County designates third reinvestment zone for wind energy development

Lynn County Commissioners met Monday morning for a public hearing regarding designation of another reinvestment zone for wind energy projects, approving Lynn County Reinvestment Zone No. 3 for wind energy development with Alternity Wind Energy. There were no public comments made at the hearing, and commissioners unanimously approved the designation of an area east of U.S. 87 and north and south of Hwy. 380.

This is the third reinvestment zone designation by the county, which is one of the steps involved in bringing wind energy projects to the area. A reinvestment zone must be designated before tax abatements can be considered, and each reinvestment zone designation is for different areas/companies. The first two zones granted by the county were for WindTex Energy, one in the southeast corner of the county that joins with a wind energy project in the O'Donnell area, and another area east of US 87 and north of Hwy. 380 that is separate from the Zone 3 designation just granted.

None of the wind energy projects

have begun the construction phase as yet.

In other business, commissioners met with a representative from the Cancer Control Center who explained preventative measures for early detection of colon cancer, and commissioners approved a proclamation that Lynn County recognizes the need and declares next year as Colon Cancer Awareness Year.

Budget amendments for all four precincts were approved, moving \$12,000 from Road and Bridge funds to each commissioner precinct. An existing contract for technical service with Computer Express was discussed, and commissioners voted to keep the contract but to renegotiate some changes to the contract regarding outside technical services. Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on his department's activities, and monthly bills were approved.

Lynn County Judge H.G. Franklin presided at the meeting, with commissioners Keith Wied, Mike Braddock, Don Blair and Brad Hammonds present.

Former JP sentenced to probation, restitution

Former Justice of the Peace Ginger Henry pleaded guilty in 106th District Court Friday of theft by a public servant and was sentenced by Judge Carter Schildknecht to serve a suspended term of five years, plus a \$1000 fine and restitution of \$10,277.44 to Lynn County.

Virginia Lee (Ginger) Henry, 55, of Tahoka, former Lynn County Precinct 1 Justice of Peace, was indicted in April on felony charges of theft by public servant by a 106th District Court grand jury. The felony indictment charge was on theft of funds between \$1500-\$20,000.

Henry, who was elected to the office in January 2007, was placed on leave of absence in early December 2008 during an investigation conducted by the Texas Rangers. She resigned from the JP office on Dec. 30, effective Jan. 1, 2009. The Texas Rangers and State Attorney General's office handled the case.

In court Friday, Henry's actual sentence was for 10 years in prison, but included the stipulation that the last five years will be dropped when five years of community supervision are successfully completed. The sentence also included 10 days in county jail.

During the last week, Tahoka Police investigated reports of a traffic accident which caused no injuries, a cat biting a small child, and harassment of a young woman by cell phone text messages.

A Tahoka man reported that his 18-year-old daughter had been getting harassing text messages from her former boyfriend, also a Tahoka resident.

Last Friday, a Tahoka woman reported that her daughter, 17 months old, had been attacked by a large gray stray cat. The cat later was trapped and taken to the city warehouse.

On Sunday at the U.S. 87 west access road and Lockwood, a 2010 Ford Focus driven by Penny Ann McWilliams, 36, of Lubbock was involved in a collision with a 2000 Ford Taurus driven by Pablo Herevia, 25, of Tahoka.

Twelve more persons were arrested and jailed in Lynn County during the last week, three of those on charges of organized crime related to delivery of marijuana, less than five pounds.

The new arrests coupled with normal releases, left the jail population at 38 early this week, with 10 of those held

for Lubbock County. The latest arrests also included these charges: resisting arrest/interference with public duties, warrant on violation of promise to appear/warrant on application to revoke probation on drunk driving conviction, judgment on theft by public servant, driving while license invalid/enhanced, warrant on application to revoke probation on conviction of displaying fictitious license plate, assault on a public servant plus resisting arrest, warrant on theft over \$50 and less than \$500, accident involving injury or death plus DWI second offense, warrant on evading arrest with vehicle plus assault/domestic

Tahoka man gets multiple snake bites

O.R. "Pug" Parker of Tahoka was airlifted to a Lubbock hospital last Thursday evening after he was bitten on the hand multiple times by rattle-snakes. Parker, 87, had gone to his farm north of Tahoka, and was working on a fence gate. Looking for a screw, he stuck his hand into a bin in a compartment on the back of his camper, apparently thrusting his hand into a nest of baby snakes and a mother snake.

He was bitten 9 times, doctors determined, with one bite from the mother and the rest from the babies. Doctors also said that the bite of a baby snake is much worse than the bite of an adult snake because baby snakes don't evaluate how much venom to put into a victim.

Parker's wife, Billie Wayne, immediately drove him to the hospital in Tahoka and then he was airlifted to a Lubbock hospital, where he is undergoing treatment. It was reported that his left hand and arm were extremely swollen, and the swelling moved up into his shoulder and chest, and he was given numerous bags of anti-venom. His problems are complicated by other health issues as well, and Parker remains in the hospital this week.

SEVERAL DAYS AGO as my wife was driving us down U.S. 87 toward Lamesa, I looked up at the sky and noticed what appeared to be a huge hand formed in the white clouds. Later I saw what looked to me like the outline of a dog, with feet, snout, body and tail.

"Do you suppose any kids these days sit around and look at the sky to see what images they can pick out of the clouds?" I asked.

"I doubt it," she replied. "Now they probably just play video games on computers or TV, and never think about anything in the sky." She added that when she was a child, she used to spend hours at a time just looking at the clouds, and I remember that I did that, too. Sometimes two or three of us youngsters would just sit or lie down in the shade outside in the summer and see who could spot the most interesting formations in the clouds.

