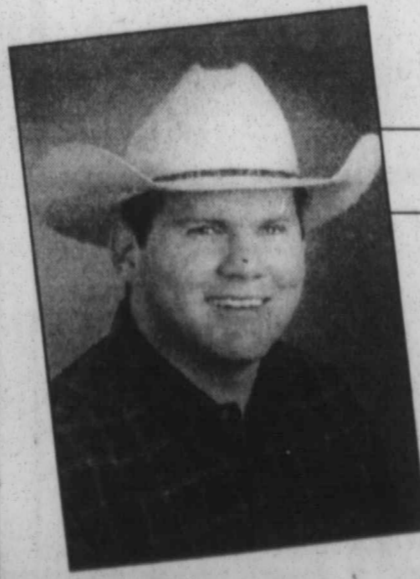

New Traffic, Criminal Laws Went Into Effect Sept. 1

Texas Department of Public Safety released the following information on notable traffic and criminal laws that go into effect on September 1 (unless noted otherwise).

HB 84, known as Katie's Law, requires drivers 85 years of age and above to pass a vision test to have their driver license renewed. Licenses will be valid for two years instead of six. Drivers age 79 and older are not allowed to renew their driver licenses electronically.

HB 586 prohibits a driver who is issued a speeding ticket and found guilty of driving at a speed higher than 95 miles per hour from taking a driving safety class to dismiss the ticket.

SB 369 prohibits the use of blurring or reflective matter on a license plate that significantly impairs the readability of the state name and license plate numbers and letters; prohibits the use of material or an apparatus that alters or obscures one-half or more of the state name; and prohibits using material that obscures the license plate number or plate color.

SB 153 makes it an offense for the accompanying licensed passenger of a driver with a learner's permit to sleep, be intoxicated or to engage in any activity that prevents the passenger from observing and responding to the actions of the driver of the vehicle.

SB 112 (effective April 27, 2007) protects the right to bear arms during a declared disaster or emergency by prohibiting law enforcement officers from confiscating firearms during such emergency periods.

HB 8, known as Jessica's Law, imposes a 25-year minimum sentence for sexually violent offenses against children under 14 years of age; eliminates eligibility for parole for certain sex offenders; makes a second conviction of a sexually violent offense against a child under 14 years of age a capital felony; mandates global positioning system (GPS) monitoring for offenders committed under the sexually violent predator statutes; extends the statute of limitations for sexually

violent offenses against children under the age of 14 to 20 years past the victims' 18th birthday; and clarifies that harboring a sex offender in violation of registration is an offense punishable by up to a third degree felony.

SB 6 increases the penalty for sexually explicit online communication with a minor who is 14 to 16 years old from a state jail felony to a third degree felony and increases the penalty for online sexual solicitation of a minor who is 14 to 16 years old from a third degree felony to a second degree felony.

HB 3849, effective June 15, 2007, creates new vehicle registration requirements for all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and a penalty if an ATV is driven on public property while the driver and passengers are not wearing required safety apparel.

SB 1315 requires DPS to develop an alert system for missing senior citizens similar to the current Amber Alert Program for abducted children.

HB 323 requires all new buses purchased by a school district on or after September 1, 2010 to be equipped with lap/shoulder seatbelts. All buses contracted for use by a school district on or after September 1, 2014 must be equipped with lap/shoulder seatbelts. (The bill's provisions will not take effect unless the legislature appropriates the necessary funds to school districts to cover the expenses of such changes.)

HB 1815 excludes from unlawful carrying of a weapon a person who is carrying a handgun, illegal knife, or club on the person's own premises or premises under their control or inside of or directly en route to a motor vehicle that is owned by the person or is under their control. The bill makes it an offense to carry a handgun in a motor vehicle that is owned by the person or under the person's control if the handgun is in plain view or the person is engaged in certain criminal activity, is prohibited from possessing a firearm, or is a member of a criminal street gang.

HB 3190 prohibits persons who have committed offenses such as vehicular manslaughter, driving under the influence, and leaving the scene of an accident from operating a school bus for 10 years after the offense; requires school bus operators to wear seat belts if the operator's seat is equipped with such restraints; prohibits the operation of a school bus if the number of persons inside the bus exceeds the manufacturer's design capacity for the vehicle or if the bus' door is open; authorizes a school bus operator to prohibit a passenger from standing or sitting on the floor of a bus or anywhere that is not a seat; requires a school bus evacuation training program and requires a school district to train all of its students and teaching staff in the process of emergency school bus evacuation at least twice a year.

SB 1287 requires certain establishments that sell alcohol to post specific notification regarding the offense of human trafficking in both English and Spanish along with the number, to the national human trafficking hotline.

