

Hospital benefit auction set here Saturday evening

All area residents are invited to the 31st Annual Lynn County Hospital District auction and fish fry this Saturday, May 7, from 5:30-8:00 p.m. at the Lynn County Show Barn on South 9th Street in Tahoka. The annual fund-raising event for the hospital, sponsored by Tahoka Rotary Club, was renamed as the Billy Tomlinson Memorial Hospital Benefit Auction last year, in honor of Tomlinson's longtime service to the hospital as a director.

Rotary members say there is still time to donate an item for the auction, by calling any Rotary Club member to pick up the item, or call Julia Allen at the hospital at 998-4533 ext. 333.

Admission to the event is free, but a \$1 donation will buy a door prize ticket to be eligible for the many door prizes that will be given away. Raffle tickets will be available for purchase, with five chances to win including a \$300 Southwest Airlines ticket, two \$50 gasoline gift certificates from Witt Butane, and two \$50 Visa gift cards.


Auction items donated thus far by area citizens and businesses include a Dell laptop computer, a 50-inch flat screen HDTV, Ipod, and an Amazon Kindle e-reader, as well as home and garden items, home décor, tools, baked goods, and more. A quilt, handmade by 101-year-old Trudy Schuknecht of Tahoka, will be up for auction, and trip packages to Ruidoso, NM and San Antonio will also be auctioned.

The Silent Auction tables, featuring items to be purchased by handwritten bids, will be conducted from 5:30 until 7:30 p.m.

An All-You-Can-Eat Fish Fry will be served beginning at approximately 5:30 p.m., at a cost of \$6 per plate. Members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department generously offer their services in preparing the fried fish, hush puppies, fried potatoes/onions and coleslaw for the evening, and hospital directors and staff members serve the meal. Phebe K. Warner club members will sell homemade ice cream, and Lynn County 4-H youth will have drinks available at the concession stand. All proceeds benefit the hospi-

The main event of the evening will be the live auction of items donated by area merchants and individuals. The live auction begins at 6:00 p.m. and continues until all items are sold, usually closing at approximately 8:00

Two jailed here after confrontation

Two 19-year-old Tahoka men were jailed on charges of public intoxication Sunday after a confrontation, first with a citizen, then with police officers called to the scene. One of the men was also charged with resisting arrest after struggling with two officers trying to get him into a patrol car.

Twenty persons were being held in Lynn County jail this week, with two of those held for Andrews County. Six were added to the list during the last week, mostly on charges related to driving. Two were charged with driving while intoxicated. Five were charged with driving while license invalid, one with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, one expired drivers license, one for speeding. Other charges included unregistered motorboat, and failure to maintain financial record or prepare annual report.

In April, 224 calls were processed by dispatchers at the Lynn County sheriff's office. These included 107 call for the county, 78 for City of Tahoka, six for O'Donnell, 22 ambulance calls, and 11 fire alarms, according to Chief Dispatcher Luis Vasquez.

In the Lynn County Hospital District election for two directors, early voting will be held in the basement courtroom at the Lynn County Courthouse during regular business hours.


Early voting for the Wilson city election will be conducted at Wilson City Hall during regular business hours (8-12, 1-3 pm) with two additional 12-hour early voting days on May 3 and May 5,

from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. For the Wilson ISD election for two trustees, early voting will be held at the WISD Elementary Office, from 1-4 p.m. Monday, May 2, and from 9 a.m.-12 noon and 1:00-3:30 p.m. May 3-10 during weekdays.

In the O'Donnell City Council election for three council seats, early voting will be held May 2-10 during regular business hours at City Hall, with two additional 12-hour early voting days on May 5 and May 6, from 8 a.m. until 8

For the O'Donnell ISD election for two trustees, early voting will be conducted at the OISD Administration Office, May 2-10, from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m.

In Tahoka, both the city and school elections have been canceled, as well as the New Home city election, with uncontested candidates to be declared elected.





LETTER to the EDITOR

Thankful for LCHD

April 21, 2011 began as an ordinary day, getting ready to go to work. But around 06:30 in the morning I started to experience some symptoms, from sweating and shoulder pains to nausea that my husband felt could not be ignored. He immediately drove us to the Lynn County Hospital emergency room. From the moment we rang the bell at the ER to the time I was transported to the ER in Lubbock I was provided with excellent care by the ER staff and the Nurse Practioner. Shannon was so calm and caring that I had no added anxieties to deal with. Shannon and the staff at the ER had correctly assessed and had initiated treatment and planned for the care that possibly saved my life.

