The 34th annual Lynn County Harvest Festival was held Saturday at the courthouse square in Tahoka, drawing a good crowd for a fun day of events. The Tahoka Rotary Club sold out their crowd-pleasing sausage-on-a-stick by 3:30 in the afternoon, and other food/craft/game booths seemed to be doing a booming business as well throughout the day.

Children brought their decorated turtles for the turtle races in the morning, always a fun event for the kids and onlookers to watch, and Cadillac Jack's band entertained the crowd throughout the day. Cash giveaways from the stage for answering questions and for bringing items (i.e., the first kid wearing blue socks to the stage gets \$15) was also popular at the festival.

Tahoka second grader Jayda Rosas was crowned Lynn County Harvest Festival Princess for 2009, for selling the most tickets in the \$1,000 trip voucher raffle. The daughter of Johnny and Shelly Rosas, Jayda won a \$750 savings bond as Princess. First runnerup was Nadalie Carrasco, second runnerup was Kaylyn Green, and third runnerup was Cheyenne Rios, all of whom also won savings bonds. Noe Olveda was named Prince of the Harvest Festival, son of Lucinda Olveda and Juan Olveda, and first runnerup was Zayne Sires. They also won savings bonds for their efforts.

HAVE YOU READ any good books lately? Or any lousy ones? Well, I have, because I read a lot. In fact, I have read at least 82 books in the last year, just from the local library, and probably have read another 35 or 40 books which I bought, or borrowed. I'll get back to those library book numbers, which are accurate, in a minute.

First, let me admit that I haven't read anything which improves my mind, because I don't read the works of the so-called "great" authors (who are mostly dead) and I don't read non-fiction. I read for escapism; I don't much like what is happening in the real world, and I don't want to have to think about it. I want to get lost in a good story, perhaps a mystery, and identify with the main character (who is always younger, stronger, smarter and better looking than I ever was, and who always come out as a winner).

If I have to read a story where the main character is really like me, it is depressing.

At home I have some books I like so well that I have read them several times, and I make a notation inside the front cover of the date I last read it. As I get older, I find that it doesn't matter if I read it last week; I still won't remember how it came out.

At the library in Tahoka, they have software which can tell you how many books you have read in each of the last several years. The nice librarian advised me that I have checked out 82 books in the last year. That's about a book and a half a week, although I don't remember ever checking out half a book.

There are several other library patrons who have checked out many more books than that, with the leaders being two women who have read 147 and 143 respectively. I won't name them, but they both probably have eyesight problems.

My first extra-curricular reading started when I was 8 years old, reading a pulp magazine called *Wild West Weekly* by the light of a "coal oil" (kerosene) lamp. I always thought that was why I so quickly became near-sighted, but just a week or so ago I read that reading in poor light will not hurt a person's vision.

Anyway, I usually read a book in one night, or at least in two. And like the woman who said being forgetful has advantages such as being able to hide your own Easter eggs, I now can read the same book every two or three months and it's still new to me every time.

Doctor Hurts Leg In Home Accident

Dr. Pat Edwards, the most recent addition to Lynn County Hospital's available staff, was temporarily sidelined after breaking a leg in a fall at the front door of his home in Slaton last week, the hospital's directors were advised by administrator Jim Morris at the hospital board meeting last Thursday.

Dr. Edwards is expected to resume seeing patients at his clinic located at the hospital sometime in October.

The board unanimously voted to leave the tax rate at 24.75 cents per \$100 valuation for the coming year, which is expected to raise \$774,303, or about \$48,000 more than was raised in the current year.

The board also voted to eliminate the early payment discount on hospital taxes, since the county and water district have voted out the discount. Taxes paid in October, November, December and January will be the same;

a delinquent penalty becomes effective on taxes paid after Jan. 31.

Susie Sosa, director of Lynnwood Assisted Living facility, appeared before the board to discuss some of the rules and guidelines governing care of residents.

The board unanimously approved manuals for emergency room/trauma policies and pharmacy policies and procedures. The board also conducted a review assessing the job performance of the administrator, then called Morris back into the room to advise him they are very pleased with his performance, and unanimously voted him a raise of \$3,000 annually.

Board president Jerry Ford presided. All board members were present, including Jannis Horwood, Frances Truehart, Virginia Griffing, Nancy Guilliams, Cal Huffaker and Dalton Wood.

HEALTH SCREENINGS CAN SAVE LIVES

You're in your 50s. It's the prime of your life -- or it should be. Don't let illness rob you of your health.

According to WebMD when you go for your annual physical, (if this is not a habit you should begin to make it one.) Make sure your doctor performs or recommends these simple tests that may save your health, and your life later.

Cholesterol Profile. Do you have high cholesterol? Find out; at least once every five years (more if you're at risk for a heart attack). Controlling your cholesterol can add years to your life.

