Tahoka boasts second Centenarian:

Jackie Turner to observe 100th birthday today

Mattie Virginia "Jackie" Turner was born a century ago, and will observe her 100th birthday today (Thursday, Feb. 17), making her the second person in Tahoka with the unique designation of "Centenarian." She and Trudy Schuknecht, who turned 100 last April, are Tahoka's oldest residents — but both are women who have aged well and adapted to the changing times with patience, humor and grace.

Mrs. Turner has been a resident of Lynnwood Independent and Assisted Living Center in Tahoka for the past 4-1/2 years. There are five generations of family living here (20 family members in all) and others nearby who are hosting her 100th birthday celebration this Saturday, Feb. 19, from 2-4 p.m. in the Community Room of First National Bank.

City officials on Monday presented Mrs. Turner with a Proclamation honoring her status as a Centenarian on Feb. 17, 2011 and designating February 2011 as "Jackie Turner Month." Mayor John Baker presented the proclamation Monday evening at Lynnwood, with City Administrator Jerry Webster on hand for the ceremony.

Jackie was born Feb. 17, 1911 in Cedar Gap, Texas, the youngest of five children of Daniel and Emma O'Connell. Because she was the youngest, she was called "Sister Babe" until she gained the nickname of "Jackie" — although no one in the family can say where the name came from.

"I came across some of her report cards from school, and she was actually going by the name 'Jack' — it didn't even say Jackie," said her son, Dan Turner, with a laugh. "And none

of us know how she came by the name, but that is what she has always gone by."

Jackie went to school in Cedar Gap, in what is now known as Jim Ned School in Tuscola. In 1928, at age 17 she married Jessie Marvin "Boots" Turner, a "boy who lived just down the road." They were farmers, and in 1930 Jackie gave birth to their only child, Dan. The family moved to Borden County in 1943, farming and making their home about 17 miles east of O'Donnell. It was to be her home for the next 60-plus years, and the family still owns the land. Her husband died in 1972.

"We were farmers, and ever how long the day was, that's how long I had a hoe in my hands. I milked cows and hoed Johnson grass," recalls Jackie. She picked cotton along with her husband and young son, who says he can remember pulling a bag behind him and being asked to fill it a certain number of times before he could go sit in the shade of the wagon.

"Mom kept pulling though, I can remember that," says Dan.

But folks back then thought nothing of the long hours of labor and doing without the inventions that came later that changed the lives of cotton farmers in so many ways, Jackie doesn't re-

Tahoka boys, girls cage teams score sparkling season stats

Bulldogs are District Champions!

As the Tahoka boys and girls varsity basketball teams prepared for the playoffs this week, coaches Brandon Lee (boys) and Bric Turner (girls) released statistics recorded by their teams during the regular season which ended last week.

The Bulldogs ended the regular season at 23-5 and 9-1 in district, winning the district championship, closing with victories over Plains 70-51 and Smyer 51-49 last week. They earned a bye in the first round of playoffs and probably will play the winner between Fort Hancock and Eldorado next week.

The Lady Bulldogs, third in district, beat Springlake-Earth 74-64 Tuesday night to win Bi-District and advance to the Area round.

For the boys' team, Blake Turner was the leading scorer in the regular season, with 469 points, an average of 18 per game. He made 76 three-point field goals and scored 77 points on free throws, hitting a remarkable 94 per cent from the line.

Tanner Hall and Taylor Abell also averaged in double figures per game, with Abell averaging 15.1 and Hall hitting 14.1. Abell had 408 total points; Hall scored 382. Other Bulldogs

scoring in triple digits for the regular season were Neiko Garcia with 242, Ke'Shawn Hood with 177, and Keyshawn Liggins with 108.

Trai Smith was the team leader in rebounds, with 171, while Abell had 162 and Hall 119. Hall was easily the main man on assists, with 145, almost half of the entire team's total for the season. Garcia led in steals with 91, while Hall had 76 and Turner 56.

Tahoka's Lady Bulldogs, with a season record of 21-9 and district record of 7-3, were led in scoring by Brittney Liggins with 427 points, an average of 14.2 per game. She also had 91 points from the line, where she averaged 55 per cent. Mattie Turner was second in scoring with 343 points, including 75 free throws (60 per cent average) and a team-high 44 three-point goals. Others with total points for the season in triple digits were Kalee Wuensche with 211, Kaitlyn Reno 165, Stormee Martin 160, Morgan Lockaby 118 and Gretchen Henley with 107.

