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## Threatening Calls, Trespass Reported

Tahoka Police investigated one report of threatening phone calls made to a Tahoka man during the last week and also took information from a Tahoka resident regarding a possible burglary attempt.

Sheriff's officers Sunday arrested a 30-year-old O'Donnell man on a charge of criminal trespass involving property owned by a relative. The sheriff's department also is investigating a report of child abuse in the county.

Four persons were jailed in Lynn County during the last week, leaving the total number in the county jail at 42 as of early this week. Seventeen of those were being held for Lubbock County and nine for Gaines County.

Latest arrests were for probation violation, child support, warrant on driving while license invalid and driving while intoxicated, third offense or more.

## FBC Youth Offer Helping Hands In "Week of Hope" Mission Trip

Fourteen youth and three sponsors from the First Baptist Church of Tahoka youth group participated in a mission trip last week in Austin, Texas. The mission trip was a "Week of Hope" through Group WorkCamps where the teens participated in various community service projects throughout the week.

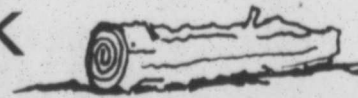


## Dog Dip and Shot Clinic Set Here Aug. 9

The phrase, "It takes a community," has never been more evident to us. Last week's issue was truly a community effort, and it would not have been printed without all of those helping hands.

And Pam definitely wins the "Best Employee of the Year" award, as we were able to leave it all in her very capable hands and not worry about it.

She is recuperating nicely, and should be home this week, thanks to your prayers and all the great people at Lubbock Heart Hospital who took such excellent care of her. 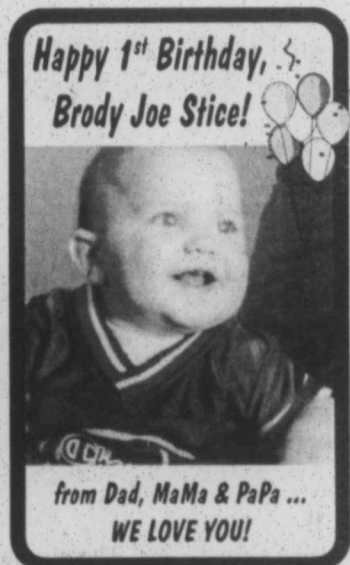

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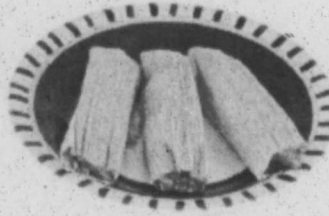

With that in mind, the American Red Cross South Plains Regional Chapter has scheduled a series of Sheltering classes in the next couple of months.

**Shelter Operations** is designed for the participants to learn about Red Cross policies and procedures for setting up, running and closing a sheltering during a disaster. In **Shelter Simulation**, participants then apply what they've learned in a table-top exercise.

### Federal minimum Wage increased To \$6.55 July 24

The U.S. Department of Labor reminds employers and employees that the federal minimum wage increased to \$6.55 on Thursday, July 24. With this change, employees who are covered by the federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) will be entitled to pay at no less than \$6.55 per hour.

This increase is the second of three provided by the enactment of the Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2007. A third minimum wage increase to \$7.25 an hour will become effective on July 24, 2009. Last year, on July 24, the minimum wage increased to \$5.85 an hour.

Every employer of employees subject to the FLSA's minimum wage provisions must post, and keep posted in each of its establishments, a notice explaining the act. These notices must be posted in conspicuous places so as to permit employees to readily read them. Updated posters and other compliance assistance materials concerning the minimum wage increase are available free of charge from the Wage and Hour Division and may also be obtained from the agency's Web site at <http://www.wagehour.dol.gov>.

Many states have minimum wage laws with provisions that differ from the federal law. When an employer is subject to both the federal and state wage laws, the employer must comply with the provisions of each law.

Employers and employees seeking more compliance information on the increased minimum wage may call the Wage and Hour Division's toll-free helpline at 866-4US-WAGE (487-9243).

L.C. was a cotton farmer in the New Home community. He was a leader in the cooperative segment of the agriculture industry having served on the boards of the New Home Cooperative Gin, Cotton Incorporated (CI), American Cotton Growers (ACG), and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association (PCCA).

He served 46 years on the New Home Coop Gin Board and as its chairman for 28 of those years. He served for 20 years on the Board of Cotton Incorporation and as chairman for one year. He served 25 years on PCCA's board and as its chairman 14 of those years. He served as ACG's only chairman for 13 years until its merger with PCCA in 1987.

