Commissioner Appointed ... Keith Wied (right) was sworn in as Lynn County Commissioner Precinct 1 by Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin Tuesday morning in the District Courtroom at the Lynn County Courthouse. Wied was appointed by the judge to fill the position after the death of Commissioner Don Morton. He will serve the remainder of Morton's term, through 2008. Wied, who lives in Wilson, produces cotton in Lynn County. Both the Pct. 1 and Pct. 3 commissioner seats will be on the ballot in 2008, with filing for the seats opening in December 2007.

Tahoka Band Among

Tahoka High School 3-D Band performed at the State UIL Marching Contest in San Antonio Monday, Nov. 5, along with 17 other 2A schools in Texas. The Tahoka band did not advance to the finals, but Tahoka fans are proud of their band for setting a landmark in school history by getting to the state contest for the first time ever.

There were 18 bands performing in the 2A state marching contest, culled from among more than 1300 2A bands in the state of Texas. Tahoka was ranked #15 in the state - a great accomplishment for the 3-D Band (which stands for Darin', Dreamin', and Doin'). Directors Carroll Rhodes and Johnathan Smith led the 80-member band in their history-making debut at the state contest.

Tahoka marched at 4:15 p.m. Monday afternoon in the Alamodome, behind Queen City High School Band, who went on to win the 2A championship title, according to information on the UIL website.

There were five judges who ranked the bands' performances, from 1 through 18. Tahoka's scores ranged from 6 to 15, with a composite score that brought them to #15 in the 2A class. Industrial High School in Vanderbilt, a 2A school that Tahoka has faced in basketball playoffs, ranked just head of Tahoka as #14 hand.

"Our band performed very well. and Tahoka can be proud of their performance," said one parent who attended the event. "Almost all of the seven finalist bands were much bigger bands than ours, many of them with additional performers like flag routines, rifle corps, and even ballet-type dancers in one case. It was a great opportunity for our kids to see what other bands are doing, and they can bring back what they learned there,"

New Home ISD Voters Approve \$1.25 Tax Rate

New Home Independent School District voters approved a school tax rate of \$1.25668 in a rollback election held in conjunction with Tuesday's constitutional amendment election, voting 51-26 in favor of the tax rate. It was the first rollback election held in Lynn County in many years, if ever, to determine a tax rate for a school dis-

New Home ISD officials asked voters to approve a tax rate that was 15cents above the rollback rate of \$1.10 in the school district. The \$1.25668 tax rate includes a Maintenance & Operating (M&O) rate of \$1.17 and an additional \$.08668 rate for Interest & Sinking (I&S) to pay bonded indebtedness. Last year's school tax rate was \$1.45668. If the vote had failed to pass, the New Home ISD tax rate would have automatically dropped to the rollback rate of \$1.106745 for both M&O and

The new tax rate will bring \$135,319 of additional revenue to the school district, for a total revenue of \$1,844,033, to fund a budget of \$1,844,

Property tax statements for New Home ISD, postponed until after the election results, will be mailed as soon as possible to property owners, according to information from the Lynn County Appraisal District.

In Tuesday's Constitutional Amendment election, 254 voters in Lynn County cast ballots on the 16 proposed amendments, all of which reportedly passed statewide. Four of the propositions failed to pass Lynn County voter approval, however, including Prop. #15 for \$3 million in bonds for cancer research, Prop. #16 for Texas Water Development Board bonds for assistance to economically distressed areas, Prop. #12 for Texas Transportation Commission bonds for highway improvement projects, and Prop. #4 for bonds for maintenance and improvement projects for several state

County Commissioner Don Morton Dies

Don Morton, 66, Lynn County Commissioner of Precinct 1, succumbed to a long-term battle with cancer last Thursday, Nov. 1. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at First Baptist Church in Wilson.

Morton had served 10 years as county commissioner, beginning his term in January 1997. During his tenure as commissioner, Morton was a key force in implement-

ing improvements for Lynn County, including a new 48-bed jail and Law Enforcement Center that opened in 2002. He was an avid supporter of the restoration/renovation grant project for the county courthouse, which is currently under consideration by the Texas Historic Commission's Courthouse Preservation Program.

