
This announcement showed that the tomb was empty, but our hearts can be full. Our hearts can be filled with joy, security and happiness that can only come from that One Perfect Love.

Read God's Holy Word and attend the church of your choice to learn more of this One Perfect Love. This day let us return that love and say in our hearts.... Jesus, I Love You.




