## **County Schools Listed Among Best High Schools In America**

Tahoka

All four schools in Lynn County made a national magazine's list of the best high schools in America, according to the U.S. News & World Report, who ranked schools in a recent issue.

Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell high school campuses all were awarded the Bronze Medal, among 1,086 schools identified for Bronze

Bronze awards in the United States. The U.S. News

& World Report, in collaboration with School Evaluation Services, a K-12 education and data research and analysis business that

provides parents with education data on schoolmatters.com, analyzed academic and enrollment data from more than 18,000 public high schools to find the very best across the country. These top schools were placed into gold, silver, or bronze medal categories

Analysis used data from the 2005-06 school year, using a three-step process. The first two steps ensured that the schools served all of their students well, using state proficiency standards as the measuring benchmarks. In the case of Texas schools, TAKS scores were used in Reading and Math, comparing economically disadvantaged

SAT/ACT scores to determine college readiness. None of the schools I saw listed on the South Plains, including Lubbock-Cooper, were scored high enough in this area to merit a silver or gold medal designation," he added.

Tahoka Superintendent Jimmy Parker said the school district has not received any informa-

> tion regarding the award, but that apparently the analysis used figures from state reports made by the school district. "We are pleased to be among the Bronze Medal schools awarded in a national magazine, but we

have not received a letter, or any specific information other than what is available at the U.S. News & World Report website, about how schools were ranked," said Supt. Parker.

According to the magazine's website, the Top 100 schools in the nation, based on college readiness index analysis, received Gold Medal awards. Silver Medal designations were awarded to schools with a college-readiness index of at least 20, but that are not in the top 100 nationally. Bronze Medal designations were awarded to schools who either did not offer Advanced Placement courses, or who do not achieve a college readiness index of at least 20, but successfully met other two key performance indicator criteria. Wilson school enrollment was listed at 181, with 66.3% of that enrollment designated as minority enrollment, and 69.6% as economically disadvantaged, according to the U.S. (See SCHOOLS, page 3)