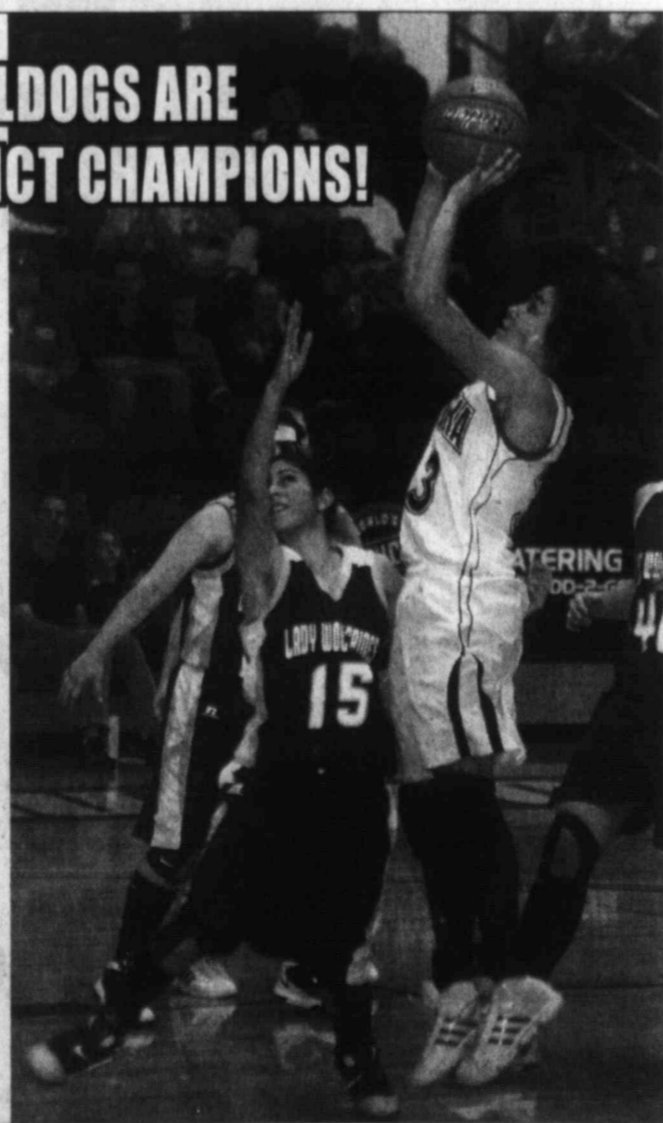
Reno was the big leader in number of steals with 121. Turner had the most assists with 83. Liggins' 207 rebounds led that category, and Henley had the most blocked shots with 49.

WHEN the Microsoft Network's daily news page on the internet offered an article last week on how men's hats are becoming popular again, it brought to mind some of my own experiments with wearing hats.

We're not talking about baseball caps here. I frequently wore those playing tennis or golf (which I used to a lot of) and mowing the grass (which I did only when no golf or tennis game was available). The article was about real hats, straws, felt or whatever, with hatbands, crowns and brims.

The article noted that back in the days of the great depression, photos of men in breadlines showed that the unemployed men all had one thing in common besides being out of work—they wore hats on their heads.

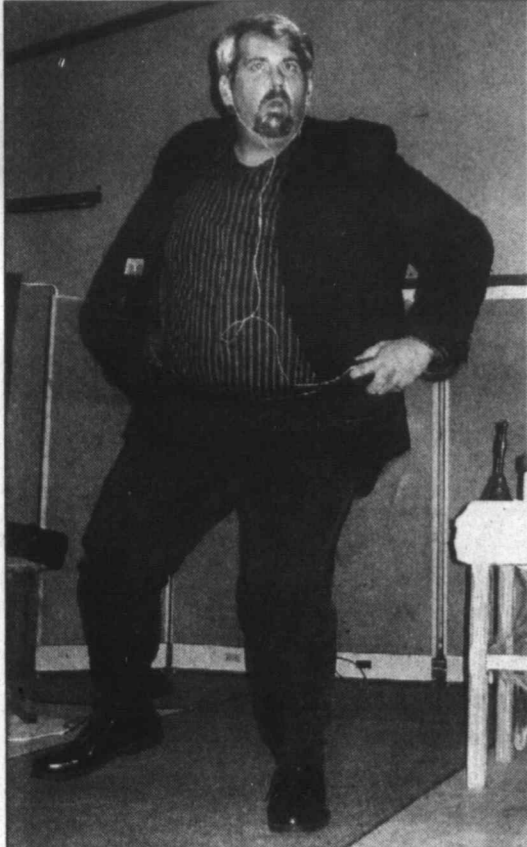
Headgear began to fall from favor with men in the 1960s, said the story, as longer hair styles and casual fashions became popular (with everybody except the parents of teenagers, as I recall).