SB 3613 creates a statewide standard for peace officer identification cards, including ID cards for reserve law enforcement officers and honorably retired peace officers.

SB 331 (effective May 14, 2007) increases the maximum length for saddle mount commercial vehicle transporter combinations from 75 to 97 feet.

SB 378, known as the "Castle Doctrine," removes the requirement that persons attempt to retreat before using deadly force to defend themselves.

HB 2112 prohibits a person from intentionally exhibiting, using or threatening to exhibit or use a firearm while on public or private school property (including in a school parking lot), or while on a school bus being used to transport children to or from school-sponsored activities.

SB 332 authorizes the state to prohibit a motor carrier from operating in intrastate commerce if the U.S. Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration has prohibited the carrier from operating in interstate

commerce because it is deemed unfit or unsafe.

SB 387 redefines "loose material" in Transportation Code Chapter 725 by adding the term "refuse," which is defined as "trash, rubbish, garbage, or any other discarded material." It also deletes existing statutory language that exempts a vehicle operated at a speed less than 30 miles an hour from application of this chapter.

SB 545, HB 1638 and HB 2077 added more than 40 municipal police departments to those police agencies eligible to have DPS train their peace officers to become certified to enforce commercial motor vehicle safety standards.

HB 1766 makes a state jail felony of the theft of wiring or cable that consists of at least 50 percent aluminum, bronze, or copper metals and that has a value of less than \$20,000.

SB 244 authorizes a district or appellate court to seal an affidavit when there is compelling state interest for doing so, such as to prevent destruction of or tampering with evidence in a criminal investigation.

HB 991 (effective May 23, 2007) makes confidential DPS records about who holds a concealed handgun in Texas. Criminal justice agency officials still have to access this information.

SB 9 (effective June 15, 2007) requires a national criminal history background check for all certified public school employees; prevents individuals from employment with a school district if they have been convicted of a Title 5 Penal Code felony offense; or a sex offense when the victim of the crime was a child, a primary school student, or secondary school student; and creates a clearinghouse at DPS for criminal history background information on public school employees so this information can be shared between school districts.

HB 233 provides a concealed handgun license fee waiver for active duty military members and honorably discharged veterans within one year of their discharge from the military service.

HB 1241 requires any private security business to maintain criminal histories of its security personnel on file at the business and to make them available for inspection by DPS.

HB 1355, known as Lillian's Law, requires all dog owners to properly secure their dogs on their property. The law provides that a dog owner can be held criminally responsible if the dog causes serious bodily injury or death at a location other than the owner's property in an unprovoked attack during which the owner by criminal negligence failed to secure the dog. It exempts many dog professionals (including peace officers) who deal with dogs on a regular basis from the bill.

HB 1839 requires concealed handgun license (CHL) holders to take a continuing education course to renew their CHL every 10 years instead of every five years.

SB 502 increases the minimum liability coverage amounts for automobile insurance. The first increase applies to motor vehicle liability insurance policies issued or renewed after January 1, 2008. A second, larger increase in motor vehicle liability insurance coverage takes effect on January 1, 2011.

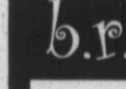

WEST NILE VIRUS

The West Nile virus is an infection spread by certain mosquito species. These mosquitoes are infected by birds with the West Nile virus. The mosquitoes spread the virus to humans. Most West Nile virus infections cause no symptoms or mild symptoms that humans do not realize they have been infected. Mild symptoms include fever, tiredness, body aches, headache, skin rash, and swollen lymph nodes on occasion. Symptoms can last from 3-6 days.

On rare occasions, West Nile virus can lead to inflammation of the brain (encephalitis), spinal cord (myelitis), and the tissues surrounding the brain and the spinal cord (meningitis). More severe symptoms include headache, high fever, stiff neck, reduced attention to surroundings, disorientation, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, paralysis, and coma. With these more severe infections, symptoms can last for weeks to months.

Infected mosquitoes not only spread the virus to humans but to animals as well. These animals such as horses cannot spread the virus to humans and humans cannot spread the virus to other humans through casual contact.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported 3,830 cases of West Nile virus infection in 2006 in the United States with 119 cases resulting in

deaths.

Anyone exposed to mosquitoes can become infected with the virus. People usually recover fully from the West Nile virus but permanent problems may develop especially in children and older adults. They may develop seizures, memory loss, personality changes, paralysis, tremors, brain damage, walking or balance problems, or similar symptoms to Parkinson's disease.

