## Wilson ISD Tax Rate Passes, But Voters Nix Tahoka ISD Tax Rate

Voters in Wilson Independent School District approved \$1.23 property tax rate in a rollback election Tuesday, but Tahoka ISD's \$1.17 tax rate election failed to pass, and county voters marked their choices in the general election ballot as well, choosing Republican presidential candidate John McCain along with the rest of Texas over Democrat Barack Obama. National election results proved Obama will be the next U.S. President.

Lynn County voted against all three county propositions on the general election ballot, and New Home ISD conducted a trustee election as well on Tuesday.

Both Tahoka and Wilson ISD ballots were asking for 13-cent tax rate increases from the current \$1.04 Maintenance and Operating tax rate, with Wilson ISD having an additional 6-cent tax rate for bonded indebtedness added on for a total \$1.23 tax rate for 2008. The Wilson ISD tax ratification election passed with 154 voting for the proposition and 62 against. Tahoka ISD's proposition failed by 544 to 452, which means that the TISD property tax rate will remain at \$1.04 for 2008.

"We will have to look at programs and staffing in the future, and try to keep costs down," TISD Supt. Jimmy Parker told *The News* after election results. "My big disappointment is that the legislators have put us in the position of going to the voters in the first place," he added.

In the New Home ISD trustee election to elect three members, incumbent Kevin Mitchell led the ticket with 198 votes, followed closely by Martin Gill with 185 votes and Rachelle Link with 123 votes. Also running was Matt Barrington, who received 111 votes, and Jose Torres, with 56 votes. Total voter turnout was 241 voters in this election.

Lynn County Clerk Susan Tipton reported a total voter turnout of 2,152 in the general election, which is 52% of Lynn County's 4,067 registered voters. There were nearly 1,000 straight party ballots cast in the county, including 525 Republican Party straight ballots, 418 Democratic Party straight ballots, and 11 Libertarian Party straight ballots. In Lynn County election results, the Republicans won every race with the exception of one, where Lynn voters chose Democrat Joe Heflin over Republican challenger Isaac Castro for State Representative, District 85.

Heflin received 1,220 votes to Castro's 841.

Locally, Brian L. Kingston will be Lynn County's next District Attorney for the 106th Judicial District, running unopposed on the ballot, and there are five uncontested candidates declared elected for county positions, including County Attorney Dennis Scott, Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin, Tax Assessor-Collector Sherry Pearce, Pct. 1 Commissioner Keith Wied, and Pct. 3 Commissioner Don Blair.

There were three county propositions on the general ballot for voters to consider. Proposition 1 failed by 1,432 to 499, Proposition 2 failed by 1,412 to 512, and Proposition 3 failed by 1,166 to 708.

The first two propositions regarded open range issues allowing animals to roam freely within the county, and voters chose to make Lynn County a closed range county.

Lynn County was historically all open range, with animals allowed to run freely. Over the years, some landowners in the county petitioned the county commissioners to allow certain parts of their land to be closed range. Years later, it became very difficult for county officials to determine which areas in the county were open or closed range, a question that comes up in liability issues regarding vehicle accidents with horses/cattle. Basically, in an open range, animals are allowed to roam freely and it is the responsibility of other landowners to prevent the animals from coming onto their land. It also potentially puts the liability upon vehicle drivers in an incident involving a vehicle hitting an animal on the road. A closed range makes the animal owner potentially liable if proven negligent in containing animals within their property.

Sixty-two percent of Lynn County voters voted against Proposition 3, which would have created a one-half cent sales tax for economic development in Lynn County through the formation of a County Assistance District. With the vote against the proposition, the issue fails, and no additional sales tax will be imposed in the county.

The city municipalities of Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson already impose a half-cent sales tax for city funds, and Lynn County imposes a half-cent sales tax that supplements county property tax rates, which remain separate from the additional half-cent sales tax that was proposed in Proposition 3.

## Gins Begin Processing County Cotton Crops

Area cotton gins are ready to begin processing the 2008 cotton crop, with several gins reporting first bales during October. Texas Star Gin, with plants in Wilson and Union, reported their first bale was brought in Oct. 4 by Heinrich Brothers producers. Woolam Gin in O'Donnell produced their first bale on Oct. 21, brought in by Matt Farmer, and New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin reported their first bale was Oct. 22, brought in by producer Joe Thomas.