Blood Sugar. Untreated diabetes can destroy your health, causing heart disease, kidney failure, and blindness. Don't let it. Get a fasting blood sugar test at least once every three years and take control of diabetes early.

Blood Pressure. Untreated high blood pressure is an equal opportunity killer. It kills your heart, your brain, your eyes and your kidneys. Don't let hypertension sneak up on you. Get the test. It's simple, it's cheap and it's quick.

For Women Only: Thyroid Hormone Test. Your thyroid, is the body's powerhouse, producing hormones needed for metabolism. Aging (and an erratic immune system) can wreak havoc causing a variety of problems, especially in women. That's why women should get a thyroid test at age 50 and then every five years. **Pelvic Exam and Pap.** You may think you have suffered enough. But you still need these especially if you're sexually active. These procedures once every one to three years pay big dividends in protecting you from cancer and sexually transmitted diseases.

Breast Exam and Mammogram. At this age, getting a mammogram every year and having your doctor examine your breasts for any changes can save your breast and your life.

For Men Only: PSA-Prostate Exam. PSA, short for Prostate Specific Antigen, this blood test when combined with a rectal exam can effectively detect prostate cancer in most men. Most experts recommend getting both tests every year starting at age 50, but some men may need to start getting PSA testing at age 40. Discuss this with your doctor.

The Rectal Exam. Dread it, hate it. Just make sure you get one every year. Along with other tests your doctor may recommend, it may give clues to treatable problems in your colon (think colon cancer) or prostate for men.

Stepping on the Scales. This is the age when most people start gaining weight. Watch this weight gain carefully, and fight back with healthier eating and exercise. Being overweight puts you at high risk for developing a number of diseases and studies show that weight loss can improve your odds.

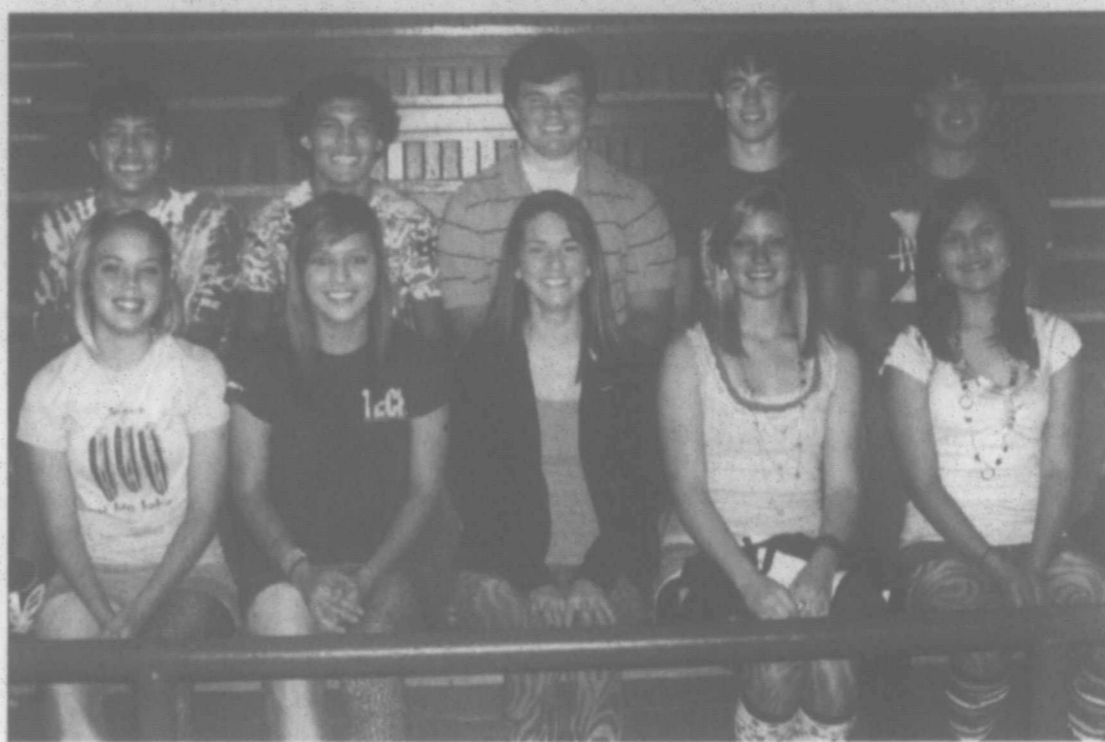
Looking for Moles. Love your skin. Check your skin monthly for any unusual spots or moles. Be sure to ask your doctor to check your skin once a year, as well.

Protecting Your Eyes. Vision-robbing diseases become more common as you age. Be sure to get your eyes examined regularly -- every one to two years. (Go more often if you have vision problems).