Some guys I know always have worn hats almost everywhere they go, although in this part of the world, they usually are cowboy style, whether straw or the more expensive Stetsons. I know some men who always wear a baseball style cap, and you never see them without one (one guy I know probably wears a baseball cap in the shower, and when he goes to bed at night). But only a few I know wear a regular hat all the time.

I found out years ago I couldn't do that. I bought a hat or two, and pretty soon I left them someplace because I forgot I had one.

My most memorable hat trick was sometime in the 60s when I ran a weekly newspaper at Throckmorton, TX. The owner of a department store (I think it was called Redwine's) was one of our few advertisers, so I decided one day to buy a western style hat, fairly expensive and sort of like a Stetson. I put it on and started out of the store back to my office, a block or so away. It was really windy that day, and a gust jerked it off my head and into the street, where an 18-wheeler ran over it before I could get it back.

It was a bad hat day.

County accepts lone bid for mineral lease

Lynn County Commissioners met Monday in routine session at the courthouse, opening a lone sealed bid for a mineral lease proposal on county-owned tracts of land in O'Donnell. Commissioners unanimously

accepted the bid for the two tracts of land, at \$150 per net acre and 3/16 royalty for five years. The acquiring company is Raw Energy, L.C. and represented by Mark Hardwick of Midland.

In other business, a request was approved from the county clerk's office for a budget amendment for temporary help due to the high volume of land/mineral research that continues through that office. Commissioners approved a \$10,000 increase, with the funds to come from the fees the county clerk's office collects for these services.

TISD administrative contracts renewed

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met last Thursday, renewing contracts for a slate of four administrators and setting a trustee election for May 14.

The contracts of High School Principal Michael Norman, Middle School Principal Tom Thomas, and Elementary Principal Alecia Hancock were approved and extended through the 2012-2013 school years. The contract for Athletic Director John Cornelius was approved for the 2011-2012 school year. None of the contract renewals included a change in salary.

Two resolutions were approved, one in support of House Joint Resolution 56 prohibiting unfunded mandates upon Texas counties, and one in support of community mental health services through the Lubbock Regional Mental Health Center.

One files for city election

One candidate has filed during the last week in city, school and hospital elections in Lynn County, which will be held May 14. Tahoka Mayor John Baker filed for re-election to his seat, and thus far is the only candidate to file in any of the elections.

The filing period opened this week and continues through March 14 at the business offices of the entities involved. City elections for Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell, Lynn County Hospital District, and school elections for Tahoka ISD, Wilson ISD and O'Donnell ISD will be held.

Monthly bills were approved, and Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on his department's activities.

Lady Bulldogs win Bi-district, advance to Area

Mattie Turner opened with a 3-pointer and racked up a total of 27 points as she led the Tahoka Lady Bulldogs to a 74-64 bi-district win over Springlake-Earth Tuesday night at the Rip Griffin Center in Lubbock. The Lady Bulldogs now face Van Horn, who drew a bye in bi-district as champions of district 8-1A, in Area action this Friday in Monahans. Tipoff is set for 8 p.m.

The Lady Dogs got off to a slow start, trailing 8-3 in the first few minutes, but tied the Lady Wolverines 18-18 by the end of the first quarter. Springlake-Earth pulled ahead by several points in the second quarter, but Tahoka closed the gap and trailed by only 2 at the half, 37-35.

Gretchen Henley tossed in 8 points in the third quarter, including a field goal that turned the tide in Tahoka's favor with two minutes left in the third. Kaitlyn Reno and Kalee Wuensche each tossed in a 3-pointer at key moments in the third, and Tahoka led 55-49 going into the fourth.

The Lady Dogs kept their lead by at least six points throughout the final period, and widened it to a 10-point lead by the final buzzer, 74-64. Henley, Brittney Liggins and Wuensche joined Turner in double-figures for the Lady Bulldogs, with 14 points for Henley, 12 for Liggins, and 11 for Wuensche despite fouling out of the game halfway through the fourth quarter.