L.C. also served on the boards and committees of the Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council, Producers Exchange Insurance Cooperative, Farmers Cooperative Compress, National Cotton Council, the Cotton Board, and the Cotton Producer's Institute (predecessor of CI).

Those left to cherish his memory are his wife, Natalie; one daughter, Tanya Thomas and son-in-law, Dr. Malcolm Thomas of Lubbock; one son Randy Unfred, who resides in various international locations; and one grandson, Derek Thomas of Austin.

He was preceded in death by his parents; one great-grandson, Dylan Thomas and one brother, Joe D. Unfred.

**MOOD FOODS**  
Can your diet really help put you in a good mood? And can what you choose to eat or drink encourage bad moods or mild depression?

While certain diets or foods may not ease depression (or put you instantly in a better mood), they may help as part of an overall treatment plan. There's more and more research indicating that, in some ways, diet may influence mood. "We don't have the whole story yet", according to Elaine Magee, MPH, RD, "but there are some interesting clues."

Basically the science of food's affect on mood is based on this: Dietary changes can bring about changes in our brain structure (chemically and physiologically), which can lead to altered behavior. The key is you must keep your glucose (sugar) level stable in your brain. Signs that you are having a LOW sugar reaction are feeling shaky, irritability or anxious, a racing heart, weakness or fatigue. Feeling "blue" can also be a sign of low sugar level.

**How do you keep your sugar level stable?** First and foremost you must eat a healthy breakfast and continue to eat every 4-5 hours. If you are hypoglycemic (your body naturally lowers your blood sugar levels) you need to eat every 2-3

hours. Eat breakfast within 90 minutes of getting up.

**What to eat?** Eat a breakfast with whole grain and a lean protein. For example, an egg and whole wheat toast. Avoid simple sugars: sodas, candy, fruit juices and white flour products. These will bring your sugar level up for only a little while, but soon send you crashing and needing something else to eat. In your other meals and snacks, combine a high quality carbohydrate with a protein. A great snack example is an apple slices with peanut butter.

To also help with your moods some experts are recommending adding Omega 3 to your diet. This can be found in fish, eggs, nuts or a daily supplement of Fish oil. It is recommended you try to eat fish 2-3 times a week. If are going to take a supplement recommendations are 650 mg of EPA and DHA daily. Just look on the back of the package and make sure that the EPA and DHA equal the 650 mg. Another recommendation one may want to try is to add more folic acid to your diet. Foods that contain folic acid are oranges, green leafy vegetables such as spinach, sunflower seeds, and even beans.

So here is to our moods! Eat a good breakfast this week and see if you don't feel better.

**Sales Tax Holiday Set For August 15-17**

With the rising cost of gasoline, groceries and other goods, the annual clothing sales tax holiday will help families' back-to-school budgets go farther, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said today.  
 Combs announced that the 10th annual sales tax holiday will take place Aug. 15-17. During the tax holiday weekend, most clothing and shoes priced less than \$100 can be purchased tax free. The tax break applies to both children's and adults' apparel.  
 "We estimate shoppers will save about \$54 million in sales tax during the sales tax holiday, including approximately \$42.1 million in state sales tax and \$11.9 million in local sales taxes," Combs said.  
 The shoppers' gain is not expected to have a significant impact on sales tax collections. "Though the national economy has slowed, Texas sales tax revenue continues to grow at a healthy pace," Combs said. "Through June, state sales tax collections for fiscal 2008 were up 6.1 percent compared to the same point in fiscal 2007. Cities' and counties' calendar year-to-date sales tax revenues were up an average of 5.1 percent."

 Combs reminds families that school backpacks and messenger bags costing less than \$100 are now included in the sales tax holiday, but school supplies are taxable.  
 Since 1999, the clothing sales tax holiday has saved shoppers more than \$388 million in state and local sales taxes.

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## Pages from the Past...

The following excerpts were taken from past issues of THE LYNN COUNTY NEWS.

### Three Killed In Lynn County Tornado Draw Community Is Scene Of Disaster

Three people are dead and more than a score of others were injured by a tornado which swept across the northern portion of Dawson County and the southeastern portion of Lynn County about six o'clock Tuesday afternoon [April 1938].

The dead all resided in the vicinity of Draw in Lynn County about 18 miles southeast of Tahoka. A number of those who were severely injured also resided in that community ...

Scenes of horror marked the path of the tornado, which made its approach undetected by its victims until it was hard upon them.

Houses were reduced to splinters, automobiles were torn to pieces and scattered over the landscape or were twisted into almost unrecognizable masses, while some of the injured were hurled high into the air and carried many feet from the place where they were picked up by the terrific twister.

