Early voting begins Monday for November 2 elections

Registered voters may begin casting ballots in the Nov. 2 General Election during early voting which begins Monday, Oct. 18 and continues through Oct. 29. In Lynn County, early voting will be conducted in the basement courtroom of the Lynn County Courthouse during regular business hours, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday. All voters should bring their voter registration cards to vote.

Two county races will be decided in the Nov. 2 election, with Dana McKay (incumbent) and Nancy Guilliams vying for Justice of Peace, Pct. 1, and Danny Martin and Larry Durham seeking the Pct. 4 Commissioner seat.

Listed on the ballot will be several county offices under the heading "Uncontested Candidates Declared Elected," that lists six county officials who are uncontested in their bids for re-election

creating and perfecting forms that help the office flow more smoothly.

In July of 2008 McKay passed the State of Texas Judicial Court Clerk Certification Test after taking the test only once, which is an accomplishment as only 66% of court clerks pass this test, many after numerous attempts. To learn more about the tasks and duties of a Justice of Peace, McKay has completed more than 179 hours of continuing education.

In Ector County, McKay worked as a volunteer with the Victims Witness Program through the DA's office preparing before and staying with the children (victims) during court hearings. She and Steve McKay, a Sergeant in the Tahoka Police Department, have been married for almost 26 years. When Steve became a police officer, he wanted to move to Lynn County because his grandparents were from here.

The McKays are members of First United Methodist Church of Tahoka where she is on the Administrative

and for whom no votes will be cast. That list includes County Judge H.G. Franklin, District Clerk Sandra Laws, County Clerk Susan Tipton, County Treasurer Pam Miller, Pct. 2 Commissioner Mike Braddock, and Pct. 4 Justice of Peace E.L. Follis, Jr. District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht is running unopposed on the ballot as well, but there will be a place on the ballot for voters to mark beside her name.

Also on the ballot for New Home ISD voters will be an election for four New Home ISD trustees.

In addition to several state offices, including a hotly contested race for Texas Governor with incumbent Rick Perry (R) challenged by Bill White (D), Kathie Glass (LIB) and Deb Shafto (GRN), and incumbent Joe Heflin (D) challenged by Jim Landtroop (R) for State Representative District 85, there will also be a place on the ballot to vote for a Pct. 1 Director for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District #1. Five candidates are running for the water district director position, including George Sell, Lloyd Arthur, James Powell, Jeanette Nathan and Chester "Ches" Carthel.

There is one federal race on the ballot for consideration, for U.S. Representative, District 19. Incumbent Randy Neugebauer (R) faces challengers Andy Wilson (D) and Richard "Chip" Peterson (Lib). Sample ballots may be seen at the courthouse.


There will also be information available about long term care, oxygen and medical equipment, tips on tobacco prevention and control, EMS information and File of Life cards, and other medical information.

LAST WEEK Frito-Lay announced that the company no longer would use biodegradable bags for Sun Chips, because there had been too many complaints that the bags made a lot of noise when people reached into them for chips.





City initiates automated phone messages for water cutoff, boil notices this week

Many Tahoka residents received automated phone calls on Monday from the City of Tahoka to notify them that the city water had been cut off for emergency repair work. The new notification system is now operational for emergency notifications only, sending messages to those 1,165 phone numbers that have been requested by city residents for the service.

"We believe the new emergency notification system is going to work well for us," said City Administrator Jerry Webster. "However, we want to let people know that it is not necessary to call back to the City Hall phone number if you missed the call," he added.

When the call is sent, a recorded message says that "an important message from the City of Tahoka will follow" and within a few moments the pre-

recorded message will begin. In this instance, the message noted that the city water was cut off for an indefinite period due to a break in the water line. A second automated phone call, several hours later, notified citizens that the water was back on and that a mandatory "boil notice" to boil water for consumption should be followed. A third phone call will be sent when the boil notice is lifted and water is safe for human consumption. The boil notice is a safety

issue only for drinking water for human consumption. Water for all other usage, such as laundry, dishwashers, showers, and drinking water for pets, etc., is safe to use without boiling. For those with Caller ID, the

number for City Hall (561-4211) is shown. If a phone is in use, or not answered, the automated call message will be dialed again, once only. The service does not keep calling until the phone is answered. However, if there is an option to leave a voice message (answering machine or voicemail), the message will be recorded.

"There is no need to call City Hall if you missed the call," said city officials.

The city sent out postcards several months ago offering the automated phone service, and residents were required to list the phone numbers they wanted on the service and to return the postcards to City Hall. Anyone who failed to sign up for the automated phone message service, which will be used for emergency notifications only, may contact City Hall at 561-4211 for more information. Signups for the service are required in person at City Hall, with exceptions made for disabled/elderly residents who may have problems traveling to City Hall.





TxDOT to close **Woodrow Road** for three weeks