Those were magical times, and I sort of believe that kids who used their imagination like that to entertain themselves may have benefitted more than the youngsters today who spend all their time with video games, mostly pretty violent in nature.

Of course, we didn't have any of the technological knowledge children acquire so rapidly these days. But what we saw in the clouds, although we knew it wasn't real, was interesting.

The Bible and a folk song say Ezekiel saw a wheel "way up in the middle of the air," and my brother, who was an airlines pilot, always thought Ezekiel saw a flying saucer sent by aliens (the kind who came from the stars, not those who cross over the Rio Grande into Arizona).

Gene Autry saw a gold mine and Judy Garland saw rainbows in the sky, and hundreds of songwriters and lovers saw things in the moon that never were verified by Neil Armstrong.

So there are wondrous things to be seen in the sky, and youngsters and other people who look up at the clouds have few limits on what the imagination can offer, and there are no limits to places you can go in your mind.




Couple announce engagement

Using 911 to Report **Emergencies**

As you'll recall, last week's column discussed the importance of using the 911 system when requesting an ambulance. This week we'd like to discuss ways in which you can make an efficient 911 call.

When making a 911 call:

· Remain calm, speak slowly and clearly, for any type of emergency

· Explain what type of emergency you are reporting

· If you are requesting an ambulance, stay on the line while the dispatcher transfers

the call to the hospital · Remember, you will be asked questions. These questions will help the ambulance be prepared for treatment of the patient & does not delay the am-

bulance · Give the location as precisely as you can. Include the address (even though it's on the 911 screen, you will be asked to

verify it) · Give the age of the person needing help or the number of people needing help

 Is the patient conscious? · Is the patient breathing?

When requesting an ambulance, call 911 for a life-threatening

· Breathing difficulty /shortness of breath or if breathing

has stopped · Choking (can't talk or

· Constant chest pain - in adults lasting longer than 2 min-

· Uncontrollable bleeding / large amount of blood loss

Drowning

Electrocution

emergency such as:

 Drug overdose /poisoning Vomiting blood

 Sudden fainting /unconsciousness

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· Convulsions /seizures (uncontrolled jerking)

· Severe allergic reaction (difficulty breathing /unrespon-

· Major burns (white or charred skin: blisters and redness over large area)

 Someone who will not wake up, even when you shake

· Severe injuries from:

- Traffic accidents - Head injuries

- Significant falls


Lynn County Hospital District EMS is equipped to handle all of these illnesses/ injuries and transport the patient to the appropriate hospital for care.

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

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department has 20 members

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department has long served the citizens of Tahoka and Lynn County, comprised of 20 men who volunteer their time and expertise to prepare and train as firemen, and who meet every other Monday evening for two-hour training sessions for training and certification.

Steve Sanders is Fire Chief, and the department currently has six vehicles including a 5,000-gallon tanker truck to haul water, a pumper truck, two brush trucks for grass fires, one rescue truck, and an old converted ambulance that hauls men and/or equipment. In addition, the department recently acquired an old army truck from the U.S. Forestry Service, at no cost, which they are converting for usage in fighting grass fires.

Auction funds new scanner at hospital

Funds from the annual hospital benefit auction and fish fry have been used to purchase a new computerized radiography scanner at Lynn County Hospital, administrator Jim Morris advised hospital board members last Thursday.

Morris said the scanner will "greatly increase the quality of x-ray images" at the facility.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board, trustees approved a resolution of support to maintain the hospital's Level IV trauma designation with the state, a necessary step for the trauma level designation application, a process which takes place every two years.

The board also approved a nurse staffing policy that addresses the hospital's plan for nurse-to-patient coverage as well as preparing for additional coverage if needed.

A Lynnwood rate review was tabled until the next meeting, and the transition to a new EMS director was discussed.

All board members were present, with President Jerry Ford presiding. Others present were members Cal Huffaker, Jannis Horwood, Frances Truehart, James Craig, Victoria Baker, and Nancy Guilliams.

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Rep. Heflin hosts West Texas Agriculture Issues Summit with near-capacity crowd attending

(Crosbyton - June 28, 2010) State Representative Joe Heflin hosted the first-ever West Texas Agriculture Issues Summit at the Plainview Civic Center earlier this month. Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples presented the keynote address, and a number of other government and agriculture industry leaders addressed current issues facing agriculture in West Texas for a near-capacity crowd.

Legislative redistricting was

a dominant topic, with State Senator-Robert Duncan (Lubbock) saying that legislative seniority within the West Texas delegation will play an important role in assuring that West Texas retains maximum representation in Austin. Redistricting affects things like the amount of federal funding a region will receive, and that always impacts infrastructure such as schools, roads and utilities, Duncan said. "Our challenge," he said, "will be to preserve as many seats as we

can (for West Texas)." Commissioner Staples told the group, "We need policies that will support urban and rural Texas...and then we need to remind our urban neighbors that...we need policies that continue to support production agriculture.... We need to continue to look for technology and assure that's being dispersed to rural areas. That's why we need to keep our taxes low so that we can attract jobs and businesses and investment to rural areas,"


Other speakers and topics at the summit included State Representative Joe Pickett (El Paso) on transportation, Representative David Swinford (Dumas) on wind energy, and Representatives Hardcastle (Vernon) and Heflin on other alternative energy sources, including solar, nuclear, and coal. Eric Beverly of the Texas Department of Rural Affairs spoke on rural economic development, and Texas Farm Bureau Legislative Director Billy Howe addressed water

The group was welcomed by Plainview Mayor John Anderson, and Rep. Heflin thanked the speakers as well as the local community leaders and involved citizens who attended the summit. "We have a new session coming up in 2011," Heflin said, "and the representatives and senators really want to know what agriculture and local communities see as the main issues for the coming session." Rep. Heflin represents Texas
