OISD, Superintendent agree to six-figure separation buy-out

A settlement of \$108,686 was the payoff by O'Donnell Independent School District, Board of Trustees to former Superintendent Rodney Schneider, according to the details of an 11-page "Voluntary Employment Separation Agreement" between Schneider and the OISD Board of Trustees. The settlement agreement terminated the contract between the school district and Schneider, who had a year remaining in his original three-year contract with the district.

Schneider was hired in July 2007 for three years, through June 30, 2010, at an annual salary of \$85,000 per year. In the trustees' annual consideration of the superintendent's salary package in January of 2008 and 2009, no salary increases were given. Buy-out talks began surfacing in the April 20, 2009 board meeting, and trustees met behind closed doors on May 7 to take their first legal steps in breaking ties with the superintendent, and a few days later Supt. Schneider announced his resignation due to an agreement reached with the school district.

The News obtained a copy of the settlement agreement, which notes that Schneider's resignation is effective on June 30,2009, and that the superintendent would continue to receive his monthly

salary and all benefits until that date. A settlement of \$108,686 is to be paid to Schneider and his attorneys on June 30, at which time Schneider should have all personal effects and property removed from the OISD superintendent's home provided by the district. OISD and Schneider are responsible for each of their respective attorneys' fees incurred in connection with the negotiation of the separation agreement.

The agreement also includes a "mutually acceptable letter of reference" from the OISD Board regarding. Schneider, and stipulates that both parties agree not to make negative and/or disparaging remarks about each other. No official reasons for the separation agreement are listed, other than to note that "Schneider and the District believe that entering into this agreement is in their mutual best interests."

The separation agreement was signed by Renn Dorman, President of the Board of Trustees, and by Rodney Schneider, and attested by Cody Furlow, Board Secretary.

Since Schneider's resignation, O'Donnell ISD Board of Trustees hired Randy Allen as interim superintendent for the district, in a unanimous decision in a called meeting on May 14.

Drug bust snares man in O'Donnell A drug bust in O'Donnell, criminal that a Honda 250 n

mischief in Wilson and a missing motorcycle at O'Donnell were among incidents investigated by Lynn County sheriff's officers during the last week.

Roger Gonzales, 28, of O'Donnell was arrested outside the O'Donnell post office last Wednesday, June 3, after postal inspectors advised the sheriff's office that a suspicious package addressed to Gonzales had been detected. Sheriff's officers, aided by the postal inspectors, Tahoka Police Dept. and Dawson County Sheriff's Dept., arrested Gonzales about 4:45 p.m. June 3 after he had taken delivery of the package, which was determined to contain about a pound of marijuana.

Gonzales, charged with felony possession of marijuana over four ounces and less than five pounds, remained in jail this week in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

In Wilson Sunday someone damaged the door facing of a storage area and broke a window at the home of Santos Delgado. When the door facing was damaged, it caused a mirror which was leaning against the door inside to fall and break.

Total damage was estimated at \$80.

Brent Cox of O'Donnell told officers

that a Honda 250 motorcycle which had been parked outside his residence apparently had been stolen Saturday night or early Sunday. The bike, with a red gas tank and fenders, was not in running condition, and was valued at \$200.

Eleven new inmates were added to the total number of persons in Lynn County jail during the last week, with the total jail population at 46 as of Tuesday. Eight of those were held for Lubbock County and five for Gaines County.

Charges resulting in the most recent arrests included application to revoke probation on conviction of driving while license invalid, possession of marijuana over 4 ounces and less than five pounds plus failure to appear (Cameron County), resisting arrest plus driving while intoxicated first offense, DWI third offense plus DWLI enhanced, failure to appear on DWLI plus warrant on DWI from Winkler County, warrant on two Class C misdemeanors from Lubbock County, DWLI enhanced, warrant on theft by check from Dallas County, DWI plus operating a vehicle without liability insurance, warrant on theft by check from Gaines County, and DWI second

During my 31 years of teaching family and consumer sciences here in Tahoka, it has been my pleasure to come in contact with many young people, school personnel, and community people. 1. have worked with at least twelve principals (in high school) and seven superintendents, numerous teachers and coaches, and support staff. Tahoka has been a great place to teach, and even though I did not live in this town,

it has been my home. The community people always made me feel welcome.