Apparently the twister first struck in the OK Community or a few miles west of that place in northern Dawson County, eight or ten miles southwest of O'Donnell. The store at OK was demolished and a number of houses destroyed. It moved in a northeasterly direction, passing within two miles southeast of O'Donnell, a residence about two miles south of O'Donnell being destroyed and some of the inmates injured. Little damage was done in the Joe Bailey Community except the destruction of outhouses and feed stacks, but the tornado struck again with full force just west of Draw.

The first resident struck and demolished was that of Allen Moore, but the family had fled from the house and were scurrying to the storm cellar when the house crashed.

There were seven persons in the McKay house when the storm struck. Mrs. McKay, it is said, ran from the house toward a storm cellar with her twins in her arms, but she was thrown down. The babies were torn from her grasp and one of them was very seriously injured. The other miraculously escaped serious injury ...

### Excerpts from a follow-up story on the same tornado ...

...A half-mile east of the Gary house was the four-room residence of E. Vandivere. His roof was gone and walls of the house so badly damaged that they planned to rebuild the entire structure. Mr. Vandivere said his wife kept telling him to look at the terrible storm cloud approaching, "but there wasn't any use to look," he said facetiously, "for we had no storm cellar."

Finally, he ran out to cut off the windmill and as he turned back toward the house he was compelled to see the storm -- a black wall of sand hard upon them. "Before I got to the house, car sheds and chicken houses were passing me, but I managed to dodge them," he said. "I met my boy coming out the door to see about Daddy. I grabbed him and hurried into the house. My wife grabbed my hand. I think it was the first time we had held hands in 30 years. She was praying while I was holding the front door, which didn't need holding. And then two or three windows blew in and the roof went, and there we were. But luckily none of us were hurt. The main part of the twister was to the north of us."

### Several Families Under Quarantine

Dr. E.E. Callaway, county health officer, reports that several families in various parts of the county have been placed under quarantine for various diseases during the past few days.

Two little boys, twin brothers, residing just outside the limits of O'Donnell developed scarlet fever and the family was quarantined.

One little girl six miles east of O'Donnell developed a case of diphtheria and the family was also placed under quarantine.

Two families residing between Magnolia and Gordon were quarantined for smallpox.

Another family living in the Wells community was also placed under quarantine for smallpox.

These quarantine regulations should be rigidly observed so as to reduce the danger of spreading these diseases to the minimum.

Announcement has been made that airplane service is to be established between Fort Worth and Midland. From Midland the line will extend to Lubbock, evidently passing over Tahoka, and from Lubbock back to Fort Worth.

Three planes, it is said, have been procured for this service, and the service will be begun at an early date.

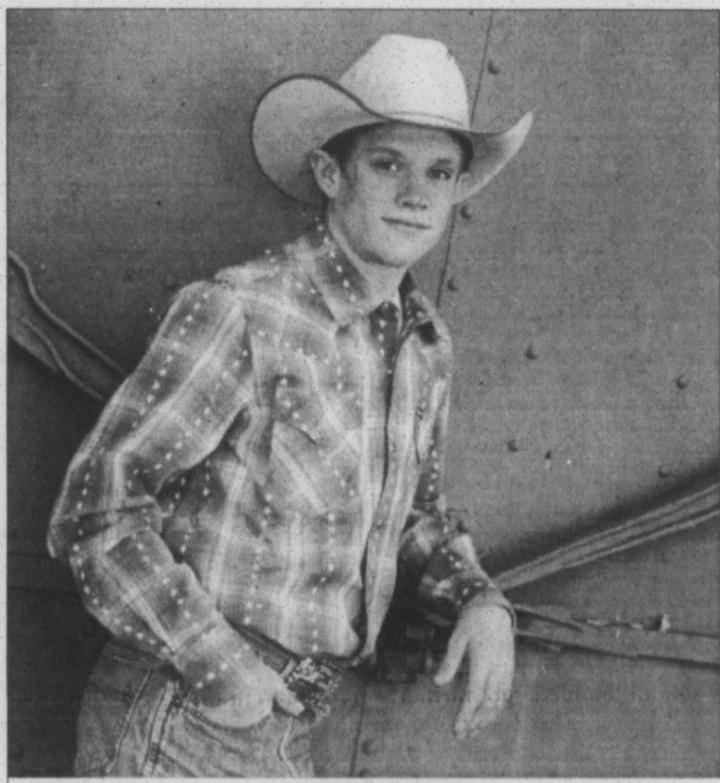