I was told all the names of the staff but I hope you understand why on this morning, I can't remember names, but I can remember the care you provided. One person in particular, the ER aide, appeared to be my guardian angel, as she held my cold hands with her warm hands and spoke in a soft voice telling me you will be alright and with a soothing tome she said keep the faith. The ER's staff calmness and nurturing manner allayed my fears and anxiety.

The ambulance drive to Lubbock was an adventure and Ginger drives a mean ambulance. The two young folks with me in the back of the ambulance, even though they were new to this work were very calm and professional. Lynn County Hospital is to be commended for the ER staff who provided fine care and who were very professional. I realize the ER staff is simply doing their job as health care professions but they made this person feel very appreciative of their caring and nurturing professional work.

My husband Ricardo and I chose to come to Tahoka almost five years ago and we are very glad we did.

Lynn County Hospital ER staff of the morning of April 21, 2011, you know who you are, so pat yourself in the back and remember that the Martinez family is very appreciative that you do what you do.


Mires-Begley engagement announced

Legislation seen as threat to Lynn County Hospital

Morris detailed some proposals that he said would negatively affect rural hospitals, and later issued a prepared statement detailing some of the threats.

The board voted unanimously to increase the room deposit for new residents of Lynnwood Assisted Living and to make the deposits non-refundable to help pay for room repairs, effective May 1.

The board also approved a new policy for use of cell phones by employees, medical staff reappointments for a group of Lubbock radiologists for reading x-rays and cat scans, and a resolution to designate funds for any construction projects.

Attending the meeting were Morris, board president Jerry Ford and members Jannis Horwood, Victoria Baker, James Craig, Frances Truehart and Nancy Guilliams. Absent was member Cal Huffaker

Morris issued the following analysis of the threat of legislation to rural hospitals, noting that he attended a conference of the Texas Organization of Rural Community Hospitals (TORCH):

"Healthcare (particularly

rural healthcare) is facing some of the biggest challenges and threats from legislators ever experienced. It was reported that the Congressional Budgetary Office has recommended to reported to the hospital board A Congress to end Critical Access Hospital cost reimbursement. A Critical Access Hospital (CAH) is a hospital that is certified to receive cost-based reimbursement from Medicare. The reimbursement that CAHs receive is intended to improve their financial performance and thereby reduce hospital closures.

"Lynn County Hospital District converted to Critical Access Hospital status in 2004. As of Sept. 2010 there were 1320 CAHs throughout the nation. Advocacy groups such as TORCH, American Hospital Association and the Texas Hospital Association are protesting the CBO's recommendation and have pointed out that all payments from the Centers for Medicare Services (CMS) to all facilities with 50 beds or fewer which includes all CAHs make up less than 2% of the overall CMS budget. These advocacy groups are saying to the CBO that they should clean up the 98% and leave the 2% alone. This may not be politically expedient because the 98% represents all of the largest hospitals in the nation from 50 beds and up and includes the nation's largest hospital and healthcare systems

"Another threat is the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB), which is a result of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act. This is a 15-member panel appointed by the president and subject to Senate confirmation and will be the primary mechanism for cutting Medicare spending. Some of IPAB's critics say that it takes the duty of cutting Medicare reimbursement out of Congress' hands and is basically a transfer of power from the legislative to the executive branch. Other critics state that this legislation specifies that any recommendations IPAB makes about Medicare, spending automatically become law. Congress can only override IPAB with a threefifths vote or they can pass their own Medicare plan that meets the same spending target.

"In addition, there is NO administrative process for doctors or citizens to challenge the IPAB board's decisions. Critics point out that IPAB is even more blatantly unconstitutional than the individual mandate, as its power





U.S. Treasury to "retire" paper check Social Security, other federal benefits

Washington, D.C. - The U.S. Department of the Treasury is retiring the paper Social Security check for millions of baby boomers and others applying for federal benefits, a move that will save taxpayers \$1 billion over the next 10 years. Beginning May 1, 2011, anyone newly applying for Social Security, Veterans Affairs or other federal benefits will need to choose an electronic payment method paper checks will no longer be an option. People currently receiving their federal benefits by paper check must switch to direct deposit by March 1, 2013.

"More than 18 million baby boomers are expected to reach retirement age during the next five years, with 10,000 people a day becoming eligible for Social Security benefits," said Treasurer of the United States Rosie Rios. "It costs 92 cents more to issue a payment by paper check than by direct deposit. rity paper check option in favor of electronic payments because it is the right thing to do for benefit recipients and American taxpayers alike.'

