Draw Methodist To Celebrate 100th Anniversary on Oct. 14

One hundred years ago, 7 Draw residents asked the United Methodist Conference to establish a Methodist Church in the small community.

One hundred years later, about 10 people regularly attend Sunday morning services at Draw United Methodist Church. On Sunday, Oct. 14, 2007, Draw Methodist Church will celebrate their 100th anniversary with special services and events, and all area residents are invited to participate. The Draw church is located on FM 1054 at Draw, 12 miles northeast of O'Donnell and about 22 miles southwest of Tahoka.

"We are so excited to mark our 100th year with our Bishop Max Whitfield and descendants of the families who have made this anniversary possible," said Fern Caswell Barnes.

The Caswells moved to Draw in 1926. Mrs. Barnes has attended the Draw Methodist Church for 81 years. Church members will have coffee

and donuts available at 8:30, Sunday, Oct. 14. Services will begin at 9:15 a.m. Following Bishop Whitfield's sermon and departure, church members and friends will relate their experiences growing up with in the Draw Methodist Church.

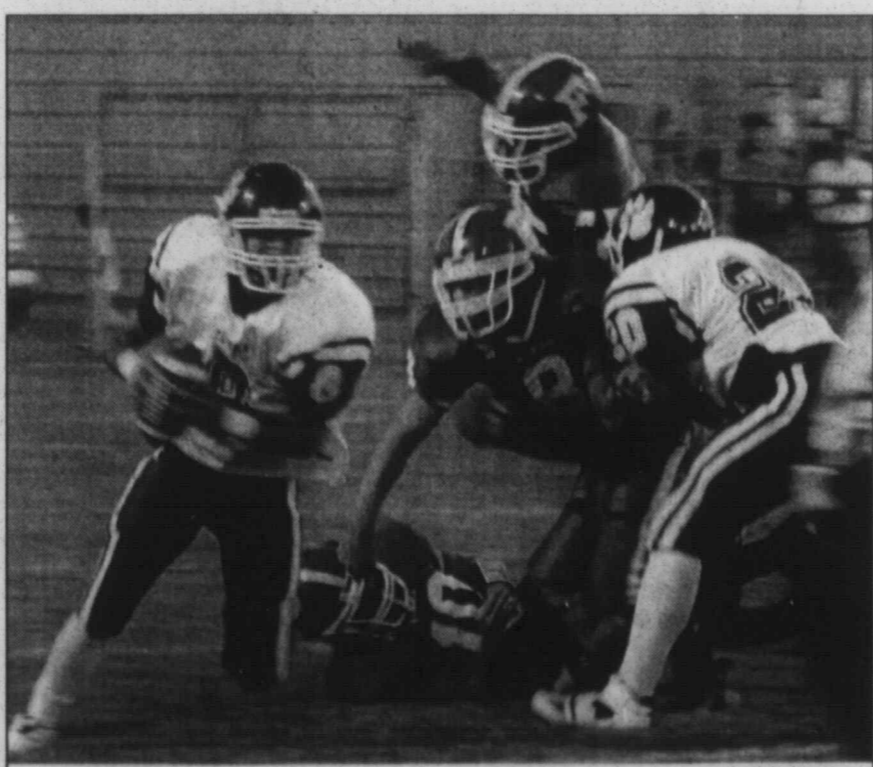
"There are families who have given their all to make sure this church kept going during the Depression, during the drought in the 50's, and when the population dropped. We are planning to pay homage to these families during a time of joyous celebration," said Mrs. Barnes.

A luncheon at the O'Donnell Community Center will follow the services at Draw.

"We appreciate the O'Donnell Methodist Church for helping us with this meal. They are a wonderful group of people who share the pastor and their pianist with us. They also voted to cancel their Sunday services and join us at Draw for our 100th anniversary on October 14th," added Mrs. Barnes.

First Bale Reported

Burglar At High School Scared Off

A would-be burglar who used a screwdriver to gain entry to Tahoka High School early Tuesday morning fled the scene after he was spotted by a school employee who was working late past midnight Monday.

