

# Smyer ends playoff run for Tahoka's Lady Bulldogs

Smyer, district foes of the Tahoka Lady Bulldogs, shut down Tahoka 63-38 in the Class 1A Division I regional quarterfinal Tuesday night at the United Spirit Arena in Lubbock, ending the Lady Bulldogs' state playoff run. Coach Bric Turner's squad finished a great season at 23-10.

The Lady Cats' standout player, Haley Fowler, a junior who last year was the Class 1A state tournament's MVP, led Smyer's win with 23 points. Lead scorer for Tahoka was Mattie Turner with 15, most of which occurred in the first half of the game, when the Lady Bulldogs kept an even pace with the Lady Cats, trailing by 8 at the half, 32-24. Smyer controlled the second half, however, with Tahoka's girls only getting two free throws in the third quarter to Smyer's 15 points.

The Lady Bulldogs struggled to add another 12 points in the final period, but by then Smyer had increased their lead significantly, and had 25 points on the Lady Dogs in the end.

The Lady Bulldogs manhandled—or womanhandled—the Van Horn girls team 61-14 at Monahans last Friday to win the Area playoff. Coach Turner let all 10 varsity girls get into the action after the Lady Dogs took a 26-0 first quarter lead, and from there they coasted in.

Mattie Turner led scoring with 17 points; Brittney Liggins scored 13 and Morgan Lockaby 10. Kaitlyn Reno had 6 steals, while Turner, Liggins and Lockaby had 4 each as Tahoka stole the ball a whopping 27 times. Gretchen Henley blocked four shots.

# Arrests planned for hot check writers and other offenders

Lynn -County law enforcement agencies will be serving arrest warrants soon for those who have cases pending in Lynn County involving hot checks, traffic citations or other outstanding Class C offenses – unless arrangements are made immediately to pay the fines and fees to clear these cases. Lynn County Attorney Donnis Scott told *The News* this week that more than 100 cases are pending that may result in arrests in the coming weeks.

"Every law enforcement agency will participate in the roundup," said the past but have defaulted on them, or perhaps they never made arrangements to pay," Scott said. "And they will not be given a second chance to make payment plans,—it's pay now or go to jail," she added.

Offenses including hot checks, city and county traffic citations and other outstanding Class C offenses filed in Justice of the Peace or Municipal Courts, such as ordinance violations or open container violations, will be included in the arrest warrants.

"Anyone who has any of these types of cases pending must make payment immediately to the appropriate

Scott. "We will be serving arrest warrants in Lynn County and possibly surrounding counties in the coming weeks on people who have not cleared these cases," she warned.

Scott said that in all pending cases that will be involved in the roundup, the persons involved have received a minimum of three notices and had many months to make arrangements to pay their fees and clear the case.

"A lot of these will be people who have made payment arrangements in

# New US 87 traffic signals at Woodrow Road intersection now activated

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) was scheduled to activate the new traffic signal on US 87 at Woodrow Road (CR 7600) on Tuesday, Feb. 22. The \$567,294 project was funded through the federal Hazard Elimination and Safety Program and state funds.

Additional intersection improvements included adding left and right turn lanes to both northand southbound US 87, adding through-traffic and dedicated turn lanes to Woodrow Road and the installation of a vehicle detection system designed to improve traffic flow through the area.

The traffic signals will not run off a timing system but, rather, will be triggered by a vehicle detection system and is designed to eliminate unnecessary waiting, said Ricky Lawrence, TxDOT traffic systems specialist.

"When the sensors detect a vehicle approaching the intersection, it puts a call into the system's computer to give the vehicle a green indication," Lawrence said. "The light will remain green until all the detected vehicles have entered the intersection or for a maximum of 30 seconds, whichever comes first."

The intersection is assigned a default major road – usually the intersection's major highway or the road with the highest traffic volume. The light will remain green on the major road until a

vehicle is detected on the minor road, Lawrence added.

Motorists should also keep in mind that the sensors have a limited range from the intersection and may not detect vehicles approaching the intersection or that the light has already reached its 30 second maximum green time and will have to wait at the red light until other traffic is allowed through the intersection.

"It may take a little time go get use to, but this system of traffic signals does minimize the amount of time motorists wait at a red light," Lawrence said. "Really, it all comes down to practical time management."

Additionally, an Advanced Warning End-of-Green (AWEG) System, also installed in the intersection, will notify US 87 motorists of the approaching traffic signal.

"The AWEG system is designed to alert motorists to be prepared to stop when the yellow lights are flashing," said Jeremy Dearing, P.E., TxDOT traffic engineer and project manager. "This type of system is typically used to improve safety on roadways where traffic is approaching a signalized intersection at a high rate of speed."

Because of the new traffic conditions, Dearing urges motorists to use caution when traveling through the area once the traffic signals are activated.







body and food. Your liver and other cells in your body make about 75% of blood cholesterol. The other 25% comes from the foods you eat.


