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Burglary, Abuse Of 9-1-1 Reported

tion sticker from a 1994 Chevrolet pickup in New Home on July 4. The pickup owner, Vincente Silva, said the sticker, which expires in March 2009, was stolen from inside the pickup while it was parked at his residence.

Sheriff's officers also took a report from Steve Miller on Saturday that a small quantity of diesel fuel had been stolen from a tank at a location 2-3 miles northwest of Tahoka.

And on Tuesday a 17-year-old Tahoka youth was arrested and jailed after he called 911 to make a false report of a burglary, using what officers described as very profane language. Officers said when the youth was picked up, he apparently was just upset with his girlfriend.

Tahoka Police Friday arrested an 18-year-old Tahoka man on an outstand-

Someone stole the vehicle registraing warrant for burglary of a vehicle.

Dispatchers at the sheriff's office processed 286 calls during June, including 134 for the city of Tahoka, 115 for the county, 20 ambulance calls, eight fire alarms and nine calls for O'Donnell police.

With eight new inmates brought in during the last week, Lynn County jail was home to 39 persons early this week, with 17 of those held for Lubbock County and two for Gaines

Charges bringing the most recent arrests included driving while license invalid, order to modify charge of possession of controlled substance, burglary of a vehicle, driving while intoxicated, child support violation, Potter County warrants on possession of marijuana, and assault/violation of protective order.

Software, Jury Duty Fees **Under County Consideration**


Lynn County Commissioners met Tuesday morning in regular session, with Ed Hazledean from Local Government Solutions (LGS) presenting information about a new software program for the District Clerk's office. The contract discussed was \$594 per month for software in three stations in the District Clerk's office, with that price locked in for a 60-month time period. District Judge Carter Schildknecht had asked commissioners at a previous meeting to consider switching to LGS software, as that is what the other three counties in the 106th Judicial District were using and she was pleased with the capabilities and access the software provided. Hazledean left copies of the contract with commissioners for consideration, but no action was taken at the meeting.

Action was tabled on several agenda items, including changing the amount paid for jury duty service, a date for closing the county landfill, and a resolution concerning a request for statewide collection of \$2 on hunting licenses for predator control for livestock, wildlife and agriculture. Jury fees are currently set at \$8/first day paid to those called for jury duty, and \$15 paid to those selected for jury duty. Those fees are at the county's discretion, but the fees for actually serving on a jury (second day and thereafter) are not under discussion, which is \$40 per day (\$32 of which is reimbursed to the county by the state).

Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on inmate counts at the jail, and said the jail had served 820 plates at \$717, which breaks down to a cost of 87-cents per plate. The Sheriff's Dept. purchased a new pickup last week, and he said the Law Enforcement Center's generators worked well during the three-hour period when the town of Tahoka was without electricity during last Thursday night's thunderstorm.

Commissioners approved a threeyear contract with Election Systems and Software, Inc. for election related services, which provides software for the county's electronic ballot/tabulation machines.

The 2008-09 budget was also discussed before commissioners adjourned the meeting. County Judge H.G. Franklin presided and all four commissioners were present, including Keith Wied, Mike Braddock, Don Blair and Brad Hammonds, as well as County Treasurer Pam Miller, County Attorney Donnis Scott, County Clerk Susan Tipton and other officials.

IN KEEPING WITH my long-established policy of writing about things I know almost nothing about, I decided to look into the reason why none of the Indians I have ever seen in movies or TV shows have beards or mustaches.

I don't know any real Indians personally, although I used to bowl with a guy in Lubbock who said he was full blood Indian. He certainly was smooth-faced (and a smooth bowler, too). Anyway, when I thought about it, I figured Indians never grew beards or mustaches, either by choice or by heredity. I googled Indians on my computer and it turns out I was only partially right.

First of all, there's a ton of stuff on the internet about Indians, from the well-known historical ones like Geronimo, Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull to the lesser-known ones, like the first Indian politician, Shooting Bull. (Okay, so I made that one up).

There's a lot of information about Indians and facial hair, too. Seems many of us white eyes have wondered why Indians don't have beards and mustaches. And I imagine most of us are jealous, wondering how they do it, since we spend far too many hours in our lifetime shaving our dumb faces when we could surely be doing something more productive.