Tahoka High School is a wonderful place to teach. How do I know? Well first of all, we have consistently had a great faculty and staff who truly had the best interests of our students in mind as we taught them each day. In addition, we have had some excellent administrators to lead our way. Troy Hinds, our current high school principal, is a prime example. Not only does he have the best interests of our faculty/ staff in mind, he cares for the students who walk the halls of THS. He was the only principal

I ever had who consistently arrived at school before me (if only a couple of minutes). He gets to work early to get his own work done so that when the faculty, staff, and students arrive, he can interact with them instead of sitting at his desk. He is available when students, faculty, or parents need him. Mr. Hinds knows the names and potential of each of our students and continues to push those students to be better. Jimmy Parker, our superintendent, is another example of an excellent administrator. I never understood why anyone would want to be a superintendent because that job just does not seem very fun. Having to manage the business end of a school always looked difficult to me, and the job does not seem to garner many kudos, but lots of criticism. However, Mr. Parker was always very fair to me, my students, FCCLA members and the program of work in the family and consumer sciences department. As the superintendent, Mr. Parker continued his practice of visiting classrooms to see what was going on in this district. And believe me, he knows what goes on in our classrooms.

We also have great students at THS. It has always been fun for me to travel to workshops and conferences and hear about the problems other teachers were having with administration or students in other schools. We do not seem to have those problems at our school. Sure we have our pesky students that try our patience in the classroom, but for the most part our students are very good when compared to other students around the state. Working in the classroom with these students was a great deal of fun, but a highlight of my years here was FHA/FCCLA. Working with Family, Career and Community Leaders of America members taught me a great deal, and I was able to see many students grow and develop into effective leaders and community members who went to college and carried on the tradition of leadership, character, and scholarship. Watching those students plan and implement projects

and programs in the elementary school or community made me very proud. It has also been my pleasure to travel to many places across our state of Texas and the nation with thirteen region and state FCCLA officers who represented Tahoka High School. These students always represented TISD in a responsible and dignified manner.

So as my time here in Tahoka comes to a close, it is my hope that community members and parents will continue to support our school. Our school can only, be as good as the support we receive from the community A wonderful, recent example of support is the band boosters and former students tribute to Carroll Rhodes, our band director. During my time here, community members and parents have always been extremely supportive of the family and consumer sciences program and FCCLA, for which I am very grateful.

It has certainly been interesting to teach at least two generations of students here and see young people grow into responsible, caring citizens and parents. You then entrusted your children to my care and my classroom.

Thanks to all of you who have passed through my space at Tahoka High School and enriched my life. It would be impossible to list all of you, but you know who you are. We will surely see each other down the road.



"We did set some priorities and have targeted the first three buildings that the city will tear down," Webster said. The first building targeted is a dilapidated building on the town square, next door to the cleaners, which the city has authority to tear down. In other business, the council awarded South Plains Community Action in Levelland to administer HOME grants for the city, and changed the regular meeting time for council meetings to 6 p.m. on the second Monday of each month, instead of 7 p.m. Council member Amy Preston was unanimously chosen as Mayor Pro Tem, which is a designation to serve the city in the absence of the mayor, if needed

Monthly bills were approved, and reports were heard regarding the police department and public utilities. A slate of names suggested for a steering committee was presented to the council, for the possibility of assisting the city with economic development, but no action was taken at this time.

He recently completed a 51-day treatment program at MD Anderson, and is expecting to undergo a surgical procedure to remove a tumor from his esophagus.

"We so appreciate all the prayers from the community on our behalf, and the support from so many people," his wife, Kim, told The News. Friends and neighbors also helped plant Paris' land recently.

safety seats and boosters.) **New Booster Seat**

Law Clarified There has been some confusion about a new state law that requires all children younger than eight (8) years old, UNLESS taller than 4'9" to be in child passenger safety seat system. ("Child passenger safety seat system" includes traditional car seats with harnesses AND booster seats - both high-back and backless versions.)

The law also requires all safety seats and booster seats to be installed according to the instructions of the manufacturer of the safety seat system.

Because of the changes of the wording in the law (SB61), the following legal interpretation should be applied:

. Once a child reaches eight (8) years old, they are not legally required to be in a child safety seat system. . If the child is younger than

eight years old, BUT they are already 4'9" tall, they are not legally required to be in a child safety seat system.

• If a child is eight years old or older, and not yet 4'9" tall, they are not legally required to be in a child safety seat system.

The law also requires that

by Julia Allen safety and booster seats be installed and used according to the manufacturer's instructions, including age, height and weight requirements and the placement in the vehicle. (Some manufacturers prohibit using their products on the

front seats of vehicles.) The other part of the law that may cause some confusion are the dates of when the law takes effect and when the enforcement phase

begins. The law will take effect September 1, 2009. Law enforcement officers may only enforce the new changes in the law with written or verbal warnings until June 1, 2010. However, beginning on June 1, 2010, officers may then arrest or issue a citation/notice to appear to a person committing an offense. A fine of not more than \$25 can be assessed for a first offense and no more than \$250 for the second or subsequent offenses.






