Tahoka ex speaks about remains of Buffalo Soldier buried in county

The remains of a man who died in 1877 and believed to have been one of the Buffalo Soldiers of U.S. 10th Cavalry, Company A, are buried in Lynn County, near Double Lakes in the western portion of the county. Bones believed to be the remains of Private John T. Gordon have been found on the property owned by E.L. Short of Tahoka, according to Chris Roberts, a self-professed historian formerly of Tahoka, who spoke to Tahoka Rotary Club last week

Roberts, son of the late Sonny and Dot Roberts, grew up in Tahoka, and currently resides in Levelland. He is a history buff and longtime family friend of E.L. Short, who invited him to his Double Lakes property to help investigate the burial site.

"E.L. found a marker - a stump with a mule shoe nailed to it - several years ago and believed it was the marker of a burial site," Roberts explained. "The Buffalo Soldiers are known to have camped at this site, and E.L. has recovered several artifacts here," he added.

According to information published by Dr. Paul H. Carlson, Professor of History at Texas Tech University

in a book titled "The Buffalo Soldier Tragedy of 1877," four Buffalo Soldiers of U.S. 10th Cavalry, Company A perished in the fateful Lost Troop Expedition

"In the blistering hot and dry summer of July, 1877, Captain Nicholas Nolan and Company A of the 10th U.S. Cavalry went from Double Lakes in Lynn County through present Terry County, Hockley County, Cochran County, and eastern Roosevelt County, NM, in pursuit of a Comanche raiding party. The cavalry unit became lost and was without water for 86 hours. The pursuit ended in great hardship and the tragic loss of life of four Buffalo Soldiers who were engaged in the expedition, sometimes referred to as The Lost Troop Expedition."

It is believed, but not yet proven, that the remains of one of those soldiers, Private Gordon, are those buried at the Double Lakes site. The

Intruder discovered inside home here

A Tahoka woman awoke just \$25.02 for gasoline after midnight Saturday to discover a man seated on her bed, and when she screamed at him he ran out the front door of the residence. Another woman living in the house said she saw him leaving. They told police he was a small man and that he smelled strongly of alcohol. Entry was apparently gained to the home through an unlocked door.

Sheriff's officers are investigating a report that six used golf cart batteries and eight battery cables were stolen off a golf cart at O'Donnell Oil and Butane on Monday. Owner Maurice Jackson estimated the loss at \$110.

Also at O'Donnell, someone drove away from Allsup's without paying for \$5 worth of gasoline on July 13. There also were two similar incidents of gas thefts in Tahoka. At Town and Country store Friday someone left without paying for \$25.34 worth of diesel fuel, and at Allsup's in Tahoka the same day someone drove off without paying

Fourteen persons were locked into Lynn County jail during the last week, leaving the total number in jail at 43, with 10 of those held for Lubbock County and three for Gaines.

Four persons were jailed on charges of organized theft in Dawson County, and each of those also faced additional charges, which included traffic warrant, tampering, criminal instrument and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Charges for which others were jailed included driving while intoxicated with a child passenger, application to revoke probation on DWI conviction, judgment on driving while license invalid, DWI second offense, speeding (Lubbock), grand jury indictment for possession of a controlled substance, order to modify probation, possession of controlled substance, driving while license suspended and public intoxication.

LISTEN UP, YOU screenwriters of television and movies about Texans, because here is sumpin y'all need to know: there are lots of Texans who are educated, speak well when the occasion warrants, and are not the ignorant hicks they usually are portrayed to be in movies.

One of the first movies I ever walked out on halfway through the show was "Giant", a heralded film about Texans back in the 1950s. It featured stars Elizabeth Taylor and James Dean,





Registers of Enlistments in the United States Army, 1798-1914 Records of U.S. Army Commands in the National Archives

provided the following details on Private John T. Gordon: "A" Co. 10th U.S. Cavalry died July 30, 1877. The 5'6" former laborer with black hair and eyes enlisted the day after Christmas 1876. He was 28 years old at the time. He came from Norfolk, VA but enlisted in Baltimore, Maryland.

African-American soldiers, known as the Buffalo Soldiers, played an important role following the Civil War in conquering the far western frontier in Texas, fighting the Comanche and marching through the Staked Plains area, including Lynn County.

Roberts showed pictures to the Rotary group of the burial site at Double Lakes and explained that the soil was dug only far enough to determine that there were bones at the site, and then recovered and left undisturbed.

"We're not sure what to do with them, but want to do what is right," Roberts told the group. "We would like to get testing done to determine for sure if these are the bones of Private Gordon," he

Roberts and Short are working with members of the Lynn County Historical Commission to get a historical marker for the highway near the site. Several members of the Commission attended the Rotary meeting to hear Roberts speak.

70% of Smokers Want to Quit

70% of smokers say they want to quit; 40% try each year but only 4-7% succeed without help; this was the last statistic we read last week. Why is it so hard to quit? Research shows it is because smokers not only become physically addicted to nicotine; there is a strong emotional addiction.

Keep in mind that this addiction is two-fold; there is the physical addiction but also the emotional/mental part of addiction. When you begin to stop smoking you will need help in this area. The American Cancer Society offers the Ouitline in most states. Call 1-800-784-8669 here in Texas. Having this link to a specialized "stop smoking" counselor will help you tremendously. Statistics show that people who have this type of help are twice as likely to stop smoking as those who do not get it.

Science has made great strides in making items that can help you with your nicotine addiction. Nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) is just one option. As mentioned earlier, the nicotine in cigarettes leads to actual physical dependence. This can cause unpleasant symptoms when a person tries to quit. NRT gives you nicotine -- in the form of gums, patches, sprays, inhalers, or lozenges -- but not the other harmful chemicals in tobacco. It can help relieve some of these symptoms so that you can focus on the psychological (emotional) aspects of quitting. NRT provides a controlled amount of nicotine to your system at a slower, less intense pace than cigarettes. It works as a temporary aid to help you quit smoking by reducing nicotine withdrawal symptoms until your body no longer needs nicotine. Depending on your length as a smoker you may need to be on NRT longer, it is best to consult your doctor before starting the program.

There are prescription medications

you can also get from your doctor. Zy ban, Chantix were specifically designed to help you stop smoking. Other medications that have been known to help but are not approved by the FDA are Nortriptyline and Clonidine. Hypnosis, acupuncture, herbs and supplements are some other natural ways people have chosen to use.

Remember as with any addiction you will go through withdrawals. Here are a few symptoms that may occur: dizziness (which may only last 1 to 2 days frustration, impatience, anger, anxiety, irritability, sleep disturbances (including having trouble falling asleep and staying asleep), and having bad dreams or even nightmares. Withdrawal can also cause concentration problems, restlessness, headaches, tiredness and increased ap-

The American Cancer Society website (www.cancer.org) has several articles that have tips and hints to help you get past the hard part of addition. If you do not have access to a computer but would like copies just give me a call at the Hospital and I will print them out for you. Our local county library has internet access and printers also. Most of these articles are also available in Span-

Other websites you could possibly look at are www.cdc.gov/tobacco, www. americanheart.org, www.lungusa.org, www.nicotine-anyonymous.org, and www.smoke free.gov. Whatever way you choose to stop smoking will be one step closer to better health and a longer life. Healthy living is what we are all about out here at LCHD so we wish you all the

One last statistic before we leave the subject of smoking. In the last three weeks while we have been reading and writing these articles 17,010 Americans have died from smoking.