I think it was Bob Hope who once said, "my grandfather was an old Indian fighter for several years, until they ran out of old Indians." Anyway, back in frontier days, some tribes of Indians, maybe miffed because they couldn't grow beards, would take the white man's hair,

Indians are much more civilized now, and just take the white man's money, as I can attest from having made several trips to casinos in New Mexico.

Anyway, several of the internet sources pointed out that it's not true that no Indians can grow facial hair.

A man who teaches American Indian civilizations and philosophy at a university in Missouri, and who is himself an Indian, writes that there are over 700 nations of Indians and no two are alike, so "Indians come in all shapes, sizes, colors and beliefs." Also, "we are not all dark skinned." He said most people form their conceptions watching movies, usually stocked with Italians, French and Mexican Indians.


"Another popular misconception is that Amerindians can't grow facial hair." This is brought on by the fact that few did for reasons of hygiene. The hair was plucked or singed from the face, arms, legs and often the head too. He says early day paintings of American Indians show some with facial hair.

I contacted a Navajo man who works with a Christian organization in Farmington, NM. He made the comment that "there are a lot of native Americans who do not grow facial hair, but there are some who do. I personally know of a lot of Navajo men in my church who do have mustaches and beards, and I also know that there are more Navajo men who grow beards and mustaches than other Northern Plains tribes. Not sure what is the determining factor."

An author named Marshall Trimble said that the Indians' lack of body hair is attributed to their Asian ancestry. He said some tribes wore wispy mustaches, and for some other tribes, body hair held cultural meaning. He added: "I met a Hopi woman in the 1960s who said her people didn't care for the bearded hippie-type doctors who worked on the reservation. The Hopi thought any man who grew a beard was trying to hide something."

On that thought, I will end my hairy Indian investigation with this



Comptroller Combs Distributes \$459 Million In Sales Tax Revenue

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Texas Comptroller Susan Combs recently announced that the state collected \$1.8 billion in sales tax revenue in May, a 4.7 percent increase over May 2007.

"For the first nine months of fiscal 2008, state sales tax collections are up 5.8 percent over the same period in fiscal 2007," Combs said. "While increases are smaller than in 2006 and 2007, growth in state sales tax revenues continues at a healthy

Combs sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$459 million in June local sales tax allocations, up 9.3 percent compared to June 2007.

Combs sent June sales tax allocations of \$306.3 million to Texas cities, up 8 percent compared to June 2007. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up 5.4 percent compared to the same time period last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$28.4 million, up 13.2 percent compared to last June. So far this year, sales tax allocations to counties are up 6.4 percent compared to 2007.

In addition, \$17.3 million went to 135 special purpose taxing districts around the state, up 21.3 percent compared to last June. Ten local transit systems received \$106.9 million in sales tax allocations, up 10.2 percent compared to a year ago.

State sales tax collections in May and local sales tax allocations in June represent sales that occurred in April and were reported to the Comptroller in





WATER: ARE YOU DRINKING ENOUGH??

If not, you could end up with excess body fat, poor muscle tone, digestive complications, muscle soreness, even water-retention problems, according to Dr. Howard Flaks bariatric specialist in Beverly Hills, CA. "Next to air, water is the element most necessary for survival. We can go without food for almost two months, but without water for only a few days." Water is also in lymph (say: limf), a fluid that is part of your immune system. which helps you fight off illness. You need water to digest your food and get rid of waste, too. In addition to being an important part of the fluids in your body, each cell depends on water to function normally.

Most of us don't drink enough. Many people live in a dehydrated state. Dehydration is a condition which arises when there is not enough water in the body to enable it to function properly.

Signals that your body needs

*Heartburn, stomach ache *Low back pain *Headache *Mental irritation & depression *Water retention *and Dry mouth.

Dry mouth is the body's LAST signal that you need water according to Dr. Thomas Lee. "As we age our sense of thirst fails. We need to be aware of these other signals choices when you have planned

Drinking 8-10 eight oz glasses a day is recommended. Overweight people need to drink an extra glass for every 25 lbs. they exceed over their ideal weight says Dr. Flaks. Also, if you are going to be outside doing physical activity you need to be drinking before and more throughout the day to keep properly hydrated. And remember - cokes, coffee, and alcohol are not a substitute for water. Six tips to drinking more water

1. Add flavored packets - If water alone bores you, take advantage of the new flavor packets that are sold specifically to enhance your enjoyment of water.

