# SEASON FOR GIVING Local church provides help

### Four file for county offices

Four incumbents have officially filed for reelection to Lynn County offices, according to information from county party chairmen this week. As of Tuesday morning, four candidates filed with the Democratic party, and none had filed with the Republican party for local offices, although it is expected that there will be some before the filing deadline expires on Jan. 4.

Incumbents filing for re-election include Mike Braddock, Commissioner of Precinct 2; Susan Tipton, County Clerk; H.G. Franklin, County Judge; and Sandra Laws, District Clerk, all on the Democratic ticket.

Additionally, District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht has filed for another term as 106th District Judge, on the Republican ticket. The 106th Judicial District includes Lynn, Garza, Dawson and Gaines counties.

Candidates must file with their county party chairman by Jan. 4. John Baker is the Republican county chairman, 561-5566, and Rosalinda Gutierrez is Democratic county chairman, 806-401-4083.

Local offices up for election include district clerk, county clerk, county treasurer, county judge, both Justice of Peace offices, and Pct. 2 and 4 commissioners. Primary elections are March 2, 2010 and the General Election will be Nov. 2, 2010.



A NEW FOSSIL of a different kind of dinosaur, perhaps an early ancestor of all other kinds of dinosaurs, was discovered in New Mexico recently and was described in a newspaper article (Lubbock Avalanche-Journal) last week.

An artist's drawing of the creature is included, and if the depiction is accurate, the ancient creature looked like a cross between a bird and a nightmare. It is really ugly, and if you ever wake up some morning and see one of these things perched at the foot of your bed, you need to lay off the sauce.

It's called Tawa hallae, which sounds like a name chosen by a pop singer, but the story said the fierce looking dinosaur is named for Tawa, a Hopi sun god, and for the late amateur paleontologist Ruth Hall, whose fossil collection helped found the Ruth Hall Museum at Ghost Ranch, where the quarry in which the bones were found is located. It was more like a lizard than a bird, although birds reportedly evolved from dinosaurs.

I had not remembered anything about a place called Ghost Ranch in New Mexico, but when I looked it up, I discovered that Lactually have been pretty close to the place on a couple of occasions.

There's some kind of place called Ghost Ranch in Santa Fe, just three blocks north of the historic plaza (and I've been to the plaza), but the Ghost Ranch where the ugly bird-o-saur bones were found is northwest of Santa Fe, 40 miles beyond Espanola on U.S. 84, the same highway as you find at Post, Slaton, Lubbock and on northwest up through Clovis, etc.

I also have been to Espanola, but nobody told me there were monsters' bones nearby.

This Tawa hallae, six to 12 feet long, was carnivorous, like the later dinosaurs, meaning they ate meat, such as other animals and people, if there were any around in those days, about 213 million years ago.

Those things lived on red meat, which explains why they are extinct. They all died of heart attacks caused by too much cholesterol.





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

# Plan ahead for winter storms

Winter storms can strand motorists traveling northern routes in Texas, sometimes striking South Texas and coastal areas. When winter storms threaten, monitor broadcast media and NOAA Weather Radio for information, says the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM). Keep your gas tank full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines. On icy roads, drive slowly and increase distance required for stop. Watch for downed trees and power lines across roads. If power is out, treat all intersections as four-way stops.

· Blankets/sleeping bags and extra clothing, mittens and hat · Cell phone, radio, flashlight, extra batteries

· First-aid kit and pocket knife

· High calorie, non perishable food, bottled water

· Sack of sand or cat litter for de-icing roadway · Windshield scraper, tool

EMERGENCY TIPS FOR HOME

If a winter storm leads to

a power outage, be extremely careful using generators or gas powered equipment. Carbon monoxide (CO) is invisible, odorless, deadly - and can build up in a matter of minutes. Do not use generators, charcoal grills or gas grills inside the house, garage or enclosed space. Do not try to heat the house using a gas range or oven. Be prepared at home:

· Battery-powered NOAA weather radio, batteries, flashlights, cell phone and chargers, manual can opener

· One-week supply of food, water, medicine, medical supplies and items for special health care needs, babies and the elderly

· Pet supplies, kitty litter or sand for de-icing steps and walkways

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· Heating fuel, properly ventilated emergency heating source such as a fireplace, wood stove or space heater

· Fire extinguisher, smoke detector, carbon monoxide detector

I can only imagine what it would be like to look into your child's eyes and not know how you can immediately provide for them. Our mission is to not let that happen."

"As we see more and more fires, we also appreciate the benevolence of our donors and supporters, without whom, our services would not be possible. We've been doing a lot. You can help." Raney concluded, "Our mission is never in recession."

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

### **Census Bureau seeking applicants** for working in local communities

The U.S. Census Bureau is recruiting and testing motivated individuals to work in local communities across the state of Texas for the 2010 Census.

Testing for these positions is taking place now, and testing information is available at (866)861-2010. Pay is based on position and location, with flexible work schedules of up to 40 hours per week. Peak hiring will take place in May, but applicants may be offered temporary positions as early as January. The Census Bureau hires locally, offers paid training and gives mileage reimbursement.

"Our goal of recruiting individuals from every neighborhood is crucial to achieving an accurate Census count," says Gabriel Sanchez, the Census Bureau's Regional Director for the Dallas Region, which is comprised of Mississippi, Louisi-

ana, and Texas. "The decennial census is mandated at a national level, but cannot be successful without the help from the communities within the region."

Census Day is April 1, 2010, and the Census Bureau's Dallas Region has begun operations to ensure that every person is counted in the 2010 Census. A total of 38 Local Census Offices are operating across Texas. Based on the workload, these offices will need to recruit and employ approximately 84,000 workers during peak 2010 Census operations throughout Texas.

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session-Monday morning, considering several routine agenda items. including a new annual contract for providing defense counsel to indigent persons in the local judicial system. District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht provided information on the proposed contract for 2010, any portion of the county. The which amounted to \$8,118 for order does not prohibit common Lynn County's portion, slightly higher than last year's portion of \$7,609. The contract is based on the number of indigent defendants served in the prior year, with the cost-share divided between the four counties in the 106th Judicial District, including Lynn, Gaines (\$22,855), Dawson (\$27,126) and Garza (\$7,900), for a total annual contract of \$66,000 between the four counties. In 2009, there were 309 cases disposed involving indigent defense in the 106th Judicial District, including 38 cases in Lynn County, 37 in Garza,





# Neighbors help Draper family harvest 50th, final cotton crop

ers are among the most helpful in the world - just ask the family of the late John Draper, who relied on neighbors and other county producers to harvest Draper's 50th and final cotton crop recently. Draper, 69, had planned to retire after harvesting this year's 500 acres of cotton, and had made plans to rent out the land to other producers so as to keep the family acreage, at least in name, since his children were employed in other ventures. # Wilson boys, girls compete at Gail

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