The Treasury Department published a final rule in December 2010, to gradually eliminate paper checks for federal benefit payments. In addition to the taxpayer savings, electronic payments are safer and more convenient than paper checks. Last year alone, more than 540,000 Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) paper checks were reported lost or stolen and had to be replaced.

The Treasury Department's Go Direct® public education campaign provides information to Americans about the change to how federal benefit payments are being delivered and makes it easy for current check recipients to switch online at www.GoDirect.org or by calling a toll-free helpline.

federal benefits on or after May 1, 2011, must choose an electronic payment option at the time they sign up for their benefits. If they wish to direct their money into a bank or credit union account, they will want to have the following information on hand at the time they apply for their benefits:

 Financial institution's routing transit number (often found on a personal check)

 Account type – checking or saving

· Account number (often found on a personal check)



USDA is providing funding for up to \$61 million in guaranteed loans and \$42 million in grants through the Rural Energy for America Program (REAP). Funds are available to help agricultural producers and rural small businesses develop renewable energy systems, including assistance to fuel station owners to install flexible fuel pumps that will offer Americans more renewable energy options. In addition, funding is available for energy efficiency improvements and studies to determine the feasibility of renewable energy systems.

Recently, USDA issued a rule to clarify that the definition of renewable energy systems in REAP includes flexible fuel pumps, sometimes referred to as "blender pumps." This clarification is intended to provide fuel station owners with incentives to install flexible fuel pumps that will offer Americans more renewable energy options. The Obama administration has set a goal of installing 10,000 flexible fuel pumps nationwide within 5

The rule also makes the following clarifications:

· Grants are available for audits of energy improvements and studies to determine the feasibility of renewable energy systems; and

 Agricultural producers in non-rural areas are eligible for REAP assistance. Small businesses must still be located in rural areas. This clarification makes REAP eligibility requirements consistent with those of other USDA energy programs.

Under REAP, local businesses receive assistance to deploy wind, solar and other forms of renewable energy.


The reason I can't remember it now is that I didn't use it much, It was really hard to work into a conversation.

Job fair slated for Post/Garza County



It can hurt your eyes, irritate your respiratory system and worsen symptoms from preexisting conditions. If your home is located in an area affected by wildfires, keep the windows and doors of your home shut and limit outdoor activities as much as possible. Wear a protective mask outside, and keep your airways moist by drinking plenty of water. To help relieve dryness, breathe through a warm, wet cloth.





Lynn County Appraisal District Provides Public Information and ASSISTANCE

This is the time of year the Lynn County Appraisal District sends notices of appraised value. Lynn County notices will be mailed by May 10, 2011. Property owners will be mailed a notice as a result of any of the following circumstances affecting real property: if the 2011 proposed value is at least \$1000 more than the 2010 certified value; if the property owner has filed a timely rendition; if 2011 is the first year the property is listed in the appraisal records; if the property changed ownership during 2010; or if the property is a producing mineral interest. Notices will also be mailed to owners of taxable furniture, fixtures; machinery, equipment, vehicles, and inventory used in a trade or business.

Property owners who have questions, or want to discuss the value placed on their property should contact the appraisal district office. The legal deadline for filing a timely protest is thirty days from the date of your notice. Those who receive a notice in Lynn County have until June 9, 2011 to file a protest. If you believe the proposed market value of your property is incorrect, be sure to contact the appraisal district prior to your deadline. It is important to ask questions or call to our attention unusual facts about your property as soon as possible. In the case of value questions, property owners are urged to present conclusive evidence regarding the true market value of their property. Such evidence consists of closing statements, listing agreements, fee appraisals, income and expense statements, pictures, and surveys. Our goal is to treat all property owners in a fair and equitable manner; and this can best be accomplished when you provide evidence to us about your property as soon as possible.

The following publication is required by Section 41.70 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property · the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- · any exemptions that may apply to you · the qualification for an agricultural or timber
- appraisal · the taxable status of your property · the local governments which should be taxing
- your property
- · the ownership of property • the change of use of land receiving special
- appraisal · any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affects you.

INFORMAL REVIEW

You may call (806) 561-5477 to discuss your protest with a CAD employee and try to come to a settlement without meeting with the ARB.

REVIEW BY THE APPRAISAL REVIEW BOARD

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The CAD might ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for

the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 1615 Main Street, Tahoka, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

REVIEW BY THE DISTRICT COURT OR AN ARBITRATOR

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal with the applicable filing fee.