A lifelong citizen of Wilson and owner of Morton Manufacturing, Morton also served his community as a city council member, and as Mayor of Wilson from 1982-1985. He was a member of the Wilson Lion's Club and First Baptist Church in Wilson, and had served in the U.S. Marine Corp.

He is survived by his wife, Peggy. a son, Craig of Idalou, a daughter, Angie Taylor of Leander, four grandchildren, and two sisters.

Visit Health Fair Today

Flu shots and a variety of health tests and information will be offered today (Thursday) at a County-Wide Adult Health Fair from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. at The Center for Housing and Community Development, located at 1400 Ave. K in Tahoka. The event is sponsored by Lynn County Hospital District, and healthcare officials will be on hand to answer questions and visit with attendees. Admission is free.

Flu shots will be available at a cost of \$15 (free for Medicare beneficiaries who bring their cards). All other health testing will be offered at no charge. including bone density tests, hemoglobin, blood pressure and oxygen saturation level tests, and glucose and cholesterol tests. Hearing and vision testing will also be offered, although the vision tests will not begin until 11:30 a.m.

A blood drive is also being held in conjunction with the health fair, with the mobile unit outside the building during the event.





Library Takes Advantage Of Prestigious Grant

The City-County Library of Tahoka is taking advantage of the prestigious 2006 Texas Book Festival Grant by updating the Book Festival passed the \$2 million mark in total grant funds awarded to Texas public libraries. In 2006 alone, the Texas Book Festival raised \$200,000 and those funds have been awarded to 60 libraries throughout the state. The grant for the forts.' City-County library was in the amount of \$2,500.

"A few months ago we weeded our non-fiction section. getting rid of out-of-date and tattered books," said Claudia Guin. Library Director. "The result of that weeding left us woefully short of needed non-fiction titles. This funding will help us replace standard materials and add new ones to the collection."

Circulation of audio books at the library has increased approximately 140% since 2004. According to Guin, more people are taking advantage of the format while traveling or going about their day-to-day lives.

Since the biggest part of the library's audio catalog was on cassette tape, new compact discs will replace old titles, and new titles will be added.

"We are so grateful to the Texas Book Festival for awarding us this grant," said Guin. "With library funding so limited. the majority of public libraries in the state apply for this grant -it's very competitive. We feel very fortunate that the Texas Book Festival Grant Committee felt we were deserving of their ef-

The Texas Book Festival celebrates authors and their contributions to the culture of literacy, ideas, and imagination. In late 1995, Laura Bush convened a task force to plan a book festival that would promote the joys of reading and to serve to benefit public libraries. The Effects of Energy Drinks

There are many types of energy drinks on the market. I recently looked at the variety that our local stores provide and found it staggering. There were many that I'd never heard of, much less tried. Coke machines used to have cokes. Now they contain many different sodas. juices, different flavors of water and energy drinks.

Most of these energy drinks are loaded with caffeine, sugar and herbal stimulants that can make you more alert. Not only do they make you more alert, they also make your heart beat remarkably faster, putting you at risk of health problems.

Caffeine, the main ingredient in energy drinks, isn't directly toxic to the heart, but if you have almost any type of underlying heart disease, even a small amount of caffeine can stimulate the heart and cause problems. Caffeine can increase your blood pressure and sometimes impair blood flow to your heart, triggering abnormal heart rhythms. Anything that changes your heart rhythm or increases your blood pressure can be life threatening, especially in people who are already considered high

One problem with energy drinks is that they have become popular as mixers for alcoholic beverages, used to counteract drowsiness, allowing you to drink more alcohol. The combination of large amounts of caffeine and alcohol is a dangerous mix, since alcohol alone is known to trigger fast heart rhythms. Mixed together, the danger is doubled. To avoid this serious health risk, even if you don't have heart disease, alcohol and energy drinks skould never be combined.

For athletic activity, it's healthier to drink noncaffeinated. low-sugar beverages to prevent dehydration. If you decide to consume an energy drink, read the label and research how much caffeine it contains. If you have heart disease, be cautious about energy drinks and talk to your doctor. 

Basketball Season Opens Tonight


