Burglaries, domestic violence investigated

Tahoka police during the last week were busy with reports of vehicle burglaries, domestic violence, thefts and a shooting fatality in the city.

Last Tuesday Marvin Pierce reported that someone had stolen items valued at \$120 from his Ford pickup parked at his residence on N. 7th St. Stolen on Aug. 28 were a battery booster and a black Maglite flashlight.

Tahoka Mayor John Baker advised police that on Friday his car was burglarized and two shotguns and a laser measuring tool were stolen. The shotguns, both 12 gages, were Remington and Ithica. Total value of the three missing items was listed at \$550.

Two vehicles on Ave. K were targeted by burglars, according to reports received Saturday. A vehicle owned by Kathy Byrum had a window broken out, but nothing appeared to be missing. A vehicle parked nearby, owned by Joan Power of Rogers AK, had damage, but entry was not gained.

A 26-year-old Tahoka man was arrested on a warrant specifying two counts of disorderly conduct, three counts of assault and one count of endangering a child after police went to a scene of domestic disturbance Sept. 1. Police also went to another location of family violence Thursday when a woman reported she had been assaulted by her 44-year-old boyfriend.

The Lynn County Harvest Festival will be held at the courthouse square in Tahoka next Saturday, Sept. 18, featuring live entertainment, food booths, games, and cash prizes from audience participation. The Harvest Festival Princess and Queen will be named during the afternoon, and a movie night on the square will be held at this year's festival to conclude the day's activities.

The fun starts at 10,a.m. with turtle races for the children (kids must bring their own turtles, decorated, for the races). Food and game booths will be open throughout the day. For information about booth space, contact booth chairman Rebecca Ingle at 561-4440. Booths close at 5 p.m. Admission to the festival is free. Bring lawn chairs for seating on the courthouse lawn.

Something new this year, the movie on the square, will begin at dark. Popcorn and soft drinks will be available from the NHS concession, and everyone should bring quilts or lawn chairs for seating. The movie will be shown on the wall of Tejeda's Café, facing the courthouse, and admission is free.

Also new is a Photo/Art Show that will be displayed in the courthouse basement.




I HAD to order a new printer for my computer recently, and, of course, it operates a bit differently from the one I had. I mentioned to my wife that I was not completely happy with the new one.

Bulldogs win again, ready to host Plains

The Varsity Bulldogs traveled to Ralls Friday night and came home with their second win of the 2010 season, with a 35-14 win under their belt to prepare for their home opener this week as they host Plains.

It was quarterback Neiko Garcia who started things off for the Dogs with a 5-yard run with 12:00 minutes left in the first quarter. The extra point was missed and Tahoka was up 6-0. Feeling his adrenaline pump-

ing, Garcia was on a roll with his second rushing touchdown of the evening from 9 yards out. Cristian Ramirez added the extra point to make the score 13-0 with 9:27 left to go. A couple of possessions later, Garcia decided to go to the air and launched a 52-yard touchdown pass to Trai Smith. Ramirez was there with the kick and the Bulldogs were up 20-0 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, it was Smith who scrambled the 2 yards into the end zone for his second touchdown of the night. Ke'Shawn Hood threw a pass to Cristian Ramirez for the 2-point conversion to put the Bulldogs up 28-0 with 7:01 left to go. Ralls finally got on the scoreboard with a

touchdown pass. Smith still wasn't satisfied and added another rushing touchdown when he bulldozed into the end zone with 1:32 left in the first half. Ramirez added the extra point and the score was 35-6 at

halftime in favor of Tahoka. A Ralls touchdown pass was the only score of the entire second half.

Chance Cook led the Bulldog defense with 15 tackles followed by John Ryan who had 12. Ricardo Delgado had 2 interceptions and Sabino Perez had 1.



September is **National Head Lice Prevention Month**

First and foremost remember that anyone can get head lice. Lice are chiefly contracted by head-to-head contact but also from sharing hats, brushes and headrests. Prevention is a much better option than having to treat your child or yourself for lice according to headlice.org.

Here are some ways you can help keep head lice out of your

child's hair.

1) Talk with your child: teach them to never use someone else's brush or wear another's hat.

2) Watch for signs of head lice. such as frequent head scratching. 3) Check all family members

at least once a week. Look for lice and nits (lice eggs). Lice are reddish-brown wingless insects. nits are grayish-white, always oval shaped and are "glued" at an angle to the side of the hair shaft. (Do not confuse hair debris with nits. Hair debris are segments that are easily dislodged such as dandruff. Lice treatment is inap-

propriate for hair debris.) IF lice are found begin treatment immediately. Treatment can consist of using an over-the-counter or prescription "shampoo" and removing all nits from the hair. Follow package instructions very carefully as all treatments are pesticides. Never let treatment get into the eyes. Treat over a sink not in a shower; never let chemical flow over the complete body. Use a very fine toothed comb to remove all the nits from hair. Separate hair in sections and again remove all nits. This manual removal is also a safe alternative to using the treatment shampoos.

Next you will need to wash all bedding and recently worn clothing in HOT water and dry in a HOT dryer. Soak combs and brushes in HOT water for 10 minutes. Vacuum upholstered furniture, rugs, stuffed animals and cars seats.


Lastly you need to notify your child's school, day care provider, neighborhood parents and anyone else that your child might have come into contact with. Remember prevention is the best way to protect your family and community.

Mammograms are a fact of health care life for women. And so are rumors of the discomforts, confusion and controversy surrounding mammograms. Some women wonder if having this routine preventive procedure done is even a good idea. Before making that decision, here are some facts to think about:

Fact 1: Mammograms save lives. Several studies have shown that regular screening mammograms can help decrease the chance of dying from breast cancer. For example, evidence suggests that mammograms can increase breast cancer survival rates as much as 30 percent for women over age 50.

Fact 2: Mammograms are safe. The level of radiation a woman encounters when getting a mammogram does not increase her risk of breast cancer.

Fact 3: Mammograms provide more treatment options. In many cases, finding a tumor early gives women the opportunity to choose less radical surgery. Fact 4: Mammograms aren't

perfect. Sometimes false positives (a cancerous lump is suspected but not present) do occur. However, standard follow-up procedures (including ultrasounds, biopsies and fine needle aspirations) can go a step further in diagnosing breast cancer for women with abnormal mammograms.

The American Cancer Society recommends:

· A mammogram every year for women age 40 and older, as long as they are in good health.

· A clinical breast examination as part of a regular physical by a health professional at least every three years for women in their 20s and 30s. After age 40, women should have a breast exam by a health expert every year.

Medicare, Medicaid, and most private health plans cover all or part of the cost of this test. or call the Texas Department of State Health Services at 1(512) 458-7796 for assistance in finding out about free or low-cost mammograms. For more questions concerning mammograms, consult a doctor or health care professional.