TAX PAYMENT You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at Lynn CAD, 1615 Main Street, Tahoka, TX 79373, (806) 561-5477. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Assistance Division at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural aporaisal because you changed the use of your land). the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the

notice of the determination was mailed to you. For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

High Plains Water Conservation District Board consider public comments on amendments

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Board of Directors held an April 19 work session to review, discuss, and consider public comments received on its initial draft rules amendments.

The Board received recommendations from General Manager Jim Conkwright at the work session on moving forward with the rules amendments and responding to public comments. The recommendations included the following:

· Raise the proposed annual allowable production rate to 1.75 acre-feet per contiguous acre (21 inches per contiguous acre per year) and then lower the allowable production rate incrementally over a four-year

 Eliminate the designation of high decline areas within the district. As a result, the proposed moratorium on drilling and the five percent production reduction in areas exceeding the allowable decline rate are eliminated as well.

 Refine language regarding contiguous controlled acres.

· Add option for "water banking" to allow the option of carrying forward an amount of water left over from the previous year's allowable production

· Allow additional time to comply with District rules.

The District staff is working to proceed as recommended and will develop rules amendments for the Board to review and discuss at the May 17 Board meeting.

The District is amending its rules to implement the "50/50" management goal adopted by the District. The "50/50" management goal refers to the desired future condition that has been established on a regional basis for the Ogallala Aquifer that at least 50 percent of the groundwater in the aquifer will still be available in 50 years.

"After attendance at the public meetings and review of the public comments on the initial draft rules amendments, several areas of concern were indentified and revisions are being made to the next set of rules to address those issues," Conkwright said.

The current timeline for rules development will result in a revised set of rules available for public review and comment on or about May 17.

The Water District will hold two public hearings on June 9 to receive comments about the revised set of draft rules amendments, with one hearing in the northern area of the District and the other hearing in the southern area of the District. Once determined, the times and locations of the two public hearings will be made available to area news media, and will be posted to the District's web site at www. Written comhpwd.com. ments on the revised set of rules will be accepted at the District's Lubbock office until 5:00 p.m. on June 30.

"The High Plains Water District Board of Directors appreciates the public input it has received regarding these rule revisions. We encourage area residents to look over the next set of draft rules, when available, and offer any comments that they might have," Conkwright

Lynn County Appraisal District Provides Public Information and ASSISTANCE

This is the time of year the Lynn County Appraisal District sends notices of appraised value. Lynn County notices will be mailed by May 10, 2011. Property owners will be mailed a notice as a result of any of the following circumstances affecting real property: if the 2011 proposed value is at least \$1000 more than the 2010 certified value; if the property owner has filed a timely rendition; if 2011 is the first year the property is listed in the appraisal records; if the property changed ownership during 2010; or if the property is a producing mineral interest. Notices will also be mailed to owners of taxable furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment, vehicles, and inventory used in a trade or business.

Property owners who have questions, or want to discuss the value placed on their property should contact the appraisal district office. The legal deadline for filing a timely protest is thirty days from the date of your notice. Those who receive a notice in Lynn County have until June 9, 2011 to file a protest. If you believe the proposed market value of your property is incorrect, be sure to contact the appraisal district prior to your deadline. It is important to ask questions or call to our attention unusual facts about your property as soon as possible. In the case of value questions, property owners are urged to present conclusive evidence regarding the true market value of their property. Such evidence consists of closing statements, listing agreements, fee appraisals, income and expense statements, pictures, and surveys. Our goal is to treat all property owners in a fair and equitable manner; and this can best be accomplished when you provide evidence to us about your property as soon as possible.

The following publication is required by Section 41.70 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or appraised value of your property • the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll · any exemptions that may apply to you
- · the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- · the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- · the ownership of property • the change of use of land receiving special
- · any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to

and adversely affects you. INFORMAL REVIEW You may call (806) 561-5477 to discuss your

protest with a CAD employee and try to come to a settlement without meeting with the ARB. **REVIEW BY THE APPRAISAL REVIEW BOARD**

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. The CAD might ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for

the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. In certain protests where the owner has submitted an independent appraisal before the hearing, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 1615 Main Street, Tahoka, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case

before the ARB hears it. **REVIEW BY THE DISTRICT COURT OR AN ARBITRATOR OR SOAH**

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. In certain cases, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may file, not later than the 45th day after you receive notice of the ARB order, a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district. In certain cases originating in certain counties, as an alternative to filing an appeal in district court, you may appeal to the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH). An appeal to SOAH is initiated by, not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order, filing with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district a notice of appeal with the applicable filing fee.

TAX PAYMENT You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual leadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the

notice of the determination was mailed to you. For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