2. Get fun to-go containers -Always have water with you or in the car. Get good size, fun colored

3. Change your daily habits -Wake up to your first glass of water. Make it a rule to order water (with or without lemon) when you go out to lunch instead of a diet soda. 4. Drink a glass before you eat -

Water helps to curb your appetite. It

is easy to confuse hunger with being

thirsty; so try water first. Drinking water makes you feel trimmer. 5. Use straws, add ice and a lemon - Make this glass of water

feel like a treat. 6. Always have cold water on hand ready to drink - Make it easy. It is always easier to make the right ahead and are prepared.

Texas Vehicle Crime Issues **Emphasized During July**

stolen in Texas, and every two minutes, a vehicle is burglarized for contents or parts. Stolen vehicles are often used to commit other crimes, including theft, drug smuggling, human trafficking, domestic/international terrorism, and countless other offenses. In addition, vehicle burglary incidents such as gas siphoning, stealing personal identification items, and theft of vehicle parts containing valuable metals are on the rise. Now, more than ever, Texas drivers must become actively involved in vehicle crime prevention by practicing "Lock, Take, Hide": lock vehicles, take keys, hide belongings. The Texas Auto Burglary and Theft Prevention Authority (ABTPA) will highlight this philosophy throughout "Watch Your Car Month" this

During "Watch Your Car Month", hundreds of law enforcement task force representatives funded by ABTPA will be working in their communities reminding Texas drivers to take extra precautions when leaving their vehicles unattended. To raise awareness about the role of auto theft in secondary crimes, ABTPA personnel will heavily promote the "You Hold the Key" campaign, which is designed to remind all owners and operators that vehicles should never be left running while unattended, and

keys should not be left inside. In 2007, approximately 94,000 vehicles were stolen in Texas resulting in financial losses well into the hundreds of millions. And in almost half of all auto theft incidents, keys were left inside, which means the vehicle owner was, in some cases, an unwitting accomplice

Every five minutes, a car is to more heinous crimes. Recent statistics from Texas law enforcement agencies indicate the top three locations from which vehicles are stolen are: residences/homes (41.6%), public parking lots/public garages (28.7%), and roadways/highways/alleys (12.2%), which proves no area is truly safe from vehicle crime activity.

> "We can not stress enough to Texas drivers that they 'hold the key' to auto burglary and theft prevention," said Michelle Lanham, program manager for ABTPA's Reduce Auto Theft in Texas (RATT) task force in Arlington, Texas. "Being aware of techniques to prevent these crimes, such as utilizing visible deterrents and anti-theft devices, will help discourage thieves and make neighborhoods safer." Susan Sampson, ABTPA director, adds, "Vehicles are frequently stolen and burglarized for the resale of their parts, insurance fraud, identify theft, and to commit gateway crimes. Texas drivers must become educated about these problems and solutions to avoid becoming vic-

The ABTPA, an office of the Texas Department of Transportation, was created by the Texas Legislature in 1991 to fund programs to reduce vehicle thefts. Since 1991, the vehicle theft rate has been reduced by 59%. State Parks Offer Outdoor Family Weekend Workshops

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Outdoor Family program is expanding, offering a new series of weekend workshops in state parks this summer and fall. Workshops in state parks cost \$55 per family (up to eight people), and include individual car camping sites for each family, restrooms with hot showers, prostate park police officer public safety and security, a curriculum developed specifically for use and enjoyment of a state park, and state park Junior Ranger certification programs. The entire approach is 'Leave No Trace' Certified so it's environmentally

"There's no experience necessary for these workshops," said Chris Holmes, a state park regional interpreter who is organizing the new workshop series. "We recognize that many people in today's increasingly urban culture don't have the same skills or backgrounds as earlier generations of Texans. These weekend workshops offer a supportive environment where families can get started in safe and comfortable

For example, the schedule for one upcoming state park weekend includes pitching tents, fire starting and outdoor cooking, and morning and night-time guided talks or tours with park rangers.

Most workshops also include activities such as introductions to fishing kayaking and trail adventure and exploration through GPS and geocaching.

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
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