Checking your Immunizations. People over age 50 should

get a flu shot every year. And don't forget, even healthy people need a tetanus booster shot every 10 years. Be sure to ask your doctor to update any immunizations that you might need.

Use your birthday as a gentle reminder to schedule a visit to your dentist, and call your doctor to see if there are important tests you should take. By investing an hour or two now, you may be able to add years to your life.

In the USA, celebrate Walk to School Day on October 7, and promote safe walking and bicycling throughout the year. New Deal rolls past Dogs 58-6 Friday

The powerful New Deal Lions, one of the state's top-ranked Class A football teams, justified their ranking by crushing Tahoka 58-6 in the Bulldogs' homecoming game last Friday.

The Lions remained undefeated, untied and unworried as they stormed to a 37-0 lead in the first quarter, then eased off with 14 points in the second period and just 7 points in the last half.

Tahoka QB Neiko Garcia was responsible for most of Tahoka's offense, gaining 53 yards on 18 carries, including a 3-yard run in the third quarter for the

Bulldogs' only score.

Tahoka had only 6 first downs in the game, and just 59 yards of total offense against the talented New Deal defense, and missed on all five pass attempts.

Larry Saldana had 10 tackles to lead the Tahoka defense.

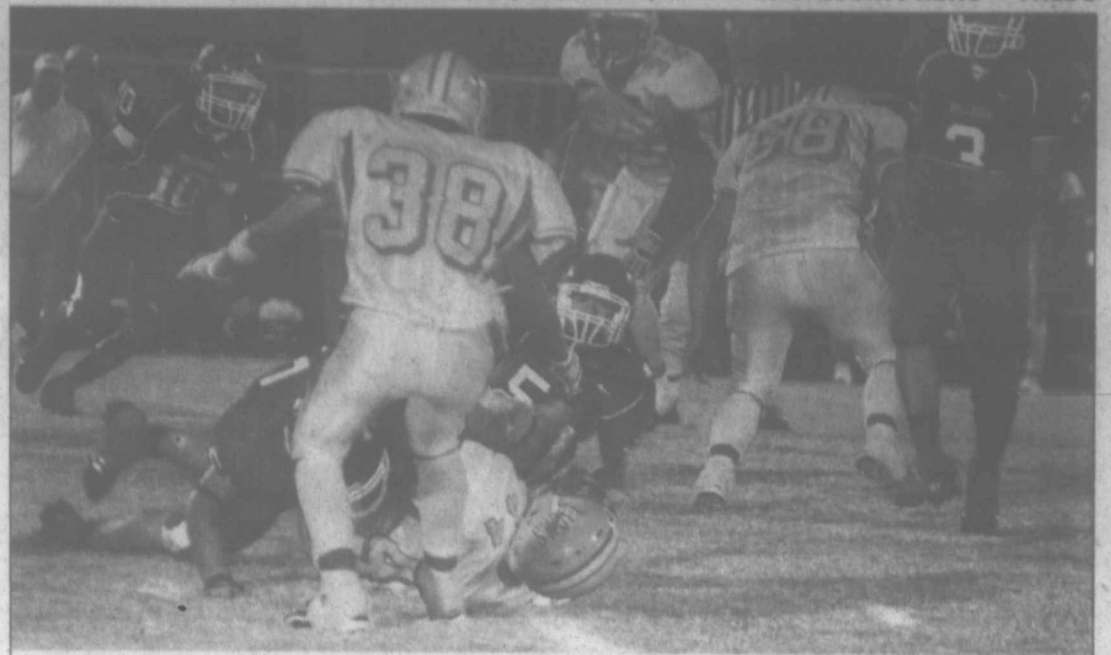
JV Football

Traffic accident, theft reported during week

A traffic accident in Tahoka Monday involved three vehicles, but no injuries resulted.

The Tahoka Police report said Samantha N. Martinez, 22, of Tahoka was driving south on Ave. L and collided with a 1997 Dodge Ram pickup driven by Christopher D. Moers, 30, of Tahoka, who was attempting to turn onto N. 4th St. The impact caused Moers' pickup to strike a 2008 Nissan pickup driven by Steven Starkey, 39, of Tahoka.

Police also took a report from Ralph Wells Huffaker of Tahoka that a starter had been

stolen off a John Deere tractor parked by a barn in the 2000 block of Ave. D sometime since May. The starter was valued at \$1,200.

Only three persons were jailed in Lynn County during the last week, one each on charges of possession of marijuana, failure to appear on charges of driving while license invalid, and driving while intoxicated second offense.

The arrests left the total jail population here at 38, with five held for Lubbock and one for Garza County.

Area gins gearing up for upcoming cotton harvest

Lynn County area ginning plants are gearing up for the cotton harvest that will soon be underway, and in fact the Texas Star Gin in Wilson/Union has already reported their first bale ginned from a Lubbock area producer, Nathan Bednarz, on Sept. 22. They reported a total of 26 bales ginned as of this week.

