Gins Tally 228,086 Bales From '08 Crop

The eight area gins who report bale counts to the Lynn County News have a final tally this week, reporting a combined total of 228,086 bales of cotton ginned from the 2008 cotton crop by area producers. Last year, those same eight gins processed a recordsetting 575,403 bales from the 2007 crop, and did not finish ginning until April 8, 2008.

New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin reported the most bales ginned, at 80,117 as they finished this week. That's less than half of last year's record-setting numbers, when the gin processed 108,905 from the 2007 crop.

Texas Star Gin, with plants in Wilson and Union, reported 68,230 total bales this year, compared to a record-setting 145,156 bales reported last year.

Farmers Coop Assn. #1 in Tahoka reported 24,470 bales, compared to last year's 73,455 record numbers. Woolam Gin in O'Donnell processed 18,639 bales this year, compared to last year's 73,689, again a record for that gin.


Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell reported 7,398 bales this year, compared to 67,539 last year, but not as high as their record-setting year in 2005, which was 81,654 bales, according to records kept by The Lynn County News.

Wells Coop Gin reported 19,934 bales this year, compared to 62,498 bales processed last year, a record for them. Grassland Coop Gin processed 4,883 bales this year, and had a record last year of 26,285 bales. And, Close City Gin in Post reported 4,415 bales this year, compared to 17,876 last year, which was a record high for them.

HERE IT IS already the second week in February, with Lincoln's birthday and Valentine Day coming up this weekend.

Abraham Lincoln , if he were alive, would be 200 years old today, and I think I am beginning to realize how he would feel. He was born poor and, although he is considered one of the greatest leaders of all time, he could never be president in today's political scene, because now you have to be pretty wealthy just to make a run at the job.

He was called Honest Abe, and may have been the last honest man ever to hold office in Washington. Well, maybe not, but an honest politician these days has little chance of success. I had a friend who used to say, "I don't want an honest man in office; I want a crook who is on my side."

He was assassinated while attending a play in a theater. I don't recall ever hearing what the play was all about, if it was almost over, or what.

VALENTINE'S DAY, once celebrated with machine gun fire up north, and originally based on some kind of Roman holiday where young girls were chased around and whacked with switches or some such nonsense, is better celebrated locally by grandparents bragging on their kids, and a lot of cute ones are shown in this issue of the newspaper.

St. Valentine was two people, the encyclopedia tells me. It was a name given to two Christian martyrs whose feasts were formerly observed on Feb. 14. One was believed to be a Roman priest martyred "during the persecution of Claudius the Goth, and buried on the Flaminian Way; the second was probably a bishop of Terni martyred in Rome. It is possible that these two legends were based on real people or, as some believe, one person. The association of St. Valentine's Day with love and courtship may have arisen from the coincidence of the date with the Roman festival of Lupercalia, a feast day dropped from the Roman church calendar in 1969.

Since the St. Valentines had their feasts on the same day the Romans had a love feast, so the day comes to be a day of love and courting. We observe the feast part by pigging out on chocolates.

The encyclopedia digressed into birthstones and associated beliefs, and told me that the purple amethyst is St. Valentine's stone and it also. protects its owner from drunkenness. I never saw a purple amethyst; it sounds like some kind of demon. Nor do I need any proteshian from intoshication.

Council Sets May 9 For City Election

Tahoka City Council met Monday night, setting the city election for May 9 and conducting other business. The general election on May 9 will be held for the purpose of electing a mayor and two council members, in Districts 1 and 3. Currently holding these positions are Mayor Mike Mensch, Dist. 1 councilman Rudy Tejeda and Dist. 3 councilwoman Amy Preston.

The filing period for the election opened on Feb. 9 and continues through March 9, at city hall. Early voting for the election will be conducted April 27-May 5. No applicants have filed to date.

City attorney Cal Huffaker presented information about the possibility of the city accepting the old Keltner Hotel building from the Lynn County Historifrom the Pioneer Museum, on Lockwood.

Tahoka Fire Chief Steve Sanders addressed the council, informing them that the city had recently received a reimbursement check from FEMA in the amount of \$17,860 for fire department expenses related to fighting grass fires in 2005-06. He told council members that the department was interested in using the funds to purchase a used truck that could be used as a tanker truck for the fire department, and council members indicated the department could begin looking at possibilities.

Council members heard a police department report from Steve McKay, and Raymond Vega reported on the city utilities department. A resolution was approved authorizing the submission of a Texas Home In-

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit without providing any opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

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



DENTAL HEALTH FOR TEENS

As stated last week the American Dental Association has declared February as National Children's Dental Health Month. Since 1949, the ADA has sponsored National Children's Dental Health Month to raise awareness about the importance of oral health. This week we will focus on your teen's healthy teeth.

As teens the pressure is on to look and be as perfect as possible. Straight teeth, white teeth and clean teeth are all part of the pressure package. Of course clean teeth are not just a part of looking good they are part of feeling good too. Good dental health can affect other areas of your health. Your oral health is connected to many other health conditions beyond your mouth. Sometimes the first sign of a disease shows up in your mouth. In other cases, infections in your mouth, such as gum disease, can cause problems in other areas of healthy. You should always be sure your toothpaste contains fluoride.

Proper brushing is a must. Use a soft toothbrush if you brush too hard you can cause receding gums, tooth sensitivity and over time, loose teeth. Again, brush for at least 2 minutes each time you brush mostly in a circular motion.

Dental caries (tooth decay) can attack the teeth at any age. In fact, 84% of 17-year-olds have the disease. Left untreated, caries can cause severe pain and result in tooth loss. Losing teeth affects how you look and feel about yourself as well as your ability to chew and speak. Treating caries is also expensive. So prevention and early treatment are important.

It may surprise you to know that 60% of 15-year-olds experience gingivitis, the first stage of gum disease. Gingivitis, which involves the gums but not the underlying bone and ligament, is almost always caused by an accumulation of plaque. As with caries, treatment can be expensive. To prevent cavities, you need to remove plaque, the transparent layerof bacteria that coats the teeth. The best way to do this is by brushing your teeth twice a day and flossing at least once a day. Brushing also stimulates the gums, which helps to keep them healthy and prevent gum disease. Brushing and flossing are the most important things that you can do to keep your teeth and gums

If you remove plaque regularly and follow good oral hygiene habits, your gums usually will return to their healthy state. However, more serious gum disease can cause gums to swell, turn red, and bleed, and sometimes causes discomfort. How dentists treat gum disease depends on the extent of the disease. It is best to get regular dental checkups every 6 months to a year. Some problems may be prevented with these checkups.