Burglars strike two downtown businesses

Two downtown Tahoka businesses were victimized by burglars Sunday night or early Monday, stealing about \$270 at one location and causing damage "and a big mess" at the other.

Taylor Tractor & Equipment and Fenton Insurance agency were targeted, and each of these businesses offered \$500 rewards to be added to another \$500 from Crime Line, 561-5255, making a total of \$1500 offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible.

Entry was gained at Fenton Insurance by breaking through a rear door. Once inside, the intruders overturned a large heavy safe and then managed to get it open, apparently with a crowbar or similar instrument. Owner Kent Elliott said there was nothing in the safe except papers, which the burglars left scattered on the floor. A smaller safe also was broken into, but contained nothing of value. Other than the mess made, nothing appeared to be missing or damaged.

At Taylor Tractor, where entry also was gained by forcing a rear door, the burglars broke into a safe and took \$270. They also stole two sledgehammers, one 10-pound and one 4-pound, and a pry bar. The stolen articles were valued at \$77 by Taylor Tractor representative Mike Mensch, who also said

several offices in the company had been ransacked.

Police on Sunday arrested a 45-year-old Tahoka man who allegedly violated a criminal trespass warning issued three days earlier and was accused of assaulting a 47-year-old woman.

Thirteen persons were jailed in the county during the last week, including three held for Andrews County, leaving the total in jail here at 17 early this week.

Charges on which arrests were made included grand jury indictments against three persons previously named, indicted for sexual-assault/indecency with a child, felony driving while intoxicated and prohibited substance in a correctional facility plus bond forfeiture. Other charges bringing arrests were driving while license invalid with previous conviction plus fleeing from a police officer, failure to appear on possession of marijuana, hold for immigration authorities, application to revoke probation on displaying suspended drivers license plus violating promise to appear, DWI, driving while license invalid, and one female on seven charges related to driving: license invalid with previous conviction, no Texas drivers license, unsafe speed, no liability insurance, two counts of violating promise to appear, bond surrender and two cases of DWI.

member the job of picking cotton by hand as being hard. "Naw, picking cotton wasn't hard ... as long as I had a pair of gloves I was fine," she says.

When asked what she thought were the best inventions in her 100 years of life, she thought briefly and then said, "Cultivators, I guess - although indoor toilets were a big deal. I saw a lot of changes, but I just changed with them," she says with a shrug.

And, apparently, her easy-going attitude of taking life as it comes is part of the secret of longevity.

"Patience and good health - that's what has kept Mom go-

ing," says Dan. "She was never in a hospital until she broke a hip when she was 85 years old, and she is really doing quite well, all things considered."

"I feel good," insists Jackie. "I've never been sick to amount to anything, really."

Dan and his wife, Ouida, had two children, Blaine and Danna. Dan and Blaine owned and operated Harmony Gin east of O'Donnell for several years. Blaine, however, died young at the age of 36 after a heart attack. "After Blaine died, we ran the gin one more year and then shut it down. There were too many little gins around back then and not enough cotton to go around," says Dan.

Their daughter, Danna, married Zane Curry, both of whom are educators. Danna is a teacher at Tahoka ISD, and their children Rachel (and Bruce) Lehman, Rebekah (and Reed) Filley, and Ryan (and Erica) Curry and their families, also live in Tahoka. Blaine had three children, one a son, Brick Turner, who is the head basketball coach for the Tahoka Lady Bulldogs. He and his wife Tonya have four children who attend Tahoka ISD. Blaine also had two daughters, Kim (and Steve) Lightfoot and sons, of College Station, and Roxie (and Clay) Miller of Lamesa.

Jackie spends her days walking the halls of Lynnwood Center and visiting with the other residents, and observing the nearby cotton fields she can see from her window. "I still like looking at the cotton fields, and the cotton gets so big now," says Jackie.

As to hobbies, Jackie says with a grin, "No hobbies - I can get out of everything now." She enjoys walking for exercise, albeit with a walker to steady her balance.

Her family is pleased to have the Lynnwood facilities available here, allowing Jackie to live with some independence and yet have the care of health professionals and other amenities.

And, the fact that she is the second Centenarian of Tahoka is something they are proud of.