Other gins contacted by The News say they expect to begin processing in the next week or two, as area producers begin harvesting their crops. Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell and

Grassland Coop Gin estimate they will have their first bales this week. New Home Coop/Lakeview, Farmers Coop Gin in Tahoka, Woolam Gin in O'Donnell and Wells Coop Gin expect to begin processing cotton within two weeks, and Close City Gin in Post estimates a month before they will start.

The News will begin reporting weekly bale counts in about two weeks, as soon as most gins have numbers to report.

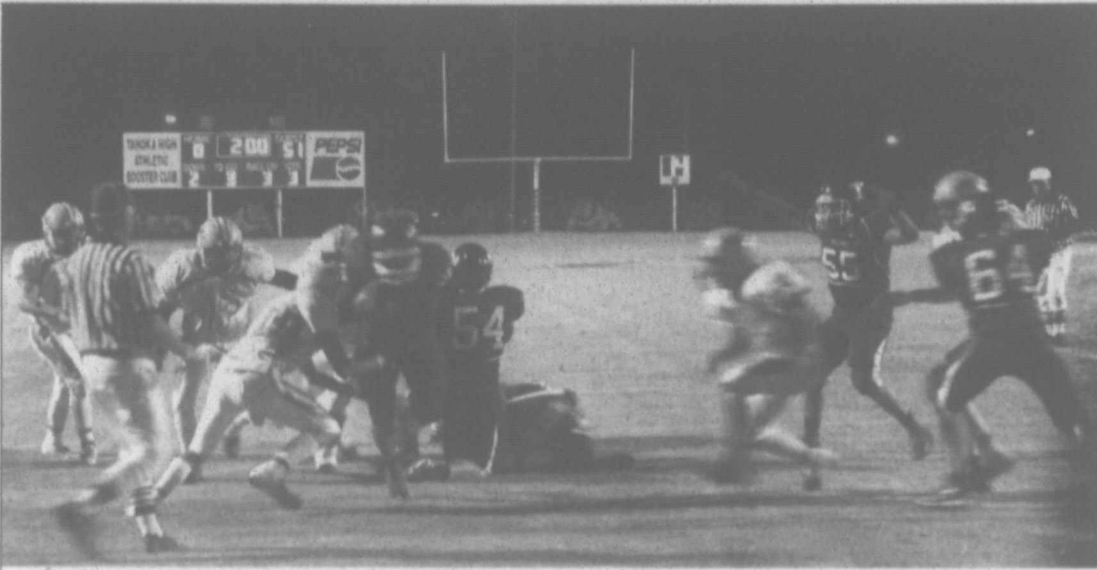

It was close for more than a half, but eventually the six-man football team of Christ the King Cathedral of Lubbock wore down the Wilson Mustangs last Friday and managed a 50-32 win over Wilson.

The Mustangs led 14-8 after the first quarter, but were behind 18-14 at halftime. The CTK team outscored Wilson 12-6 in the third and 20-12 in the fourth period.

For Wilson, Frederick Ramos had 189 yards rushing and 53 on two pass receptions. His longest run was 65 yards, and he averaged 15.7 yards per carry. He scored four touchdowns, including three by rushing. He also was the leading tackler on defense, counted in on 16 tackles.

Jordan Guzman gained 80 yards in just six carries, and also scored a touchdown. Guzman, Brandon Bassinger and Francisco Hernandez also did well on defense for Coach Cody Sandlin's Mustangs.

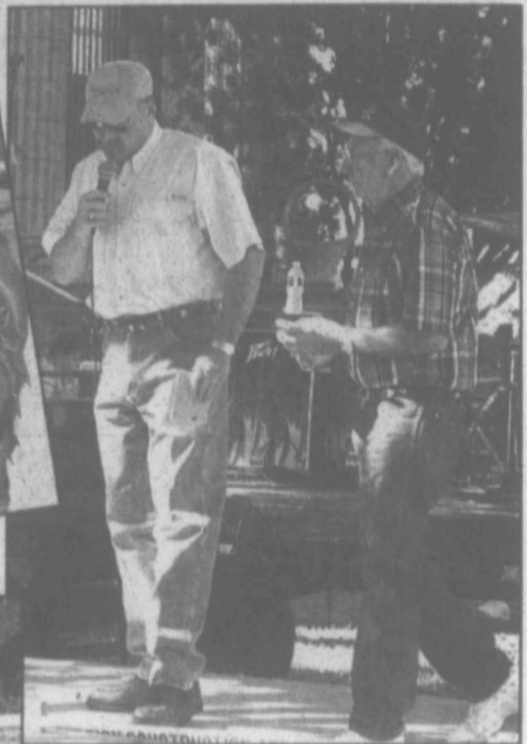