Band Director Carroll Rhodes said that when he noticed an office door open and went to check it out, a male suspect ran out of another office, down some hallways and out of the building. Several officers called to the scene searched the area for a couple of hours but could not locate the suspect.

Police also talked with two teenagers and a 12-year-old who reportedly stabbed a 12-year-old boy with pens on the Tahoka Elementary School playground Sunday.

On Friday police arrested a 61-year-old Tahoka man for disorderly conduct and retaliation after breaking up a fight involving several persons. A 21-year-old Tahoka female and a 24-year-old Brownfield man were arrested Thursday in relation to a dispute over a welfare check and some outstanding warrants, and a 25-year-old Tahoka man was arrested Saturday on a warrant related to drug possession.

At O'Donnell Thursday, a man was seen cutting an air hose at Allsup's; he claimed the device took his money and gave him no air.

The sheriff's department also was advised of a car burglary at Wilson, where a 1992 Buick owned by Clyde Wilke was burglarized Friday night. Stolen were stereo equipment and 20 CDs, while the car was parked at Wilson school.

Forty-four persons were being held in Lynn County jail this week, with 14 of those held for Garza County, three for Gaines and two for Lubbock. Charges on which the latest inmates were arrested included disorderly conduct, contempt of court, theft by property, grand jury indictment for burglary of a building, driving under influence, failure to identify fugitive, hinder apprehension, furnishing alcohol to a minor, retaliation, driving while license invalid, driving while intoxicated, theft by check, public intoxication, Bell County warrant, felony DWI, application to revoke probation on conviction of possession of a controlled substance.

In September, dispatchers at Lynn County sheriff's department answered 263 calls, including 135 for the county, 90 for Tahoka, 17 for O'Donnell, 14 ambulance calls and seven fire alarms.

I READ last week that wine-makers are starting to use metal screw-caps on even their expensive wines because cork often eventually deteriorates, ruining the wine. The story said this trend could kill the cork-making industry and lead to cork trees being uprooted, "wiping out habitat for some species."

I've never seen a cork tree (I can almost hear my sister down in south Texas saying, "Of course not—out there in West Texas you've probably never seen any kind of tree.")

The story said cork trees grow in Portugal, Spain, Morocco and Algeria, and the cork producers have pumped lots of dollars into research and promotion for cork, again painting the issue as an environmental one, claiming some species will maybe go extinct because they have no place to live.

So what kind of species lives in cork trees? Maybe something called a cork-popper. I have this vision of bleary-eyed winos living in trees.

It is traditional for expensive wine to come in bottles with corks, or so I am told. The wine mentioned in the story sells for \$320 a bottle, and some people apparently buy it as an investment, keeping a case of it around for as long as 15 years before breaking it out for some special occasion like the appearance of Halley's Comet or Aunt Callie finally getting a boyfriend.

Anyway, even if I liked wine that much, I doubt I would pay \$320 a bottle for a case of something to be kept around for years before anybody drank any of it.

Seems to me that the last wine I bought was something called Mogen-David, and I got about a quart of it for 98 cents back when I was in college. And we probably didn't keep it around for several years. I'm pretty sure it had no cork.

The winemaker quoted in the story said that in an average 15-year-old case of wine with corks, two bottles would be pure, two would be ruined, and the rest somewhere in between.

There are some who say that a little wine is good for you. Maybe that's why I don't drink it any more. I try to avoid things that are good for me.