The Lynn County News begins this week reporting bale counts from eight area gins. New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin had processed 5,101 bales as of Tuesday morning, Texas Star Gin reported total bale counts at 4,922, and Woolam Gin reported 1,858 bales.

Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell processed their first bale on Oct. 30, brought in by Stanley Forbes, and reported a bale count of 456 on Tuesday. David Ehlers produced the cotton for

the first bale at Farmers Coop Association #1 in Tahoka on Oct. 31, and the gin reported a bale count of 364 this week as they gear up for the harvest season. Wells Coop Gin also processed their first bale on Oct. 31, brought in by Ty Askew, and reported a bale count of 769 on Tuesday.

Grassland Coop Gin and Close City Gin in Post have not yet processed any cotton, but expect to begin soon.

There is some good cotton in the fields in Lynn County, but some producers' crops were hailed out earlier in the season, and what survived may have been affected by an early freeze.

The 2008 crop is not expected to match 2007's fantastic bale counts reported by area gins last year. Seven of the eight area gins reported record bale counts from the 2007 crop, totaling 575,403 bales and exceeding records that were set in the 2005 and 2004 crop totals.

I remember warning people years ago not to go up there, because I was pretty sure that some people who went up there never came back down.

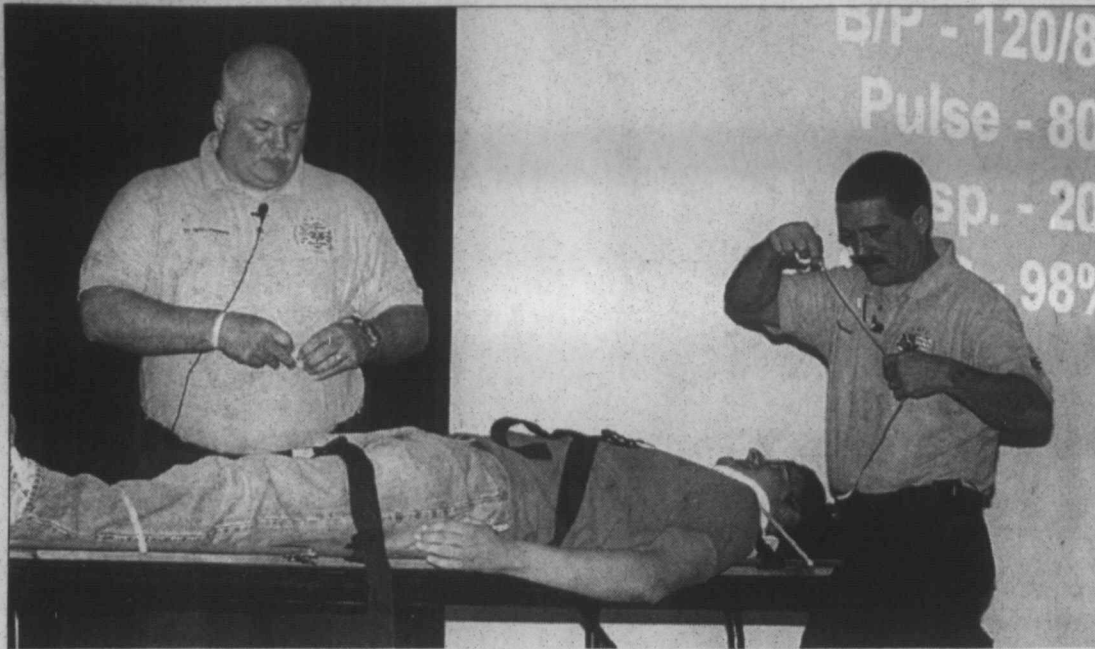

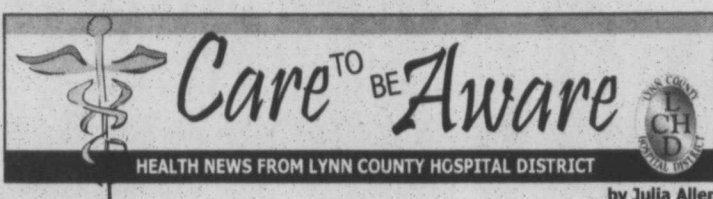
**THS To Present Play, "The Nerd"**

**RADIOLOGIC TECHNOLOGY WEEK**

Radiologic Technologists (RT's) at Lynn County Hospital District celebrated National Radiologic Technology Week this week. National Radiologic Technology Week is celebrated annually to recognize vital work of RT's across the nation. The celebration takes place each November to commemorate the anniversary of the x-ray discovery by Wilhelm Conrad Roentgen on November 8, 1895. The weeklong celebration calls attention to the valuable work of RTs in the health care field and the highly technical images that they make. The images play an integral role in the medical process and in the lives of millions of patients. Each image tells a story. Here at LCHD we have a combined experience of 30 years from our technologists. We have

a Certified Medical Radiological Technologist and a Radiologic Technologist registered with the American Registry of Radiologic Technicians (ARRT). LCHD has adapted computer radiography (CR) since 2004. CR refers to the x-ray image acquired in digital format using an imaging plate rather than film. Changing to CR integrated the use of the PACS (picture archive communications system). This system allows imaging modalities to be integrated, displayed and digitally stored. Beside diagnostic x-ray, other modalities