Burglaries of car, home investigated by officers

Tahoka Police this week investigated reports of a burglary of a home, and also a burglary of a vehicle. No items were listed as stolen in either report, but damage was reported.

On Saturday, damage was reported to picture frames and electronic equipment at the home of Dennis Ray Newsom on N. 6th St. Entry was not forced, but damage to two picture frames and a stereo/TV knocked to the floor was estimated at \$250.

Cristina Coronado of Tahoka told police Sunday that someone had cut a window out of her 2006 Ford Taurus, with the loss estimated at \$424.

On Sunday a 50-year-old Tahoka man was treated at Lynn County Hospital for apparem minor injuries reportedly suffered when, he said, three persons in a city park attacked him at approximately 1 a.m. when he was walking by the park.

Lynn County jail held 23 inmates early this week, with three of those held for Gaines County. Charges on which four persons were jailed in the last week were warrant on failure to appear on charges of driving while license invalid/enhanced, evading arrest with a vehicle, judgment on possession of marijuana under two ounces, and assault/family violence.

Commissioners propose keeping tax rate at 86-cents; set hearings

Lynn County Commissioners met Tuesday morning, approving the proposed 2010-2011budget and proposed tax rate and setting public hearings for both on Aug. 23 and Aug. 31. Commissioners are proposing keeping the current tax rate of \$.86110 to fund the budget. While the tax rate is not an increase from the previous year, it is considered a tax increase because it will bring in more funds than last year due to increased values.

Total expenditures on the proposed budget are estimated at \$4,111,882 and

total revenue expected is \$4,260,011, including tax levy revenue of

\$2,677,469. A 3% increase in salaries for elected officials, and other county employees, is included in the proposed budget. The increase would put salaries at the following amounts, with travel allowances also listed (which did not increase): County Judge \$43,511 (\$28,511 from the county plus a \$15,000 judicial state supplement), plus a \$2,400 travel

allowance; four County Commission-(See COMMISSIONERS, pg. 6)









My Aching feet!

The FLIP-FLOP. Flip-flops were designed years ago to be worn around the pools and in showers to prevent catching athlete's foot or planters warts according to specialists. Nowadays they are the summertime craze but they are not meant to be worn with abandon. Unlike sturdy shoes, Flip-flops are not good for extensive walking because they offer no arch support, heel cushioning, or shock absorption, according the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA).

Vacationers find out the hard way. You take your flip-flops on your trip and halfway through your feet begin to hurt. "They let your foot be as flat as they can be" states Dr. Jim Christina, of the American Podiatric Medical Association, and "you are not getting any support." Dr. Christina says everything in moderation. As long as you are not doing a lot of walking, it's probably okay to wear them. If you are having foot pain and need an alternative you can go to the APMA website. They

have a list of approved flip flops if you must wear them. Just look under Products We Recognize in the search box. Apma.org If you are diabetic flip-flops are never recommended to wear.

A foot injury can become very serious, even leading to amputation. Diabetics need the proactive function of something that covers their toes according to Dr. Christina.

Some Don'ts when it comes to wearing sandals:

*Don't run or play sports in flip flops. This means backyard fun as well. *Don't wear sandals riding

*Don't do yard work in san-

*Don't walk in tall grass. (this means cotton too.) *Don't drive in flip-flops;

they can come off and lodge under the break or gas pedal.

Here are some injuries that have occurred while wearing flip flops: stubbed toes, glass cuts, puncture wounds, smashed foot, sprained ankles, and fractures, sever ligament injuries, sever cuts to toes or feet, bug and snake bites!

So, if you are currently experiencing foot pain, heel pain or just plain achiness in your feet? The culprit may be those fashionable shoes we all wear almost year round out here in West Texas, but remember they will probably bring you a lot of foot trouble later in life so it may be in your best interest to take the time to put on a better

Council has budget session

Tahoka City Council met Monday night to pay monthly bills and hear department reports, and then began the first of their budget sessions to work on the upcoming year's budget issues. Mayor John Baker led the session with all council members and City Administrator Jerry Webster present.

Police Chief Doyle Lee reported his department's activities, and told the council that he was expecting to receive a report from the Texas Rangers this week in an ongoing homicide investigation in the Rudy Chapa Jr. case, but that autopsy reports are still most likely several weeks away.

Webster told The News that the council will meet in special session Friday at 5 p.m. to consider information regarding a rate increase settlement with Atmos Energy and the coalition of cities involved in the rate increase request from Atmos.



Tahoka ISD to keep \$1.04 property tax rate

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night in regular session, following a budget workshop prior to the regular meeting to discuss school revenue and expenditures for 2010-2011. Trustees approved a proposed Maintenance and Operations tax rate of \$1.04 for the 2010-2011 school year, which is the same rate as last year. They set a public hearing on the budget for 6 p.m. August 24, and expect to approve the budget and set the tax rate after the hearing.

Trustee John · Hawthorne was elected as Vice-President of the Board to fill the vacancy after Tony Garcia resigned. Reports from the principals and athletic director were given, and trustees went into executive session to discuss personnel.

In other business, the Board accepted two quote proposals, one from the Texas Association of School Boards for property, casualty, and fleet insurance and the other from Thriftway Grocery for milk. Trustees also approved a teacher appraisal calendar, as required by state statute, which stipulates when school administrators may conduct state required classroom observations of teachers, and approved all of the school district's certified administrators as second appraisers in the event a teacher requests a second appraisal. The student code of conduct was approved for the 2010-2011 school year.

Some repair work to the outside of the Gardner wing of the elementary campus was approved, with trustees approving a bid of \$24,000 from Advantage USAA for the work. Repairs will include replacing the mortar that is missing between the bricks, seal the brick wall and seal around the windows and work on the roof flashing.

Trustee Abraham Vega was appointed as the voting delegate to the Texas Association School Board Convention, and trustee Scott Dimak was appointed as the alternate.