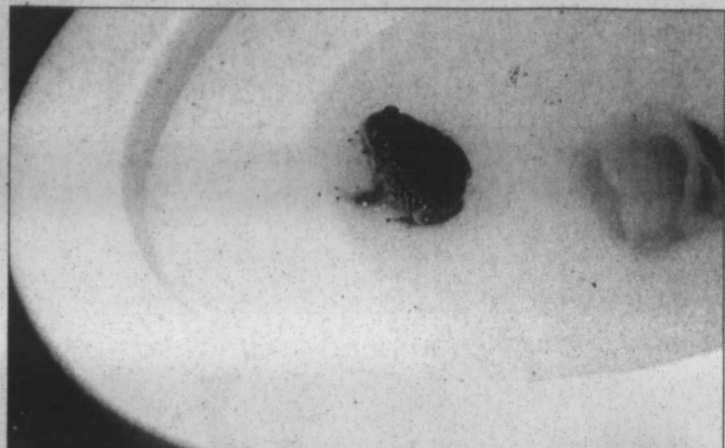

Firemen's Fish Fry Set Here Friday

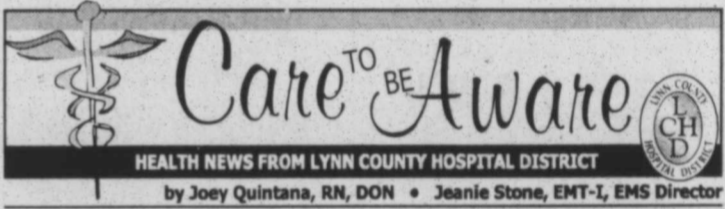
The Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department's annual Fish Fry will be held this Friday, Oct. 5, beginning at approximately 6 p.m. at the Tahoka Mini Park, behind City Hall. The department will sound the fire whistle when the meal is ready for serving. All area residents are invited to the fund-raising event, with proceeds benefiting the local fire department.

Firemen will be preparing cornmeal-batter fried fish along with fried potatoes and onions, hush puppies, cole slaw, bread

and a drink. Cost of the meal is a minimum \$5 donation - or they will accept more if anyone desires to give. All proceeds from the fish fry will be used to purchase equipment for the department's fire trucks.

All plates will be in carryout containers, and there are picnic tables available at the mini-park, or bring lawn chairs or blankets for seating.

The Tahoka VFD is comprised of 20 volunteer firefighters, with Math Bartley as chief.



CHRONIC OBSTRUCTIVE PULMONARY DISEASE (COPD)

Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is a lung disease that makes it difficult to breathe. COPD is caused by damage to the lungs over many years and is usually from smoking.

COPD is the 4th leading cause of death in the United States and the numbers continue to rise;

COPD is a mixture of two diseases: chronic bronchitis and emphysema. Chronic bronchitis is the inflammation of the bronchial tubes. The bronchial tubes carry air to the lungs. Along with the inflammation, the bronchial tubes also produce a lot of mucus narrowing or blocking the airways, making it difficult to breathe.

Emphysema is a chronic, irreversible lung disease that occurs when the tiny air sacs in the lungs are damaged and cause shortness of breath.

There are several factors causing COPD over a long period of time and they include:

- Smoking
 - Chemical fumes
 - Dust
 - Air pollution
 - Secondhand smoke
- COPD symptoms include:
- A long-lasting cough

Mucus that comes up when you cough

Shortness of breath that gets worse when you exercise

COPD exacerbation occurs when your symptoms get much worse. An exacerbation can range from mild to life-threatening. The longer you have COPD, the worse these exacerbations will be.

COPD can be diagnosed with a physical exam, health history, chest X-ray, and spirometry testing to find out how well your lungs work.

Your physician can prescribe treatments that may help you manage your COPD symptoms and feel better.

There are many things you can do to stay as healthy as you can including:

- Quit smoking
- Get the flu and pneumonia vaccines
- Avoid smoke, pollution, and cold, dry air
- Use an air conditioner or air filter in your home
- Take rest breaks during the day
- Get regular exercise to stay as strong as you can
- Eat well so you can keep your strength up

Staying healthy will prevent more damage to your lungs, help reduce COPD exacerbations, and make you feel better.

SUBJECT: QUARTERLY FLUORIDE NOTIFICATION

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has notified the City of Wilson water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL for Fluoride at 4mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 3.8 MG/L.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in the developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

The City of Wilson has inquired about getting a Reverse Osmosis plant to deal with this problem and without the help from grants this system has been too costly to put in at this time. The City is also looking for alternative water supply sources.