offered at LCHD are ultrasound, Doppler (vein/arterial testing) and a 32-slice helical computed tomography (cat scan) machine. This year, all signups will be conducted at First United Methodist Church in Tahoka, in the fellowship hall (enter at the south door of the church, located at North 1st and Ave. J). Signup dates are as follows: Saturday, Nov. 8 & 15 - 10 am-12 noon; Saturday, Nov. 22, 2-4 pm; Thursday, Dec. 4, 5-7 pm; and the final signup date will be Saturday, Dec. 6, 2-4 pm. Applicants must provide: Must have WIC, Medicaid, or Food Stamp Card before we can take your application. Be prepared to show photo identification, if requested. Be prepared to show proof of address, such as a utility bill, if requested. You must provide a physical address as well as a mailing address. You must provide a phone contact number (yourself, friend, relative or neighbor). Only children actually living in your home will be accepted. You may not sign for a relative or friend and they may not sign up for you. Each family must fill out their own application. Children ages newborn through age 14 will be accepted, if funding is available. Any false information will result in denial for all children in the family. You will be contacted when your gifts are ready for pick-up. If you have not been contacted by Dec. 19 please call Janet Porterfield at 561-4036. Absolutely no packages will be released to a child.

**Renovation Projects At Hospital Discussed**

Several renovation projects, some of which are underway and others being considered for the future, were discussed at a meeting of Lynn County Hospital board of directors last Thursday. Some of the work is being done to prepare the clinic at the west end of the hospital for use by Dr. Pat Edwards, who is expected to begin practice at the clinic in late December, possibly earlier. Hospital Administrator Jim Morris said the clinic work is near completion. He also advised the board on bids received for replacement of ceiling tile throughout the hospital, but noted that this project is not being implemented at this time. However, another ongoing project, renovation of patient rooms, has begun with work in one of the 15 rooms now underway. He also told the board that television commercials promoting the hospital are now being aired on Lubbock Channel 11, and will continue for some time. Lynnwood Assisted and Independent Living facility now has all rooms occupied, with 21 residents, and a waiting list of 32, with one couple now living in New York on the waiting list. Medical staff appointments were approved for Dr. Edwards and for Dr. Wael F. Qubti of Lubbock, who may assist in coverage of the emergency room. Board President Jerry Ford presided. Other board members present were Virginia Griffing, Frances Truehart, Jannis Horwood, Billy Tomlinson and Dalton Wood. Absent was member Cal Huffaker.

