Local, not statewide issues will be on the May 9 ballot

While Texans will go to the polls on May 9 to decide many local issues, there are no statewide propositions on the ballot that day, according to Secretary of State Hope Andrade.

Rumors – fueled by an e-mail circulating around the state – of a constitutional amendment on the ballot regarding the homestead tax are not accurate, Andrade said.

"Our office has been contacted by many citizens that received or heard of the e-mail," said Andrade. "We want to make sure people have correct information and are prepared to vote on the issues before them. Many cities, school districts and other local entities will be holding important elections, but there are no statewide constitutional amendments on the May 9 ballot."

The deadline to register to vote in the May election is Thursday, April 9. Individuals who need to register to vote may obtain an application from several county offices, many post offices, libraries, or from the Secretary of State's voter information Web site: www.votexas.org.

Head Coach/AD Position Posted On TISD Website

Tahoka Independent School
District Board of Trustees met in
special session Tuesday night to
consider the athletic director and head
boys basketball position that is open
for next year due to the resignation

of Drew Stone, but took no action regarding personnel during the meeting. By Wednesday morning, the position of head football coach/athletic director was posted on the TISD website.

School officials offered no

explanations on the advertised position, although currently the head football coach at TISD is Jesse Garza. Supt. Jimmy Parker did indicate to *The News* that Garza is not seeking the AD position.

According to the website, the school is accepting applications for head football coach/AD with a teaching field of Math preferred. Applications will be accepted until April 11.

Collision, Check Case Reported

A collision with no injuries and an incident involving two forged checks were among reports investigated by law enforcement officers in Lynn County during the last week.

At Lynn County Hospital parking lot Monday a 1998 Chevrolet Lumina driven by Roman M. Bermea, 85, of Tahoka struck two parked and unoccupied vehicles. One was a 2002 Ford F250 pickup owned by Jerry Ford of Tahoka and the other was a 2007 Dodge Ram pickup owned by Jack Jaquess Jr. and Barbara Jaquess, also of Tahoka.

A 22-year-old Lynn County man was arrested on a warrant related to a forgery conviction Monday and also reportedly admitted to officers that he had forged a signature on two more checks, one for \$500 and another for \$300. These checks had not been passed.

Bennie Nance showed police that a passenger side door window glass on her 2008 GMC Acadia had been shattered March 24. It was not determined whether the damage was a result of criminal mischief or if it was weather-related.


Police also arrested a 41-year-old Tahoka man on an outstanding warrant, another for DWI, and were called to the scene of a domestic disturbance.

Six persons were jailed in the county during the last week, on these charges: application to revoke probation on conviction of possession of marijuana, unsafe lane change, failure to appear, driving while intoxicated second offense plus warrant on DWI first offense, warrant on possession of narcotics paraphernalia, plus failure to appear on charges of no drivers license, DWI second offense and warrant on DWI.

Total number of persons in jail was 43, with 17 held for Lubbock and two held for Gaines County.

I THOUGHT it might be a good idea to write something about April Fool's Day, only when I got ready to actually do it, I realized that by the time anyone reads this, April Fool's Day will have come and gone.

But a day or two late is not too bad for me, so I am going ahead with this topic.

However, when I thought about it, I realized I had procrastinated again, and I remembered that for months I had been intending to write about National Procrastination Day, only I couldn't remember when it is, or was. Only I just found out it is the first Wednesday in September, so I am either six months early (unlikely) or six months late (probably) writing about it.

So, anyway, I learned that there really wasn't a first April Fool's Day, sometimes called All Fools Day, that can be pinpointed on the calendar. One source says the observance may have evolved simultaneously in several cultures in the late 1500s, when the new year was celebrated for eight days starting on March 25, by people who used something called the Gregorian calendar.

(A minister friend who once lived in Tahoka, Rev. Marvin Gregory, denies that his ancestors devised the calendar or that he has ever used it to measure the length of a sermon).

Anyway, when the calendar was revised and New Year's Day was moved back to Jan. 1, many people did not receive the news for several years, because communications were poor in those days. Some stubborn people refused to accept the new calendar and continued to observe the new year on April 1. These people were labeled as "fools" by the general public and often were sent on fool's errands or made the butt of other practical jokes.

When we owned a weekly newspaper in Sudan (between Littlefield and Muleshoe) in the early 60s, I once published an April Fool's Edition, with a couple of preposterous stories on page one, and convincing many of our advertisers to include ridiculous things in their ads. For example a welding shop ad had a picture of a cow with a chicken's head on it and the legend, "Bud's Welding—When We Put Something Together, We Do It Right." The owner of the shop said he had more comments on that ad than any he had ever run.

Anyway, in keeping with April Fool's Day, here's a well-known statement by a famous author:

It's better to keep your mouth shut and be thought a fool than to open it and leave no doubt. --Mark Twain





To Helmet or Not to Helmet?

Recently helmet use is in the news as actress Natasha Richardson lost her life on the bunny slopes due to a fall and a blow to her head. Experts say that possibly if she had worn a helmet she would be alive today. She had refused to wear one offered to her. It was a little fall and she got up, laughed and walked away, until an hour later. Of course in Lynn County we have no bunny slopes but we do have activities that we should all wear helmets with; bikes, skateboards, scooters, motorcycles, and ATVs to mention a few.

Wearing a helmet is a must if you value your life. Let me reiterate helmet use should not be optional for anyone in your family, no matter where you are or how short the ride. Here's why: Most accidents involve some type of head injury, so a crash could mean permanent brain damage or death for someone who doesn't wear one while riding. In fact, each year in the United States, about half a million kids are seriously injured in bicycle-related accidents, and most of those injuries could have been avoided if a helmet was worn.

Bike injuries are common. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), every year about 800 Americans die because of bicycle-related injuries. Think it won't happen to you? The odds for danger are high: More than half a million Americans end up in hospital emergency departments each year because of bicycle-related injuries.

Here are some things to keep in mind when buying a helmet:

· Pick bright colors that are visible to drivers and other ey-

· Look for a helmet that's well ventilated.

· Make sure that the helmet has a CPSC or Snell sticker inside. These indicate that the helmet meets standards set & the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) or the Snell Memorial Foundation; a nonprofit group that tests helmet

· Make sure your child's helmet fits correctly and can be adjusted.

Even the best, most expensive helmet won't protect you if it doesn't fit. Any bike store can help you adjust your helmet so

And also remember after taking a serious hit, helmets lose their capacity to absorb shock. If you ever have a fall and hit any surface hard with the helmet, immediately replace the helmet.

Hope to see you on the road, decked out safely.





A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owns a home on Jan. 1 and uses it as a primary residence on that date is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower school taxes this year...and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 or disabled exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The county, city or junior college may adopt a tax ceiling to lock in 2009 taxes as the highest amount for 65 and older or disabled homeowners.) The over-65 homeowner's school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. The age 65 or older homeowners (or their surviving spouses 55 years of age or older) also may transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2008, you won't need to reapply for 2009 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 2009. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the age 65 or older exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

When and where should I file?



"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timberland!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2009 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.






