

missed it, on June 11, 2007, Texas Governor Rick Perry signed into law House Bill 3678, the Religious Viewpoint Anti-Discrimination Act. HB 3678 clarifies a student's right to religious expression in school and creates a model policy for district adoption. HB 3678 took effect on September 1, 2007.

"Education is about openmindedness and learning from one another's thoughts and philosophies," said Perry. "Therefore we cannot - and should not - shield or discourage our children from expressing religious views in school. Stifling discussion in order to appease a secular-only environment will prevent students from growing both academically and personally."

Though the United States Supreme Court holds religious discussion in schools permissible, some Texas schools may have been misapplying the law and restricting student's legal expression. This may be due to outdated school policy or an unintended consequence of efforts to prómote a neutral learning environment.

HB 3678 requires school districts to adopt and implement a policy establishing a limited public forum for student speakers at school events. The bill provides a model policy that districts may directly adopt or use for reference.


Policies must contain language which:

· Protects a student from being punished due to expressing a religious viewpoint verbally or in a class assignment

· Creates guidelines for student speakers at graduation ceremonies and other school-wide events


· Allows students to organize religious groups and activities

Kelly Coghlan, a Houston attorney, is the legal author of the Schoolchildren's Religious more information.



"While school personnel must remain neutral, parents, pastors, students and other nonschool officials are free to encourage students to communicate God-honoring viewpoints whenever they publicly speak," said Coghlan.

According to Sec. 25.154 of HB 3678, students may organize prayer groups, religious clubs, 'see you at the pole" gatherings, or other religious gatherings before, during, and after school to the same extent that students are permitted to organize other noncurricular student activities and groups. Religious groups must be given the same access to school facilities for assembling as is given to other noncurricular groups without discrimination based on the religious content of the students' expression.

# **Early Voting Continues**

Early voting for the Nov. 4 elections began Monday and continues through Oct. 31. There are several ballots in Lynn County for voters to consider, including the General Election ballot, and local ballots for New Home ISD trustee election, and for Wilson and Tahoka ISD tax rate elections.

Early voting in the general election will be held at the Lynn County Courthouse County Clerk's Office during regular weekday hours, from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., and the office is open during the noon hour for early voting.

"Please bring your orange voter registration card with you when you come to vote," said Susan Tipton, County Clerk. "The current voter registration card is orange and white, and is good from Jan. 1, 2008 through Dec. 31, 2009, " she added. Approximately 200 ballots were marked during early voting on p.m.



Myth 1: Freezing water in plastic bottles causes cancer.

Truth: Freezing actually works against the release of chemicals according to Rolf Halden of Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Chemicals do not diffuse as readily in cold temperatures, which would limit chemical release if there were dioxins in plastic and we don't think there are.

Myth 2: Drinking water from a bottle of water that has been left in the car can cause breast cancer.

tial glance, we as taxpayers may have been glad for the relief. But the rise in costs of so many other items, including state mandated programs that aren't funded by the state, has made it difficult for our school district to stay ahead in the financial arena.

Now our school board has made the tough decision to hold a "tax rollback election." At the polls we are being asked to vote for or against a school tax rate increase to \$1.17 per \$100 valuation. None of us like the thought of our taxes increasing, but I like less the thought of what might happen to the education and activities at Tahoka ISD if we do

not approve this rate increase. At a recent tax hearing, Jimmy Parker, TISD superintendent, stated that the average taxable Fried Steak, Pork Chops, and value of a home in our school district is \$33,000. Assuming that property values remain the same, that means that the average tax payer's increase will be \$42.90. That's only 82 cents per week!!!! Aren't our kids and their education and activities worth 82 cents per week? And if you own a larger home, let's say \$200,000, assuming property values remain the same, your increase will be \$260. Even that is only \$5 per week. Again, aren't our kids and their education and activities worth \$5 per week? Tahoka ISD has so many great things going for it. All of our campuses have received a **RECOGNIZED** rating by TEA based on TAKS test results. We have been able to maintain 'a low teacher/student ratio which aids our students in doing their best and allows our teachers to be most effective. We have PE and music curriculums that have gone by the wayside in many school districts and studies have repeatedly shown that music education improves abilities in other areas, especially math. We have computers in every classroom and several labs that allow our students to stay up-to-date with the technology that is ever

changing in our world today.