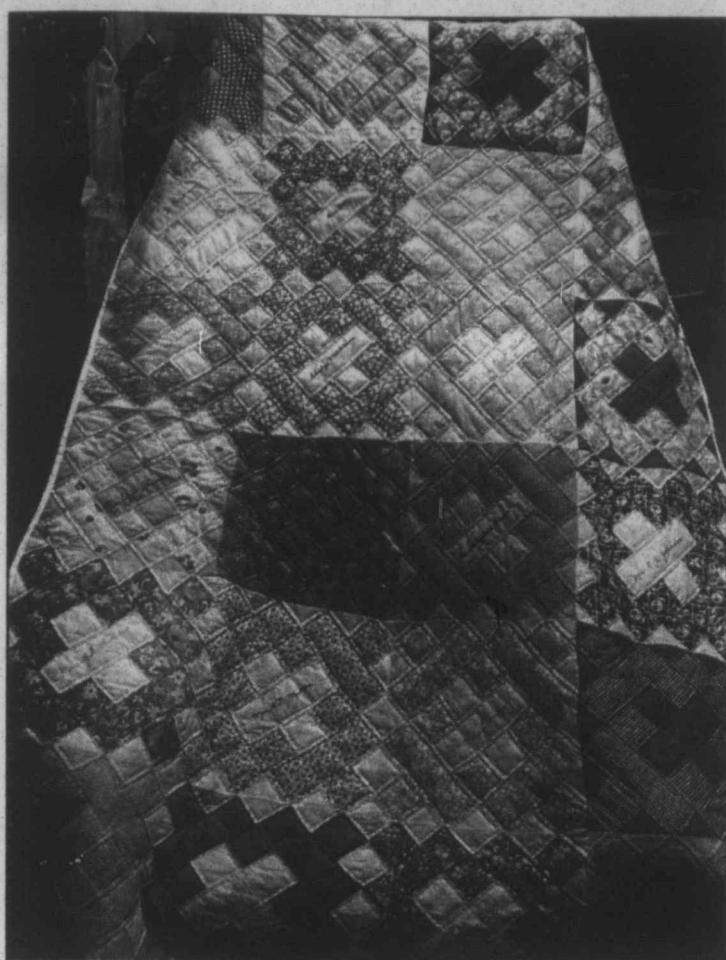

(Lois) Roberts, whose name is one of the 24 on the quilt, said the participants likely were mostly from the Grassland area, but she does not recall any exact date of the origin of the quilt pieces.

Ms. Truehart brought the top to the senior citizens center in Tahoka, and it recently was quilted.

**OISD To Sell House Through Bidding Process**

O'Donnell Independent School District Board of Trustees in their October board meeting approved a resolution authorizing the disposition of district property located at 205 5th Street in O'Donnell, which is a small house formerly used by the school for teacher housing. The house will be sold through a bidding process in accordance with district policy.

In other business, trustees unanimously approved a clarification regarding its policy for paying substitute teachers who serve in a long-term capacity as determined by the campus principal and the superintendent. "The intent of this policy is to encourage certified teachers to participate as substitutes whenever possible, especially in long-term situations," said Supt. Rodney Schneider.

Other routine agenda items were approved, including a district mission statement, a Head Start program continuation agreement, district improvement plan, and internal controls procedure plan. Monthly bills were paid, and financial reports were presented. Enrollment figures showed 325 students in the district, including 180 in elementary, 69 in junior high, and 76 in high school.

Cross-country coach Perri Clark and band director Dusty Palmer were named for the district's Celebration of Excellence recognition.

**APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION.** City of O'Donnell, P.O. Box 236, O'Donnell, Texas 79351, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of Permit No. 11126-001, which authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 120,000 gallons per day via evaporation and irrigation of 50 acres of non-public access agricultural land. The current permit authorizes land application of sewage sludge for beneficial use on 50 acres of land. This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into waters in the State. TCEQ received this application on July 18, 2008.

The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located immediately west of the intersection of U.S. Highway 87 and Farm-to-Market Road 2053 in Lynn County, Texas. The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located in the drainage basin of Lake J. B. Thomas in Segment No. 1413 of the Colorado River Basin.

The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, Executive Director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at O'Donnell City Hall, 615 8th Street, O'Donnell, Texas.

**PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING.** You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ holds a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

**OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING.** After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.

**TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST:** your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are germane to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

**EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION:** The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the Executive Director will not issue a final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.