When dealing with West Nile virus, prevention is your best bet. Fighting mosquitoes will reduce your chances of getting this disease. The steps below will reduce your risk:

- Use insect repellent containing DEET (look for: N,N-diethyl-metaltoluamide).
- Wear long sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors.
- Avoid mosquito peak hours from dusk to dawn.
- Drain standing water because mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water.
- Install or repair window and door screens to keep mosquitoes from coming indoors.
- Report dead birds to local authorities.
- Keep your neighborhoods clean and free of standing water.

So, protect yourself and others by following these simple steps to help reduce the chances of infection with the West Nile virus.

Cotton Program Referendum Sign-up Begins Sept. 4 at FSA

Cotton producer and importers who want USDA's Agriculture Marketing Service (AMS) to conduct a referendum regarding the Cotton Research and Promotion Program can sign-up at their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office September 4, through November 30, 2007. No action is necessary if a continuance referendum is not desired.

"This sign-up period allows eligible cotton producers and importers to request a referendum for continuation of the 1990 amendments to the Cotton Re-

search and Promotion Act," said Rodney Schoppa, Executive Director for Lynn County FSA.

In March 2007, following a comprehensive mandatory five-year review, USDA endorsed continuation of the 1991 Order amendments without a continuance referendum.

This sign-up period is significant because, "If results of the sign-up period show that at least 10 percent (4,622) of the voting program participants request the conduct of a continuance referendum, then a referendum will be held within 12 months of the

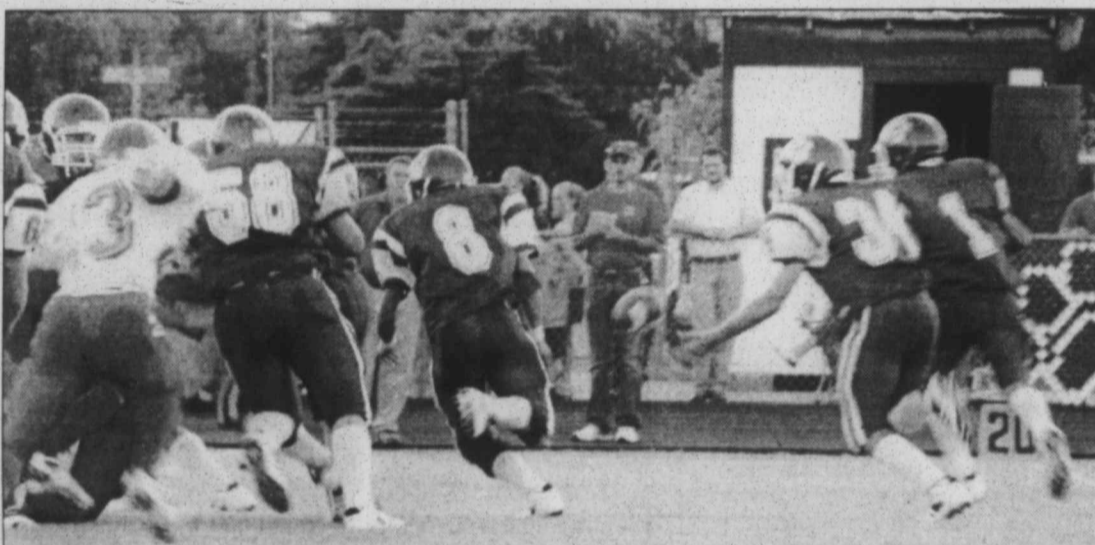
sign-up period end date," said Schoppa.

Changes to the Cotton Research and Promotion Program were approved in a July 1991 referendum, by a 60 percent majority of cotton producers and importers who voted. These changes included: (1) importer representation on the Cotton Board, the organization that assists the Department in administering the Cotton Research and Promotion Program; (2) assessments levied on imported cotton and cotton products; (3) increasing the amount the Department can be reimbursed for the conduct of a referendum from \$200,000 to \$300,000; (4) reimbursing government agencies

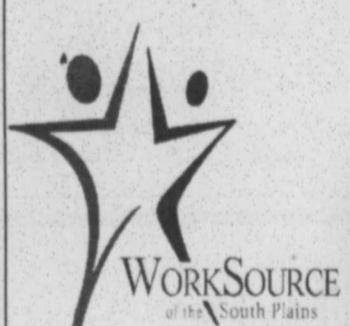
that assist in administering the collection of assessments on imported cotton and cotton products; and (5) terminating the right of cotton producers to demand a refund of assessments.

According to Schoppa, eligible producers are individuals over age 18 engaged in the production of upland cotton during calendar year 2006. Eligible importers are those who imported upland cotton in excess of the value of \$2.00 per line item entry during calendar year 2006. Schoppa advises that other eligibility requirements might apply and eligibility will be determined by FSA.