"You want to know something funny?" says Dan with a laugh. "Trudy (the other Centenarian) does my ironing! I mean, I hate to have her keep doing it, but she wants the pocket money and insists on still doing it, so we just keep taking it to her."

"I tell you, we can learn lessons from these older people!" Dan added. "Five years ago, we had a 95th birthday celebration for Jackie and all the family came. One of my cousins told her, as he was leaving, 'Aunt Jackie, I'll come back for your 100th birthday' - and Jackie responded, 'I'll be here!'"

A century of life is a milestone that very few achieve, and this birthday is one that Mattie Virginia "Jackie" Turner can be proud to celebrate.

City audit approved

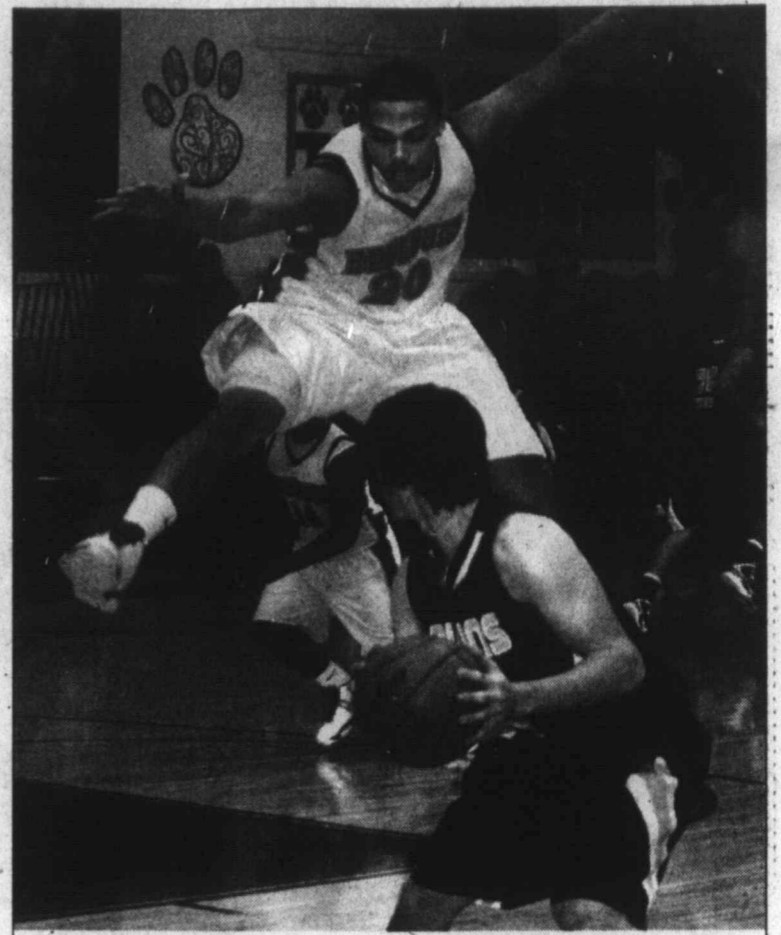
Tahoka City Council met in routine session Monday night, approving the city's financial audit for fiscal year ending September 2010 as presented by Joe F. Hays, CPA. Hays reported a clean audit.

Discussion was held on the possibility of a new city ordinance prohibiting loud music coming from vehicles on public streets, as city officials have had several complaints regarding this issue. The council instructed the city attorney to present a proposed ordinance at the next meeting.

The council also voted to place stop signs at the east-west intersection of N. 8th Street and Ave. M, after receiving complaints from citizens. The signs will be ordered and placed as soon as possible.

Mayor John Baker presided at the meeting, with council members Rudy Fuentes, Ronny Jolly, Amy Preston, Jeff Martin present, as well as City Administrator Jerry Webster and other city officials. Councilman Ray Box was absent.



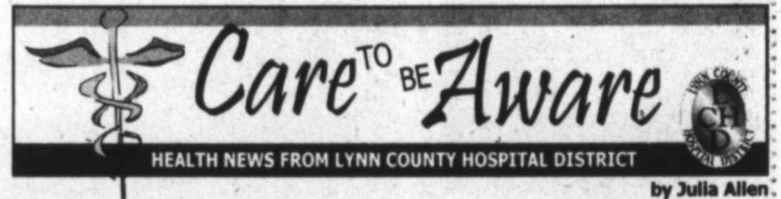
